CANADA WILL BE KEPT BUSY

The British War office evidently does not look for an end of the war for at least another year, as orders are being placed to keep every munition factory in Canada busy until June 30, 1917. It was announced by the Imperial Munitions Board that the orders placed or authorized for all classes of shells will keep the munition plants in the Dominion busy until this date.

The Board states in a memorandum issued recently that all necessary raw material to maintain the deliveries required are contracted for well ahead, and particular mention is made of the very favorable position the Board is in in respect to steel supply. The present report shortage of steel in the United States, is not causing the Board any uneasiness, in view of the purchase of steel the Board made last spring and summer.

The policy adopted some time ago, whereby Canadian manufacturers would supply fuses, primers, brats disc, cartridges, case, and the many smaller components, is now well established, and supplies of this nature which came from the United States in large quantities in the past will to a very great extent be secured from Canada. It is stated many of the parts heretofore either purchased entirely or in part from the United States will now be secured exclusively from Canada, and Canadian manufacturers are showing every disposition and bending their best energies to give the Board the deliveries required to enable the Board to carry out the important programme it has undertaken.

DR. EATON'S STRONG WORDS

(Editorial from the New York Sun.)

It is not necessary to recall that the Rev. Dr. Charles A. Eaton is a Canadian by birth to account for the strong language for using which in his pulpit on of The Sun's correspondents takes him to task this morning. Dr. Eaton said no more than thousands of men born in the United States would have said. He expressed a conviction that is shared by multitudes of those whose ancestors came here so long ago that the fact they were immigrants is forgotten. He put in vigorous phrases thought that no attempt to attain official neutrality can strife.

Nor is it plain that Dr. Eaton should be censured for his beliefs or his methods of proclaiming them. To him, as to hosts of others, the course that should have been followed by the United States seems plain. The failure to pursue it appears to them not as an example of political inexpediency, or shortsighted statesmanship, but as an immoral, unchristian and indefensible default in the performance of duty, to be accounted for only on the ground that the United States is spiritually unfit either through cowardice or blindness. Obviously a preacher holding these opinions would be untrue to his mission if he did not give tongue to them; his obligation is personal and professional, and of compelling force.

Moreover, it is not true that preachers of an earlier generation shirked discussion from their pulpits of worldly affairs; for example, did not Henry Ward Beecher sell a slave girl in his church to bring home with crushing emphasis to his great following the reality of a terrible moral and political vice in the struggle to suppress which he was enlisted?

Dr. Eaton's critic reminds us of several of the great and good men who preceded Dr. Eaton and his contemporaries in ministering to the spiritual wants of New York. They and those who labored with them make an impressive showing as they are marshalled in the corridors of memory. But did all of them abstain from the application to pressing civic problems of their power and authority? Were they all at all times impassive and unresponsive to those move-

ments and menaces that, while not originating in religion, inevitably reacted upon Christianity and the work its propagandists and defenders have undertaken?

It is not within our recollection that such was the case. We remember them as virile, bold men, whose sympathies were easily aroused, whose strength was gladly expended for what they conceived to be the good of humanity, and who established a precedent of public service that Dr. Eaton in his passionate appeal has not violated. As to the soundness of his conclusions, every man may pass judgment, but as to the propriety of his expressing them, there seems to us to be no question.

At the annual meeting of the Nova Scotia Carriage Company held in Amherst on the 3rd, the shareholders, after hearing the report of the directors, strongly recommended that the company go into liquidation.

American's Offer To Raise a Battalion At His Own Expense

London, Ont., Nov 16—Lieut. M. Stevenson, who left here to attend a school of instruction to qualify as Captain for Overseas has offered to bear the cost of equipping a Battalion estimated at one hundred thousand dollars.

He is a son of Senator Isaac Stevenson of Marinette, Wisconsin, formerly of New Brunswick and believes he can raise a Scottish American unit and enlist many Americans. He resigned command of the U.S.S. Yantle to take his Canadian commission.



Letter from Sergt. Blenkhorn to his parents at Canning:  
Dear Mother:

We left St. Eloi on the \_\_\_\_\_ and proceeded to the Somme by short marches, and by train, some two hundred miles. We stopped half way for training were there a week, then took our train and rode about 100 miles in box cars, that being the way soldiers travel in France. We arrived a great deal nearer our destination and got off our train at 5 a. m. Each day we marched a few miles, our beds at night were the ground with a rubber sheet under us and a great coat and the starry skies over us. Did we sleep? Well, I guess! We always had that good tired feeling, altho the nights were cold, we would never wake until reveille sounded though maybe our feet and hands would be pretty cold but a couple of rounds out of our bedfellows (we usually sleep in pairs) soon set the warm blood in circulation. Sometimes if we were near a brook or river, we'd make a dash for a dip in the ice cold water before our breakfast of half a canteen of strong, hot tea or coffee, 1/4 loaf of bread, a couple of hard tack, a piece of bacon and some cheese. Then the "fall in" would sound and we'd march away, stopping again for dinner. Every day was the same and soon by the terrible cannonading which grew nearer and nearer and louder and louder, we could tell we were near the Somme. I thought that when we were at Ypres we heard guns but they sounded like rifles, compared with the roar of these big fellows.

