Aphelion—that part of a planet's orbit *farthest* from the Sun.

The Astronomical day is reckoned from Noon to Noon through the 24 hours. Thus July 21, 9h. is 9h. A. of July 21st, and July 21st, 15h. is 3h. M. of July 22.

The Sun's Declination and Equation of Time are given for Noon at Halifax, Apparent Time, *i.e.* when the True Sun is on the meridian.

The Moon's Southing is given in Astronomical Time for the Meridian Passage at Halifax; and her declination when on that meridian.

Both the rising and setting of the Moon are given for every day in the year.

THE TIDES.

The Tides in the Calendar given for the Ports mentioned, are the tides that occur during the day. In the Tide Table (page 53) will be found constants for finding the time of High Water at each of the places mentioned in the Table.

The Times of High Water given in the Calendar have been corrected for the varying distance of the Moon from the Earth, and also for her angular distance from the Sun. They can now be depended on as accurate to at least the same degree as the Admiralty Tide Tables.

It will sometimes be found that when a constant is added to the time of High Water at Halifax, the sum exceeds 12 hours; in this case subtract 12 hours from the sum, and the remainder will be the time of High Water at the required port on the following afternoon or morning, according as the Tide at Halifax was a morning or afternoon Tide.

It will sometimes be found that a constant to be subtracted is greater than the Time of High Water at Halifax; in this case add 12 hours to the time at Halifax, subtract the constant, and the remainder will be the time of High Water at the required Port for the previous Morning or Afternoon, according as the tide at Halifax was an Afternoon or Morning Tide.

EXAMPLE.

High Water at Halifax, Jan. 6, 0h. 8m. A.
Add 12h.

12h 8m.
Cape Sable Island, S. side, Subtract 1h. 19m.

High Water at Cape Sable Island, Jan. 6.....10h 49m. M.

To find the length of the day,—subtract the time of sunrising from 12 hours, and to the difference add the time of sunsetting.

EXAMPLE.

12h. 0m.
Sunrise, June 20th, 4h. 20m. Subtract.

Difference, 7h 40m.
Sunset, June 20th, 7h 43m. Add.

Length of day, June 20th, 15h. 23m. The longest day.

To find the length of the night,—subtract the time of sunset from 12 hours, and to the difference add the time of sunrise next morning.

EXAMPLE.

12h. 0m.
Sunset, July 30th, 7h. 23m. Subtract.

Difference, 4h. 37m.
Sunrise, July 31st, 4h. 51m. Add.

Length of night, July 30th, 9h. 28m.

In this Almanac all the times except for Moon's Southing are Mean Time at Halifax, *i. e.*, Civil Time. The Moon's Southing is given for Astronomical Time at Halifax.

Standard Time is 15 minutes earlier than Halifax Mean Time, and the Railway Time one hour later than Halifax Standard Time.

FEBRUARY is the most trying month for cattle; we cannot too strongly impress the necessity of care in their feeding, watering, and general treatment, at this season of the year. Barns may be faulty, and the cold severely felt, and yet this is one of the least evils in Nova Scotia, for horned cattle require plenty of fresh air, and winter and spring rates of mortality in cows in the country barns is very low compared to that of the apparently comfortable, substantial wind-tight stables of the City of Halifax. The root cellar may be troublesome to get at, and the animals may miss an occasional meal; the wells may be frozen, and the way to the watering places may be so slippery that the cattle cannot reach them without discomfort or positive accident. In order to overcome these and many other difficulties that appear in February, it is a good rule to give extra time and attention to the stock. In feeding grain and meal always mix them into cut hay, moistened. In districts where an Agricultural Society does not already exist this is a good

time to organize: farmers have leisure to attend a meeting, and take steps for organization. Notification has to be made to the Office of Agriculture, so that the new society may be sanctioned by the Governor-in-Council, before the end of June in order to qualify for the grant for the year.

