On December 8, 1973, Canada and the USSR signed a two year programe of scientific, academic and cultural exchanges for the period 1974-75 at the conclusion of the Second Session of the Canada/USSR Mixed Commission on General Exchanges which was held in Ottawa from December 6 to 8. The Assistant UnderSecretary of State for External Affairs, Mr. J. G. H. Halstead, Head of the Canadian Delegation,aigned on behalf of Canada and Mr. I. N. Zemskov, Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs, signed on behalf of the Soviet Union. Represented on the Canadian Delegation were federal government departments and agencies, provincial governments and organizations and members of the academic commity.

The Canada/USSR Mixed Comission was established by the General Exchanges Agreement which was signed by Prime Minister Trudeau and Premier Kosygin in October 1971 in Ottawa. Its first session was held in Moscow in June 1972 when it worked out the Programe of Exchanges which expires at the end of December this year. Under the agreement the Mixed Comission meets alternately in Moscow and Ottawa.

There are seven major areas of co-operation included in the programe: science, education, the arts, cinematography, television and radio, sports and tourism. The guiding principles of all aspects of the programe are mutual benefit and reciprocity.

A number of major new features are included in the $1974-75$ programe, including an agrement to develop sports exchanges on the basis of an agreement on principles of co-operation between sports organizations signed the same day by representatives of the Department of National Health and Welfare and the Cormittee for Physical Culture and Sport of the USSR.

The programe provides for futher work to be done on progranmes relating to the arctic sciences. It envisages the conclusion of an agreament on medicine and public health and includes a new programe of exchanges in social aciences.

In the field of education, the programe provides for the continuation of exchanges of students, professors and translators as well as delegations of educational officials and specialists.

In the field of the arts, it provides for exchanges in the performing arts, exchanges of art exhibitions, the loan of works of art, the exchange of writers and poets and the visits of theatre directors and designers, choreographers and teachers of the arts.

It also includes an exchange of publishers, editors and journalists and a new programe of co-operation between librarles and archives in Canada and the Soviet Union.
