There has been a strike of the brakemen on the Erie Railroad, which has ordered to conductors to discharge one brakeman from each train. Next day the brakemen struck, demanded the restoration of the removed men, and an increase of wages to \$2 per day. Two large freight trains were detained by the strike next day at Hornsville, but the passenger trains were allowed to come through till the afternoon, since when the strikers have stopped them, smashing the breaks, and thus rendering the cars useless owing to the steep grades.

For the Amherst Gazette. Mr. Eaton, having read 'Vox' reply to my correspondence, and seeing that I must conclude he is pretty well demolished. If it were otherwise he would not have so partially replied. His second article which elicited that reply, I think is a very good one. It is important measure of Sir John's Government. Upon every point of the same I took issue with him. Notwithstanding this, he tries with his partial reply to improve his position. This reply exhibits his incompetence. And why is this? because his articles are poor, his case bad. His article of last week is somewhat ridiculous in its sense, that is, in its attempt to gull his readers. He has answered all but what was unassailable. It was useless for Veritas to contradict him, that Mr. Laird was not an able man; that Ontario, not N. S. Representatives, held the balance of power; that the press of Great Britain, and the U. S. States acknowledged a wrong case was established against the late Government; that the Standard, London Times, and other leading papers of Great Britain were friendly to enemies of Colonial connection; that the other important points asserted by Vox, to all of which Veritas took issue with him, notwithstanding Vox met Veritas' statements by saying they were unworthy of a reply. Veritas' name should be Fox. Truly, Vox has adopted Paddy's mode of defence by replying that he must not dispute. I suppose, Sir, you must pay Vox's last article the compliment of a reply. He says, because Messrs. Tilley, Tupper and Mitchell knew nothing of the Pacific Scandal, therefore, it could never have existed. This age is said to be growing weaker and weaker, hence Vox must have discovered a new mode of logic. Sir John with all his recognized ability for evasion and expediency never conceived of this mode of reason for a defence. What an Advocate Vox would have been in Parliament for the late Government if that Parliament would have accepted sophistry or simplicity for truth, as Vox would have his readers in advance of the age.
