Why the Munster Bank Failed.

DUBLIN, July 29.—Extensive frauds have been discovered in the accounts of the Munster bank. Farquarhson, one of the joint managers of the Dublin branch, is missing, with £70,000 of the bank's funds. Warrants have been issued and sent in every direction to secure his arrest. The accountant's balance sheet of the Munster bank shows liabilities of £2,148,000 and assets of £2,187,000. It is believed the reserves, amounting to £225,000, will suffice to cover all risks.





NO MORE MONOPOLY. P. R. to Make a Bid For Canadian

Telegraphic Custom. From the Montreal Star. The monopoly of the telegraph business of the dominion so long enjoyed by the Western Union through its attachment in Canada, the Great Northwestern, is about at an end, as in the course of a month and as soon as the railway service is opened between here and Winnipeg, the immens elegraph system of the company will be thrown open to the public. "Our system is now in first-rate condition," said a high official of the road to-day to a Star reporter, "but we do not desire to open it to the public until we are in a position to give ample satisfaction and at the same time to despatch games of man to any portion of lespatch gangs of men to any portion of

despatch gangs of men to any portion of the line to carry out repaire."

In telegraphic circles here it is known that the most gigantic efforts were made by Jay Gould on behalf of the Western Union to get control of the Canadian Pacific lines. This was peremptorily refused and negotiations are believed to be on foot for the laying of a cable to connect the Canadian Pacificsystem with Australia, China and Japan. The Dominion government has in fact been approached on the subject by an English capitalist, but with what results has not yet transpired.

A gentleman who is unusually well posted in telegraph matters stated to-day that if the Canadian Pacific adhered to its present policy of ignoring the Gould clique if weuld revolutionize the telegraph problem. The Canadian Pacific, he said, had a complete monopoly of the business weet of
