

Commercial Summary.

THE Molsons' Bank has declared a dividend of 31 per cent, for the current half year.

THE Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Co. have just declared an interim dividend of three per cent.

THE Delaware peach crop this season, it is thought, will be about 5,000,000 baskets, of which 1,000,000 baskets will probably be evaporated.

THE merchants' clerks " Metropolis Association" have instructed their counsel to apply for an act of incorporation at the next session of the Quebec Parliament. It is intended to introduce a bill to regulate the hours of labor.

MR. T. H. PETERSON, for 25 years a prominent merchant of Colborne, has sold out his stock and trade to Messrs. Peterson & Co., who have moved into the old premises. The new firm begin business under favorable auspices, having abundance of capital and prospects of doing a large trade.

NEGOTIATIONS are now in progress between the Montreal Abattoir Company and a few Quebec capitalists for the purpose of slaughtering and shipping cattle from Montreal to this city for household consumption, with a view of breaking down the excessive prices now demanded by the butchers.-Quebec Chronicle.

Southern papers report that a gentleman in Florida has produced a new variety of cotton by budding the cotton plant on the okra, which grows wild in great abundance in that State. There is but one boll on the plant, but it is larger than an ordinary cocoanut and contains at maturity two pounds of pure lint, while there are no seeds in it and therefore will not require ginning. This is important if true.

W. E. CAMPBELL, general storekeeper, Metcalfe., Ont, is said to have compromised with his creditors at 50c on the dollar, cash. He succeeded to the business of his father about a year ago, and it is stated that the real property of the estate is in his mother's name. - Another family matter is that of Oscar C. Rowe, dealer in tins, &c., Moncton, N. B., who is reported to have recently given a bill of sale to his father.

At the tenth annual meeting of the Canada Paper Co., held in this city last Tuesday, a satisfactory statement of affairs was submitted, and the following were elected directors: Sir Hugh Allan and Messrs. Andrew Allan, Thomas Logan, Jonathan Hodgson, and John Macfarlane. Mr. Logan was elected President and Mr. Macfarlane, Vice-President and Managing Director, Mr. J. G. Young being re-appointed secretary-treasurer.

A MOVEMENT has been commenced for the building of a branch of the Port Rowan and Lake Shore Railway from Port Dover to Brantford. It was stated at a special meeting of the Waterford Village Council, recently held to consider the question, that \$6,000 of stock had already been subscribed in Port Dover towards the project. The proposed line is to run within one mile of Smcoe, and half a mile of Waterford.

The Midland Banking Company have filed their Statutory declaration of partnership; it was dated and filed on the 28th Aug., ult., at the Registry office in Port Hope. The parties composing the company are Messrs. Stanley Paterson and John Paterson, who are to commune for a period of ten years from the first day of March last.—The Midland Railway Company of Canada have successfully floated #610,000 upon the English market.

It would seem that Yorkville, Ont., is destined to become somewhat of a manufacturing centre, in the event of the village becoming amound to Toronto. Capitalists have proposed to establish there a carpet factory, tin stamping works, and agricultural works. But the villagers have not yet decided to come into the household of the "Queen City," probably awaiting further inducements.

JOHN F. GOODERE, who has carried on a tailoring establishment at Moncton, N.B., for a good many years, is reported to have gone out of business and taken a situation as cutter in a Leading Wholesale Trade of Montreal.

Nova Scotia establishment.—J. D. Steeves & Co., Moncton, who commenced business in the dry goods and clothing line a few months ago, have closed up, and the goods have been returned to Messrs. Cole & Dully, who, it is reported, were the owners. The branch store business does not appear to have been a success.

The general trade situation in the United States, as reported to the Mercantile Agencies continues to improve. The industrial outlook is also brighter. The grown cotton has suffered of late from rain. The outlook for wheat as shown by replies to nearly 3,000 enquiries seat out is for a crop of 525,600,000 bushels. The corn crop is not reported definitely, but is greatly improved. The total number of failures reported during last week was 110, a decrease of 22 from the week preceding and six more than for the corresponding week last year. Ganada reported 13, an increase of 5.

MESSRS. WOOD & PARR, contractors for building the section of the T. & O. Rv. between Madoc and Bridgewater, have got into difficulties. They had their contract nearly finished, but the pressure of creditors for payments of overdue accounts and of the workmen for their wages became too stormy, and a few days ago Mr. Wood, who was in charge, left with the books without taking the precaution of advising his creditors of his leaving. Mr. Parr professes his anxiety of paying all the creditors, and, if protestations go for anything, is much more anxious to find Mr. Wood than Wood is of finding his "Parr." The percentage that will be due on completion of the works kept back is about \$8,000, and we understand the liabilities on the contract are about \$5,000. An assignment of these monies have been made to a trustee in trust for their creditors.

