Railway Acci- dent Inquiry.

In the Central District Court yester-
day afternoon Judge Morris,
the preliminaries in connection with
the recent train tragedy at Mount
Moriah were held. Mr. P. J. Sum-
mers, K.C., Deputy Minister of Jus-
tice, and Mr. P. A. Mewa, Esq., re-
presented the Crown, and Mr. W. J. Hig-
gins, K.C., represented the Reid Mfd.
Co. In opening the proceedings Judge
Morris said: "The inquiry is pursuant
to instructions communicated to
me by the Government through the
Department of Justice, to hold an in-
vestigation into the railway accident
which occurred on the 24th ultimo, in
which five passenger cars, attached to
the above mentioned train, were de-
tailed near Curling resulting in the death
of one passenger and injury to a
number of others. My instructions
require that the Government be
satisfied that this inquiry should be as
far-reaching and thorough as possi-
ble, and that all available witnesses
should be brought before this Tri-
bunal. I am further instructed that
the Deputy Minister of Justice, Mr.
Summers, K.C., with him Mr. F. A.
Mewa, Esq., are to undertake the con-
duct of this investigation on behalf
of the Government." Mr. Summers,
K.C., stated that the object of the
inquiry is to ascertain the cause
of the accident and as some material
witnesses have to be obtained, he as-
ked for a postponement. The opening
of the enquiry was therefore set for
3.30 p.m. Monday.

Runaway Horse.

Last evening, about 7 o'clock, while

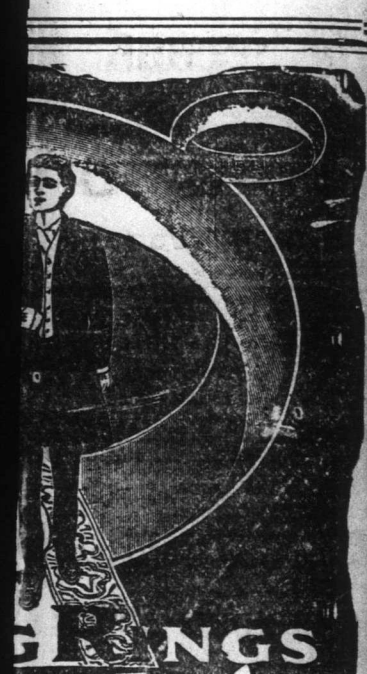

Turkey Has Surrendered.

Austria-Hungary Next.

German Retreat Homeward Continues---The Whole Allied Line Advancing---Enemy Defence System Shattered and Broken---U-boats in Atlantic Again.

TURKEY ACCEPTS WILSON'S TERMS.

(Bulletin.)—Turkey announces that she accepts Wilson's terms and has notified Germany.

WAR REVIEW.

On the news of necessity the Germans are flying east from their old battle positions from Douai to La Fere and northward from La Fere to the Meuse River. Their flight is towards some haven of safety from the talons of the Allied hawks, which everywhere are menacing them. Meanwhile there have been sent broadcast further reports that Austria-Hungary and Turkey, seeing that they will accept President Wilson's peace terms. Notwithstanding the advantages that are being achieved over the common enemy on the battlefronts and the peace feelers in the air, President Wilson, Secretary of State Lansing, Secretary of the Treasury, McAdoo and in fact all the high officials of the Government are warning the American citizens that the situation still is critical, and that everyone should rally to the support of the Fourth Liberty Loan. All along the battlefront the Allied troops are advancing. From the south of Douai to the east of Laon the enemy everywhere is giving ground eastward.

AMERICANS STRIKE IN ARGONNE.

