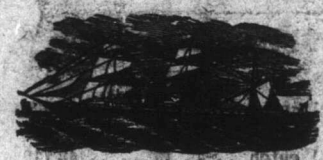

FIRST SONATA IN D MINOR  
For Organ.

"Organists may be recommended a  
Sonata in D Minor by Alfred H. Allen.  
This is an extremely well-written  
work for one who is evidently an ex-  
pert organist. In the prelude the  
composer employs the rarely used  
seven-four alternating with three-four  
tempo. His counterpoint flows natu-  
rally and without effort. There is  
an excellent fugal section in this  
movement. The Intermezzo is melo-  
dious and simple in construction,  
an Allegretto Scherzando in the mid-  
dle affording effective contrast. The  
Finale worthily concludes the Son-  
ata."—Morning Post (London).

sound workmanship, and the light  
Scherzo affords excellent contrast to  
the stately opening movement and the

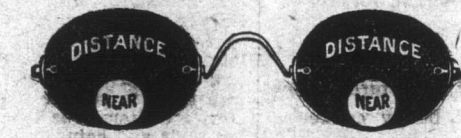

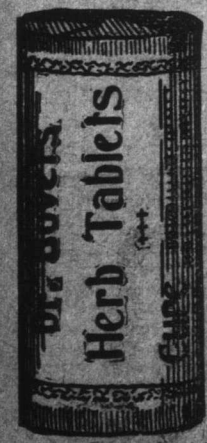
She dearly longed to get into some kind of society, to enjoy its admiration at close quarters; but in this matter Sidney stood firm.

## An Adventurous Life.

Last night a young man who arrived here yesterday from Grand Falls, named J. W. R. Hamilton, of Kent, England, reported to the police the loss of a sum of money. He says he has had a most and desolating career spent two years in the Argentine Republic, was a member of the Vigilantes there, captured a desperado who had killed 27 persons, and only received \$15 reward for his brave act from the Government. The captive was given a life term. Leaving there, he went to South Africa, joined a Boer Regiment and went through the Boer War under Baden-Powell. His mother and two sisters, he says, were killed by bursting shells at Ladysmith, and his father and brother were defending the town. He has two sisters and a brother living now at Johannesburg. On arriving here in a vessel he went to Green Bay at the herring fishery for 6 months, and the past fourteen months has been at work at Grand Falls.

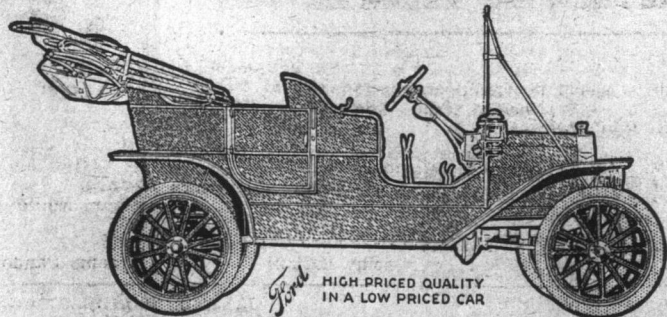

## The Normandy's Loss.

### Captain and Crew Arrive by the Steamer Portia.

On Sunday afternoon Capt. Hawthorne with the officers and crew of the ill-fated S. S. Normandy, arrived here from Tor's Cove by the S. S. Portia, and from Capt. William Steele, the chief officer of the ship, the Telegram received particulars of the disaster shortly after his arrival.

The Captain of the ship with Mr. Constant, who was a passenger on board, were joint owners of the vessel—a new one—which was only launched two months ago and was making her maiden voyage across the Atlantic, when her career just beginning was cut short by collision with the rugged rocks of Great Island, just off Tor's Cove, on the Southern Shore.

The ship left Millsboro, Yorkshire, three weeks ago and called at Holy-head, which she left for Toronto, Ontario, just two weeks ago yesterday. She had on board 1,800 tons of pig iron, a half cargo for the vessel, and from the day of her departure had rough weather with gales varying from N. W. to S. W., heavy sea and dense fog and torrential rain. Several times during the voyage the ship was compelled to lay to, and so dense was the fog encountered that for 4 days in succession she had to run at half speed.