There is no reason why every farmer's family should not be provided to a large extent with supplies from the garden, such as early salads in spring time, rhubarb for pies, early green peas, early turnips, lettuce, radishes, cucumbers, early cauliflowers and cabbages, early beans, goose-

berries, currants, strawberries, raspberries, (not the watery, wild kinds that grow about the fences, but the luscious-fruited European varieties,) winter radishes, turnips, beets, parsnips, artichokes, seasoning herbs, melons, squashes, and dozens of other delicacies and substantial articles of food that cost nothing but foresight and some agreeable labor. The nature of our climate necessitates the use of hot-beds for raising seedling plants of those crops that require a long season to mature. A hot-bed is made by piling on successive layers of well-chopped horse dung, obtained from a stable where oats are freely fed. The manure may be raised to a height of two to three feet above the surface of the soil. On top spread four or five inches of very fine and rich soil mixed with sand; this should

APRIL.—One of the most important operations of the year is spring ploughing—the preliminary to planting and seeding. This operation belongs especially to the month of April, commencing sooner in dry, light soils and warm situations, later where the opposite prevail. Every farmer should be ready to avail himself of the early opportunities presented by the varying years. In 1880 ploughing commenced at the very beginning of April; in 1890 its commencement was delayed till near the end of the month; in 1891 the earliest ploughing was done in Digb. and Yarmouth counties on 10th April. It is not wise to plough till the soil is comparatively dry, and little is gained by early sowing until the ground is warm. In fields seeded down with timothy last fall, it will now be time to sow clover,—a mixture of red and a s'ke is the best for hay. Where early potatoes are required, the seed should be kept in a warm place so as to start the eyes, and,

whenever the ground is dry enough, they may be planted. This advice if not heeded will lead to potatoes coming up scantily, many rotting in the ground. If farmers, instead of planting inert seed potatoes, taken out of a cold cellar, would first allow the eyes to start, there would be fewer complaints of the seed perishing in the soil. Peas and broad beans may be sown at the very beginning of the month; onions, parsnips and carrots as soon as the ground is fit to be worked sufficiently to give them the more delicate seed-bed they require. Beets and mangel wurzel are usually sown at the end of the month or early in May, but are apt to be weedy if sown too early. All gooseberry and currant bushes should be dressed, apple and pear trees gone over, and, generally, the whole kitchen garden and orchard thoroughly cared for.

MAY.—If the season is not an unusually early one, some ploughing will still have to be done; let it be done at once; if manure has to be taken out for crops,

don't wait for a more convenient season ; if the weather is not all that is desired, proceed nevertheless with your work, vary it to suit the state of the soil and atmosphere. Men cannot fight successfully against the operations of nature, but they can very often turn them to advantage by consideration and forethought. What has to be sown and planted this month? *Everything*, except what has either already been committed to the soil, or is too tender to withstand the coldness or the probable frosts. Such exceptional crops are bush-beans, pole-beans, corn, tomatoes, cucumbers, squash; it is only in warm, sandy soils that such things can safely be put out before the end of the month. Turnips also should not be sown in May, except the small garden patch of early whites for household use. One of the principal marketable crops in Nova Scotia is the potato. It has been found

advantageous of late years to plant as early as possible; as soon, therefore, as the ground is in fit condition, commit the potato to it; see, however, that the eyes of the seed have started into growth, otherwise it will be apt to rot in the cold seed bed. Neglect of this point, which has been urged again and again in the Farmers Calendar of this Almanack has caused the loss of countless thousands of dollars to our farmers. See Crop Report for August, 1891, copies of which may be obtained at the office of Agriculture. In light lands the manure (old and well rotted) may be ploughed in before planting. In heavy soils, put the manure in the drills, so that the warmth of the air may counteract the deadening effect of the cold wet clods. Superphosphate and other artificial fertilizers may also be used.

JUNE.—Planting and sowing will still continue, and much of such work has, in unfavorable seasons, to be accomplished in June. Corn for ensilage should now be sown. But, while spring operations have to be continued and finished this month, there are others appertaining more especially to the summer that have to be attended to. Garden crops will require hoeing and weeding; potatoes also, when sufficiently advanced. It should not be forgotten that we have not only to sow and cultivate, but to protect our crops, if we would gather a profitable harvest. In localities subject to late spring frosts, it is easy to protect early crops by throwing some spruce or other brush over them on cold nights. A method much used in France, and which may easily be adopted in this country, is to burn brush to windward so as to cover the field in a cloud of smoke. Attention has often been called to such simple and costless devices, and yet year after year, we hear of the loss of early crops; it is said "by fro-t," we should say "by neglect." During the past year the Colorado Beetle or Potato Bug appeared in great strength over a large extent of the province, and was expected to prove a formidable foe to the

potato crop during the season of 1891. Fortunately the cold wet spring dampened its ardour, and there was not much call for Paris green or other poisonous applications. The season of 1892 may be quite different. Paris green and London purple are undoubtedly efficacious, but they are homicides as well as insecticides, and every precaution should be observed in their use by farmers, and in their sale by apothecaries and store-keepers. As soon as the currant and gooseberry bushes have pushed out their first leaves and early blossoms, it will be found advantageous to give them a sprinkling of white hellebore powder in the morning before the dew is off. This will destroy the first crop of currant worms, and thus preserve the bushes and the fruit crop for the season. The objection to the use of white hellebore on currant bushes (if used early enough in the season) is by no means so strong as to the employment of arsenical poisons, as the white hellebore