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY NORTH WEST OF VERDUN, Oct. 11. (By the A.P.)—American forces struck the German lines just east of the Argonne forest to-day. They captured the villages of Somme-erance, Chevières and Marcy. The ridge of Dame Marie was stormed after hard fighting. More than one thousand prisoners were taken during the day. These include one Colonel and two battalion staffs. Fighting opened this morning with the infantry sweeping through the northern portion of the Argonne forest for a maximum distance of nearly five miles. Little opposition was encountered from the enemy, who had probably retired during the night to escape from the untenable pocket formed by the American banking movement on Monday. As the Americans pushed forward they found that the Germans had made a thorough job of blocking and destroying the roads as they retired. At two o'clock this afternoon they were in Marcy and the Lafolle farm and Richin farm and advancing on the Negremont woods, the only piece of forest land between them and Grandpre. Half an hour later they had captured Somme-erance and had advanced north of that village. By this attack the Americans have taken a firmer grip on the territory just north of the broken Kriemhild line.

HUNGARIAN PREMIER RESIGNS.

BUDAPEST, Oct. 11. (Via Basel.)—Dr. Alexander Wekerle, the Hungarian Premier, announced his resignation, after an audience with King Charles.

ADVANCE NORTH OF THE SCARPE.

LONDON, Oct. 11. North of the Scarpe river in the direction of Douai the British have passed the Drocourt-Queant line and reached the Lens-Douai railway in the vicinity of Beaumont, and at Quierzy-La-Motte further north they have arrived at Henin-Lietard on the Douai-Carvin road.

ABANDON GOLD MINES.

TOKIO, Friday, Oct. 4. Bolshevik forces abandoned the gold mining district west of Morosoffsk, in the trans-Balkala region, when Allied troops entered it, according to a statement issued at War Office to-day. Bolshevik left the vicinity of the Irok-Ai gold mine when the Allied troops entered the village there. When the Allied forces entered the town of Bankul on Sept. 23, the people hung out flags and gave the Allied troops a cordial reception. The Allies captured nine steamers at Sankul and took possession of 381 passenger cars. The war material captured included 1,800 hand grenades, 29 machine guns and four mortars.

NERVOUS COLLAPSE IN GERMANY.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11. A despatch to-day says: General Von Ardenne writes in the Berlin Tageblatt that General Foch had obtained successes so important and so plainly evident that the Central Powers have now lost nearly all the benefit of previous offensives, and many people wonder what is the mysterious power continuously pulling back the German armies, though they were meant to go onward. The Strasbourg Post is quoted as saying: The military situation in the West causes the most fantastic rumors to newly spread. Again people begin to fear the collapse of our front and the oncoming rush into Germany. All those who have not lost their heads, and who still preserve the mastery of their nerves ought to feel it their duty to go against such rumors.

SUBS. AGAIN IN THE ATLANTIC.

AN ATLANTIC PORT, Oct. 11. Officers of a Brazilian steamship arriving to-day told of an encounter with a German submarine yesterday 70 miles off the North Atlantic coast. The steamer fired on the submarine, and members of the gun crew believed it was sunk, although no wreckage was seen. The submarine was sighted as it was rising to the surface and the steamer immediately opened fire. A shot from the stern gun missed the target, but the steamer swung around and made a fair hit with the bow gun, according to the officers. The matter was reported to Navy officials.

SOCIALISTS APPROVE OF WILSON'S REPLY.

PARIS, Oct. 11. Delegates attending the session of the Socialist Congress to-day voted in favor of the resolution presented by Pierre Renaude, leader of the majority socialists in the Chamber of Deputies, which approved of the reply sent by President Wilson of the peace proposal of the Central Powers. The resolution voted is as follows: "The Socialist Party, confirming its address to President Wilson, gives its approval to the answer just made in the name of the President by Secretary of State Lansing, to the German Chancellor's note. The Socialist Party

to have fled so far across of the battlefield as to be out of range. The high ground on the eight mile front between St. Hilaire and Le Cateau to the southeast was found to be alive with machine guns when the British approached and the cavalry patrols were held up for some time. The Douai salient has been made still deeper and the news that the Germans are beginning to evacuate that city may be expected at any time.

show the Kreuz Zeitung, of Berlin, the organ of the Prussian Junkers, as expressing bitter disappointment that German diplomacy did not succeed in disrupting the Entente coalition. It says we should have offered a separate peace with advantageous conditions to one or two of the Allies. Unfortunately it is too late now to take up again this idea, which should have remained the chief governing idea of any Government truly German. The Baden Press, the semi-official organ of Prince Maximilian, of Baden, the Imperial Chancellor, says, if Germany is ready for sacrifices it must be understood that she is not ready to give back Alsace-Lorraine or a single metre of German commercial territory in the Orient. Neither question can be submitted to any discussion whatever.

