Editorial Briefings.

Don't grumble if your paper is not always fresh up to the high standard of your ideal. Uncharitably remember that no editor is capable of getting up quite as good a paper as you could yourself.

The reply to the German counter-propaganda was completed and headed to the German delegates on Monday if Germany does not accept the terms by Monday next the armistice terminates automatically.

Fifty-seven food rations—all one variety—were marched to a galloway erected by the infuriated populace in Priguone and given their choice between being bogged as professors and signing a solemn oath that they would sell their goods at reasonable prices. They signed.

The Canard lier Aquitaine is expected to arrive in Halifax this (Friday) morning. On board are a total of 2075 passengers, of whom 574 are officers, non-commissioned officers and men of the Canadian Expeditionary force. There are six cadets and 150 other ranks for the Halifax disposal area.

Captain John Alcock and Lieutenant Arthur W. Brown, in their Vickers Vimy biplane, landed at Clifton, Ireland, Sunday morning, completing the first non-stop airplane flight across the Atlantic. Their trip from St. John's, Nfld., was made in six hours and twelve minutes. The distance was over 1,900 miles.

An interesting revelation made at the inquiry into civil service at Ottawa last week was that, on the average, employees in the Interior department, besides their yearly vacations and the ordinary holidays, were absent from their work on thirty-seven days last year. The refreshing information was added that an improvement has recently been observed.

The citizens of Wolfville are summoned to meet this evening at the Town Hall to give their approval of the bill passed at the last session of the Legislature authorizing the Council to borrow the sum of \$25,000 for street improvement. It is hoped that there may be a large attendance and that citizens generally may show by their presence that they are not lacking in interest in town affairs.

One of the oldest graduates of Acadia passed away last week in the person of Dr. Elias Alward, K. C., D. C. L., of St. John. He graduated with the class of 1860, and in 1882 received the honorary degree of D. C. L. For fourteen years, from 1887 to 1901, he was a prominent member of the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick. He was for some years a member of the Board of Governors of Acadia University.

Lieut. Stewart Graham, accompanied by Mrs. Graham, arrived in Halifax this week to take the second Currier plane purchased by the St. Maurice Forest Protection Association to St. Maurice Lake, Quebec. The plane is now being set up and it is expected that the hop off will take place the last of this week. Lieut. Graham plans to make this flight in a day, leaving Halifax at dawn and flying continuously for eight hours.

The city of Charlottetown, Manitoba, celebrated the 144th anniversary of the Battle of Baner Hill on June 18. Those who have visited the city of Cambridge will remember the tables near Harvard College which mark the spot of the start of Pepper's men to defend the hill, which was really not Baner Hill but Beech's Hill. This is the only battle in history where both sides in the conflict are settled. The British won the victory, but the Americans won the hill. Considering that the total forces on both sides numbered nearly ten thousand men this battle sinks into oblivion when compared with the battles on the western front in the great war where the number would have scarcely been considered as adequate to relieve a mile of the line.

Under the amendments to the Immigration Act passed in the two branches of the Canadian Parliament and given the royal assent within an hour on Thursday last, the government was given power to deport all persons who are not British subjects by birth in Canada or by naturalization in Canada, who advocate the overthrow of constituted authority. This applies to British immigrants who are of course British subjects, but are not so by birth or naturalization in Canada. The amended act also provides for the deportation of immigrants who lawfully assume any power of government in Canada or in this country or elsewhere.

Acadia University has appointed J. D. Logan, Ph.D., special lecturer in Canadian literature. The appointment is significant in so much as it marks the first formal recognition by a Canadian university of a distinctly Canadian literature. Dr. Logan gave a course of lectures on Canadian literature prior to his going overseas with the 85th Battalion, C. E. F., and this year delivered a special lecture on Canadian literature and the relation to the Empire. His programme for the coming year provides for lectures on both English and French-Canadian literature. The chair of Canadian literature was first created in 1907 by Acadia University and has since been filled by the appointment of William J. Wright, Ph.D., who has been connected with the department of Canadian literature of the University of Toronto and who has an overseas record.

Popular Appointments.

