Thousands of Citizens Celebrate the Liberal Victory

By Which Charles S. Hyman is Re-elected.

The Grandest Political Demonstration Ever Seen in the City.

Red! Red!! Red!!! Red here, red there, red everywhere. Red was on top. It is intended that these columns shall be read also.

The town was literally painted red. Ladies wore it, boys were festooned with it, young men wrapped yards of it around them, middle aged men were bedecked with it, and grey-headed men did not think it a breach of dignity to display the successful color, for it represented the triumph of principles in London which they had fought for years to maintain.

"I have seen processions, political and sectional," said a Toronto clergyman, "but I never saw the equal of this." Was ever the like seen in London? The oldest inhabitant savs "No." and there have been many processions in the Forest City more or less imposing. Saturday night's caps the climax. It was a glorious outburst of pent-up enthusiasm, that for the first time found expression. It was a fitting celebration of one of the grandest victories ever won by Right over the might and corruption.

They carried brooms, they blew horns and cheered alternately, and they were bedecked with the emblematic hue. Toronto, Feb. 27.—Mr. Gibson's bill respecting insurance companies, contrary to the expectations of many prominent insurance men, does not contain any ciause to prohibit what is called a "rebate" of premium, which amounts to a discrimination between the large and the small insurer. The bill is principally made up of provisions for an elaborate system of registration both of companies and agents. It says: "After Dec. 31, 1892, no insurance shall

mayer in the power works are than one year it has assisted except by companies registered, either as insurance companies or as friendly societies. No friendly society shall be deemed to be managed according to the true intent of the act unless the persons insured by the society erecise effective control over the insurance funds of the society. Any lawfully incorporated trades union in Ontario, which, under the authority of the incorporating act, has an insurance or benefit fund for the benefit of its own members exclusively, shall be entitled to be registered on the friendly society register. No friendly society shall be required or permitted to make a deposit with the Ontario Government, nor shall the registrar vouch for the financial basis or the actuarial standing of it."

The army of life insurance agents in this Province must also be registered before they can carry on their operations. The bill provides that no person, not being the chief agent or the chief managing officer, shall directly act as insurance agent without having first obtained an agent's certificate of registry from the chief agent of a foreign insurance capen to the chief agent or the chief agent of a foreign insurance to the chief agent of a foreign insura

The German Government has appointed Dr. Von Holleben as its representative at Washington, and the new Minister has presented his credential, at the State Department. Dr. Von Holleben, the new German Minister, is a bachelor about 50 years old. He was educated in the universities of Heidelberg and Fonn, and earned the degree of doctor of laws. The doctor joined the Prussian Army at the beginning of the Franco-Prusian war. In 1876 he entered the diplomatic service, having previously been attached to the Department of Justice in Berlin. His first diplomatic assignment was as Charge d'Affaires at the Legation at Tokio, Japan, in the same capacity. In 1878 he was appointed Minister to the Argentine Republic, and in 1886 he was made Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to Japan.



Captain Lawson reports that it was 9:30 Wednesday night when the Loughbrow, which was loaded with coal, crushed into the Forest Queen's starboard quarter.

In the Young Men for January Professor Blackie publishes an interesting article on reminiscences of his youth. Like a lady's letter, the most important part of it is in the postscript, in which he sets down a few of the rules of conduct which have guided him through life, and which he has no doubt may have contributed largely to any praiseworthy work which he has been able, in the course of a long life, to achieve.

1. Never indulge the notion that you have any absolute right to choose the sphere or the circumstances in which you are to put forth your powers of social action; but let your daily wisdom of life be in making a good use of the opportunities given you.

2. We live in a real, and a solid, and a truthful world. In such a world only truth, in the long run, can hope to prosper. Therefore avoid lies, mere show and sham, and hollow superficiality of all kinds, which is at the best a painted lie. Let whatever you are, and whatever you do, grow out of a firm root of truth and a strong soil of reality.

3. The nobility of life is work. We live

S. Never desire to appear clever and make a show of your talents before men. Be honest, loving, kindly and sympathetic in all you say and do. Cleverness will flow from you naturally, if you have it; and applause will come to you unsought from those who know what to applaud; but the applause of fools is to be shunned.

3. Above all things avoid fault-finding, and a habit of criticism. Let your rule in reference to your social sentiments be simply this: Pray for the bad, pity the weak, enjoy the good, and reverence both the great and the small, as playing each his part aptly in the divine symphony of the as playing each his part aptly in the divine symphony of the universe. — [By Professor John Stuart Blackie.