THERE is one class of vessel owners who are exempt from the disabilities of which the grain carriers are complaining—namely, the lumber freighters. During the past fortnight business has been very active, with advancing rates. One of the largest and most conservative owners of the lumber carriers at Chicago, last week said: "Our time has come at last. There is only about ninety days left to bring the winter's supply of lumber to this port, and from this time forward the owners intend to have paying rates or we will lay our vessels up. If shippers want their lumber brought here they will have to pay fair freight rates."

P. M. Calden, dry goods merchant, Chatham, Ont., has failed three or four times during his business career, extending over ten or twelve years. It was understood that at one time he had about \$4,000 invested in business, but a number of years ago he bought out the bankrupt stock of John Hyslop, and it is stated paid "too dear for his whistle," and has never been able to recover. He accordingly assigned on the 21st ult., with liabilities amounting to \$12,000, and assets in stock and book-debts estimated at the same figure. No offer has been made, and the estate will probably be wound up.

A PROMINENT railroad manager is credited with the following: "I predict that every passenger locomotive will soon carry a pilot. I don't know where he'll be—whether on the cab or in front of the cab over the boiler, or in front of the boiler over what we now call the pilot and you call the convextcher—but he will be carried on every locomotive that carries trains at a high rate of speed, and he will watch the signals, switches, bridges, highways and junctions, and do nothing else, while the engineer runs his engine."

The Metropolitan Plate Glass Insurance Co. of New York, who made a deposit of \$3,000 with the Canadian Government some months since, have concluded to withdraw from Canada, not finding the business a paying one. The feud between the "Metropolitan" and the "Lloyds" Plate Glass, also of New York, a year or two since, has eventuated after the manner of the "Kilkenny cats." The authorities of the Bank of Toronto bave learnt that Thomas Elgar, accountant, who absconded some time ago, is now in Chicago, some of his effects having been forwarded there to the care of Mr. T. W. Handford. The Sheriff has a small quantity of Elgar's goods in his hands, which he has seized, and the bank has obtained an order for substantial service on Elgar, with a view to reaching the goods in the Sheriff's hands. The amount of Elgar's indebtedness to the bank, for which they sue, is \$1,500, but it is supposed that he was in default to a much greater extent.

The general stores of the young firm of Gadbois & Clark at Rat Portage, Manitoba, and at Keewatin, are in possession of one J. A. Wright, under a chattel mortgage, for a claim of \$1,500. In June last the firm claimed to have a surplus of about \$5,000.—Messrs. Stontenburg, Smith & Co., storekeepers, Brandon, Manitoba, whose assignment we have previous-

Watier was arrested on a capias, and in the event of the prisoner not being brought back to Montreal under the extradition treaty, an effort will be made to force him to disgorge some of his creditors' money, which it is alleged he carried away.-Frank Curran, of Welford Station, N.S., general storekeeper, who absconded some time since, has been induced to return, and is offering to compromise at 40c on the dollar. The offer will not likely be accepted, as it is believed a larger dividend can be realized from the estate.

Boomer has been admitted a partner in the firm of Warren Bros., wholesale grocers, Toronto; Wm. Stewart & Co., dry goods, Guelph, dissolved-Wm. Stewar continues.

Mr. J. W. MARLING, Supt. of Agencies of the Canada Life Assurance Company, has been appointed to the position in this city and Province rendered vacant by the resignation of Mr. R. Pownall.

The Toronto Industrial Exhibition was formally opened on Wednesday last by Attorney-General Mowat, in the absence from the city of the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario. 'All the exhibits were not quite in position. The display in the greater number of buildings is fully up to that of former years, while many new features will attract the attention of visitors; including the electric light from forty-one lamps on the grounds, nightly displays of electrohydraulic fireworks, the bombardment and explosion of a man-of-war vessel, etc. The attendance promises to be unusually large, and the Exhibition is an assured success.