Wednesday last coming in over the Banks it was particularly stormy, but the vessel being half loaded was in good trim, and all things considered, proved to be a good sea boat. At certain periods of the voyage so thick was the fog that the ship's head could hardly be discerned by men standing aft, and as a result the captain and officers had a very anxious time of it all through the voyage.

For six consecutive days no observations could be had, and during the last few days the lead was kept going soundings being taken every four hours; while Thursday and Friday last as it was deemed the vessel was in the latitude of Cape Race, the lead was hove at intervals of an hour. The dense pall of fog continued to envelop the ship while the wind blew half a gale out of the S. W., and she continued running at half speed. Mr. Steele had the watch on deck for Friday night and was on the bridge with 4 others on deck with him to navigate the ship, when shortly after midnight he saw the "loom" of what he imagined to be an iceberg ahead of the ship. Putting the helm hard a starboard to clear the obstruction he sent the ship full speed ahead, and as she swept ahead he soon realized that it was the surf breaking over a reef of rocks. The vessel answered her helm instantly, when suddenly as she appeared to be falling off from the shoal her starboard bow struck it with such force that the ship's hull vibrated with the shock, and the

watch below and the passengers on board knew she had collided with the shore, as most of them were thrown from their berths and roused from their sleep by the force of the impact, and hurriedly putting on what clothing they could lay hands on rushed on deck.

The ship had four water tight compartments and but for this fact all on board would have met a watery grave. She ran along the line of the reef with a grating noise, and the starboard side was torn completely out of her. She travelled almost the entire length of the shoal which ran about a half mile off from Great Island and went into deep water.

Eight minutes after striking the well was sounded and there were 9 feet of water reported in No. 1 hold. It was then seen that the ship was doomed, as she began to settle quickly by the head, and there was no time to be lost in getting out the three life boats swinging in the davits. If those on board were to be saved.

There were 21 men of a crew on board, with the captain's wife and 4 children, nurse and maid, with Mr. Constant. One of the children was an infant only two months old. The women folk though naturally frightened obeyed implicitly the orders of the captain and officers, and being assured by them that there was no immediate danger, and that there was ample time to launch and man the boats they remained perfectly calm while the crew upheld the best traditions of British seamen. Every man was calm and collected, stood at his post and received and obeyed orders, and in a very short time the first boat was over the side. The captain asked Mr. Steele to take charge of this, and to take his wife and children and the other women folk with him while he (the captain) would look after the crew.

clear of the foundering ship the wind seemed to increase, the rain fell in torrents and the women and poor little children suffered terribly for several hours until after daylight had appeared. While Mr. Steele and his crew waited outside with the boat's head to the sea they were in a state of anxiety about the captain and the rest of the crew fearing an accident to their boat. Flare-ups were kept going to warn the captain of the position of the chief officer's boat, and all were relieved after about a half hour to hear shouts coming from the other boat which was rowing towards them. When the captain left the steamer she was broad side on to the sea and wave after wave broke over her. Before pushing off from her the captain's boat surged heavily against the Normandy's side, and stove a hole in her planks. The cries that greeted Mr. Steele's ears when the captain's boat came near were that she was sinking. As the boat came near she listed perceptibly, and in the heavy sea which ran, 7 of the men on board were washed out of her. Fortunately before leaving the ship all were supplied with life belts but for which some of the crew of the boat would have been drowned. In the darkness and amidst the howling of the gale and rushing of the waters it was some time before all were picked up. The men lay in the boat chilled and exhausted and saturated with water. Provisionally Mr. Steele had seized a bottle of brandy before he left the ship, and a draught of this given to each man revived him and sent the blood once again going warmly through his veins. Six fresh men from Mr. Steele's boat went aboard the captain's, and by incessant bailing kept her afloat until daylight dawned when the boat was taken in tow, and as the dark line of the shore could be discerned inside, the boats