RETIREATING FROM DOUAI TO GRAND PRE.

LONDON, Oct. 11. The enemy evidently is retiring from Douai. The British have captured Staubert and thus are within several miles of the main lateral line of communications, namely the Valenciennes-Lille railway. The enemy is retreating on the whole front from the Soissons-Laon road to Grand Pre north of the Argonne forest, and also from the north bank of the Sappe river in Champagne. General Gouraud's army in Champagne advanced four miles this morning and captured Marchant. The enemy is falling back towards Vouziers.

GERMAN MURDERS.

DUBLIN, Oct. 11. Of the 160 women and children aboard the str. Lienster when she was torpedoed by a German submarine, only fifteen have been accounted for. Several of these have died since they were brought to port.

CONSTANTINOPLE UNDER MARI-TIAL LAW.

PARIS, Oct. 11. A rumor was circulated on the Paris bourse this afternoon that Constantinople had been declared under martial law. Ottoman values jumped three and four points. Turkish securities were in great demand and there was much trading in them.

IMPORTANT TOWNS CAPTURED.

PARIS, Oct. 11. British armies under command of Generals Rawlinson, Byng and Horns, continued their advance this morning under favorable conditions. British troops captured St. Hilaire, Les Calvaux, Avesnes and Stauber. Many prisoners were taken and much material was captured. General Debeney's army has pushed across the river Oise at several points in the

NO ENEMY OPPOSITION. WITH THE ANGLO-AMERICAN FORCES SOUTH EAST OF CAMBRAL, Oct. 11. (By the A. P.)—The great battle now being fought in this region is on a front of nearly thirty miles to-day it having been extended to the north. The British are gaining everywhere. There is virtually no enemy infantry opposition.

APPROVED WILSON NOTE.

PARIS, Oct. 10. President Wilson's reply to the German peace note was approved to-day by a vote of the Committee on Foreign Affairs of the Chamber of Deputies. The resolution also expressed reliance in the Government not to accept on behalf of France any armistice which would not provide for atonements for the guarantees 'to which the victorious armies of the Entente are entitled.'

NEW LEAVEN WORKING.

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 11. The working of the new Leaven in Germany is illustrated by a decree of the Crown Council of Saxony summoning the Landtag to convene on October 28. The decree directs the Minister of the Interior to draft a measure which shall substitute for the franchise now obtaining for the Lan-

tag second chamber, a franchise based on a broader foundation. Saxony has to-day a franchise system of four complete classifications.

HOT WEATHER HAIR GROOMING.

How very much our hair has to do with our good appearance and comparatively few women have the naturally wavy hair which always looks well in all kinds of weather, to the envy of her many less fortunate sisters. A summer girl's most serious problem is that of keeping the hair in curl in hot weather. The wise summer girl whose locks are naturally straight, has, however, discovered that an application of a curling fluid made of a tablespoon of bruised quince seed to a pint of hot water, the water being poured over the seeds and the whole allowed to stand several hours, will help wonderfully in keeping the hair in curl.

The resulting quince mucilage is thinned with a few drops of essence of violet before the hair is moistened with the fluid. Apply the fluid just before wrapping the hair upon the crimpers. There is also a curling fluid that can be applied to the hair and left to dry, curling the hair as it dries without the aid of crimpers. It is sold as follows: Potassium of carbonate 120 grains; ammonia water one fluid dram; alcohol twelve drams; rosewater enough to make sixteen fluid ounces. In using, moisten the hair, adjust it loosely and allow it to dry.

There is little or no excuse for the summer untidiness and wilted appearance of some girls and women during the hot months, for with a little care one can acquire that trim grooming that is a very vital part of charm and beauty.

"Entangling Alliances."