Well, we arrived at Albert, staying there for a few days. When the call came for us to move up nearer the trenches, it did not take us long to get up into some of the ground captured from the Huns. Such sights as I saw and never want to see again. The ground was torn up as by a recent earthquake, villages levelled to the ground; artillery in shell holes; and old trenches pounding away at the Huns as though they were not going to stop until there wasn't a Hun left on the face of Europe; motor lorries and transport smashed up; captured German guns and ammunition; all kinds of equipment twisted and battered into so much old junk; German graveyards.

Well, we took up our position in Divisional Reserve. "Fritz" would send over a few shells occasionally generally getting some poor chap, for the men and horses were in regular swarms and as countless as sands on the shore. It looked as if England meant business all right, and she sure did, as we soon found out.

When our chance came, "2nd Division Reserves to take certain frontage"—wow! the news came bringing a thrill of excitement. The 4th and 5th Brigades were the lucky ones to go over and the poor 5th had to stay in Reserve. We thought we'd have to take a back seat but that evening the word came "5th Brigade to go over at 5.30," and go over, we did. I wish I could describe it—it seems like a dream to me though I think I might write a book on that charge, the taking of Corcelet by the 22nd French Canadians and the 25th Nova Scotians. We lost lots of good officers and men who went from Halifax with us. We will always remember them—they were some of the best old Nova Scotia could produce, and that we ever had or ever expect to have. We took lots of prisoners and souvenirs.

We "went over the bags" on the anniversary of our landing in France, Sept. 15th.

After a pretty tough time with no water or food for three days we were relieved by the 1st Division.

Later, I will write you about my second trip in there, where I got my wound which brought me here to dear old "Blighty."

I must close now with love to all.

**BRITAIN'S GIANT BRITANNIC IS SUNK**

**Only Fifty Lives Lost**

London, November 22—The British hospital ship Britannic has been sunk, with the loss of about 50 lives, says a British official announcement today.

The Britannic was sunk by a mine or torpedo yesterday morning in the Aegean Sea, according to the official statement. There were 1,108 survivors, of whom about 28 were injured. The Britannic was torpedoed at eight o'clock in the morning and sank near shore fifty-five minutes later. She was going to Saloniki, but had no wounded on board.

Her complement included 121 nurses and 390 officers and men of the army medical corps. 25 of the injured from the steamer are now in the Russian hospital while others are aboard allied warships.

The islanders of the Zea saw the vessel sinking in the waves, and promptly responded to the appeals for help, and an Anglo-French squadron from Piræus, comprised of destroyers and auxiliaries, immediately went to the scene.

The injuries of some of those on board are very severe, especially the occupants of two boats which were caught by the steamer. The women of Zea tore up their clothing to bandage the injured.

The Britannic had 3,000 beds, which had been prepared for the reception of sick and wounded an hour prior to the torpedoing.



The brother of the deceased, A. B. Blyth, was appointed shipping master of the port of Halifax, by the Macdonald-Tupper Administration in 1878...

The deceased is survived by four children by his first wife, who was the daughter of the late Major Thompson, of the 47th Regiment, a Crimean and Indian Mutiny veteran...

The members of the Citizens Recruiting Committees of course receive no pay, and since last March the County Recruiting Officers throughout the Province have served without pay. Outside of the staff at Halifax, there are only three paid recruiting officers or deputy recruiting officers in the Province and no officer, non-commissioned officer or private is paid for recruiting work except those who devote their whole time to the work. We have been authorized by the Chief Recruiting Officer to make the above statement in statements which have been circulated to contradict unfounded and untrue rumors."

### OPERATIONS EXTENDING PROVINCIAL SANATORIUM

Yesterday work was commenced by Mr. Charles Wright contractor for the proposed buildings near the Sanatorium for returned sick soldiers. This is the result of arrangements made between the Provincial Government and the representatives of the Military Hospitals Commission, for an increase of the accommodation of the Provincial Sanatorium at Kentville. This increased accommodation is at the joint expense of the Military Hospitals Commission and the Provincial Government and will, during the war be used exclusively for the treatment of tuberculosis soldiers who have enlisted from this Province.

The plans outlined embrace the immediate erection of two pavilions to accommodate forty patients each, and one Infirmary Pavilion for the treatment of advanced cases, to accommodate from twenty to thirty patients. If found necessary, the plans outlined includes the erection of further temporary pavilions to accommodate forty more soldiers. A suitable work shop recreation building will provide hospital and sanatoria facilities now much needed and will meet a demand daily growing more insistent. After the Military Hospital Commission shall have no further use for the property it becomes the property of the Province. Nova Scotia is the only Province having a Government-owned and operated Sanatorium and with its splendid administrative staff enable the Province to respond to the present demand most promptly and effectively.
