It is almost needless to enumerate the various animals shown by Mr. Stone. They are a splendid lot, and would distinguish themselves even in the show rings of their native country. Indeed, we are not sure but that, as in the case of the shorthorns imported by Mr. Cochrane, a transference to Canadian pastures has improved them. Commander-in-Chief and Canadian Knight, the two four year old bulls on the ground, the first shown by Mr. Stone, and the second by Mr. Hood, are both choice animals. The younger bulls and all the females, with the exception above named, are from the Moreton Lodge herd, and as the various lots presented themselves in the ring, with their solemn looking white faces and goodly propor-tions, it was impossible for any connois-seven bulls of various ages, three aged cows of which Vestor 4th is the Queen, three vendings, and three heifer calves, and it is not too much to say that there is not a single inferior specime among them.

Public curiosity has been greatly excited by the extraordinary case in the police court on Saturday. No thing transpired in court in explana tion of the strange proceedings at Morton Lodge; and beyond the surmise that they probably arose from a difficulty between Mr. Stone, and the Provincial Government, the general public could glean nothing definite. It is not often that nego. tiations for the sale of a farm cul minate in a police-court, and when the parties to the negotiation are amongst the most prominent men in Ontario it is all the more strange and regrettable that such an unseemly incident could not have been avoided. The facts of the case are

about as follows :-Our readers are aware that the Ontario Legislature at its last session authorized the Ministry to purchase Mr Stone's farm of Moreton Lodge. In pursuance of this, a preliminary agreement of purchase was drawn up in April last, by which Mr. Stone undertook to sell Moreton Lodge Farm to the Government for \$75, (i00: to furnish satisfactory title: to give possession of the house on the

Ist May last, and of the farm on the Ist December next. The offer of Mr Stone was only open to the lst of March last, whereas the House did not give final authority for the purchase until after the date. This enabled Mr Stone to obtain some in commenting on the foregoing the 1st May last, and of the farm on the further concessions from the Government, one of which was that he should retain possession of the farm until the coming December, and have the benefit of this year's crops. Some delay then ensued in procuring a proper title, partly in conse-quence of documents being required from a person in England; and it is only lately that this obstacle was got over. Then another difficulty arose. The farm was understood to contain 559 acres at the time Mr. Stone offered it for sale; but he had bought it in several parcels, and when an accurate measurement came to be made, the acreage was found to be 583. Mr Stone put in a claim for compensation for this additional 33 acres; Mr. McKellar replied that the Government bought the whole farm, not a certain number of acres; Mr. Stone would not give way, and the matter again hung fire. As Mr. McKellar was very anxious to commence operations, he conceded this