(From the Boston Herald.)

In the carefully prepared address which President Wilson delivered in New York on Friday, he said: "We still read Washington's immortal warning against 'entangling alliances.'" Of course, the words ascribed to Washington are not his. What he said was that we should "steer clear of permanent alliances with any portion of the foreign world," and that by keeping ourselves "on a respectable defensive posture we may safely trust to temporary alliances for extraordinary emergencies." The full passage will be found in his presidential farewell address. It was another President that spoke of "entangling alliances." In his inaugural address Jefferson stated what he deemed "the essential principles of our Government" and began his enumeration thus: "Equal and exact justice to all men of whatever state or persuasion, religious or political; peace, commerce, and honest friendship with all nations, entangling alliances with none." Mr. Wilson is not the first person to fall into this little error, but that he, a university president, and President of the United States, should be found entangled in it is quite astonishing.



My Job--After The War.

THE SENTENCE OF THE SEAMEN.

(By J. HAVELOCK WILSON, C.B.E., Secretary of the National Seamen's Union.)

I see a tremendous amount of work awaiting us after the war. I venture to predict now that our Seamen's Union will be bigger, more powerful, more effective than ever; and that the sailors and firemen and dock workers will have more friends still as the result of their magnificent work for Britain during the great crisis.

There are undoubtedly far better times coming for Jack Tar than he has ever hitherto known. One of my first peace-time duties in the two great Unions to which I have the honour to be secretary, will be to see that after the war Germany is made to pay the full penalty for her savagery on the sea. The sentence at present amounts to five years and eight months of boycott, during which the 250,000 men in connection with our Unions will absolutely refuse to sail in a ship which has Germans working on in any capacity, or to load or unload any such vessel, or to take any British ship into a German port or bring one out in the way of commerce.

I may add that the seamen of our Allies are with us in this, that we have tremendous power in these matters, and that we shall carry out this boycott whatever Governments may do, unless Germany gives full reparation and compensation in other ways to be agreed on.

Then, again, after the war we shall be busy in fitting out completely our three splendid "Homes" for the use and enjoyment of aged and convalescent sailors.

Then, too, our powerful Unions are already making such changes in the ordinary sailor's and worker's life aboard ship (in conjunction, I am delighted to say, with the Shipowners' Federation) that the future of Jack in that way will be such as might well make Captain Marryat, Clark Russell and other men who described the bad old days so strikingly, turn in their graves!

The owners and our Unions are working splendidly together, with one sole desire to-day—to improve the lot of the seamen in every possible way. Wages have, of course, risen very much during the past two years, and though they will fall somewhat after peace comes, it is certain that they will never again get so wretchedly low and poor as they once were. So the sailor can congratulate himself on that, anyhow.

Then his food, his quarters, his freedom, his general environment will be immensely improved as the result of regular conferences between the members of the National Maritime Board.

The improvement in the lot of sailor or lads, of apprentices on board ship, of those who take up any section of a seaman's life will be the constant after-war study of the various folk engaged in helping forward our mercantile marine. With a great army of 250,000 seamen, etc., such as we possess

to-day, all pledged to help and stand by one another for the benefit of the seamen, we feel that we can effect almost any reform we deem desirable with respect to life on board or at the docks.

I am certain that the general public also will immensely benefit through all these things done, or intended to be done; through the agency of the Seamen's Unions and the valued co-operation of the shipowners. For, with all seamen more happy and contented, strikes, disputes, and differences will collapse or be adjusted without friction, and sea traffic will grow in enormous volume each year.

Britain's part in her mercantile marine has been glorious. But her future promises to eclipse it—TW-Eds.

Mangin

Mangin is the tiger among French generals. Even in appearance he has something of the air of the great jungle cat. His expression is grimly feline. A square-jawed man with a narrow line of dark moustache, thin, firm-set lips and black, bristling hair trimmed like a brush. To tell the truth he has rather a forbidding, not to say ferocious, appearance; and there is a look in his eye which shows you that he is humorously aware of it. He is not vain. After Mangin had retaken Douaumont Fort at Verdun in November, 1916—a job that required all the jungle qualities any general might possess—Lucien Jonas was in his dug-out on day painting his portrait. Mangin went quietly on with his work until the artist had blocked in the rude outlines of the general's stern, square features. "Let me see that," he demanded suddenly. "Ah, that's perfect," he remarked. "You can leave it like that. If you finish it you will only flatter me."