being organic, decays, and is thus speedily rendered innocuous, by exposure to rain and air. Summer bedding plants are set out in the flower garden as early this month as the weather will allow; verbenas may be put out very early, and they thrive rather better in the moist cool weather of early June than later, when the soil is apt to be baked by the sun. Stocks are also very hardy. Balsams, Phloxes, Petunias, Geraniums, Heliotropes, and other tender things need not be put out so early, as they will make no progress in cool weather, and the slightest approach to frost will kill them for the season.

JULY.—On an ordinary arable farm, the operations of mowing, sowing, and planting have now been completed. This month is especially devoted to the cultivation of the various field crops. Cultivation, in this restricted sense, means the hoeing of crops, stirring by cultivators and harrows, and such like implements

between or over the drills, hilling up and moulding. The objects of these operations are to destroy weeds, to keep the soil open, and thus to promote the decomposition of the manure, enable the soil to obtain moisture, allow free access of air, bring the soil well over and around the roots and stems, and, by these several means, to ensure vigorous growth. We are apt to have a good many rainy days in July, and, as most of the hoeing work has to be compressed between planting time and haying time, haying has occasionally to be begun before potato hoeing is completed: this occurs on many of the best regulated farms. In ordinary seasons it is sure to occur on a farm where foresight is not shown, hence the miserable root crops we so often see. Let our farming readers then be careful to forecast the weather probabilities in light of the July work to be done on the growing crops, and thus avoid the disastrous loss that comes from neglect. The sowing of turneps is usually recommended for the month of June, but as the ground has to

be remarkably fine for this crop, and as turnips are often put in to fill up land that was originally intended for the earlier sown roots, it frequently happens that turnips have to be sown in July. Some even prefer to sow their Swedes early this month, so as to avoid the "fly," and the soft turnips for immediate feeding need not necessarily be sown till the end of July, although, if they get warm genial weather to start with they do much better earlier. It is a fact, however, that late sowing, while it is apt to give a small yield, ensures excellent quality, and freedom from fibre, so that turnips intended for table use in winter, should never be sown early. The ground should have undergone a thorough pulverization. Light sandy soil is the best for turnips. They start better after the ground is warm,

but the bulbs swell most rapidly during the cold dewy nights in Autumn. The soil cannot be worked too deep or made too fine for turnips. Town manures are valuable for this crop and crushed bones have been applied with best effects, either when covered in the drills in the manner of ordinary dung, or, preferably, when sown by machine along with the seeds, so as to be in immediate contact with the latter.

August.—Hay-making is the most important operation of the Nova Scotia farmer, half of all his land under crop of every kind being occupied with grass destined to be made into hay. More than half a mill on acres have to be mown every season. Our haying season usually begins in the extreme western part of the Province, early in July, but later in the eastern counties, and especially where

the land is heavy. In Yarmouth, Digby and Annapolis Counties it may be finished by the end of July; but in most other counties it is carried over into the month of August. Where suitable implements and appliances are used there is now no difficulty in securing the crop. After haying there will be work in the garden and orchard. Where the trees are in grass they will benefit by a rich top dressing around their roots. Look after the ripening fruit, destroy the caterpillars, if any still remain; pick the early August apples, and send them to into a local market or to the picnic. When the rain comes beds of strawberries may be made up. See that the ground is well drained and enriched with old manure. Mushrooms now appear in horse pastures, house flies become troublesome, and the swallows congregate in flocks and leave us

and put into the silos; fortunately these are now on the increase in this Pro-
vince. The ensilage forms an excellent supplement to the hay and roots upon
which our cattle were fed so exclusively in former years, but ensilage is still used
to only a very small extent. Later in the month, potatoes of the earlier kinds,
and earlier planted, will be ready to be taken up, but, while the weather remains
warm, they should be well aired before being put into the cellar, and only in small
quantities at a time. The most experienced farmers usually wait for cold weather
before taking up their full crop. The farmer's year is a complete circle, and
before one year's annual harvest is taken in, it is needful to be preparing for the
next. In fact it is already time, by the beginning of September, to sow Winter
Rye, which is a favorite crop with some of our farmers. County Exhibitions are
usually held during this month, and will be looked forward to with interest by
every improving agriculturist, whether an intending exhibitor or a mere specta-

