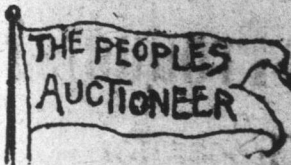

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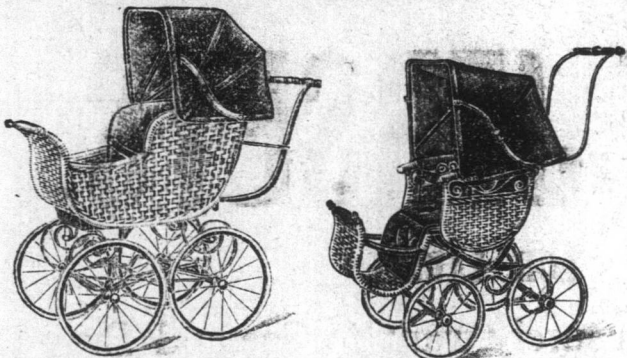

Why Kitchener Isn't Liked.

He Has Made Powerful Enemies in High Circles by His Iron Rule. Lord Kitchener's appointment as the King's representative in Egypt means that there are a number of very angry people in various parts of the British Empire. For months they have been fighting a terrible silent battle against him. They have laboured hard to bar his way to any post of power and honour—and he has beaten them. It would be foolish to pretend that Lord Kitchener has no enemies. He has, and they are powerful enemies, too. But he has made them by refusing to budge an inch from what he regards as the line of his duty; and also, what has made him far more unpopular in certain quarters, he has refused to let other people shrink what he regards as their duty.

"Your reasons for not doing what you are told are the best I ever heard," he once told an officer after listening to a series of plausible excuses for neglected duty. "Now go and do it." That sort of remark to a "slacker" doesn't make him feel at all friendly towards you. It was during his Sudan campaign that Lord Kitchener seriously began the process of making enemies by standing no nonsense from anybody. To drop the Ladies in the Nile. Some ladies wanted to go to the

front, and they arranged with an influential personage at the War Office that they should be sent out as nurses. Lord Kitchener received a telegram telling him to expect them. He replied immediately that he did not desire the presence of women with the Army. Again came a message from the War Office saying that the ladies were coming out. The exact words of Lord Kitchener's final words are unknown, but it was to the effect that if the ladies came they would be sent back, and if they came again he would drop them into the Nile. After that threat no more was heard of the proposal, but both the high personage and the ladies took a violent dislike to the Commander-in-Chief.

Before the advance on Khartoum Lord Kitchener required a new type of gun, and sent home for it. The War Office, after its amiable custom, replied by offering to send out another kind of gun, more or less obsolete. Lord Kitchener tartly replied that he could throw stones himself, he wanted a gun to shoot with. More trouble!

His Hurred Visit to Cape Town. During the last Boer War Lord Kitchener, though busy at the front, paid a hurried visit to Cape Town. Here he found a number of officers having a great time. His visit was quite unexpected, of course, and they had no time to scurry back to their regiments. When they suddenly ran face to face with their Commander-in-Chief in the hall of a big hotel they nearly fainted.

"What are you doing in Cape Town?" Lord Kitchener demanded. "I—well, on leave, sir," was the trembling answer. "Oh, indeed? On leave, are you?" "Yes, there's—there's not very much—fighting—on—just now," another of the officers ventured to remark. "Really?" Lord Kitchener retorted. "You surprise me. Well, you will do better go straight back to the front—all of you—or you will take the next boat back to England. You understand?" They understood very well indeed, and the whole lot caught the next train to the north.

One of the things that exasperated him is when he gives a plain order and is asked to explain it, or to repeat it. During the South African War he sent for an aide-de-camp and gave him one or two verbal orders to take to some officers in the neighborhood. The aide-de-camp failed to grasp the orders properly, and three times he

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asked Lord Kitchener to repeat them. At the third request the General lost all patience. He wheeled round to the table and wrote a few hurried words on a sheet of paper.

The Hornet's Nest in India. "Here, Captain Blank," he said, handing the paper to the aide-de-camp "take this note. It is to the Principal Medical Officer asking him to examine your ears. There is evidently something wrong with them. And as you go out please send someone else to me."

