Canadian Army Headquarters, April 19.—Having heard somewhat of their achievements from the outside world, the Canadian troops have now had an opportunity of hearing, in an order of the day, the opinion of their army commander on the operations last week.

An Historic Day.

The general commanding the first army, Sir Henry Horne, says that he destres to express his high appreciation of the splendid work carried out during the days immediately preceding. "By the troops of the first army," he adds, "the Vimy Ridge has been regarded as a position of very great strength. The Germans have considered it impregnable. To have carried this position with so little loss testifies to soundness of plan, thoroughness of preparation, dash and determination in execution, and devotion to duty on the part of all concerned. The 9th of April will be an historic day in the annals of the British Empire."