NOVEMBER.—To insure the improvement of cattle, every society keeps or ought to keep, a sufficient number of male animals for the use of members. If the selection and purchase of animals required for the season be deferred till Spring time, large prices have to be paid, and suitable animals are not always obtainable. For beef cattle the Short Horn Durham, Polled Angus, Galloway and Hereford are used. For milk alone, Ayrshires are to be preferred. Devo is make the best working oxen, are quick, active, and easily fed, and soon fatten in the wild pastures for beef. For domestic cows, the creamy Guernseys or Jerseys are the most suitable. The Jerseys have been great favorites, and their increase will promote the manufacture of butter, but it threatens to lessen our capacity for beef production. Holsteins are also increasing, but less rapidly, in a few localities; they are large, healthy cattle, combining beef producing with milking qualities,—the yield of

The special purpose of a Society is to improve the live stock of his district, which is accomplished by obtaining and keeping for the use of members, superior male animals, such as bulls, rams and boars. Societies may also, by permission, introduce seeds of new varieties of grain, roots and also improved implements, and sell

DEPARTMENT OF LAW AND JUSTICE.

SUPREME COURT OF CANADA.

Chief Justice—(\$8,000)—Sir William Johnston Ritchie.

Judges—(\$7,000 each)—Hon Samuel Henry Strong, Hon Telesphore Fournier, Hon H. E. Taschereau, Hon J. W. Gwynne, Hon C. S. Patterson,

Registrar—(\$2,600)—Robert Cassels, Jr. *Reporter*—George Duval.

The Supreme Court has both original and appellate jurisdiction—*Original*, as to (1) *habeas corpus* in criminal and extradition cases; (2) judicial opinions to the Crown; (3) private bills and petitions therefor referred by the Senate or House of Commons; and (4) civil suits in which the validity of a Dominion or Provincial Act is questioned. *Appellate*, in appeals (1) from the Exchequer Court; (2) from the Provincial Courts; (3) in *habeas corpus* cases; and (4) in election cases.

THE EXCHEQUER COURT OF CANADA.

The Exchequer Court has original jurisdiction (1) in revenue cases, (2) in civil suits when the Crown for the Dominion is plaintiff, (3) controversies between the Dominion and the Province, or between two Provinces. *Judge*—(\$6,000), Hon. Geo. W. Burbidge; *Registrar*, Q. Andene; *Asst. Registrar*, Charles Morse.

SUPREME COURT OF NOVA SCOTIA.

All goods not enumerated in this Act or any other Act as charged with any duty of Customs, and not declared free of duty by this Act, shall be charged with a duty of twenty per cent, *ad valorem*, when imported into Canada, or taken out of warehouse for consumption therein.

Goods free in the cases therein mentioned.

The following articles, when the natural products, of the colony of Newfoundland, are free, viz.:

Animals of all kinds.

The following articles shall be prohibited to be imported under a penalty of 200 dollars together with the forfeiture of the parcel or packages of goods in which the same may be found, viz.:

Books, Printed Papers, Paintings, Drawings, Prints, Photographs or representations of any kind of a treasonable or seditious, or of an immoral or indecent character.

Coin, base or counterfeit.

Prohibited.

Reprints of Canadian Copyright Works, and reprints of British Copyright Works which have been Copyrighted in Canada.

Goods manufactured or produced, wholly or in part, by prison labor, or which have been made within or in connection with any prison, goal or penitentiary, shall not be imported into Canada, under a penalty of two hundred dollars, and if imported such goods and the parcels or packages in which they are contained shall be forfeited.

No oleomargarine, butterine, or other similar substitute for butter, shall be imported into Canada under a penalty of not more than four hundred dollars and not less than two hundred dollars for each offence, and if imported, the same and the packages within which it is contained shall be forfeited.

The export of deer, wild turkeys, quail, partridge, prairie fowl and woodcock in the carcass or parts thereof, is hereby declared unlawful and prohibited; and any person exporting or attempting to export any such article shall, for each such offence, incur a penalty of one hundred dollars, and the article so attempted to be exported shall be forfeited, and may, on reasonable cause of suspicion of intention to export the same, be seized by any officer of the Customs, and if such intention is proved, shall be dealt with as for a breach of the Customs laws.

- Steel Strip, specially imported by manufacturers of buckthorns and plain strip fencing for use in the factories, July 17th, 1886.

Postage Stamps, Post Cards, etc., issued by the Canadian P. O. Department.

