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PROCEEDINGS OF THE

York Municipal Council.

January Session, 1883.

Officially Reported for the Board by

Loran O. Macnutt.

FIRST DAY.

Fredericton, Jan. 16.

The York Municipal Council opened its session today at 10 A. M.

Warden Close, in the Chair.

Secy-Treas. Rainsford called the roll of Council, and all members were present constituting the Council for 1883 as follows:

WARDEN—Thomas Coburn, Henry Sloan.

CANTERBURY—Daniel W. Grant, George A. Jamieson.

DUNFRIES—John Scott, David P. Gilman.

KINGSLEIGH—John O. Murray, Benjamin A. Everett.

MANNERS-SUTTON—William Murphy, John Mowatt.

NEW MARLBOROUGH—James K. Pinder, James T. Martin.

ST. MARY'S—Benjamin Close, Wm. H. White.

STANLEY—William Currie, John Calhoun.

The Council then proceeded to the election of a Warden for 1883.

Warden Close was nominated by Councilor Pinder and seconded by Councilor McCormack.

Coun. Colter was nominated by Councilor McCormack.

On a vote being taken, Coun. Colter was declared elected, the vote standing: Colter, 15; Close, 11.

Warden Colter then took the chair and thanked the Council for the honor they had conferred upon him.

He then read the report of the Council for the year 1882, and hoped he would be able to leave the chair at the close of the term with as good a record as his predecessor.

The Secretary-Treasurer then read the minutes of the July session, which were received and adopted.

The Secretary-Treasurer submitted his half-yearly accounts, which were referred to Couns. Coburn, Estabrooks, Grant, Close, Gilman.

The Council then adjourned till 2 P. M., on motion of Coun. Estabrooks.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Council resumed at 2 P. M., the Warden in the Chair.

On motion of Coun. Murray, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the Council do hereby order that the report of the Council for the year 1882, be printed as an appendix to the Auditor's report.

The Warden appointed the following committees:

Assessment—Couns. Estabrooks, McNally, Everett, Murphy, Pinder, Colter, Cropley, Grant, Hornecastle, Calhoun, Coburn, Close, Gilman.

Public Buildings—Couns. Coburn, Everett, Jamieson, Martin, Bird, Lonsbury, White, Currie, Smith, Mowatt, McElroy, Sloan.

Printing and Stationery—Couns. Sloan, McNally, Hornecastle.

Administration of Justice—Couns. Pinder, Currie, Murphy, Sloan, White.

Coun. Coburn submitted the report of the committee on the Secretary-Treasurer's Accounts, which was read and approved.

However, to direct the Council's attention to a charge of \$3 by the MARITIME FARMER Office for addressing papers, and to the expenses of lodging the jury in the Lees' case at the Queen's Hotel and Barker House, in which the charges were \$1.50 a man, per day.

Coun. Calhoun justified the \$5 paid for addressing, it having been authorized by the Council.

Coun. McCormack considered the expenses of the jury as entirely and unnecessarily too high.

Coun. Estabrooks took a similar view. He thought a saving could be effected in future, and the Council might make a recommendation to the Judges and Sheriff.

Coun. White considered the Sheriff controlled the matter, and the jury were bound to go where they were ordered by him.

Couns. Calhoun and Sloan were of opinion that regrets for the past were unavailing, but the expenditure should be better controlled in the future.

Coun. Coburn was authorized to state that jurors would be entertained at least one (1) cent bottle of beer, and one (1) cent bottle of coffee.

Coun. Everett moved, and Coun. Jamieson seconded, that a committee be appointed to recommend the necessity of a reduction in jury expenses hereafter.

Coun. McNally doubted the Council's authority to order the judges and the Sheriff to take the jury here, there, and everywhere.

Coun. Estabrooks thought the judges were reasonable gentlemen and would listen with respect to any recommendation of the Council.

The Council then passed, and the Warden appointed the following committee under it: Warden, Couns. Coburn, McCormack, Everett, Jamieson.

On motion of Coun. Murphy, the Board then proceeded to the election of county officers.

