EDITORIAL

The Brunswickan had no intended personal implications whatsoever in its editorial last week "Don't Vote for Jumping Beans and Social Climbers." We are sorry if any of the candidates got the impression that we were attacking them; if they did, it was entirely in their own minds. We tried to give each candidate an equal amount of publicity and an equal chance to win.

However, we did attack "jumping beans and social climbers." That trite old adage must be true that if the shoe fits people will wear it.

Mr. Fleming has criticized the political aspects of the Brunswickan. 