But it was when he went to India that Lord Kitchener stirred up his biggest hornet's nest. So big, indeed, was the nest and so angry were the hornets that every effort was made to prevent him from being sent back to India recently as Viceroy.

The Indian army had drifted into a very "slack" state when Lord Kitchener arrived on the scene. The climate, of course, is rather against hard work in India, and as a general rule nobody does more work than they can help. Lord Kitchener changed all that. "How many men do you want for the manoeuvres?" asked a certain General who had about 20,000 troops under his command. "I think I can spare 5,000."

Quick as a flash came Lord Kitchener's reply: "I want every man who is not sick or otherwise incapacitated for duty."

And he saw to it that he got them, too. If Lord Kitchener had been contented to make himself amiable at Simla tea-parties and had not worried people to do the work they had been sent out to India to do, he would almost certainly have been Viceroy of India to-day. Egypt, however, is a good second; perhaps India may yet come to him.—Pearsons Weekly.

Invents "First Aid" for Hobble Skirts. Alexander Jameson Calhoun, of Bloomfield, N.J., has invented a device which he says will assist women wearing hobble skirts in getting aboard trains. Bloomfield women who have tried the "lift" say they hope it will be placed in all stations. At most country stations the platforms are very low, which makes the first step of the car about eighteen inches from the ground.

Some few weeks ago the Hon. C. H. Emerson, one of the members of the Executive Council, left here for an extended trip to England and the continent. To the surprise of his friends and acquaintances who knew of his intention to spend a lengthy period abroad his quick return was a matter of much surprise.

Mr. Emerson arrived last Saturday morning and the Premier, Sir Edward Morris, was waiting to see Mr. Emerson. So important was this interview that the Premier who was due to connect with the steamer at Placentia to go to Garnish, did not go out on Saturday on the regular morning train, which makes that connection, but took a special train.

What matter of public urgency demanded the presence of Mr. Emerson in St. John's? Was he recalled? If so, why? Why was the Premier waiting to see him? What made the conference important enough for the Premier to miss the regular train and take a special? Has Mr. Emerson been recalled to perform any special and important task, which he is considered uniquely fitted to perform? If so, what is the task?

What is its importance to the Government?

Banking Fleet Here.

A fleet of bankers arrived here since Tuesday evening. Among them is the Lunenburg Percival S. Parks, Capt. Sam Parks, who came in Tuesday night for a bait supply and also salt. She has been 2 weeks on the Banks and captured 550 qtls. in that time. She is a vessel of 7 dories, and has 1,850 qtls. to her credit to date.

The Burn banker Kasaga, Capt. Goddard, also arrived Tuesday evening. She had been fishing 2 days only and secured 100 qtls.; she has 6 dories and has stocked 1,500 qtls. for the season. In the high wind which blew she stood in towards this port she smashed the foremast at the polehead but received very little other damage. The vessels report fish fairly plentiful, and all will try to get a supply of squid bait.

"The Sins of Society."

An American Clergyman's Trenchant Criticism of Conditions Prevailing in the United States.

Philadelphia, Aug. 12.—Undismayed by criticisms, many of which have come from high places, the Rev. George Chalmers Richmond, rector of St. John's Protestant Episcopal Church, will to-morrow deliver a sermon to his parishioners equally as denunciatory and scathing as that which he preached last Sunday on the approaching marriage of John Jacob Astor to Miss Madeline Force, a sermon which, during the past week, has excited the whole American nation and which has been applauded by certain prelates in the Protestant Episcopal and Roman Catholic Churches, notably Bishop Doane of Albany.

Mr. Richmond's attitude against the Astor-Force wedding is no less militant now than it was a week ago in fact in his second sermon it is more so. He cuts and mows with a free verbal sword if ever a man—inside the pulpit or out of it—did. His sermon is entitled "The Sins of Society," and his text is taken from the 12th, 13th and 14th verses of the second chapter of the second epistle of St. Peter.

Speaking in regard to the coming marriage, Mr. Richmond says:—"The utterances of Bishop Doane in this coming marriage set all our Bishops a good example. The Bishop knows Astor very well, but that fact only drives the great bishop of Albany to exercise his prophetic function of a priest of God's holy church, pronouncing anathema on this coming alliance. Their money and hereditary increments of various kinds place them for unthinking people among the highest citizens of New York.