J. H. Grisdale has been appointed Deputy Minister of Agriculture, after eight years' successful service as Director of Experimental Farms. He is succeeded in the latter office by Prof. Edgar S. Archibald, son of the late E. E. Archibald, of Wolfville. As Director Prof. Archibald will have charge of fifteen divisions of agricultural work at Ottawa and eighteen branch farms and stations throughout the Dominion. The Ottawa Journal has the following to say to Prof. Archibald:

The new Director of Experimental Farms, Prof. E. S. Archibald, assumes his position with the assurance that, backing him in the work, will be a Deputy Minister, who having himself been a director for eight years, fully understands what is really needed to make the system what it ought to be—a leader in the advanced movement for better agriculture. This should go a long way towards placing the Central Experimental and branch farms on a better working basis, and more able to cope with the growing demands of the country. Heretofore, for want of sympathy and support from those higher up, the work of the farm system has been somewhat handicapped, but with the changes recently put into effect by the Minister, much improvement along this line may naturally be expected.

The appointment of Prof. Archibald will, the Ottawa Journal believes, be rather popular throughout the country, and particularly with live stock men, in whose interests he has labored for some years with a great deal of success, as head of the Animal Husbandry Branch of the Experimental Farms' System. The line of work has been a hit to all parts of Canada year after year, so that he is not only thoroughly in touch with activities of the various branch farms, which now come directly under his supervision, but he also has a deep knowledge of farming conditions as they exist in the different provinces, which will enable him to carry on the work effectively and efficiently. Coupled with this is the fact that he has always been a close student of rural requirements from an agricultural standpoint so that his qualifications seem to eminently fit him for the work. The ACADIAN will be joined by many Wolfville friends in congratulation to our clever young townsman.

The People's Forum.

DEAR SIR,—Would you kindly give this letter space in your paper and perhaps some one may be able to give the required information, many of your readers want to know. The question is: Why was not the name of all the soldiers in the 85th N. B. Battalion, who won distinction on the field by medal, cross, etc., published in the list that was printed in some of last week's papers? It is a question many cannot solve, the writer being one in same box, thus we ask for true information through your paper. The writer knows people who had dear ones in that battalion who had won medals and came home wearing the ribbon, red, white and blue, attached to a bar pin which is pinned to tunic, given them officially on the field, showing they had won medals or cross, and medal was supposed to be sent to their home from military headquarters. Some won medals a year or several months before the war closed; others, a short time before, and that might account, perhaps, for the latter names being omitted—had not been officially notified at headquarters in time, even after being given the ribbon on the field; but it does not make it any easier for some people to understand why all names were not in the list. They certainly deserve all credit or honor due them. The omission of names does not look just right, and perhaps some one who has the proper window can tell us. 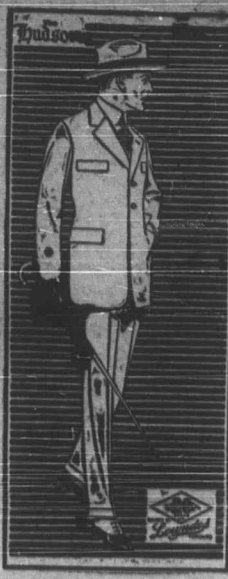

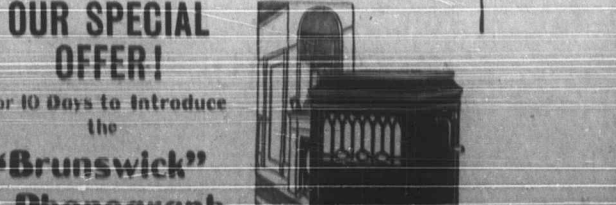

England is enfranchising 6,000,000 of its women citizens. The agitation for this piece of justice had its inception stages nearly a century and a half ago. D., this well-known writer traces the movement back to the days of Mary Wollstonecraft (1759-1797), an English writer, clever, excitable and the victim of life-long untoward circumstances.

The W. C. T. U. sent congratulations to the King and Queen on the occasion of their silver wedding.

The W. C. T. U. of Scotland has sent a letter to all Scotch members of Parliament asking if they will oppose the State purchase of the liquor traffic, maintain the Temperance (Scotland) Act, and strengthen its weak clauses and oppose the export of liquor to Colonies and Dependencies and to Native Races.

The W. C. T. U. has decided to recommend its members to support no Parliamentary candidates except those who are in sympathy and who are prepared to give active help towards the attainment of these objects.

