DEUTSCHLAND IN COLLISION

New London, Conn., Novem-ber 17—Five members of the crew of the tug T. A. Scott Jr., one of the tugs which accom-panied the German submarine Deutschland from New London early today, on her return trip to Bremen, were drowned when the submersible and the tug col-lided in the Race, about twelve miles from this port. The only person on the tug saved was

miles from this port. The only person on the tug saved was Captain Fred Hinsch, of the German interned liner Nectar. The tug, which belonged to the T. A. Scott Wrecking company, went to the bottom. The Deutschland returned to her dock here at 5.15 a.m. Of-ficials declined to discuss the accident or to tell the extent of the damage inflicted on the sub-marine. The tug and the sub-marine came together, in a com-paritively smooth sea.




