Particulars are Hard to Obtain---One Hundred Corpses Recovered.

Portland, June 15.-The following despatch was received from Heppner regon, this afternoon: "Two-thirds of Heppner was swept away by a terriole flood. Fully 250 people were drowned. The weather is hot today and the odies cannot be recovered on account of the debris and lack of men. The ousiness portion of the town is left with small damages. Outside assist ance is needed to bury the dead and clear away the wreckage."

All the telegraph and telephone wires are down, and no accurate informaon can be obtained, but the estimate of loss of life is based on the most reliable reports received up to tonight. Report from Ione, 17 miles from Heppner, is to the effect that 300 bodies have been recovered.

A messenger who arrived at Ione said that a wall of water 20 feet high rushed down into the gulch in which Heppner is situated, carrying everything Crop Report

The flood came suddenly, so sudden that the inhabitants were unable to eek places of safety, and were carried down to death by the awful rush of water. Almost the entire resident portion of the town was destroyed, but some of the business part, which is on higher ground, escaped. Huge boulders, weighing a ton, were carried down by the current, and many people were killed by being crushed against the rocky bluff. Early in the afternoon a thunderstorm set in, many of the small streams overflowing their banks in a short time. Bridges were swept away like straws.

As soon as possible after the flood had subsided the work of relief was mmenced by the citizens of the town.

Dozens of bodies were found lodged along the bends of Willow creek, and everal places they were piled over one another. Up to two o'clock this afternoon 200 bodies had been recovered almost within the city limits. Five hundred are reported dead. Without other warning than a few preliminary claps of distant thunder the worst calamity that ever came to the Pacific Northwest descended upon the towns, almost wiping them out of existence. Terrible loss of life known to have resulted, and by some is estimated at 500, although details are mpossible to obtain. Rough estimates place the property damage at more than a million dollars.

Preparations fof relief of Heppner are in progress at various points from Portland to Pendleton. The Oregon Railway & Navigation Company despatched a relief train from the Dalles at 12:30 and 1:30 p.m. A train left this city carrying J. B. O'Brien and a party of engineers. Dozens of wagons with supplies and doctors are being sent to Heppner from nearby points.







these Dene Indians, Father Morice said that they ascribed the source of everything to something, not someone. They believed in the influence of evil spirits, who roamed through the air. These evil spirits came into the body of a human being and were the cause of illness. The function of the medical men was to exorcise these evil spirits. The medicine men claimed to be endowed with supernatural powers, and they often went into a trance or cataleptic condition and had visions. The medicine men had vivid imaginations, and many of the maladies of the Denes were influenced by imagination.

The hunting grounds of the Denes are the property of the chiefs of the clans, who have possessed them from time immemorial. The Denes inherit through the female line, the males not being considered in relation to the descent of a family.
