



GRAVITATION SCHEME AGAIN

ENGINEER TO PREPARE ESTIMATES AS TO THE COST.

The Tunnel Proposal Left in Abeyand the Meantime-A Suggestion That the Engineer Make the Borings and Prepare Plans for a Tunnel Across the Bay Not Adepted,

The Committee on Works is fighting shy of Engineer Keating's report on the pro-posed new conduits and improvements in the city water supply. A special meeting was convened for Tuesday last, but nothing was done for want of a quorum. Yes terday afternoon the adjourned meeting practically ignored the Engineer's report and spent two hours and a half in listening to the praises of the gravitation scheme for hringing water from Lake Simcoe. Ald. Hewitt was chief spokesman, and for the one hundredth time ventilated his pet

one hundredth time ventilated his pet scheme, in which he was supported by Ald. Gowanlock and Bailey.

Ald. Lamb, who presided, suggested that the Engineer proceed with the borings and prepare plans for the tunnel under the harbor and a new conduit across Toronto Island, with all possible speed, in order that a bylaw for the same may be brought into council and submitted to a vote of the paperle.

The Alderman moved that the Engineer be instructed to report the cost of surveys and borings for a gravitation supply of water from Lake Simcoe. With this information and the Engineer's report on the tunnel scheme before them the committee could compare the merits of the respective schemes.

Ald. Bailey seconded the proposition and generally endorsed Ald. Gowanlock's views. He said the people would rather spend the millions required for the Lake Simcoe project than half-a-million for the tunnel proposed. "The ratepayers are disgusted with these perpetual waterworks improvements and will vote two to one in favor of going to Lake Simcoe for a supply."
