For the first time in Canada, we believe. Easter Monday is now a bank holiday. This is under a statute passed last session The question has been raised here, whether Easter Monday is legally a holiday in govexcise. We quote a few words from the

Section 10 of the act of 1867, cap. 5., respecting the collection of the revenue, reads as follows: "No day shall be kept as a public holiday by the officers and persons employed in the collection and management of the revenue except Christmas day, New Year's day and Good Friday in every year, any day appointed by pro-clamation of the governor for the purpose of a general fast or a general thanksgiv ng, such days as are appointed for the elebration of the birthday of her majesty and her royal successors, and such other days as may be from time to time appointed as olidays by the governor in cour To which Dominion day has since be

added by 42 Vic., cap. 47 (1879). The banking act of 1872 (35 Vic., cap. 8) names the legal bank holidays for Ontario, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, with. some additional holidays for Quebec, but Easter Monday does not occur in either list. The banking act of 1883 (44 Vic. cap. 20, section 10) adds Easter Monday for the whole of the dominion. But thes sections apply to banks only, and to them only as far as bills of exchange and prom ory notes are concerned.

It appears to have got into the public mind that as Easter Monday has by the banking act of last session been made a public holiday as far as bills of exchange and promissary notes are concerned, must, therefore, be a public holiday in the post office, customs and excise. But, unless specific orders from Ottawa otherwise direct, it will be found that this is not the

From various sources we get intimation of the fact that spring is making an early opening in the Northwest. Yesterday we quoted something to this effect from the Montreal Herald, which the types gave to the Northwest Herald instead—a paper that does not exist, as far as we know of. The report from Minnesota is that wheat seeding there is about three weeks earlier this year than last, which agrees with reports from the Canadian side of the boun dary. But an early season means a good crop, especially in the Northwest, and therefore the prospect for 1884 out there is cheering. Considering the extra preparations made for early sowing, along with the favorable season, so far, it should not surprise us were 1884 to turn out a big har vest year in the Northwest. Present in dications point that way pretty strongly.

During the past few years a new city has sprung up and become the largest port of Europe; or rather not a new city, but a very old one, famous in years past, although apparently dead for several centuries which, by enterprise and energy, by the encouragement of the government, ha again become the most important commer cial town on the continent of Europe. This city, with a population smaller than New Orleans, has considerably more com merce, and ranks, after Liverpool, London New York and Newcastle, as the fifth sea port in the world. Twenty years ago, Antwerp was almost

a provincial town, full of antiquities and

eminiscences of the days of William of Orange and the Duke of Alva. It had an antique, faded appearance and seemed to have lost the grandeur it boasted during the middle ages. But the Belgian government encouraged it and expended money to improve and deepen its harbor and to build its docks. The commerce of Antwerp rapidly improved, and since 1833, in half a century, it has increased forty fold, until its tonnage is double that of Havre or Genoa, and greater than that of Glasgow and Hull together. Antwerp is now the leading embarking point from the continent of Europe to America, and an important emigrant centre of Belgium, Germany and France. Vessels bringing grain from Russia to Switzerland now pass by Marseilles, where they formerly landed their cargo and bring it to Antwerp, whence it is car ried by rail to Switzerland. All the trade b. ween Italy and Great Britain passes through the town, as does the bulk of the merce with Germany, Belgium and

It is not often in Europe that a city springs up so rapidly and prominently as this Flemish town has done. It is no mushroom growth, but the necessary result of keen, practical business sense and foresight, backed by the assistance of the government. Belgium spent \$20,000,000 in improving the harbor of Antwerp, and gave it twenty-six feet of water. All the port charges and the cost

Six years ago those charges, tolls, ton nage taxes, etc., were applished and the pilot tax reduced to insignificance. Finally, in one respect—the handling of freight—Antwerp is wholly without a rival. Its quays, or wharves, are 350 feet wide and several miles long. They are separated from the town proper by a railing, and covered on their entire length by iron sheds. On the quays are, first, a line of rails reserved for hydraulic cranes serving to unload vessels and deposit their cargo in railway trucks; secondly, a second line of rails parallel with the first, on which these trucks are stationed; thirdly sheds extending toward the town for width of 150 feet, and covered with galvanized iron sheetings. A third line of rails par allel with the two others runs from end to end of these sheds, and a number of lines placed transversely with this one con-

In other words, the quays of Antwerp are an immense warehouse, where all the work of unloading, assorting and transporting goods is done scientifically, mehanically and at a minimum cost. With such a mode of handling business is it a wonder that this old, apparently dying, city has sprung to life again and distanced

TORONTO IN REBELLION TIMES.

THE FIRST ALARM-NOV. 4, 1837. In November, 1837, I had travelled to Toronto for the purpose of seeking permanent employment in the city, and meant to return in the first week of December, to spend my last Christmas in the woods. On Sunday, the 3d, we heard that armed men were assembling at the Holland landing and Newmarket to attack the city, and and Newmarket to attack the city, and that lists of houses to be burned by them were in the hands of their leaders; that Samuel Lount, blacksmith, had been manufacturing pikes at the Landing for their use; that two or three persons had been warhed by friends in the secret to sell their houses, or to leave the city, or to look for textiling changes of some sort. Then it starting changes of some sore. Then it was known that a quantity of arms and a couple of cannon were being brought from the garrison, and stored in the coverad way under the old city hall Every idle report was eagerly caught up, and magnified a hundred-fold. But the burthen of all invariably was an expected invasion by the Yankees to drive all loyalists from Canada. In this way rumour followed rumour, all business ceased, and everybedy listened anxiously for the next alarm. At length it came in earnest.
