This establishment was founded in 1867. Its object is the in struction of young ladies in the various secular branches of alliberal education, and, also the inculcation of Christian doctrine, as contained in the Bible and the Book of Common Prayer.

The Lady Principal is assisted by an efficient staff of instruction, sixteen in number, and the arrangements for competent teaching in every department, and for the due supervision and moral training of the pupils, as well as for their health and comfort, will be found complete and satisfactory.

Wykeham Hall, formerly the residence of the late Sir J. B. Macaulay, which was first acquired by the school in 1870, and greatly enlarged, is an entensive and handsome building, surrounded by beautiful and secluded grounds, admirably situated for school purposes. Every part of the property is in thorough repair, and the systems of heating, ventilation, and drainage, as well as the teaching appliances, are effective. The spacious and lofty rooms are conveniently furnished, and unite the advantages of a well ordered home to the requirements of a high-class school.

The attractive and well kept grounds afford ample scope for the exercise and recreation that are so essential for the young.

In addition to thorough instruction in the English Language and Literature, the course of study comprises the other Modern Languages, Latin, the Mathematics, History, Geography, Natural Science, Vocal and Instrumental Music, Drawing and Needlework, The improved and simplified modern text-books, which have received the sanction of high authorities, are used, with a due regard both to the accuracy, ease and clearness of teaching, and to the saving of expense to the parent.

By the formation of a special class, opportunities will be given for higher culture in the Classical and Modern Languages, in English Literature and Composition, Elecution, Science and the more advanced Mathematics, and in Art, for those who are found fitted and desirous for such study.

Simplicity and economy in dress, and moderation in expenditure, are enforced.

The Religious Instruction is under the charge of the Rev. J. Pearson, a clergyman appointed by the Bishop.

In their efforts to establish and maintain an institution with such objects, and which they believe to be now especially needed, the Council have met with an encouraging success, and they confidently claim the support of their fellow churchmen throughout the country. As there is no desire to make a mere pecuniary profit,

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the fees are placed on as moderate a scale as is compatible with thorough efficiency in the teaching and an adequate expenditure upon the supplies for the house.

TERMS.

1. The Scholastic Year is divided into four Terms of ten weeks each; viz:—Michaelmas, Christmas, Lent, and Trinity. Michaelmas Term begins on the first Wednesday in September, and ends on the 9th of November. Christmas Term begins on the 10th of November, and ends on the 10th of February, with Vacation from the 22nd of December to the 13th of January. Lent Term begins on the 11th of February, and ends on the 21st of April. Trinity Term begins on the 22nd of April, and ends on the 30th of June.

Pupils should present themselves invariably on the first day of the term.

No Pupil is allowed to continue in residence during the Summer Vacation, and any pupil remaining at Christmas, will be required to pay the sum of Four Dollars per week for Board.

The only persons allowed to visit Pupils are Parents or Guardians, lady friends in Toronto introduced by them, or persons from a distance who shall bring a written request from such Parents or Guardians to be permitted to visit their children or wards.

Reception day: Tuesday, from 3 to 5 P.M.

FEES

Per Term (payable strictly in advance.)

For Tuition,—Elementary Class, \$6 per Term; Junior Class, \$12; Intermediate Class, Lower and Upper, \$15; Senior Class, \$18; Upper Senior Class (special class for advanced pupils), \$18.

Music, Drawing, and Calisthenics are all optional, and the best instructors are secured. The General Vocal Class, conducted by Mr. Torrington, is open to those who are competent to learn, without charge.

Additional for Bourders.—Board and Washing, in all the Classes, \$45 per Term.

A reduction of 25 per cent, from the ordinary fee is made in favour of the daughters of clergymen.

An entrance fee of \$12 is charged to Boarders, to defray the expense of beds and bed linen, silver, &c.

FEES FOR MUSIC, ETC.

Instruction in Pianoforte by a governess, including semi weekly lessons and the use of Piano one hour daily, \$5 per term.

Instruction by a Master and Governess, viz.: semi-weekly, one lesson from each, with use of Piano one hour daily, \$8 per term.

Instruction by Master twice a week, with use of Piano one hour daily, \$16 per term.

Instruction in Vocal Music by a Master (in a Private class of five) semi-weekly, \$8 per term.

Special Lessons may be obtained by arrangement.

Pupils taking more than one hour for daily practice with the piano, are charged \$2 per term for every additional hour.

Instruction on the Organ, \$8 per term.

Painting in oils or water colours, \$12 per term.

His Excellency the Governor General presents annually a Silver and a Bronze Medal to the two pupils who acquit themselves most satisfactorily in the subject of English Literature.

Dr. Hodder presents annually a Gold Medal to the papil who obtains the highest place in General Proficiency in the Upper Senior Class.

Alexander Manning, Esq., (ex-Mayor) presents annually a Silver Medal to the pupil who obtains the highest place in General Proficiency in the Lower Senior Class

The Council award valuable prizes for General Proficiency in all the classes, as well as for diligence in Special Subjects.
