T. D. Sullivan Talks for the First Time on the Present Trouble.

Chicago, Dec. 4.—T. D. Sullivan, the white-haired defender of Ireland, poet, and journalist, has a warm place in the hearts of the Irish people. The peculiarly sympathetic appliance that greeted him at the mass-meeting Saturday night demonstrated the hold he has upon the hearts of the Irish in America. This grand old patriot, whose good nature is as overflowing as is his fiery earnestness when aroused, is saddened at the existing state of affairs, which he thinks menaces the success of many years of effort. Commenting late last night upon the attitude of Parnell he said:

"Mr. Parnell is a man of great determination and of resolute character. His splendid attainments have been of great service to us in the past, and it grieves me very much to think that they will be of as much injury in the future. I cannot understand it. I do not see why he should so menace the unity of our party and the happiness of our race. What can he gain? Only his personal aggrandizement. For his own selfish gain he seems willing to sacrifice all the years of effort and privation and suffering which have been gladly endured by those who have loved Ireland. The result will be a little party divided into factions. Every moment since our party was formed we have been united in our work and in our trials. Why does he not, when he sees that his continuance as a leader imperils success, step like the patriot that we have always believed he was into the martial ranks? But no—no. And now, when so near the goal of our hopes and our prayers, we are crushed by his cruel solishness."

The old patriot's voice, which had called thousands to their feet in enthusiasm for Erin's cause at the meeting, was touching in its mellowness and grave in its carnestness, as he spoke, while the blue eyes and the honest countenance reflected the wail of a patriotic heart.

Quebec, and the contest for the seat in the Dominion House of Commons has not exthe spectacle is presented of a straight Liberal candidate, who favors unrestricted reciprocity with the United States, opposed by a Conservative candidate who declares he also will support unrestricted reciprocity by whomsoever brought forward, and that the Dominion voters' list revision shall cease, it being too costly. Let it not be supposed that there is any hedging on the part of this Conservative candidate. Speaking at the village of St. Remi, he said, according to the report in the Montreal Star, "he came forward as an independent candidate, free from all par-ties and pleiged to support none. The great question of the day he held to be the fiscal policy, and on that score he was in the most unlimited reciprocity

with the United States, and even if to

secure that, as great a change as reverting

to free trade was necessary, he would declare for the change. He would advocate revision of electoral lists by the Dominion as being too costly."

At first sight a supporter of unrestricted reciprocity would take the Conservative candidate for a good Liberal -one of those fellows who have been so frequently denounced by the organs that support the present Ottawa Administration s traitors, scoundrels, and annexationists. There can be no mistaking the principles which this representative of the Tory party professes. He wants votes, and knows he cannot get them the farmers of Napierville if he supports the regulation Tory platform, which, in obedience to combine dictation, is death on unfettered trade with the is death on unfottered trade with the States, and invariably blackguards all who favor it. ASSESSMENT OF FACTORIES. City Council to cast ballots for or against this question: "Are you in favor of exempt ing all manufactories from taxation as to building and machinery, the land to be assessed at its value?" This step has been taken in consequence of an agitation against the unfairness of the system generally pursued in assessing factories. Hamilton, with the object of encouraging manufactories, has already gone half way in the move ment towards the Georgian system of taxing the land, and exempting all buildings and all improvements. The assessors of that city are ordered not to tax machinery in factories. The ground taken has been that it is well to encourage the control of the use of as much machinery as possible, and inasmuch as a tax on an article has al-ways had the tendency to make it scarce, and the tax on machinery leads to fewer machines being used and therefore decreases the employment of labor, it has been deemed wisdom to throw off all taxes

of that kind.


