Exclude the Specialized Agencies, the Trusteeship Council and the International Court of Justice, which are placed elsewhere in the guide under the subjects with which they deal; material on specific subjects (other than those outlined below) with which the UN and its agencies are concerned: UN peacekeeping operations (21-14). The sub-groups of Group 24 are designed to serve as the standard breakdown for the specialized agencies. For example, material on the ILO, which falls within Group 44-4-ILO may be subdivided as follows:

System; the coordination of activities to ensure full interests of all concerned, whether governmental, public, academic or private institutions; the agenda, minutes and general reports of the interdepartmental meetings.

Exclude Canadian involvement in activities of a specific nature for which see appropriate sub-groups hereunder.

Subdivide as required by name of organization using respective symbols, or by general subject matter.

Include material related to Canadian contributions in terms of human resources essential for a better understanding of Canada's policies and interests in the operations of the U.N. System of organizations; searching for suitable candidates through established contacts with Canadian institutions; stimulating and securing employment of highly qualified Canadians by identification of suitable posts within the U.N. System and by promotion of strong candidates through official sponsorship.

Subdivide by general subject and further subdivide as required; e.g. by name of candidate and by name of organization or description of post.

Include material on all aspects of specific subject matter of interest to Canada; information acquired and contribution by Canada.

Subdivide by subject and further subdivide as required.

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DEPARTMENT OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS FILE CLASSIFICATION GUIDE INTRODUCTION

The Records Classification Guide has been drawn up after a study of the 1940-series files at head office in consultation with the file users. This is a subject classification filing system: the Guide groups the diversified activities, operations and interests of the Department into related subjects and is designed, therefore, to serve regardless of changes in the organization of the Department or modifications in the functional responsibilities of departmental units. It follows that the present functions of a departmental unit may be dealt with in different sections of the Guide.

2. The primary purpose of the Guide is to provide personnel at head office and posts with a uniform system of classifying records. To this end the scope of individual subject groups is defined in the Guide, cross-references are made to related subjects and a detailed index is appended. While these features will assist in correct filing, it should be borne in mind that the Guide is an outline of file groups and not a file list.

3. In addition to the breakdown of subject groups and the index to this breakdown, the Guide contains a list of post, divisional, area and country abbreviations (or codes) employed in certain instances in the file numbers, and a list of abbreviations (of organizations, committees, military commands and other bodies) in common use in the Department.

4. The records classification comprises six major blocks:

Administration	Groups 1 - 19
Political and Defence	" 20 – 34
Economic and Social	" 35 – 54
Culture and Information	" 55 – 64
Science	" 65 – 79
Consular and Legal	" 80 – 89

Each block is divided numerically into primary groups representing the principal facets of the main subject. Each group, in turn, is broken down into sub-groups representing more detailed aspects. The groups and sub-groups shown in the Guide may or may not be represented in the filing system by actual files. However, they are always pointers to the location of the files and their scope is given in the Guide. 5. File titles are composed by using the subject headings of the groups and sub-groups. For example, the file in the Reports and Statistics sub-group of the General Administration group on policy and procedures relating to post reports (Groups No. 1-3-2) will be entitled:

General Administration – Reports and Statistics – Post Reports.

6. The post, divisional, area and country codes employed in conjunction with file numbers make it possible to avoid the proliferation of file numbers. The code may follow the primary, secondary or subsequent breaks in the file number depending on the circumstances. If, for example, it is desired to bring together all Supplies and Properties subject files on a given post, the code for the post will follow the primary number (9) of the Supplies and Properties group. Normally the position of the code is shown in the Guide. In the example (1-3-2) used above, the post report file for Brussels will be numbered:

1-3-BRU-2

and that for London

1-3-LDN-2

Files in which the codes are used are put away (i.e. filed in cabinets) first by the numbers (1-3), then Alphabetically by the code (BRU before LDN) and then numerically again. In addition to the three codes mentioned, abbreviations of well-known international organizations are also used in various groups.

7. Authority rests with the Registrar to add new groups to the Guide. Suggestions for new groups or the amendment of existing groups should be made in Ottawa by a memorandum to the Registrar and from posts by numbered letter. At headquarters, the Registrar also controls the opening of new files within the existing group numbers shown in the Guide. Abroad this responsibility rests with the post.

8. Headquarters requirements have dictated the detailed breakdown of the primary subjects in the Guide. In Ottawa specific subject headings should be used before the more general headings. The Guide, however, is intended also for use at posts where major group headings will often suffice. The growth of files should be closely watched, however, to ensure that advantage is

taken of the detailed subject breakdown. This is why the injunction "Subdivide if volume warrants" is stated repeatedly throughout the Guide.

9. The new Classification system was put into use at headquarters in 1963; corresponding files in the 1940 series were closed. Material was not transferred from the old to the new files, except in the case of name files. However, desk officers may request that duplicate copies (to be provided by the desk officers) of vital reference papers antedating the new filing system be placed on the new files.

10. Amendments to the Guide may be issued from time to time. They should be recorded on the amendment page to be found at the beginning of the Guide. 11. Every piece of correspondence prepared in the Department should bear the appropriate file number, or group number when the file number is not known. This is the responsibility of the drafting officer but Registry personnel should be consulted when doubt exists. Given the difficulty of analyzing and classifying political documents, the need for continual consultation between officers and Registry classifiers will be appreciated.

12. Copies of this Guide are issued to posts and head office units and the Guide is office, not personal, property. Responsibility for accounting for copies and keeping them up to date as amendments are issued lies with posts and head office units.

The departmental symbols are divided into two parts both arranged in alphabetical sequence; Part I: by head office unit and post (name of city where located), with its appropriate symbol and Part II: by symbol corresponding to a head office unit or post. These symbols are reproduced in this Guide because they are extensively used in records processing and especially as coding components in the numbering of files in accordance with our classification system.

2. Usually an embassy or legation is indicated by the name of the capital city where it is located. The name of a city other than a capital would indicate normally a consulate or trade and commerce post. Where a Canadian mission or permanent delegation is located in a city where a diplomatic post already exists it would be identified in addition to the symbol of the city by a symbol representing the name of the organization or conference to which they are accredited, e.g. our Canadian delegation to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization in Brussels would be identified by the symbol "BRU-NATO".

3. For convenience, symbols have been supplied for some cities in countries where Canada is not represented and for some governmental agencies closely related to this department.

Posts and head office units may wish to add abbreviations in local usage. Similarly, new abbreviations should be added to and obsolete abbreviations deleted from the List.