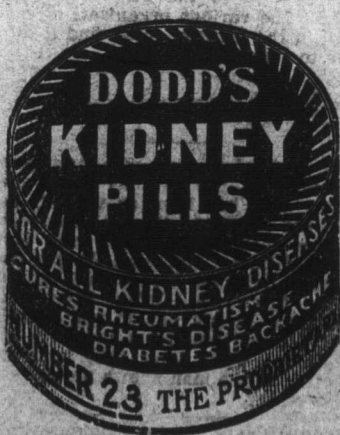

were rowed quickly towards it, and they landed at St. Michael's at 8 o'clock Saturday morning. One of the men of the place saw the boats approach and ran to the rest of the residents who soon had all ashore and comfortably housed. All were dripping wet and shivering with cold. Their wet clothing were taken off and dry apparel given them, and the officers said that they will never forget the kind treatment given them. But that the children had some rugs thrown over them in the boat they would have perished from exposure.

The crew lost all their clothes and effects; the captain's wife losing £200 worth of jewelry, while the captain lost £50 worth of valuables, and Mr. Steele £40. The captain and his family and Mr. Constant were to reside in Toronto, and the ship was to ply in the grain trade on the Great Lakes.

The Normandy was built to carry freight and passengers, was lit with electricity and supplied with every



modern convenience. Mr. Steele was captain of the Lord Londonderry, and two months ago she was durned to the waters edge at Hull. In the fire he then lost all his effects, and only last month he bought a new stock of nautical instruments. The crew will return home the first opportunity.

I've been meditating to-day on the blessedness of being middle class. Sometimes when I am thrown into contact with a life that is so different from mine as mine is from that of the wretched creature who is rotting away in a

cellar—a life of immodesty and wretched frocks and furs, and long-stemmed roses and sun-catching jewels—a life of homes with wide staircases, stately stairways and silences as deep and rich as the rugs on the drawing room floor—a life of horsemanship by the sea, and the freedom to travel anywhere in this wonderful world, I am seized with a sudden rage to think I will never know even for a little while what such a life is like.

But for all the rest of the year I am really quite contentedly happy that I am middle class.

In many ways I think the middle class gets the cream of life.

How? Well, for one thing, if you are middle class and marry you a wife or husband, or get you a friend, you can know absolutely and surely that it is yourself that won the friendship or love, not your money.

And then for another thing, you can have neighbors, and I don't think the rich ever do.

They have sycophants and enemies and acquaintances and some friends, I suppose, but I don't believe they very often have any of those kindly, curious, willing-to-do-anything-if-you-are-in-trouble, next door friends that belong to the genus neighbor.

The lady across the way from us has been ill. A half dozen times in the past two weeks has my little mother slipped across the street with some dainty from our table set forth in all the daintiness of our best silver and napery and china. Three times when the invalid was sickest did the

lady next door sit up all night with her. The man on the other side of us has taken complete care of her furnace all through the siege, and his daughter has been over almost every day to help take care of the children.

Rich people never have things like that done for them. If they are ill, they receive perfect service, of course, but it is service with all the warmth taken out of it by its being given for money.

And then again, if you are middle class and your daughter elopes, or your wife or husband sues you for a divorce, you will probably get off, as far as notoriety goes, with a paragraph or two tucked away on the inner pages of the town or city paper.

But if you happen to possess a few hundred thousand, and your third cousin or your sister-in-law's husband gets tangled up in a scandal, you will doubtless find your picture and your whole history emblazoned across the front page of half the newspapers in the country.

