FIRE IN WEST FLAMBORO'.—On Wednesday evening, 19th inst., at about seven o'clock, the residence of Mr. John W. Betzner, lot No. 3, 1st concession, West Flamboro', was destroyed by fire, together with most of the contents, only a few articles having been saved from the front rooms of the house. The building was a story-and-a-half frame, and the fire is supposed to have been caused by a defect in the chimney inside the roof. Mr. Betzner had no insurance on the building or its contents, and his loss is estimated at \$1,000.

The Spanish Assembly.
No Abolition Bill Passed.

Ontario Legislature.

Feb. 27.
Mr. Prince moved that the House do resolve itself into a Committee to consider the following resolution:—"That it is desirable that the management of the Indian lands in Ontario be transferred to the Government of this Province, and that such steps shall be taken as would induce that result."
Mr. Crooks said the subject which his honorable friend from Essex had drawn the attention of the House to was a very important one. He thought that settlement and civilization would be aided by a reform in the management of the Indian lands. He could not see why the Crown could not be prevailed upon to give to the Province the control of the Indian lands in this portion of the country. For he was sure such a course would result favourably to the advancement of civilization.

Two Hundred Families Homeless.

London, Feb. 27.—The despatch, yesterday to an outside Press Association, reporting that the Spanish Assembly had passed the Bill abolishing slavery in Porto Rico and other colonies of Spain is untrue. The Assembly has not passed any Abolition Bill.

Marshall & Sons, cotton spinners, of Stockport, have suspended. Liabilities £250,000. The suspension was caused by the bad condition of trade.

London, Feb. 28.—The efforts of Sir Rowland Stephenson to mediate for settlement of the strike in South Wales has failed.

The University of Dublin have voted to petition Parliament for rejection of the Education Bill.

Commander Ramsay and Col. Cheesborough were presented yesterday to the Queen.

A special from Paris to the Times asserts that a reconciliation has been effected between the Duke of Montpensier and ex-Queen Isabella. Prince Alfonso is to marry the daughter of the Duke, who will assume the regency of Spain.

Lisbon, Feb. 27.—Insurrection in Londa has been suppressed, and the colony is now tranquil.

Washington, Feb. 27.—The Credit Mobilier Committee in their report, made to the Senate to-night, says the testimony does not effect Logan or Wilson in any sense which would call for action of the Senate. They, however, submit the following resolution:—"Resolved that James W. Patterson be, and he is hereby expelled from his seat as a member of the Senate." Report is unanimous. The Committee consists of three Republicans and two Democrats.

New Orleans, Feb. 28.—A fire in 3rd district yesterday destroyed nearly six squares, bounded by Claude, Dauphine and Mandeville Streets and Washington Avenue. About two hundred houses and their contents were consumed—mostly small frame dwellings. Loss \$250,000. About two hundred families are left homeless.

Conservative Meeting.

(From the *Frederic News Record*.)
For some weeks past bills and newspaper paragraphs have announced a general meeting of the Conservative party, to be held in Fergus on Tuesday last, and as a final action to be taken respecting the protest it was in the highest degree desirable that all who were anxious to see that matter carried through should attend—the number not being more than twenty-five at the very outside, officers and newspaper men, come and goers included. The Treasurer stated that he had received from different parties \$9,019! (Conservation but no applause.) The Collector for Garafaxa reported that \$9,060 was subscribed in that township, and about half of it actually paid over.—Bully for Garafaxa! The Conservatives of Connelly's neighborhood must either be a dishonest lot, or else they have but little faith in the protest enterprise, because the collector stated that he would not go to the bother of writing down subscriptions for any party except those who paid the cash, and the result is that the contributions from South Peel would not more than pay a temperance man's travelling expenses from one end of the Township to the other, while a man who treats on the way could not be induced to start out upon the journey with such an empty purse! Some \$60 has been subscribed in Fergus, and it was stated that \$100 could be raised here if it was shown that the protest would do the party any good. The reports from all quarters showed that close upon \$9,100 in hard cash has been contributed!

Dr. Orton once more repeated his doleful lamentation about Messrs. John Mair, Matthew Anderson and one or two other leading Conservatives not supporting him in the contest better than they did.

John Beattie, Esq., made a vigorous and sensible speech against the protest. He said there is hardly a member elected for any constituency where there was a contest but might be unseated for breaking some portion of the election law, and declared that even if Ross were unseated the Conservative party would be in no better position. Both sides did all they could to gain the victory, and he thought the best course was to abide by the result. He advised them to drop the protest, and save their money, though they might appear to have differed from the ordinary car. It can be stopped more speedily than the horse-car, as the steam break is attached; and it can be run to any degree of speed under twenty miles per hour.

Tavern and Shop Licenses Advanced.

Berlin, Feb. 28.—At the meeting of our Town Council last night, Hotel licenses were advanced from \$48 to \$100, and shop licenses from \$41 to \$75. This will have a tendency to close some three or four Hotels and shops, and also three flourishing Saloons to whom no license will be granted this year. The closing of the latter may be mainly attributed to the good work of our Young Men's Christian Association, and Temperance Society during the past year.

Death from Smoking.