"In reality Astor and his crowd are social perverts of the worst type. Think of the difference between him and Seth Low, John Bigelow, the late Mr. Sheppard and many others who, with their wealth, position and character, are helping in the erection of a kingdom of peace, justice and righteousness."

"Has Astor ever lifted his hand to help New York in her progress upward. No. He simply draws the big rents from off land and buildings, the value of which—has unearned income—has been enhanced by the toil of thousands of humble men and women who through the long hours every day sweat and slave in order to give such as Astor a bigger income—mansions, yachts, midnight dinners and weeks and months of foreign travel."

With respect to the "smart sets" of New York and Philadelphia, Mr. Richmond said:

"Too many of our rich men lack all feeling of personal responsibility in the life and welfare of the city that supports them. The smart set is undoing what the real set is building up. The moral underpinning of our nation is shaken every time such a wedding as this Astor-Force affair takes place.

"I speak out in order to bring these frivolous people to their senses. That is not only my privilege; it is my duty. The moral standards of our nation are being imperilled by the smart set. They are ignorant of duty, of moral worth, or personal responsibility of civic obligations, of patriotic demands and of the strong national claims laid on them because of their inherited wealth and social position.

Women Drift and Drive.
 "The smart set of our day have no religion suitable for life's demands. The women of this set drift and drive as the day's pleasure and sensual gratification allow. The young girls of our so-called 'upper crust' have no religion to speak of. Their minds are filled with material ambitions and social schemes which they hope will place them above some other woman whose brain is torn and warped with a like purpose.

"This condition is due to three reasons—a false leadership in the past among some of our Episcopal clergy who prepare many of these women for confirmation; a weak, dotting and foolish lot of mothers whose sole idea is to have a daughter marry a millionaire or some other social snirk and who would rather have the girl know how to dress and dance well than pray, and whose sole idea of church and religion is a means of social advancement, exclusive company and a place of refuge once or twice a year, at Christmas and Easter, when, of course, a person is off color if she doesn't attend services to show off her new hat and drop a dime in the box.

"Oh, the smart set of New York is the social dung heap of the nation! The stench emitted is felt all over the world. Paris, London, are defiled by the social rakes and moral perverts

of New York who hang around the outskirts of a coronation or stand in line to catch a sight of some lord's daughter, whose name may add an iota of an inch to a calling card."

"Thank God, King George of England—God bless him—will have nothing to do with the smart set tribe of New York and Philadelphia, and for this our nation ought to pass him a vote of thanks.

"This matter of the Astor-Force wedding is more important even than President Taft's arbitration treaty. For if America continues to raise up moral weeds, weak and worthless specimens of men and women, she will some day have no men with souls big enough or broad enough to think of nations' duty let alone our obligations across the seas.

"We must free ourselves of the American smart set just as soon as we can. They are a drawback on our character; an unholy stigma on our national life and a disgrace to us abroad.

"The motherhood of our land is pure and holy. I revere it and love to think of it as our great national asset against the awfully ravaging sins of our women who care not for the beauty of children. A woman without a babe to her breast or at least in her soul is a useless inhabitant of this globe.

Smart Set's Women.
 "We detest the women of the smart set. They stand for nothing high or morally lovely. They lead on to sin the men who for a time they thought they loved. Their weak, insipid natures are the worst character the world ever knows, frivolous, vain, deceitful, always seeking publicity, gadding about to dinner parties, horse shows, polo contests, yacht races, ball games and prize fights. They laugh at nothing; they smirk at themselves, which is the same thing; they giggle at the sunlight; they snicker at the moon. Minds they lack. As we walk our streets we avoid them. Sensible men hide their faces in shame as they see a woman of the smart set approach."