The stamps issued by the Canadian Post Office Department, are of the following denominations, viz.: postage stamps, ½ c., 1 c., 2 c., 3 c., 5 c., 6 c., 10 c., 12½ c. and 15 c.; registered letter stamps, 5 c.

Post Cards are issued at one cent each, and may be sent to any address in Canada or United States. Reply Post Cards (2 cts.) may be sent to any address in Canada. Post cards are also issued at two cents each for transmission to the United Kingdom, Newfoundland, St. Pierre et Miquelon, and certain foreign countries. Post Bands are for sale at the rate of \$1.25 per hundred

Rates of Postage within the Dominion.

LETTERS.

To places within the Dominion of Canada, 3 cents per oz. each. Short paid letters will be taxed with double the amount of the deficient postage. Letters wholly unpaid will be sent to the Dead Letter Office.

On letters posted at an Office to be delivered from it, commonly known as Local or "drop letters," the rate will be 1 cent per oz.; but where there is a free delivery by letter carrier, the rate will be 2 cts. per oz.

Re-directed Letters will be forwarded without any additional charge if not taken from the office or if handed back at the moment of their delivery, or as soon as possible after their delivery,

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

Newspapers and periodicals printed and published in Canada may be sent by Post from the Office of publication to regular subscribers in Canada free.

Transient Newspapers and Periodicals addressed to places in Canada, will be sent at the rate of one cent per 4 ounces, which must be prepaid by postage stamp. Newspapers and Periodicals weighing less than one ounce may be posted singly, prepaid by postage stamp, one half ct. each.

MISCELLANEOUS MAIL MATTER.

The rates of postage upon all books, pamphlets, occasional publications, printed circulars, prices current, hand bills and other material wholly in print, and on packages of seeds, bulbs, roots, scions or grafts, patterns or samples of goods or merchandise, is *one cent per four ounces* or fraction thereof, to be prepaid by postage stamp or stamped postband or wrapper.

Upon all book and newspaper manuscripts, printers' proof-sheets, whether corrected or not, maps, prints, drawings, engravings, lithographs, photographs, when not on glass or in cases, containing glass, sheet music whether printed or written, documents partly printed or written, not being letters or intended to serve the purpose of letters—such as deeds, insurance policies, militia and school returns, or other documents of like nature—and on all miscellaneous matter transmissible by post, not otherwise provided for—the rate of postage is *one cent for each two ounces* or fraction of two ounces, to be prepaid by postage stamp or stamped post band or wrapper.

Prepayment of Matter of the above description is in all cases compulsory.

PARCELS.

Closed parcels weighing not more than 5 lbs., may be sent to any place within the Dominion at the rate of 6 cts. per 4 oz. Parcels open to inspection and weighing not more than 4 lbs., may be forwarded at the rate of 1 cent per oz.

REGISTRATION FEE.

To places within the Dominion, 5 cents on all classes of mail matter. Information in regard to the rules governing registered correspondence, etc., may be had at any Post Office.

Letters containing gold or silver money, (excepting such addressed to the United States) jewels, or precious articles, or anything liable to Customs duties, will not be forwarded, *registered or unregistered*, to any place beyond the limits of the Dominion of Canada.

Newspapers and periodicals printed and published in Canada may be sent by post from the *office of publication or news agency*, to regular subscribers or news agents in the United States, free.

Newspapers if sent singly, must be prepaid at the newspaper rate, but they may be sent in packets paid collectively at book post rate, or by newspaper rate, but if at newspaper rate, each paper must be paid the same rate as if sent singly.

Parcels open to inspection and weighing not more than 4 lbs., may be sent to places in the United States at the rate of 1c per oz.

Closed parcels may be sent to and received from the United Kingdom, Newfoundland and all those countries and colonies with which the United Kingdom maintains a parcel post. Each parcel must be accompanied by a Customs Declaration, filled up by the sender. To United Kingdom the rate is 25 cents per pound, and to Newfoundland 15 cents per pound.

Full information in regard to the rates of postage to British Colonies and foreign countries, via England, or the United States, inland and foreign mail connections, the rules governing letters, newspapers, books, periodicals, samples and parcel post, and the transmission of post cards, ships letters, free matter, &c., may be obtained at any Post Office.

Light Houses.

