Immense quantities of small stones and large boulders 100 feet above the river bed cover the land. Indeed tillage in many places is impossible from the stones. Above the Carrying-place the land on the north side rises to high undulating. barren hills, covered with small barren pines and poplars.

On my way to L'Original I passed the village of North Hawkesbury on the river, and also a small as to catch the mail boat village owned chiefly by one family. Above the Carrying-place numerous small picturesque islands contracting to a quarter, a half, and a mile wide. Numerous rafts of timbers, covered with a half-adosen, more or less, of raftsmen, with long poles, were propelling the rafts. They travel on them, cook, and sleep, and cat there, and are as wild and rough a set of men as any one could well imagine, mixed breed between the Indian and French. The stage stopped to shift the mails at one place, called the "Grand River Tavern," near L'Original.