The marriage to which Mr. Richmond refers in the above article is that which is soon to be celebrated between Col. John Jacob Astor, of New York, and Miss Madeline Talmage Force. The age of the groom is 47 and that of the prospective bride is 18. The colonel has a son, who is said to be a year older than his prospective step-mother.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Aug. 22.
Thirty-one are in hospital as the result of fights between mobs and police at Ebbwale, Rhymney and Trefgar, in Monmouthshire. Clashes took place early this morning, when the rioters looted the stores in defiance of the police. The mob fought the constables fiercely, but the sight of military forces everywhere had a sobering effect upon the position.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Aug. 22.
The men who make short sea trips on trading vessels are again causing trouble to London Docks. The Transport Federation, with a view of not dislocating the work in port, has offered to submit to arbitration the terms of the award rendered by Sir Kaye Rollin. The Federation offer was, however, refused. Sir Kaye was appointed to settle the trouble with the transport workers, but his award did not satisfy the men. The Federation, following the refusal, has invited the short sea trip men to decline work on vessels, the owners of which refuse to grant the men 18 cents an hour, and, say, 25 cents an hour overtime.

The Swansea Railroad men have also gone on strike. They allege that only 60 out of 300 on the Midland Railway, who struck, have been reinstated, and the strike was declared this morning. The trade of the docks is at a standstill.

LIVERPOOL, Aug. 22.

The Commission appointed to inquire into the trouble between the Railway Companies and their employees, which led to the strike, was announced by the Government in the House of Commons to-day. The Chairman is Sir David Harrel. The railroads are represented by Sir Thomas Ellis, Secretary of Mineworkers Association, and Sir Charles Keble, Vice-Chancellor of the University of Birmingham. The representatives of the men are Arthur Henderson, the Labour M. P., and Burnel, the chief Labour Correspondent for the Board of Trade.

In naming the Commissioners, Premier Asquith briefly congratulated the country that the clouds had lifted, adding, amid cheers, that the few words said with regard to the past, at the present moment, the better.

The question as to the greater cost of railway travelling in the United Kingdom under the terms of the settlement is attracting attention. Under one clause of the agreement, the Government gives assurances for providing that the increased cost of labour, due to the improvement of conditions for the working staff of the roads, shall be regarded as a valid justification for a reasonable increase of charges. If the demand of the men for minimum wages of thirty shillings a week is conceded, the wages bill of the Railway Companies will be swelled by \$40,000,000 per annum.

Labour Trouble Breaks Out Again.

Liverpool Tramway Company Refuse to Reinstate Men--Keir Hardie Attacks Lloyd George and MacDonald Denounces Churchill.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Aug. 23.
There was a lively passage between Keir Hardie, the Socialist leader, and Lloyd George, in the House of Commons, yesterday. Hardie accused the Government of taking the side of the Railway directors, and said that if the same pressure had been brought to bear upon them as upon the men, there would have been no strike. He declared vehemently that the men shot down by the troops during the strike "were murdered in the interest of the capitalist system." As a protest, he moved an amendment to the motion for adjournment that the House adjourn to August 29th, instead of October 24th.

Lloyd George Replies.
Chancellor Lloyd George replied that the configuration had been put out, but that there were still smouldering fires here and there, which might at any moment burst into flame. He knew nothing more likely to bring about such a disaster, and perhaps cause the men to fling away what their leaders had claimed was a triumph for them, than "such grossly inaccurate statements" as Hardie had made. There was "not a syllable of truth" in Hardie's allegations that the Government had sided with the railway directors. It was due to pressure brought to bear by the Government, that the directors had been induced to meet the representatives of the men face to face. The Government employed all its power to see justice done to both parties. The Chancellor then referred to a speech made by Hardie, in which he had told a big meeting that the Premier was prepared to shoot down every striker, a charge which Lloyd George stigmatized as baseless and contemptible. Hardie's amendment was defeated by 93 to 15.

Macdonald Denounces Churchill.
Ramsay Macdonald, Chairman of the Labour Party, who took a prominent part in the settlement negotiations, was optimistic, and said that if the spirit shown by both sides during the negotiations, prevailed in future, the country had heard the last of railway strikes for a generation. He was unable to resist making a heated denunciation of Home Secretary Churchill and the employment of soldiers. During the strike, he declared, that the Department which had played a most diabolical part was the Home Office. Churchill's bulletins on the situation were "mischievous and inaccurate; expressions of opinion therein were not sensible, and effect was to make the men more desirous of continuing the fight than of coming to a settlement."

