End of German Cruiser Seems Certain Off Grenada Coast.

ENGAGEMENT WITNESSED

MUCH WRECKAGE FOUND

Lifebuoys With Cruiser's Name, Sword, Helmets and Food.

Montreal, Jan. 12 .- A detailed description of a naval battle off Grenada, B. W. I., in which the German raider Karlsruhe was apparently sunk, is given in a letter sent by an eyewitness of the engagement to friends here. The letter, which is dated Grenada, Dec. 3, 1914,

"It may interest you to know that on Wednesday evening, the 25th ult., while at my house, situated on a ridge overlooking the sea, to the north of Grenada, I witnessed a naval engagement, which was undoubtedly carried on between more than two warships.

"The action lasted, as far as I obved, from 7 o'clock in the evening to 11 p.m., and appeared to be on the very horizon, to the north and northwest of the island. As the darkness increased was quite apparent, when broadsides of projectiles exploded within seconds of each other, on either side, within a range of four to six miles.

All News Censored. "I did not hear the explosions of the shells, as the fight was too far away, out as the fight went on the position of combatants veered around to the orth and east, and increased in severity. Bodies Found. 
