As a system of bounties was in operation when the Liberals came into power, it would have been unfair to abruptly terminate it. This system began in 1883, when a bonus of \$1 50 per ton on pig iron was added to the duty. There were then three blast furnaces in Canada, and in 1897, only one remained. Since then pig iron and steel production in this country has undergone an enormous development. The great industries at Sydney and Sault Ste. 