Return of Grand Trunk Railway traffic, week ending 2nd September, 1882: passengers, express, freight and mails, \$139,527; freight and live stock, \$199,012. Total, \$338,539; corresponding week 1881, \$303,452. Increase, 1882, \$35,087; of which \$9,340 is in passenger, etc., traffic and \$25,747 in freight. Miles open, 1882, 2,322; 1881, 2,213. Increase 109.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND BANK .- A despatch from Charlottetown, 6th Sept., says :-- A large number of the depositors of the Bank of Prince Edward Island met in the Oddfellows' Hall yesterday evening. After a short discussion it was unanimously resolved—"That we, the depositors present, do hereby form ourselves into a committee for the protection of our rights against the Bank of Prince Edward Island. Resolved—That a committee of five be appointed as a working committee to further matters and report at next meeting." The committee are: Or. McNeil, J. L. Chappelle, Robt. Crabbe, John Carroll and A. B. Mackenzie. Hon. A. B. Mackenzie was appointed treasurer, J. L. Chappelle secretary. The depositors declared themselves determined to probe the bank matters thoroughly. They say the bank directors have paid on their own responsibility since the suspension, on the 28th November last, \$42,624 to the Bank of Montreal without the consent or knowledge of the shareholders or creditors.

OYSTER dealers in the States predict that the crop of oysters during the coming season will be smaller than last year, though the quality will be better, and higher prices will range. Blue Points and Shrewsburys, which were scarce last year, will be more plentiful, however, and the Chesapeake crop will give a heavy yield. During the summer months the trade is confined almost exclusively to Southern oysters, which are not as hard as the Northern variety, and bring lower prices. The Western trace promises to be heavier than ever before, while the quantity of American oysters in the English Market will probably be larger than during any time of the six years the foreign trade has been in existence. Oyster shells now bring about three cents per bushel for use in the planting grounds, the spawn of the oyster attaching itself to the shell.

THE retail dry goods firm of St. Marie, Thibault & Co., St. Catherine street, this city, have assigned in trust. It appears this is not the first time Mr. J. St. Marie has failed, he having been rather unfortunate. He is said to be a pushing salesman, and started the present business on St. Catherine st. west some threeand a-half years ago, with very little capital; he did fairly well for a time, and last Spring moved into a larger store and increased his stock considerably, without, however, adding to his capital. Mr. Thibault, who was admitted a partner about three months ago, did not bring any ready money into the business. St. Marie states that his immediate suspension was caused by a damaging report published by one of the French papers of the city, and afterwards copied by English journals, which very seriously injured his credit; he threatens legal action against the paper which circulated the rumor. His liabilities amount to about \$14,000, all due in this city, and although the stock has not all been taken yet, it's expected that the estate will pay almost in inll.

Messas. McBain, Woods & Co. are about establishing a bis wit factory in Winnipeg The firm consists of D. G. McBain and Ald. Owens, of that city, and Alex. Woods of Quebec, the latter of whom has for many years carried on business in the same line in Quebec. The new firm have purchased a large triangular block of land on Fonseca, Higgins and Argyle streets, on which they are now erecting a large threestorey building, 126 feet long by 40 feet wide besides necessary outbuildings. They intend to carry on the business extensively in all its Leading Wholesale Trade of Montreal.

THE TARIFF.

The Liberals of East York have held a meeting in honor of their recently elected member, the Hon. Alexander Mackenzie, whose health was sufficiently restored to enable him to be present on the occasion. Several other members of the Dominion Parliament of the Ontario Legislature were likewise present, and it may be assumed that this, as well as the previous demonstration in North Wentworth, was intended to influence the local general election which Mr. Mowat has announced is likely to take place before long. It is rather a singular circumstance that while in the United States the tariff is virtually treated as an open question, there being both protectionists and free traders in the ranks of the republican and democratic parties, the reverse is the case in Canada, and although the Ontario Legislature can exercise no influence whatever over the

fiscal policy of the Dominion, there seems every probability that the local elections will be fought on the merits of the tariff. There has been an announcement that the Dominion Premier, Sir John Macdonald, will during the present month hold a meeting of delegates from the various Ontario constituencies in concert with Mr. Meredith, the leader of the Ontario Opposition, the object being to influence the local constituencies to return to the Ontario Legislature candidates favorable to protection, which was the main issue at the Dominion election. Judging from past experience, it seems probable that it will be found impracticable to have distinct parties in the Provinces and in the Dominion, as it has always been found impracticable in the United States. It appears that the Ontario ministers took an active part at the last Dominion elections in support of the candidates of their choice, and notwithstanding the fact that the Quebec ministers did precisely the same thing, and are acting in the most cordial alliance with the Ottawa Government, the organs of the latter have censured the Ontario ministers for taking part in the contest. In vindicating himself from the charge, Mr. Mowat referred to the important issues affecting Ontario which are at the present time pending, and which would be a complete justification, were any required, of his course. The fact, however, that the tariff is a question affecting everyone in Ontario would have been an ample justification of the interference of any individual in that Province, whether a minister or not, in the general election. It is not surprising that Sir John Macdonald should make a strenuous effort at this juncture to secure the election of a Legislature in Ontario that will sustain him in his alli ance with the French Canadian bleus on the boundary question, and he is shrewd enough to know that his best chance of success is to endeavor to join issue on the tariff question at the local election, as he did with so much success at those of the

