Harrison, secretary of the board of trade, paid the Clover Bar section a visit on Saturday, for the purpose of securing samples of the growing crops to be placed before the board of trade, which meets tomorrow, and at which meeting the association will decide whether to make a special exhibit of the Edmonton district's agricultural, municipal and industrial resources, at a number of the prominent eastern fall exhibitions, as well as a number of the big shows on the coast.

THE STURGEON DISTRICT CROPS

The crops in the Sturgeon country promise well this year. Mr. J. R. LABOR SITUATION IN THE WEST.

Winnipeg, Aug. 13.—The Winnipeg Free Press has undertaken to secure information regarding the labor situation in the west. It says:

This August there is again a shortage of farm help. Although the proportion of demand over supply is considerable, it is not as great as it was last year. Still, it is quite large enough to require public attention. Inquiries at the immigration office show that there are over 300 places for which they cannot find laborers. The scarcity in Manitoba is general, but, while that is so, it does not appear to be acute. Plans are being made to send out 300 men. The wages offered are from \$35 to \$45 for experienced men and for inexperienced men \$25 to \$30.

To Bring Manufacturers Here.

St. Clair Letch, pleaded guilty to the charge of selling seeds of clover which contained noxious weed seeds in excess of the percentage allowed by the Dominion Act, and were fined \$100 and costs.

21,000 MEN ARE NEEDED IN WEST

Winnipeg, Aug. 13.—According to the latest estimates the first train of harvesters from the east to look after the western crop will arrive in Winnipeg on August 25. From estimates received, the total number of men required to handle the crop will be 21,000, which is considerably less than last year. Advice received from the Manitoba government places the number required in this province at 11,000. Saskatchewan places requirements there at 7,000, and Alberta estimated the requirements at 3,000.

OPERATORS LAY OFF IN TORONTO.

Toronto, Aug. 12.—The strike of the Western Union telegraphers has hit Toronto, and this morning the Great North Western is at its normal and purposes laid off. Several operators who refused to take messages last night were despatched by the non-union operators in the States, were promptly laid off by General Manager McMichael, and this morning nearly the entire staff, some fifty men and women, went out in a body and held a meeting in Labor Temple.

STRIKE DEVELOPS RELIGIOUS LINES.

London, Aug. 13.—When the house commons met this afternoon, the Irish members of the House of Commons, who were drawn from Belfast and other parts of the north of Ireland, were present in large numbers. The government is fully alive to the urgency of this matter and is doing all it can to secure a settlement of the most urgent matters.