Churchill's Defense.
Winston Churchill's retort to Macdonald was that if the "Linnely rioters had been left to themselves, they would have wrought more damage and misery in three or four hours than the whole 50,000 troops, employed on strike duty. The wholesale employment of soldiers was necessary to prevent undue loss of life. Churchill held that if the authors of the strike had succeeded in their intentions, they would have brought about a catastrophe, compared with which blockade by a foreign enemy would be an almost negligible quantity.

National Strike Imminent.

Special Evening Telegram.
LIVERPOOL, Aug. 23.
Tom Mann and other strike leaders arrived in London from Liverpool last night and held a conference with the representatives of the Amalgamated Society of Railway Servants. An ultimatum was sent to Premier Asquith, Sydney Buxton, President of the Board of Trade, and the Lord Mayor of Liverpool, practically demanding the reinstatement of the Liverpool tramway men by noon to-day. Meaning the situation is so acute that George Asquith, Comptroller of the Labor Department of the Board of Trade, has gone to Liverpool to try and arrange matters. Mann declares it is the intention of the leaders to bring about a national strike unless the corporation yields.

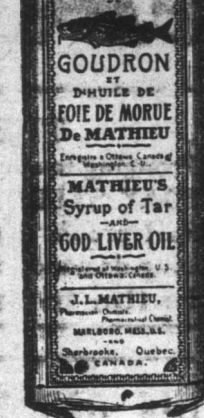

Spectacular Forest Fire Excursion by Ingraham

About 2.40 p.m. yesterday, just as the wind was about at its highest, the ridge which crosses the South Side Hill near Duck Pond and overlooking the city took fire and burned fiercely. Two boys, Fred Bussey and Alan Keeping, who were up bathing in Duck Pond, were the first to see the blaze, got their clothing adjusted quickly and ran down over the South Side Hill and reported the matter at the Western Fire Station. Soon an ultimatum was telephoned the police station, and at the suggestion of I. G. Sullivan, Supt. Grimes dispatched a sergeant with several men of the police force to the scene. The men all the evening did good work trying to beat out the blaze, but the wind was too high for their exertions to be effective. The spectacle, however, was one which thousands of people viewed with admiration. The whole ridge was burnt over and cleaned out as far as wood is concerned, and when the shades of night fell the sky all over the western part of the city was lit up. The burning woods resembled a great bonfire, and the people on the higher levels certainly enjoyed the sight, for they could see it to better advantage than those living below. The fire burned over an area of two miles and at 2 o'clock this morning was not thoroughly extinguished. Hundreds of people who were on the South Side Hill picnicking yesterday climbed the ridge to see it, but took good care to keep to windward of the big blaze.

Fire Alarm Yesterday.

All yesterday, but especially in the afternoon, a gale of wind blew and it looked to be a dangerous time for an outbreak of fire. I. G. Sullivan had all his men on the alert, and when an alarm was turned in from box 35 at 4.30 p.m., the Western and Central men made a very quick response. The scene of the fire was at Mr. Stealy's residence in Murphy's Square. A spark falling on the roof ignited the shingles, but ladders were quickly run up by the firemen, and a few buckets of water quelled the blaze in a hurry; very little damage was done.

Big Passenger Traffic.

The Reid Nfld. Co. yesterday carried over their system possibly more people than ever they carried before. At a conservative estimate the number was placed at 1,500 but many think it reached nearer 1,800. All were in or of the line before 12.30 a.m. It speaks for the efficiency of the conductors and trainmen generally, but though handling this great crowd of people in one day not an accident of serious importance occurred.

Hardly any better dusting cloth can be found than the old-fashioned red bandana handkerchief.

If an oven is too hot, the temperature may be lowered by opening the lid of the range a trifle.

When making panned oysters it is essential to have the pan piping hot before putting anything into it.

When making sweet croquettes, add a little sugar to the crumbs in which the croquettes are to be rolled.

A pinch of soda added to water in which tough meat or vegetables are boiled will make them more tender.

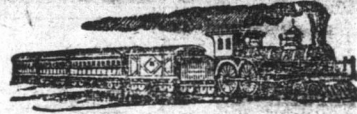

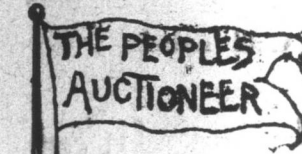
