CATHERINE GING'S MURDER

The Gambler Paid Blixt \$2,000 to Get Her

St. Paul, Minn, Dec. 7.—Goy, Clough has signed the warrant ordering the execution to harry T. Hayward between the bours of midnight and dayligh in Wednesday, December 11. On the night of December 21. St. Claus A. Blixk killed Catherine Ging, a pretty dressmaker of Minneapolis, on Excelsior road, a few miles from the Lity. A day or two later it developed that Blixt had killed the girl of 22,000 promised him y Hayward, who desired to secure \$16,000 insurance on Miss Ging's life, which had been assigned to him. Six days after the awful tragedy Blixt made a full confession, Implicating Hayward, Adry Hayward, Harry's brother, also confessed that Harry had tried to hire him to kill he girl. Columbia, S. C., Dec. 7.-The details of a lynching which occurred in this State last Monday night came to light last night. It took place in Colleton County, near the Barnwell and Hampton lines, and was not known generally in that vicinity until Wednesday morning, when the dead bodies of two of the victims, stripped of their clothing, were found, one being an old woman. She had been taken out and beaten to death with new buggy traces, the man's offence being that he was suspected of having stolen a Bible-and some furniture from a church, and the woman's offence being that she-was supposed to know something of ft. St. Nicholas' Church. in Barnwell County, was broken into and robbed several months ago, a Bible and some pulpit furniture being taken away. Delivery of Goods From the Toronto THE EXPERIMENTAL FARM

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Arrangements are being prafected for the shipment of live stock from St. John, N. Bt., for the steamship service recently arranged for. Mr. W. Atonzo Cheeley has been temporarily appointed inspector of cattle-pens and littings. The service will be inaugurated by the Lake Superior. Already a large number of applications have been made for sheep space. The owners have applied for permission to use deckroom for sheep, and this has been accorded. It seems pretty certain that the venture will be a success.

In the Act of Parliament by which the Experimental farms were established, it was wisely provided that one of the objects to be carried outant these institutions was the testing of "the merits hardiness, and adaptability of new or untried varieties of plants and trees." For the carrying out of this provision there was set a idea, the outset, at the Con rai farm, 45 acces of land, to be especially devoted to the purpose of an arbocotum and botanic garden.

During the long period which had elpased since the endowment and establishment of the Arnold arboretum there has been brought together there, by the visits of the learned director to foreign countries, exchanges with other institutions, and the assistance of botanists, a very large collection. This collection is especially rich in rare species and varieties from Northern Japan and China, countries which Professor Sargent has twice visited.