Coun. Grant, seconded by Coun. McCormack, nominated H. B. Rainsford, and Coun. McNally, seconded by Coun. Coburn, nominated J. A. VanWart.

L. O. Macnutt was appointed teller, and on the ballots being counted, Mr. Rainsford was declared elected, the vote standing: Rainsford, 14; VanWart, 12.

Mr. Rainsford, by permission, then thanked the Council for again electing him to fill the responsible office of Secretary-Treasurer, and said that he

had served the County faithfully for twenty years, and always with a view to do his duty fearlessly.

Very often matters of difficulty had arisen between the county and railway companies, and in other questions, and he had his eyes set on the interests of the county.

The opposition he met with to-day was a surprise to him, although he had heard an outside rumor. If any person was particularly anxious to leave his office, it would, he thought, be but fair, if he would notify him, and not go about behind his back, using unfair comments against him, and like a thief in the night, try to steal it from him.

He thanked the Council again, and said he would endeavor to do his duty in the future as he had in the past.

Coun. McCormack, seconded by Coun. Jamieson, nominated J. A. VanWart for Auditor and he was reelected without opposition.

Coun. McCormack moved the salaries of Secy-Treas. and Auditor be the same as last year, \$300 and \$100 respectively.

Coun. Pinder seconded by Coun. Murray, moved in amendment that the Secy-Treas. salary be \$400.

The amendment was put and lost on the following division of Council: yeas—Couns. Mowatt, Murphy, Martin, Pinder, Grant, Currie, Calhoun, Murray, Close, White, Jamieson, Estabrooks, Coburn, Sloan, Hornecastle, Smith, Scott, Gilman, Cropley, McElroy, McNally, Lonsbury, Bird, Warden.

The original resolution was then carried on the above vote reversed.

Peter Haining was reappointed constable of the Board, on motion of Coun. Coburn, and his salary fixed at \$150 per day during the session, on motion of Coun. McNally, seconded by Coun. Lonsbury.

The Secy-Treas. suggested that the Board should be advised by the Board of Trustees for convenience and information. It would cost nothing. He reported the refusal of the Municipality of \$20 by the Board of Trustees, and said that the amount paid for the services of a lunatic who had since escaped, the amount being paid over on his acquittal to the Superintendent of the Asylum.

Coun. Sloan observed that by the Auditor's Report several accounts of Poor's Assessors were signed by only one of the Assessors. There should be at least two names attached. The Secy-Treas. agreed with Coun. Sloan's remarks.

Coun. White seconded by Coun. Calhoun, moved for a committee to confer with the Council on the transfer of the old record office.

Coun. Martin inquired if the old committee had found out how much compensation the Government would allow the municipality for the transfer.

Coun. Pinder, of the old committee, said he would report to-morrow, and the resolution was ordered to lay over.

Coun. Pinder, seconded by Coun. Martin, moved for a committee to make provision for publishing the debates of the Council; carried, and the following committees were appointed: Couns. Pinder, Everett, McNally.

On motion of Coun. Calhoun, seconded by Coun. McCormack, it was ordered that the Bye-Road money be divided one-half equally, and one-half according to valuation.

On motion of Coun. Calhoun, seconded by Coun. McCormack, the Warden was directed to revise the non-resident list of voters.

The Council then adjourned till 10 A. M. to-morrow.

SECOND DAY.

Jan. 17.

The Council resumed at 10 A. M.

After routine the Secy-Treas. submitted his bonds for \$20,000, signed by himself, Hon. John J. Fraser and John McDonald, which were read and accepted on motion of Coun. Grant.

Next, Coun. Sloan submitted the report of the Committee on the MARITIME FARMER Office for addressing papers, and to the expenses of lodging the jury in the Lees' case at the Queen's Hotel and Barker House, in which the charges were \$1.50 a man, per day.

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The Council then adjourned till 10 A. M. to-morrow.

THIRD DAY.

Jan. 18th.

The Council resumed at 10 A. M.

After routine, Coun. Grant introduced a resolution relating to the running of a large of cattle in Canterbury.

Coun. Sloan seconded by Coun. Pinder, moved that the Council do hereby order that the running of a large of cattle in Canterbury be prohibited.