The New York correspondent of the Buffalo Commercial Advertiser writes: "A case in my own intimate acquaintance has this very week added a large circle of friends in this city. The victim was exactly of my own years, and a companion from early boyhood. For thirty years at least he has been a daily smoker of the choicest cigars, and in all his other habits temperate and regular, and of excellent constitution—one who, of all men, would have laughed at the suggestion that tobacco was killing him. A week ago last Sunday night he was stricken with the progressive paralysis characteristic of nicotine, and on Sunday night he died. His death was most pitiful. First, sight was lost, then speech, then motion of the neck, then motion of the arms, and so on throughout the body, and he lay for a fortnight unable to move or make a sign, save a pitiful, tongueless, inarticulate sound, which sometimes rose to almost frantic efforts, all in vain, to make known what he wished to say to his family or friends—for his consciousness and mental faculties were left unimpaired till within two hours of his last, to aggravate to the last the horror of his situation—a living soul in a dead body. The sense of hearing was left unimpaired, so that he was conscious of all around him, while as incapable of communication with them as if dead, save by a slight sign of assent or dissent to a question. The doctors were fully agreed that tobacco was the sole cause of this stroke."

Township School Board.
The Chief Superintendent of Education is troubled with a new crotch. He desires to make a change in what we consider the wrong direction. The substitution of Township Boards, for the present School Section Boards, is a blow aimed at a long-cherished principle which we mean to defend with all our might. Long and ardently have we fought for local control of local affairs, and we do not now feel disposed to let the privilege go by default. There may be arguments in favor of the "new innovation," but we fail to see, wherein a Township Board can give equal satisfaction with a School Section Board. The local wants, of necessity, would be better understood by the smaller bodies, and provision made at once for remedying wrongs which would not come to the ears of a Township Board for months after they occurred. We very much mistake the temper of the people if this new fangled notion of the Superintendent of Education is allowed to be seriously contemplated for one moment. By the School Act of the year 1850 a Township Board could only be formed by the unanimous consent of all the Sections composing the Township. By the new School Act of 1871 a majority of the Sections alone is necessary, and if the people do not avail themselves of these facilities it is because they do not wish to do so. The education department has given them a gentle hint which, if they will not take, they are to be compelled to do so! The London Advertiser says that this is an attempt to centralize one of our most important public institutions. We have no wish to see Tory institutions re-established in Ontario till we come to sit under the wing of such a paternal government as that of Kaiser Wilhelm, whose dutiful subjects are christened, defiled, married and buried with military precision, and who cannot change their residences without permission from the powers that be. We shall resist all encroachment upon the principle of local self-government, and hope all the Reform members of Western Ontario will be found true to their principles in voting against the abolition of School Section Boards of Trustees.

More "Departments."—An important change is about to be made in the construction of the Government. The Secretary of State's Department, and the Department of the Secretary of State for the Provinces, are to be consolidated under one head. Messrs Howe and Aikens will resign; the former goes as Governor of Nova Scotia, the latter remaining a simple Senator for the present, or probably take the new Department till such time as Mr. Gibbs can be put in the field with a chance of success. The name of Mr. Archibald is also mentioned as chief of the Consolidated Department, this information may be relied on as accurate.

The Ottawa Times advocates the formation of a permanent statistical Bureau in connection with the Department of Agriculture. The idea has been under the consideration of the Government for some time past. The Clerks will be chosen from the present census-compiling staff. Mr. Layton, who is eminently qualified for the position, will probably be offered the chief clerkship of the new bureau.

New Locks.—The Dominion Government are conducting a survey for the purpose of excavating a large basin at Point St. Charles, to be connected with the harbor by a channel 18 feet deep. The new locks are to be 275 feet long by 45 feet wide. The basin will be used for the iron, coal and lumber trades, and afford accommodation for sea going vessels.

Distaste.—A Montreal correspondent says that the newly formed Provincial Cabinet is distasteful to the Catholics. Hon. Mr. Chapleau, Solicitor-General, and Hon. Dr. Ross, President of the Council, are called dangerous men by the French party.

Opening of the New Brunswick Legislature.—The New Brunswick Legislature was opened yesterday, (Thursday) at three o'clock. His Excellency Lieut. Governor Wilnot came to the Council Chamber, and being seated on the throne, commanded the attendance of the House of Assembly, which being done, His Excellency was pleased to open the session with the usual speech.

Death of Mr. Jones.—The Hamlet of yesterday (Thursday) says: We deeply regret to inform the public that a cable telegram received announces the death of Richard Jones, Esq., of Montreal, Shrewsbury, England. His death has been the result of an accident when taking horse exercise, and at first not supposed to have been of a serious character. Richard Jones was born in the parish of Mool, near Shrewsbury, in the year 1812. He came to this country at an early age, and at once commenced that commercial career which proved so eminently successful that in 1867 he retired from business, and returned to his native land to enjoy the fruits of the prosperity which his most highly honourable busi-

ness career so richly merited. During his residence in Hamilton he was a most active promoter of whatever tended to the benefit of its public works. He was an energetic Director of the G. W. Railway during the General Management of C. J. Brydges, Esq. His bereaved widow and other mourning relatives have our most sincere and heart-felt sympathy.