## KING PROCLAIMED THROUGHOUT EMPIRE

### The Whitsun Holidays—The Royal Wishes—Probable Postponement of Veto Question—Connaught for Canada.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, May 9. George the Fifth was proclaimed King throughout the Empire to-day with all the traditional ceremony of past centuries. The country is now beginning to resume its normal life. The King's earnest desire being that except on the day of the funeral of Edward, the national mourning should inflict no unnecessary sacrifices upon the people. Premier Asquith and Reginald McKenna, First Lord of the Admiralty, arrived in London to-night. The members of the Cabinet and officials holding important positions under the Government are hastening to the Capital. King Haakon and Queen Maud of Norway were met at the station this evening by King George and Queen Mary. Young Prince Olaf threw his arms around his uncle's neck. The party drove immediately to Buckingham Palace. King George in a letter to the managers expressed the wish that the theatres be open until the day of the funeral on account of the number that would be thrown out of work by the closing of the houses, and this will be carried out. The King issued another letter in which he said: "Knowing so well the feelings of my

beloved father I am sure that it would be contrary to his wishes that there should be any interruption to the enjoyment of the public during the Whitsun Holidays, therefore, I hope that the general mourning will not prevent my people from taking the usual advantages of the various opportunities afforded them for the coming days." Whether at the very outset of his reign the King should be compelled to shoulder the heavy responsibility of deciding between the opposing political parties on the vexed question of the Veto of the House of Lords is a matter which Premier Asquith must settle. All the ministers are again assembled in London and there is a strong feeling among the moderate men in favor of shelving the whole question until next year. The new King was an assiduous attendant upon the recent Parliamentary debates and yesterday's assembly versed in all the aspects of the question, but he could never have anticipated that he would be called upon to give the decision. In any case it is expected that the Parliamentary recess will be extended until the middle of June. It is stated that the Duke of Connaught, in accordance with the desire of King Edward will succeed Earl Gray as Governor-General of Canada.

#### The Royal Funeral

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, May 9. Friday, May 20th, has been definitely fixed as the date for King Edward's funeral. The body will be borne on a gun carriage through the streets of London to Paddington Station and again through the streets to the Castle. The procession will be similar to that upon the occasion of the funeral of Queen Victoria in 1901. About the casket will be placed the Royal Insignia, the Crown, Orb and Sceptre. King George, mounted, will ride immediately behind the casket followed by other male members of the Royal Family, foreign monarchs, and special ambassadors. The Queen, Queen Mother, and other ladies of the Royal Family will come next in carriages. The remainder of the cortege will be made up of representatives of the army and navy, members of the Imperial Household and high officers of State. After the funeral of her husband, it is expected that the Queen mother will retire to Sandringham Palace, which King Edward some years ago made over to her as a Dowry House. The Lancet to-day publishes an authorized statement confirming the cause of King Edward's death as cardiac failure following upon bronchitis. The statement adds, the last two hours were absolutely peaceful and painless.

#### Roosevelt May Represent U.S.

PASADENA, N. J., May 9. President Taft will in all probability designate Theodor Roosevelt a special ambassador to represent the U. S. Government at the funeral of King Edward.

#### 1,000 Dead from Ruins.

Special to Evening Telegram.

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica, May 9. More than 1,000 dead have been taken from the ruins of Cartago, and many are still buried under the debris. Most of the survivors of the earthquake are now at San Jose. Medicine and food were supplied from the American warships. The condition of those who still remain around the city is such that extraordinary measures must be taken to make assistance and shelter for them. Owing to the general feeling of panic the various organizations engaged in the work of relief find it difficult to reach all.

#### A Generous Act.

Mr. Michael Curran who has been a fireman on the Florida since she arrived here has been so ill that he could not go out to the sealfishery in her this spring. He has a wife and several children, and since the sealers returned Delegate Woods and others of the Firemen's Union interested themselves in his behalf and raised about \$40 for him from members of the Union, while later they hope to do better as the man shows no sign of improvement.

**SATURDAY'S RECORD.**—Saturday night was a record one in police circles and 15 drunks and disorderlies were arrested by 10.30 o'clock. A remarkable feature of this was that most of the prisoners were very young men well supplied with money, having sums ranging from \$10 to \$40 on them, and each when searched had a flask or two of liquor in his pocket. The cells were filled and a couple had to be placed in the apartments reserved for females.