Mr. Mackenzie is probably of the same opinion that we have expressed, judging from the fact that he made the tariff one of the prominent topics of his speech, and that he dwelt on the importance of perfect union among the members of a political party. Judging from past experience there is but slight hope of such union, but Mr. Mackenzie has made an effort to satisfy the protectionist wing of the Reform party, by assuring it that it need not have any apprehensions of a serious reversal of the policy of protection which has been recently inaugurated.

He impressed on his audience that "anvthing approaching to an absolute free trade policy is utterly impossible in this country." We might join issue with him on that asseveration. It is "utterly impossible" simply because public opinion is opposed to it. It would be just as possible to place countervailing excise duties on all goods manufactured in Canada as it is to impose such duties in the United Kingdom. This point, however, is not worth arguing. Such duties are out of the question. Mr. Mackenzie recognizes the propriety of imposing duties for revenue which shall be incidentally protective, and admits that the necessities of the Government, "owing to the imprudence "and extravagance of the present admin-"istration, are so great that there is no "probability that we should be able to " make any very material reduction in a "very great proportion of our import "duties. He would only reduce duties "in the interest of the great public." Mr. Blain, who is one of the latest deserters from the Reform party, announced quite recently that "there is not a man in the "Dominion to-day who says the tariff is " perfect, or that it is not in some features "defective and unjust." We plead guilty to being so obtuse as to fail to discover the ground on which Mr. Blain, holding the views that he has expressed, has deserted the party now led by Mr. Blake, who we may remark expressed sentiments essentially similar to those of Mr. Mackenzie prior to the general election. It is, however, of more importance to examine the views of the protectionist party during the incumbency of the administration of which Mr. Mackenzie was the head. In Parliament the leaders of the Opposition were most careful to frame their resolu tions in the most general terms, andwe by no means desire to censure them for their avoidance of details.

There was another arena for the discussion of the respective merits of Protection and Free Trade, viz., the Dominion Board of Trade, and the whole question was discussed very fully by the members of that body in February, 1874, prior to the introduction of Sir Richard Cartwright's amended tariff. It is perhaps not unworthy of notice that during the discussion eight Cabinet Ministers, including the Ministers of Finance and Customs, were present, and that the members of the Board of Trade accepted an invitation to dine with them on one evening during their Session. The original resolution in favor of the continuance of the 15 per cent. tariff then existing was withdrawn in favor of one substantially the same moved by Mr. Walker. Mr. John Gillespie, on behalf of

the Toronto Board of Trade, moved an amendment affirming that " to stimulate "and foster manufacturing it is expedient "to increase the duty to 20 per cent. on "all manufactured articles now bearing "15 per cent." Mr. Walker's amendment was defeated by 34 votes to 20, when Mr. Thomas White, seconded by Mr. Hugh McLennan, moved, after a preamble to the effect that owing to the excess of expenditure over revenue "some revision of the fiscal policy of the Government will become necessary," that it be resolved, "That in the opinion of this Board the "principle of protection to the manufac-" turing industries of the country should "be embodied in such revision of the "tariff, so far as the same can be carried "out consistently with the commerce "and revenue requirements of the coun-"try." A question was put to Mr. White as to whether he had any proof that there was likely to be a deficit, and he replied that he had satisfied himself of the fact by an examination of the files of the Canada Guzette. On the division on Mr. White's amendment 8 of the 20 which had been in the minority on the 15 per cent. tariff voted for the indefinite incidental protection which Mr. White recommended, and which was carried on a division of 42 to 12. It is worthy of notice that of the 12 in the minority against protection were the 4 members from Quebec, Messrs. Garneau, Joseph, LeDroit and Woods; 2 from Montreal, Darling and A. Robertson; 3 from St. John, N.B., Fairweather, Hardy and Jones, from Charlottetown, Howlan, from Three Rivers, Balcer, and one from Sarnia, Keays.