But it is not chiefly of his appearance that one thinks in saying that he is a tiger among generals. Mangin has also the intellectual qualities of craft and stealth and merciless logic necessary in dealing with the German hyaena. He is sharp in both and claw and there is no single command—the Boches hate so much as they hate him.

Charles Mangin is what the French Army calls an "African." When war broke out in 1914 he had nearly 30 years of desert campaigning behind him. He was in all France's Sudan, Congo, East African and Moroccan "scrapes," and was wounded five times. Three years in Tonkin formed the only variety in his military career after he sailed for Dakar as a green subaltern.

The general was born 52 years ago in Lorraine. His father was a civil engineer, but the Mangins are essentially a fighting breed. One of his soldierly uncles was a general of '15. Two of his brothers, both young men, were killed in France's Colonial wars. The third, an African missionary, threw off the robe of the "White Monks" in 1914 and came back to France as sergeant of Senegalese sharpshooters!

When Mangin was in Africa he wrote a book called "Black Powder," which had much to do with France's African army. Mangin saw that a country like France, with a falling population, was doomed in a struggle with Germany unless it made good use of its Colonial reserves; so the divisions of "Sikis" and "Ramboules"—the French soldiers' nicknames for Arab and negro troops—sprang into being, and under Mangin's command have done much of the most brilliant attacking work in the present war.

General Mangin possesses a vein of sardonic-humor. When in the autumn of 1916 he had helped to undo in a few days the work for which the Crown Prince during eight months had sacrificed the flower of the Kaiser's Army at Verdun, Germany launched a peace offensive. Reviewing his men on the day Mangin eyed them over and remarked with a grim smile, "Ah, you're the sort of peace ambassadors the Republic wants."

Outflanking By Tank

(A. L. in London Daily Mail.) Slowly and clumsily the tank kept doggedly on towards its objective, which was behind the hill. Anti-tank guns were busy, angry machine-gun bullets spat about her; but the nerve of the German was not shaken, and their aim was true.

Everything was noisy, for the big attack had begun, and both sides were using every piece of artillery they possessed. Now and then you would see little crowds of men swarming out of a hidden strong point and scurrying to the rear; or, sometimes, holding their hands high above their heads and faltering forward to meet the oncoming enemy.

The bombardment had been terrific. The moral of the boche had vanished completely. As soon as a tank seemed to be making for any particular defence work the garrison chose discretion as the better part of valor, and ineffectually surrendered or ran. The tank went on serenely, as if it were unconsciously, a solemn, grotesque, terrifying juggernaut, taking trenches in its stride, and crumbling walls and trees before it. Some times a dead man lay in its path. The tank went on.

Away somewhere to the right, not very far off, there barked a German battery, trying vainly to stem the steady, merciless advance of the infantry that followed the line of tanks. The tank section commander, out in front of his three machines, could not see it; but he could form a fairly good guess as to its position. He made a signal and the tank edged in to the right.

The shell vapour lay over the ground as thickly as a smoke screen. You could not see a hundred yards in front of you. The tank found a strong point in a small chalk pit, and scurried it, indignantly, as one might kick a piece of orange peel out of one's path.

The section commander could still hear that battery pounding away, and he knew he was getting nearer. Then, quite suddenly, it seemed to him that the pounding had shifted to his rear. In a few moments he knew for certain what had happened. The tank had outflanked the battery and was working behind it.

He gave another signal and the uncouth landship swung round. Just then the smoke lifted a little and he saw the gunners. Also, they saw the tank; but a moment too late. The machine guns were stuttering away, those of the German gunners who were not killed ran wildly away from the terrible thing in the smoke, and another enemy battery was out of action—out of action and in our hands, the guns uninjured and the ammunition ready stacked. And our advancing infantry met with a dozen Germans who shouted madly of a new English attack from their own headquarters.