#### From the Iron Mines.

Numbers of men are now daily leaving Bell Island for their homes to get ready to go to the Labrador and to work in the iron mines. It is feared that there will be a shortage of help as a result in the mines the coming summer. Some of the men who arrive here yesterday are already demanding for higher wages will be made shortly. The men now, according to grade, get from 12 to 13½ cents per hour, and they intend looking for 15 cents.

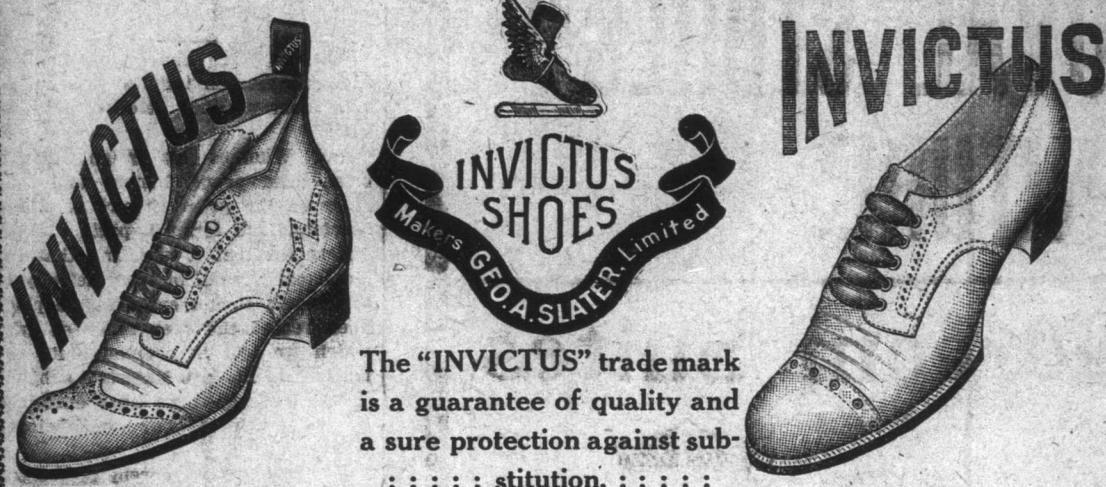
**FRESH BEEF FAMINE.**—As no vessels or steamers had been here for

His lucid and practical ideas as to the disposal of night soil is one that should commend itself to our citizens generally, and is not by any means of a costly nature. The absolute necessity of public lavatories is a move in the right direction, and his assurance to the public that he will, if elected, support all measures relating to the city's welfare, especially in water and sewerage matters for the higher levels and South Side. Perhaps there are none of the aspirants now before the public for civic honors as worthy as M. W. Myrick is, for he has given upwards of 30 years of his valuable services free in protecting the lives and property of our citizens in the ranks of the Phoenix and Volunteer Fire Brigade, previous to the inception of the present efficient brigade. He is a first-class tradesman of independent means, made so by honest toil and sobriety, and has held the responsible office of Treasurer of the St. John's Mechanics' Society now upwards of 20 years. ## The New King and Queen.