It is unnecessary to notice the speeches against the amendment, but it may be interesting to cite a few extracts from the speeches of its supporters so as to learn the extent of the protection which they recommended to the Administration. Mr. White objected, and we think very fairly, to the amendment as being too precise in its recommendation. He said. "We cannot undertake to say to the "Government that the tariff shall be 20 " or 25 or 15 per cent., or any other rate." His object he declared was "simply to affirm some principle." It was objectionable to name a 15 or 20 per cent. tariff, as he had pointed out the previous year that " what is raw material for one manufacture is the manufactured article itself with regard to another industry." He read an extract from a letter from wholesale clothiers and shirt and collar manufacturers to establish his point, which we may remark was well taken. Mr. John Gillespie, who moved an amendment in favor of a 20 per cent, tariff; made a de-

cidedly protectionist speech. He said "by a fair and reasonable protection the "infant manufactures would become "strong, and new ones would spring into "existence." His idea of fair and reasonable protection was embodied in his demand for 20 per cent. Mr. Hamilton, of Toronto, thought that "if Mr. Gillespie ' would withdraw the recommendation of " a 20 per cent, tariff and leave his amend-" ment to merely recommend a moderate "increase in the tariff, it would meet the " views of all the protectionists present." Mr. Wm. Thomson, of Toronto, who finally voted for Mr. White's amendment, declared his intention of voting for Mr. Gillespie's 20 per cent, proposition. He said, "I do not regret, however, that a 20 " per cent, tariff has been named in the " motion, and for this reason, it shows " those opposed to us that we do not ask " for over protection." Again, he argued that "if we had a moderate protection, a " slight increase on the present duties, " we would have had amongst us a num-" ber of industries that do not exist at " all." Mr. Turner, of Hamilton, expressed his readiness to support the 20 per cent, resolution, though he would have preferred that no specific rate were mentioned. Mr. Hugh McLennan objected to naming any specific rate, but his opinions may be gathered from the following remark: "With regard to the manu-"facturing interests of the United States under their protective tariff, I must say " if we take them for our guide it will be " a most unfortunate one. I happen to "know something about their manufac-" tures, and can say that our manufac-" turing interests to-day are in a much " more prosperous condition than those " of the United States." Mr. George A. Drummond, who is stigmatized as the champion of extreme protection, spoke strongly in favor of moderate protection, but against naming a rate. He adverted to the remarks which had been made on his own business, and argued that "the business of sugar refining in this Dominion has been carried on for years in spite of a hostile duty." Going into details he stated that the sugar he as a refiner imported paid over 60 per cent. of duty, while slightly better paid 50 per cent., still better 46 to 42 per cent., and American loaf sugar only 40 per cent., English sugar being 381 to 39 per cent. On the general question Mr. Drummond said that "any approach to the state of things that "exists on the other side of the line is not "desirable, even in the interest of the " manufacturers themselves." Mr. Larke, of Oshawa, was one of the special champions of protection, and he said, "Now I

" believe the main issue before us, seeing "that everybody is a protectionist of " some kind, is whether we require an " additional 5 per cent. duty in order to "encourage the manufactures of this "country. I believe an additional 5 per "cent. is absolutely necessary for the "benefit of the whole country." Mr. Neelon, of St. Catharines, was opposed to naming any specific rate, as some manufacturers only required 15 per cent. while others required something over 20 per cent. He said, "we must not go to extremes." Mr. Dougall, of Windsor, who also voted with Mr. White, argued in favor of 15 per cent., "which I think is amply sufficient for all manufactures." Mr. Adam Brown, of Hamilton, said that he would vote for Mr. Gillespie's proposition of 20 per cent., although he preferred not naming any rate, as some articles required a protection of 20 per cent., while more might require more and others less. We have cited a sufficient number of authorities from among the supporters of Mr. White's amendment to prove that the general feeling of the protectionists in 1874 was in favor of a very moderate increase in the old tariff of 15 per cent. Mr. Andrew Robertson, of Montreal, regretted the introduction of the resolution, which when proposed three years previously he had defeated. He said that Mr. White's speech had led him to doubt whether he was a free-trader or a protectionist. One thing is tolerably certain, which is that the Reform party are willing now to go as far in the direction of protection as the protectionist members of the Board of Trade were prepared to demand in 1874. Had Sir Richard Cartwright offered as a compromise his amended tariff of 171 per cent, it would have been cheerfully accepted, and it was doubtless believed at the time that the Government was actually splitting the difference between the protectionist demand of 20 per cent. and the free-trade requirement not to exceed 15 per cent. It may be well to bear in mind, if the tariff is still to be the party issue, the views of the protectionists themselves in 1874.