The tank swung round again—and went on.

The British have fought over the Plain of Ebedraclon and the field of Megiddo, and who knows but that the Scriptural prophecy of the last great fight has been fulfilled before our very eyes? Meeting with no resistance, with hundreds of Turks being added every day to the roll of prisoners, the British army is now sweeping the country clear. The Holy Land from Dan to Beersheba as well as all the surrounding country which was once included in the empire of David of Israel is now a British conquest. Jerusalem the city most blessed with hallowed associations, has for some time enjoyed the safety of our rule. Bethlehem, where He was born, and Nazareth, where He lived, know what blessings follow the presence of the Red Cross Banner. Further afield, Damascus, the oldest continuously inhabited city in the world, has fallen

to British arms, so that now both in Mesopotamia and in Syria our forces are standing as conquerors on the very birthplace of history. And throughout the countless ages that have elapsed they are the first conquerors that have not sought these lands to murder and oppress the people, to destroy their cities, to plunder and lay waste. Our khaki clad battalions have come to drive away the oppressor, to bring freedom and peace, to establish order, that the land may bloom and prosper once more, so that "every man can rest under his own vine and fig tree." We have fought on Armageddon and conquered. Our men have beaten the Turks where Barak defeated the Canaanite of old, where Sisera and his host perished and Gideon smote the Midianites hip and thigh. The more spiritually minded might imagine they can hear the triumphant song of the Deborah, or in ghostly vision see the mighty Saul transfixed with his own sword. But most of all, it is to be hoped that our heroes as they march over or encamp upon these fields will think of Him whose feet trod these scenes nearly two thousand years ago and whose life and death made possible the civilization which they bring lighter. The Holy places are all in British hands.—Acadian Recorder.

In these circumstances it may be expected that importers will advance their prices as the season progresses, and that the top of the market will not be reached until it is evident that the supply is nearing exhaustion.—N. Ethie's Report.
(Western Star.)
The s.s. Ethie arrived from the Straits of Belle Isle on Saturday evening. A hundred passengers came by her. The ship brought a full load of freight including a large quantity of herring which were landed here. Capt. English informed the Western Star that bait was very scarce along the Newfoundland side of the Straits, and cod plentiful. Not much codfish going at Battle Harbor when the Ethie was there. At Healey Harbor, cod and herring continue plentiful, but salt is scarce. There were numerous herring at Forteau when the ship went north, but on Sept. 30 there were not many going. Dogfish was numerous at Port au Choix. There is also a good sign of cod at that place, but bait is scarce. The ship experienced the first snow for the season on Tuesday night.

St. Quentin.
The city of St. Quentin, figuring so prominently in the war needs nowadays, before the war contained a population of 55,600 people. It is located on a height above the River Somme, 87 miles northeast of Paris. It is an ancient bastion of France and has figured in other wars as a strategic centre. It has been prominent in history because of its position on the frontiers between France and the Low countries.
In 1557 the army of Henri II. of France was destroyed in a sanguinary battle by the soldiers of Phillip II. of Spain. The soldiers of Phillip were assisted by a body of English auxiliaries. The town of itself was taken and sacked by the Spaniards.
St. Quentin was well built and had among its edifices a beautiful Gothic church (formerly a cathedral) of the early part of the thirteenth century, a Gothic town house with a facade resting on a colonnade of seven pointed arches, and forming a splendid specimen of the flamboyant architecture of the fifteenth century.
Like the city of Lille, Turcoing, Roubaix and other northern sections of France, St. Quentin was a centre of cotton and woollen manufacturing. The environs before the war were covered with bleaching fields. An American textile manufacturing city.
In the present war it has changed hands several times and probably now is largely in ruins.
St. Quentin figured in the war of 1870 between France and Prussia. In January, 1871, the French forces were driven out of the town by the Germans after a bitter struggle in which many were slain on both sides. The town is less than thirty miles from the Belgian border.