Now the sale of distilled liquors to soldiers is forbidden, and many other strictures are being made for civilians. 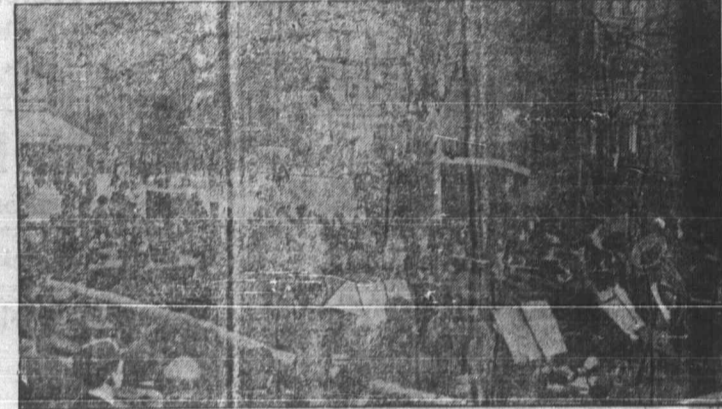
CANADIAN INDUSTRIES AT LYONS EXHIBITION



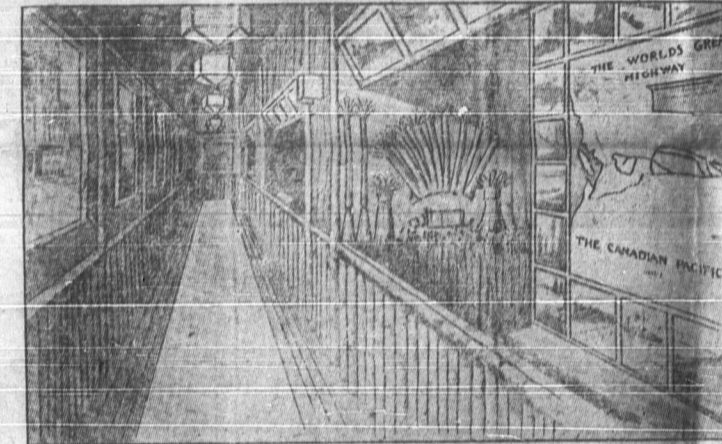

It is generally conceded that the outstanding feature of the Lyons exhibition this year was the Canadian section of 72 booths on Place Bellecour, whilst the most popular exhibit was that of the Canadian Pacific Railway, closely followed in point of interest by the magnificent display of the members of the Canadian Manufacturers' party. On arrival in England, were upset to find that under the conditions then prevailing—but now happily removed—they were in many cases prohibited from selling their goods in the motherland. Many of them had never been in England before and they found travelling conditions, the hotel accommodation, and the cost of living in general quite different to those existing in Canada. In addition, the influenza epidemic had again broken out, and several members of the party had to take to their beds in London, others in Paris and yet others in Lyons. Then the passport regulations are most strict and a source of annoying and irksome delay. Owing to transport

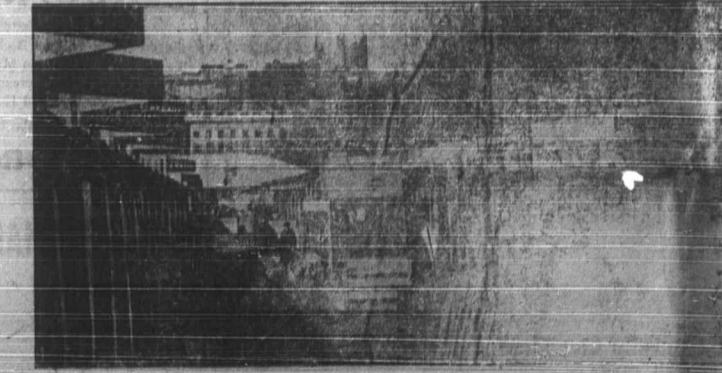


A Section of the Canadian Exhibit, Canadian Pacific Railway—Lyons Fair.

sections, and many British and American exhibitors were unable to open their booths at all owing to the non-arrival of their exhibits. Mr. E. H. Bruce, of the C. P. R., secured from the Fair authorities permission to erect at each end of the Canadian Section large signs depicting Canada's activities in peace and war, surmounted by a banner and Canadian flag, whilst on the reverse sides appeared the arms of Canada. Another exclusive privilege secured for Canada was an exhibition of films morning and evening at the Conservatoire, Quai de Bondy, for which free admission tickets were given from the start to the Canadian Section. A splendid selection of twelve films supplied from the Montreal and London offices of the Canadian Pacific Railway, proved a source