OVER-BUYING AND OVER-SELLING.

"In time of peace prepare for war," is a piece of advice which the prudent country merchant seldom fails to apply to himself on occasions like the present, when all around him are evidences of prosperity, leading naturally to the belief that the requirements of his customers must greatly increase as compared with former seasons.

While the merchant whose liabilities are not troublesome to contemplate is not likely to err in over providing for such an expected increase, there is a class of dealers, who, while usually prudent enough to resist the temptation to buy for prospective wants, are yet too weak financially to say "no" when pressed to buy by salesmen too anxious to report orders. The evil that results from this want of courage-or rather desire to oblige the representative of an indulgent creditor-is not generally felt in favorable seasons and good times, but the practice is dangerous, and not unfrequently ends in depriving the retailer of his feeling of independence, and that consequent hopefulness which buoys a man under those petty reverses and disappointments which occasionally drive the retailer to unbusinesslike practices and eventually to ruin. The evil of such competition to neighboring retailers who are determined to risk nothing that may interfere with their usual prompt payments, is often great. Goods must be sold, and just as five barrels may determine the market price of flour, so the reduced price of dress goods and other fabrics in the hands of an overstocked dealer may destroy the legitimate profits of every merchant in the neighbor hood.

Another reprehensible practice lies in the indifference with which over-competition is generally viewed by those who have a remedy at their command. No sooner does a village retailer begin to find himself able to keep his head respectably above water, however he may have struggled for it through years of depression, than forthwith some neighboring village boils over, and a competition is established which must have but one end, especially in places where manufactures are limited or do not exist at all. The undesirable customer who has been refused credit at the other stores will get an account opened, and, in gratitude, or rather to feed his or her revenge, will canvass her neighbors, and advertise unceasingly the excellent "bargains" to be had "in the new store." Examples of this are to be found in almost every township, notwithstanding the record of mercantile misfortunes that have characterized the locality from its foundation. Prudent wholesale houses seldom fail to caution their salesmen against that overselling which leads to such results, and the prudent traveller, he who looks four to six months or more ahead, will forbear in the use of his power or prerogative in taking orders, never forgetting, for his employers and for his own future, that "Good stock is better than poor pay."

RAILWAY FUSION.

Mr. William Abbott, of London, who has taken a prominent part in advocating the fusion recently effected between the Grand Trunk and Great Western Railway Companies, is at present on a visit to Canada, and has been, in accordance with custom, interviewed by a reporter from the Toronto Globe. It is satisfactory to learn that Mr. Abbott is of opinion that Sir Henry Tyler's estimate of £200,000 sterling as the yearly saving in the working of the fused roads was less than what can be effected. He deprecated any alarm on the subject of an advance in freight rates, and entertained no doubt that the company would be satisfied with the saving in the working of the roads which can be effected. Mr. Abbott expressed his opinion that the fusion would give English capitalists increased confidence in Canada as a good field for investment. In the course of the very same interview Mr. Abbott expressed his doubts as to the success of the Canadian Pacific Company in obtaining money in England to carry on their work, and he further asserted that the Duke of Manchester's colonization scheme did not take in London. We confess that, in view of the well-known jealousy with which the Canadian Pacific scheme is viewed by the Grand Trunk, we are inclined to receive any views of Mr. Abbott on that subject cum grano. After having assured his interviewer that the fusion scheme had had a salutary effect, and had created an impression that "Canada was a good colony in which to invest capital," he proceeds to disparage the North-West Territory and the various colonization schemes to the utmost of his power. What he states about the Grand Trunk is doubtless true, but it must be constantly borne in mind that the Grand Trunk scheme was devised by English capitalists; that the road was built under the supervision of English engineers and contractors, and that Canada, after making a specific agreement to loan the English company a large sum on first mortgage, most generously released that mortgage, placing it behind the ordinary stock.

