Why should a drizzly mist "Scotch" any more than it should be "Irish" or "English"? These compounds of heavy mist and dreary drizzle certainly occur in Erin's Isle as well as in our own country. Yet it is always "Scotch mist."

The fact is that Scotland has to suffer in reputation because of her hilly nature, for it is the presence of these unlands that are responsible for so many thick mists being experien-

It comes about in this way: Scot land lies fairly in the track of wet weather systems travelling from some westerly to some easterly point. These systems-cyclones or depressions—being a vast quantity, of lowlying cloud, whose lower edges trail along only a few hundred feet above

Now, the northern part of Scotland particularly has a very extensive area alevated several hundred feet above sea-level, and, of course, when the frequent great rain-clouds are travelling across the country, they actually touch the surface of this elevated area, and when they do there is a Scotch mist.

Hence, a Scotch mist is a rain-cloud trailing its watery, clinging mass along the ground. Clouds may be very beautiful objects to gaze upon from a distance, but they are depressing and un comfortable things to be enveloped in.

He said it was the only important bit of legislation introduced into the House during the present session. The Fish Regulations had wrought a revolution in the trade of the Colony. The warnings and advice of the Opposition were disregarded by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries when the Regulations had been put through the House last season. The present Bill was the antidote to the Regulations. He believed the Minister of Marine and Fisheries was sincere when he put on the Regulations, but unfortunately, he was optimistic to a fault. He drew the analogy of Joseph and his brethren and Mr. Coaker's treatment of the people. The only difference was that Joseph sent his hungry brethren home with full sacks and their money on the top of them, whilst the Minister had sent his brethren home with empty sacks and barrels. The Regulations should not, even in ordin ary times, have been entered upon without the fullest enquiry, and even then, they should only have been put on by degrees. He referred to the Prime Minister's speech and said it was completely lacking in convincing arguments. Though the Prime Minister assumed the responsibility for the Regulations, did he not remove them when Mr. Coaker went away: The object of his speech was to cement the whole fabric of the Gov ernment, which was getting shaky Mr. Bennett then cited an instance of how, when he a good many years ago was occupying a seat on the Government side of the House, sacrifice his party to his principles and went into Opposition. He complimented the Minister of Marine and Fisheries on his manly acknowledgement of failure. The Prime Minister when defending the \$500,000 allocation had quoted the Norwegian subsidies of fisheries as an analogy. But the Norwegians had not discriminated between various sections of the country, as had been done here. Government discrimination should not be permitted. The infamy was worse when our legislation was compared with Norway's. There had been no tangible results of the Prime Minister's visit to Italy. 

FURTHER COMPLICATIONS. OPPELN, May 6.

Strehlitz continued to-day with the situation at Rybnik increasingly menacing to Inter-Allied forces. Italians are known to have lost thirty men killed and seventy wounded, and in French quarters it is estimated that Allied casualties since the uprising began have been seventy killed and an unknown number wounded. Poles today resumed artillery attack on Gross and twice entered that city, but were thrown back by Italians. Elsewhere the Poles are reported to have consolidated their positions, and they are being reinforced by peasants. The Inter-Allied Commission to-day re-ceived a despatch from London saying Supreme Council had postponed making public, decisions of the Plebiscite Commission, hoping this would tend to allay Polish activites. Reports reaching here say Italian officers in the region are expressing dissatisfaction over their failure to receive support. British circles expect counter-German action shortly.

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