On the Coasts of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

GEORGE'S ISLAND, west side of Island, Halifax Harbor, lat $44^{\circ}38'30''$ N., lon $63^{\circ}33'20''$ W., two fixed white catoptric lights, vertical, 20 feet apart, 50 and 30 feet high, drab square building, 21 feet high. Lights show seaward on the S, and into harbor on N. side; on W. side the upper light only can be seen. Vessels going into Halifax Harbor, passing Meagher's Beach, will keep the light on starboard bow. The light is for the purpose of guiding vessels in and out of the Harbor, through the channel west of the Island. These lights open to westward of Meagher's Beach, clear the westward of Thrum Cap Shoal. A fog bell on western side lighthouse tower, strikes 7 strokes every minute.

MEAGHER'S BEACH, Sherbrook Tower, east side of entrance to Halifax Harbor, lat $44^{\circ}36'$ N., lon $63^{\circ}31'50''$ W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 12 miles, 58 feet high, building white with red roof, granite, height 48 feet. When Sambro light bears W. S. W., this light should not be brought to the westward of north, which clears the Thrum Cap Shoal. A fog trumpet sounds blasts of 5 seconds, with intervals of 25 seconds between the blasts.

DEVIL'S ISLAND, on south point of Island, at the eastern entrance to Halifax harbor, two fixed white catoptric lights, horizontally, E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N., and W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., 175 yards apart, visible 13 miles, the light E. 59 feet high, W. light 52 feet, both buildings white, octagonal, wood, height E. 53 feet, W. 45 feet, lat $44^{\circ}34'50''$ N., lon $63^{\circ}27'15''$ W. The eastern light opens to southward of western, clears to the southward of the Thrum Cap Shoal. Lifeboat stationed here.

JEDDORE ROCK, on summit of rocks about 22 miles east of Halifax, lat $44^{\circ}39'45''$, lon $63^{\circ}0'22''$ one fixed red light, visible 12 miles, white, square, wood, dwelling attached, 86 feet high.

EGG ISLAND, centre of island, lat $44^{\circ}39'50''$ N., lon $62^{\circ}51'32''$ W. catoptric light, a group flashing white or bright light, showing three flashes with intervals of 15 seconds between, followed by intervals of 30 seconds, visible 15 miles, 80 feet high, octagonal building, black and white vertical stripes on seaward side, height 45 feet. Visible around horizon. An iron can buoy, painted red, about 200 yards south of the Brig Rock, W. by S. from the light house, about 2 miles.

POPE'S HARBOR, on west point of Harbour Island, lat $44^{\circ}47'40''$ N., on $62^{\circ}38'50''$ W., fixed red light, catoptric, visible 9 miles, 45 feet high, tower white, square, wood, with dwelling attached, height 37 feet.

SHEET ROCK, at the entrance to Sheet Harbor, lat $44^{\circ}49'55''$ N., lon $62^{\circ}29'40''$ W., revolving red light every 40 seconds, visible 10 miles.

BEAVER ISLAND, S. E. part of East Beaver, or William Island, lat $44^{\circ} 48' 10''$ N, lon $62^{\circ} 20' 30''$ W, a bright white light showing a flash every 45 seconds, visible 12 miles. 70 feet high, white building with two black balls to seaward. S. 1/2 W., 35 feet high.

BEAVER HARBOR, on eastern end of Beaver Point, lat $44^{\circ} 52' 23''$ N, lon $62^{\circ} 23' 11''$ W. A pole light red, visible 6 miles.

From this buoy a course N. W. by W. will clear the Broad Shoal, and lead to the fairway of Louisburg Harbor. Taken up about December.

A steam fog whistle in course of construction, will probably go into operation about February.

An Automatic Signal Buoy, painted red, placed in lat 44° 31' 42" N., lon 63° 29' 28" W., in 21 fathoms of water, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Chebucto Head, sounds a ten inch whistle. From the buoy Chebucto Head bears S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., magnetic $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile. Sandwich Point, N. by W., 4 miles. Passing to the westward of the buoy at the distance of half a cable and steering a N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. course magnetic, will lead up the harbor to the eastward of the Neverfail Shoal, and at a distance of two cables to the westward of Meagher's Beach light-house.

A similar buoy, painted black, in lat 44° 28' 25" N., lon 63° 22' 10" W., in 36 fathoms, from this buoy Sambro Island light W. $\frac{1}{4}$, N. $8\frac{1}{2}$ miles. Devil's Island light N. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles, and the inner signal buoy N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. 6 miles.