Newfoundlanders are very loyal, and I am sure they would like to know something about their present rulers. The new Sovereign is like his great uncle, William IV., a sailor King. He has gone through all his degrees from midshipman to admiral, and was in every respect a most capable officer and strict disciplinarian. He is a good father and a most devoted husband; a fine all round sportsman; and one of the best shots in England. His consort and his own personality are well known to us from his visit to St. John's. The Queen is a granddaughter of George III's youngest son, the Duke of Cambridge. Her mother, the Princess Mary of Cambridge, was one of the most beautiful and accomplished women of her day. I can remember her as a youngster when she visited Liverpool with her father, the Duke of Cambridge. She was then only 19, a tall, splendid girl. She was a universal favorite with the most winning manners. The present Queen, her daughter, has all her mother's gifts and graces and is everywhere beloved. The King has only one uncle living, the Duke of Connaught; his three aunts, Princess Helena, Princess Louise and Princess Beatrice, are all very accomplished. The eldest is very beautiful, while Princess Louise, married to the Duke of Argyll, is well known and distinguished as a painter. Princess Beatrice is a writer and the author of a very interesting history of her husband's distinguished family, the Battenbergs. Her daughter is the Queen of Spain. The writer had the honor of meeting them all at Windsor Castle, and he can speak personally about their fascination and most charming manners. The Princess Louise especially took the warmest interest in his work and praised it most cordially and gave me a pressing invitation to visit them at Kensington Palace. This happened in 1895. I had helped Lord Ripon, the Secretary of State for the Colonies, on the question of our union with Canada. He was very pleased to give me a letter of introduction to the Royal Court. Sir John Cowell, Lady Curzon Howe's father, Master of the Royal Household, had just died and his place was filled by Lord Edward Pelham Clinton, the Duke of Newcastle's son, and the Secretary was Sir Fleetwood, whom I had known as a young engineer officer when he visited St. John's from Bermuda with Mr. and Mrs. Eugenius Harvey. I was very friendly with both of them. I had defended the Duke of Newcastle in the London Times against the attacks of the Orangemen for refusing to allow the Prince to receive a very strong anti-Catholic address, and had given Sir Fleetwood some good fishing.

I give these details to explain how a humble individual like myself enjoyed so much favour. It was my history that made friends for me everywhere.

Not long ago six of the crew of the banker Excelida, Capt. J. Lewis, deserted and the vessel had to sail short handed. She is now fishing with six dories instead of 10, her usual complement.

## The Queen Consort---Queen Mary.

Our last Queen regnant was Victoria the Good, who passed to her rest some nine years ago. When Albert Edward, Prince of Wales, became King, Edward VII., his wife became Queen Consort, and as such was crowned with her royal husband. This was in accordance with the old usage of the realm, for even in the most ancient Anglo-Saxon times the consort of the King occupied a most exalted position, except for a short period, after much odium was incurred by Queen Edburga, who poisoned her husband, and the West Saxons withheld the style and privilege of Queen from the wife of the King. In 856 Ethelwulf offended his people greatly by causing his second wife to be crowned, but in 965 the rank of Queen was restored and has been maintained ever since.

The Queen Consort is a subject of the King, but with special privileges. The law of treason affords her special legal protection as it does the King and the heir apparent. She has a personal revenue, her own officials, and is crowned by the Archbishop of York with the Queen Consort's Crown, known as "the ancient Queen's Crown."

The present Queen Consort is regarded as one of the best, wisest and most domestic members of the Royal Family. As the Duchess of Cornwall she visited St. John's with the Duke of Cornwall some years ago. This was before His Majesty King George became Prince of Wales. They were not then styled Prince and Princess of Wales, as those titles are not hereditary, but are conferred on the eldest living son of the King and his wife, if he is married. As Princess of Wales she has done much to introduce habits of home life among the nobility and to frown on the freaks of the Smart Set. She was specially educated from her earliest

years for the exalted position she now occupies.

Recently Mr. T. P. O'Connor wrote of her:—

"The Princess of Wales is the most expert needlewoman of the Royal Family. She, indeed, is rarely to be seen without a needle in her hand during her leisure moments. Her daughter, Princess Mary of Wales, takes after her mother in this respect, and is becoming quite expert in the use of the needle. When the Princess is staying at a country house it is quite understood that immediately the ladies adjourn to the drawing-room, the lady-in-waiting shall bring her bag of needlework to her, and with this she occupies herself constantly while joining, of course, in the conversation. She does not care for cards and has no particular skill at them, and her example in preferring her needlework to the card-table is being rather widely followed by ladies in Society at the present time. Every year the Princess of Wales assists the Queen and Princess Victoria to send large parcels of warm winter clothing to the tenantry on the Sandringham estates and many of these

articles are at this moment being made by her personally.—M.A.P.

As Princess of Wales she has proved her worth. May she as Queen Mary prove a right royal and worthy helpmeet of her royal spouse, whose lines are cast in exalted ways, but whose constitutional path appears to be thorny. King George has a rocky road before him; may her counsels be cheering and wise and worthy of themselves and the Empire.


