After other adventures, he attained a maritime command at the age of twenty one; subsequently became a favourite companion of Mohammed Ali, the Egyptian Pasha; was stripped, plundered, and left naked, nearly in the middle of the great desert, at a distance of sixty miles from any supply of food or water; travelled to India; traversed many Oriental countries, encountering storms, plagues, shipwreek, battle,

drove him from the shores of India, and robbed him of his property to the amount of £40,000; returned to this country, and obtained the recognition of his just claims for compensation from the late Lord Denman, and other distinguished men in parliament; from Sir Charles Forbes, Sir Henry Strachey, Mr. John Smith, and other India House proprietors; from Lord William Bentinck, late Governor General of India; and from almost the whole of the press and public from almost the whole of the press and public throughout Great Britain. But to the day of his death, no redress was granted him, although two committees of the House of Commons recommended that it should be. Mr. Buckingham spent some years in disseminating information,

Mr. Buckingham spent some years in disseminating information, respecting India, through the press, in connection with several public journals established by him in Lordon for that purpose; and by means of lectures delivered, and auxiliary associations formed, in all parts of the three kingdoms. In 1832, Mr. Buckingham was returned as one of the first members of parliament for Sheffield under the Reform Bill, and sat for six years, in two successive parliaments, as representative for that botough. He originated and carried through several measures of public good; such as, the virtual abolition of impressment for the navy; the substitution of a general registry for marines, with an act for the encouragement of voluntary enhistment; the appointment of committees for inquiring into the best means of pieventing the destruction of life and property, occasioned by inte, persuce on shore and shipwrecks at sea; the establishment of copyright in engravings published in Ireland; and the abolition of a heavy tax on all authors and publishers, levied on them by eleven public institutions, under the authority of parliament. He also introduced hills for the establishment of public walks and gardens in all large towns, and of hierary and scientific institutions.

Mr. Buckingham's life on pecuniary grounds, to wind up the institute. His lordship also said, that the institute was under the greatest obligations to Mr. Buckingham, and that Mr. B. was under none whatever to it. Indeed, Mr. Buckingham expended £1.350 out of his pocket, through his connection with the institute, which was never reimbursed; and devoted nearly five years in the direction of the institute, without any emolument, reimbursed; and devoted nearly five years in the direction of the institute, without any emulument, beyond the occupation of apartments on the premises. The sense entertained of his services by those of the members who were most conversant with the affairs of the institute, was unequivocally manifested by their contributions to a testimonial to that gentleman, amounting to £700. From this time forth Mr. Buckingham took comparatively small part in public labours. His presence at the inaugural meeting of the United Kingdom Alliance, in October, 1853, will not he forgotten by any of our friends who had the pleasure of being present. He there read an essay on the Justice, Policy, and Safety of Mainelaw for England, which was afterwards printed by the Alliance, in a pamphlet form. LETTER FROM WITHIN A BASTION IN SE BASTOPOL

"The bombardment of the 17th and 18th of April," says the writer, 'brought a terrible variety to the heroic garrison, in the westisome uniformity of the almost incessant cannonade which has lasted nearly eight months. Nothing could be more terribly magnificent than the picture which a bastion represents upon such a day. It then resembles the erater of a volcano. The gunness indefatigably, works at their pieces. Riflemen stand upon the banquettes. Officers pass to and fro in the batteries, and direct thefire. Round almost, shells, bombs, musket and rifle-balls fly, whistle, hiss, acream, burst, rebound and strike in all directions. No one pays attention to them, except the signal-man, who stands with a spy-glass at his eye, to watch the ment of the 17th and 18th stands with a spy-glass at his eye, to watch the enemies' batteries. LICENSING THE NEWS-BOYS.—The authorities of LICENSING THE NEWS-BOYS.—The authorities of Boston have licensed about sixty boys to sell papers, tooth-picks, shoe-strings, &c. The quantity caught in the parishes of Caraquet and Shipipgan up to the 5th of August, exceeds that of any years since 1848 or 1849. Since that date, but weather has much interrupted the labors of the fishermen. Mackerel has been tolerably abundant, and herring are now has been tolerably abundant, and herring are now striking in thickly. Altogether the inhabitants have reason to rejoice at the abundance of their harvest both by sea and land.

The Newfoundland Telegarri Enterprise.—
We hear that the Company who are about to connect Newfoundland with Halifax, by a submarine telegraph, proposes to furnish the foreign news to the American press in anticipation of the arrival of the steamers, for the sum of about \$2' 0,000 per annum, or \$2000 per steamer, calculating that they shall anticipate the arrival of about one hundred steamers a year.