Mr. Abbott in the course of his interview held out the expectation that the Grand Trunk Company would soon build a double track, his reported words being, "We have come to the conclusion that a "double track is an absolute necessity, "and then we'll give you a fast train." This assurance is calculated to give public satisfaction, but it is followed up by the remark: "Glutting the English market

"with Canadian railway stocks, as would " be the case should the Canada Pacific "go to England for capital, would have " the effect of destroying among the Eng-"lish investors the growing confidence in " Canadian railways, and Canada would " suffer by losing the capital she so much "requires to develop her resources." The foregoing, it cannot be denied, is a most singular statement. The Grand Trunk, it is said, "after 45 years patient waiting," with shareholders numbering nearly 20,000 and ordinary stock of £20,000,000, has never received any interest on their investments, and yet there is no fear whatever of glutting the English money market by asking new capital to lay a double track. The apprehension will only be felt when the Canadian Pacific Company, which is said to have obtained a most lucrative contract from the Dominion Government, applies for capital on its preferential bonds, which is likely to be the form which any application for money in England would take. We readily admit that the Canadian Pacific Company will fail to obtain money from any of the capitalists who are connected with the Grand Trunk or the Great Western Companies, and we venture to affirm that they do not expect any aid in that quarter. On the other hand we venture to hazard the assertion that outside of their own constituency the Grand Trunk will find it difficult enough to obtain the means of constructing the double track.

What Mr. Abbott means by his repeated reference to the ordinary stock of the Grand Trunk lying fallow for 45 years we entirely fail to comprehend, and we may add that we were surprised to find such a statement in a Canadian journal without a comment. The Grand Trunk was first discussed as a possible scheme in the year 1852, just 30 years ago, and had after that to obtain its charter and build the road. Doubtless it has been an unfortunate investment for its shareholders, but there is no use in making exaggerated and absurd statements, such as those attributed to Mr. Abbott. The expression "45 years" occurs twice in the Globe's report. Mr. Abbott did not give much encouragement to the proposition to fix a "two cent per mile rate." It is certainly rather cool to ask a company which has never paid their shareholders any dividend to reduce rates below what it is permitted by its charter to charge. As to fast trains, they will be given when the double track is laid, but it is satisfactory to learn that Sir Henry Tyler is satisfied that the shareholders intend to make the Grand Trunk second to no road on the continent.

THE BOUNDARY QUESTION.

The Hamilton Spectator has been discassing the boundary question in more than one of its issues, and is candid enough to admit that, so far as it is able to judge, the award of the arbitrators was correct in regard to the Western boundary, variable is the most important point at issue. The Dominion Government, as we have pointed out on a previous occasion, has induced Parliament to separate the Western boundary question from the Northern. The Western boundary has become a question in controversy between the Provinces of Ontario and Manitoba, while the Northern boundary is really a matter of very trifling importance in which the Dominion and Ontario are alone interested. It is essential that this should be borne in mind in considering the question. Those who have attacked the award of the arbitrators have done so on the ground that they did not pretend that they were able to find in the Acts of Parliament, charter or proclamations bearing on the question any precise boundary line laid down on the North. Nothing can be more absurd than the suggestion that any legal tribunal would be better able than the arbitrators were to find a true or legal boundary on the North. The difficulty arises from the fact that in the Act of Parliament defining the boundary of the Province of Quebec on the North the terms used are, "North-"ward to the Southern boundary of the "territory granted to the merchants adven. " turers of England trading to Hudson's "Bay." It is not pretended that the said merchants adventurers ever had any title except that conveyed by their charter of 1670, which gave them "the lands and " territories upon the countries, coast, and " confines of the seas, bays, lakes, rivers, "creeks and sounds, in whatsoever lati-" tude they shall be, that lie between the "entrance of the straits, commonly called "Hudson's straits, not already actually "possessed by or granted to any of our " subjects, or possessed by the subjects of "any other Christian Prince or State." When this charter was granted in 1670, and for nearly a century later, Canada belonged to France, and the boundary question was a constant subject of dispute. After the wars which were terminated by the treaties of Ryswick, and of Utrecht, commissaries were appointed to determine the boundary, but were not able to do so, and when the treaty ceding Canada to Great Britain was negotiated the boundary was still unsettled. It is, however, important to notice that during the negotiations on the boundary question subsequent to the treaty of Utrecht, and when Great

