U. S. Secretary of War Gives Figures Showing the World's Wants Stockholm to Approach Record for Nation's Mobi lization of Man Power-Army of Substantial Size Alread y in France and Completely

Washington, Jan. 10.—The United States now has in France an army of "substantial" size ready for active service, Secretary of War Baker today told the Senate war Investigating committee. Officers and men, he explained in a statement of the mobilization accomplishments, have been trained specially for modern warfare, inde-

pendent lines of communication and supply are in process of construction and great programs have been formulated for the production of new Arms of the most modern and effective kind, the secretary declared, have been provided for every soldler in France, and are available for every fighting man who can be sent to France in 1918.

An army of nearly a million and a half men, enlisted and selected without serious dislocation of the nation's industries, is now in the field or in training at home and abroad, he asserted. The subsistence of the army, he continued, has been above criticism, while its initial clothing supply, temporarily inadequate, is now substantially complete.

There were also at that time approximately 2,573 officers in the reserve, but as these were on inactive duty they cannot properly be considered in estimating the strength of the army of the United States at that time. Treasurer Reports \$158,440 Net to Good—\$375,000 for Patriotic Fund.

Quebec, Jan. 10.—The net surplus of the Province of Quebec for the past year was \$158,440. Hon. Walter Mitchell, provincial treasurer, will of-ficially announce this in the budget peech being made today. speech being made today.
The ordinary revenue of the province
was \$10,441,113, while the ordinary expenditure was \$9,907,673, leaving a surplus of \$532,440.

RUSS-BULGAR CONDITIONS.

Berne, Jan. 10 .- A Bulgarian correspondent of the Bund says Premier Radoslavoff read the following dispatch from Brest-Litovsk in Parliament:

'War between Russia and Bulgaria ceases. Diplomatic and economic relations between Russia and Bulgaria are resumed. Russia recognizes Bulgaria's right to nominate a delegate to an international Danube commission. The first peace is thus concluded, with the consent of Bulgaria's allies.'

The Bund says Bulgaria has appointed a minister to Petrograd and a consul to be stationed at Odessa, and has ordered the resumption of navigation to Odessa.

TURK PROPOSALS REJECTED.

Petrograd, Wednesday, Jan. 9.—Separate peace proposals made by Turkey it is reported, has been refused by the Bolsheviki Government. Turkey was requested to participate in the general conference between Russia and the central powers.

A dispatch received in London last Saturday from Petrograd purported to give the Turkish peace terms, as presented to Russia, but the dispatch did not state that Turkey's proposals had been made independent of the other central powers. Among the terms proposed by Turkey were free passage of the Dardanelles for Russian ships, Russian evacuation of Turkish territory and de mobilization of the Russian Black Sea fleet. Turkey was to retain her active army in consequence of continuation of war against the Entente.

Bulgaria took part with Germany, Austria and Turkey in the first negotiations at Brest-Litovsk, and it has been assumed that no peaceterms would be agreed to by the Central Powers except in concert However, advices yesterday giving the names of those who took part in the first session of the Brest-Litovsk conferences when they were re sumed this week made no mention of a Bulgarian representative, FERDINAND FOR ANNEXATION.

King Ferdinand of Bulgaria is credited with opposing the formula opeace without annexations or indemnities, declaring Bulgaria should re tain the territory she had won. This would not interfere with a peacbetween Russia and Bulgarla, however, inasmuch as the territory Bulgarla desires consists of parts of Serbia and Rumania.