SAMBRO AUTOMATIC WHISTLING BUOY, in 25 fathoms, near S. end of Sambro Outer Bank. Painted black, and white vertical stripes. From the buoy Pennant Point bears N. W. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N., $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles. Sambro Light, N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles. Chebucto Light, N. by E., $\frac{1}{2}$ E., $8\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

The Portuguese Buoy is colored red and black horizontally; the Rockhead Buoy black and white vertically. The other buoys of Halifax Harbor are colored red on the starboard hand and black on the port hand, entering the harbor.

DUNCAN'S COVE Life boat station.

HERRING COVE, Western Head, lat N. 44° 33' 57", lon W. 63° 33' 0", fixed red, on mast, elevated 52 feet above water. Visible 8 miles.

HERRING COVE, Life boat stationed.

SAMBRO, middle of Island, lat 44° 26' 10" N., lon 63° 33' 30" W., fixed white dioptric 2nd order light, visible 20 or 21 miles, 115 feet high, building white, octagonal, 60 feet high. The steam fog whistle has been replaced since the 10th June, 1891, by explosive bombs, fired every 20 minutes.

A Bell Buoy, painted black, placed S. E. of the Blind Sister.

Iron Spar Buoy has been placed off the S. W. Breaker, Sambro, wooden spars on the Pollock, and another on the Whippey Shoal, near Sambro.

SHIPLEY HEAD, Terrance Bay, lat 44° 27' 40", lon 63° 42' 50", fixed red, on mast, 55 feet high, visible 7 miles.

BETTY'S ISLAND, on Brig Point, near Prospect, lat 44° 26' 22" N., lon 63° 45' 54" W., revolving red catoptric light, greatest brilliancy every two minutes, 75 feet high, visible 14 miles, building white, with two horizontal red bands, square, wood, height 54 feet, dwelling attached. Coast light.

DOVER—A lighthouse to be erected on S. end Collaghan's Island.

PEGGY POINT, east side of entrance to St. Margaret's Bay, lat 44° 29' 30" N., lon 63° 55' W., fixed red catoptric light, 65 feet high, building white, square, 26 feet high. Lantern on dwelling.

BOX PORTAGE ISLAND, on south point, lat $43^{\circ} 27' 16''$ N., lon $65^{\circ} 44' 39''$ W., red catoptric light, revolving every minute, visible 12 miles, 46 feet high, white square wooden building, height 28 feet. For guiding vessels into Barrington West Bay and Shag Harbor.

ABBOTT HARBOR.—Lantern on mast, with white shed at base, on S. extremity of Abbott Island, shows a white light. In operation from 1st April to 1st October each year.

PEASE'S ISLAND, on the south point of Pease's Island, one of the Tusket Islands, Yarmouth County, Nova Scotia, lat $43^{\circ} 37' 55''$ N., lon $66^{\circ} 1' 40''$ W. The main or sea light will be revolving catoptric, showing alternately red and white, each color visible for 15 seconds, with intervals of 45 seconds between the flashes. It is elevated 36 feet above high water mark, and in clear weather should be seen 12 miles from all points of approach from the southward, and also through the Schooner and Ellenwood Passages. A fixed red catoptric light will also be shown from a window in the tower, 16 feet below the main light. It is intended to mark the channel between the two dangers known as the Old Man and Old Woman Rocks, and is, therefore, visible between the bearings W. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N., and N. W. by N., N. W. by W., and in no other directions. It should be visible 4 miles. The tower is a wooden building, painted white, and consists of a square tower 42 feet high from base to vane on lantern, with a keeper's dwelling attached.

EXPLANATION OF SIGNALS

Made on Main Signal Staff at Citadel Hill, when Vessels are seen from the Citadel or reported from an Outpost.

When Sailing Vessels are reported from an outpost, the following signals are made on the lower yard:

BY DAY.

For 1 Square Rigged vessel, 2 balls close up, one on the outer halliard and one on the inner halliard

" 2 Do, 1 ball hoisted on the outer halliard and one close up on the inner halliard; outer ball dropped.

" 3 Do, 2 balls close up, one on outer and one on inner halliard.

" 4 Do, 2 balls separated, and one close up on the inner halliard.

" 5 Do, a pennant of any colour on the outer halliard, and one ball close up inside.

" 6 Do, a pennant under a ball close up on the outer halliard, and a ball at the inner halliard close up.

" 7 Do, a pennant over a ball close up on the outer halliard, and a ball close up on the inner halliard.

" 8 Do, a pennant under two balls close up on the outer halliard with a ball close up on the inner halliard.

" 9 Do, a pennant between two balls close up on the outer halliard with a ball close up on the inner halliard.

For 10 Do, a flag of any colour close up on the outer halliard, with a ball close up on the inner halliard.

The above balls, &c., are hoisted on the east or west yard arm, according to the *quarter* the vessel first appears in.

A Ship, a large ball at end of yard, with a small one at inner halliard.

A Barque, a large ball at the end, with a small one dropped at inner halliard.

A Brig, a small one at end of yard, and a large one at inner halliard.

A Brigantine, a cross close up at the outer halliard. Two or more do, a cross half hoisted.

A Topsail Schooner, or Schooner wearing a Merchant's Private Signal, a cross close up at the inner halliard.

Two or more schooners, a cross inner, half hoisted.

The upper yard of the Ship Staff is used solely to designate Steam Vessels thus:

Two large balls close up, one at the outer and the other at the inner halliard, E or W, a steamer reported in that quarter.

A small ball at the outer, and a large one at the inner halliard, a very small or regular coasting Steamer.

A large ball at the outer, and a small one at the inner halliard, a large or ocean going Steamer.

Steamers or Sailing Vessels showing owners' or agents' private signal flags, are denoted on the private Signal Staff with a small descriptive pennant underneath the private signal.

When the description of vessel is ascertained, the following descriptive colors will be hoisted at the masthead, and the inner ball taken down:

BY NIGHT.

Steamers only are signalled, and are distinguished as follows, viz :—

A *Red* and *white* light, horizontal, the red light to the Eastward, denotes a Steamer East reported.

A *Green* and *white* light, horizontal, the green light to the Westward, denotes a Steamer West reported.

When a Steamer is sighted from citadel the white light is taken down.

When two or more Steamers are reported, the red or green is dropped 12 feet.

When two or more Steamers are sighted, the red or green light is shown dropped twelve feet.

Directions to Mariners with Reference to Canadian Storm Warnings, issued for Quebec and the Maritime Provinces.

I.—Cone, hoisted with the apex downwards, indicates "moderate gale is expected," probably at first from an easterly direction.

II.—Cone, with apex pointing upwards, indicates "moderate gale is expected," probably at first from a westerly direction.

III.—Drum, with Cone underneath, the apex pointing downwards, indicates fresh to heavy gale is expected, probably at first from a easterly direction.

IV.—Drum, with Cone above, the apex pointing upwards, indicates fresh to heavy gale is expected, probably at first from a westerly direction.

The Cone, when hoisted by itself, indicates that it is expected that the wind will obtain a velocity of 30 miles an hour, but will not exceed 40 miles; and it is not intended that an ordinary well found vessel should stay in port, but simply as a warning to mariners that strong winds are expected from the quarter indicated.

The Drum will always be hoisted when the velocity of the wind is expected to exceed 40 miles an hour.

The night signal, corresponding to Nos. 1 and 3, is two white lanterns hanging perpendicular.

The night signal, corresponding to Nos. 2 and 4, is two white lanterns hanging horizontally.

NOTES.—Mariners will be able to obtain further information from Drum Agents or by consulting the daily probabilities. Mariners should always bear in mind that the storm signals are merely cautionary, and do not necessarily mean that a storm will occur at the place where the signal is displayed, but that one is expected either there or within such a distance that vessels leaving port would be liable to be caught in it.

The storm warnings issued for Nova Scotia, are received from the Central Office, Toronto, Ont.

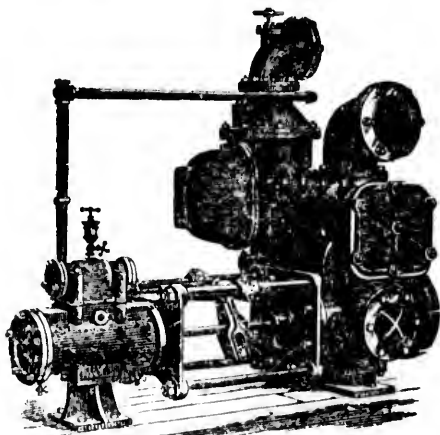

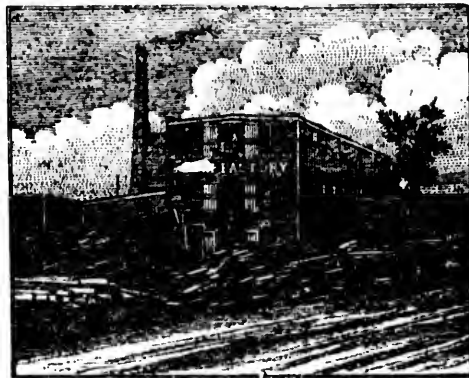