Britain was pressing her claim to the boundary known as the height of land, and which is that now claimed by the Dominion as representative of the Hudson's Bay Company, the instructions to Commissary Bladen in 1719 contain the following words :- "You are to take especial Greare in wording such articles as shall be " agreed on with the Commissary of His "Most Christian Majesty upon this head, "that the said boundaries be understood to " regard the trade of the Hudson's By " Company only." We have given the data substantially on which the North boundary is to be determined, the only additional guide being the proclamation under the Act of 1791 fixing the Northeastern boundary at a point on Hudson's or James' Bay due north from the head of Lake Temiscamingue, "including all the territory westward and southward of the said line to the utmost extent of the country commonly called or known by the name of Canada." It has never been pretended by any controversialist that any defined boundary on the North to the westward of the boundary on James' Bay has been laid down, and it is consequently impossible for any legal tribunal to a lopt any other mode of defining it than to connect the clearly established legal bound aries on the South-west and North-east by a natural boundary. Such a one was found in the Albany river, which possessed the additional claim of having been proposed on two different occasions by the Hudson's Bay Company as their Southern boundary during the contention with France. It is, of course, well known that the Dominion Government, adopting the pretension of the Hudson's Bay Company, claim that their Southern boundary is the height of land. The arbitrators held with Mr. McD. Dawson that the company had no authority but their own for such pretension, and no impartial inquirer will venture to assert that at the time when the Hudson's Bay Company's charter was granted in 1670, France was not in possession of the territory now in dispute. Whatever territory belonged to France in 1670 belongs to Ontario now under the Statute of 1774 (14 Geo. 3, Cap. 83). Whatever opinion may be formed of the merits of the award as to the Northern houndary, there has never been the slightest ground for attributing to the arbitra tors any doubt whatever as to the Western boundary, which is the really important point at issue. We have noticed that the Hamilton Spectator has acknowledged the correctness of the award in the following terms: "Our own opinion is, that it is " wrong (the decision as to the due North-"line), and that the line ought to fol"low the sinuosities of the stream." It is hardly consistent in one who acknowled; es the correctness of the award to follow up such an admission by the following:-" If " the arbitrators were unable to determine "the meaning of the Statute and the "grant, they should have so reported. "They had no warrant for making a new "boundary, whereof the territory of Onta-"would be increased, diminished or "altered." The arbitrators did determine the meaning of the Statute, and it must be borne in mind that the Court which in 1818 gave a judgment which the Spectator concurs with the arbitrators in thinking erroneous had not before it a mass of documentary evidence which was before the arbitrators, and the collection of which was the chief cause of the delay in disposing of the matter in controversy, which has been so much complained of.

With regard to the appointment-of arbitrators to settle a disputed boundary, all the proceedings were in accordance with usage, and it is notorious that the pretension that lawyers alone were competent to sit on such a case is not supported by precedent. The repudiation by one Government of an agreement entered into by its predecessor, is wholly without precedent in British history. It need cause no surprise that there should be a strong feeling on the subject in Ontario, when it is known that Mr. Mousseau has declared :- "When at St. Jerome in 1878, "with the Hon. Mr. Masson, I laid down "the conditions on which we would hold "our position as members of the Federal "Cabinet." These conditions were a refusal to accept the decision of the arbitrators, the reference of the case to the Privy Council, and the right of Quebec to an equivalent, in case the disputed territory should be held to belong to Ontario. There are, doubtless, what are deemed sufficient reasons by the Ontario supporters of the Dominion Government for submitting to the dictum of their allies in Quehec, but it is vain for them to pretend that there are any defensible grounds for the course which has been followed. Even now, notwithstanding the unprecedented treatment that it has received, the Ontario Government would, we believe, be willing to agree to any fair proposition, but it is clear that there ought to be some satisfac tory arrangement made for the provisional Government of the disputed territory, and for the disposal of the land, timber and minerals. There has been a recent murder committed in the territory, and we learn that there has been a dispute as to the jurisdiction. It appears likewise that the Dominion Government has of late modified its proposal to leave the question to the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, and demands a prior reference to the Supreme Court, which Ontario is not likely to consent to so long as its present Government retains power. In the event of its defeat there may be some truth in the suggestion of the Hon. Mr. Hardy, that the briefs on both si es would be practically in the same hands.

DEATH OF MR. RITCHIE, Q.C .- The citizens of Montreal were much shocked to learn on Monday, the 4th inst., that Mr. T. W. Ritchie had died quite suddenly on board a steamer on Lake Memphremagog, in which he was returning to Montreal from his country residence on the Lake. Mr. Ritchie stood high in his profession, being Solicitor for the Bank of Montreal, and connected with some other important commercial companies. He was at one time the partner of Sir John Rose and of Mr. Justice Monk, on whose retirement he became the head of the law firm in which his son has latterly been a partner. The Montreal bar passed resolutions of sympathy with his bereaved family in which all classes of citizens will join.

AMERICAN SILVER.

It appears that attempts are being made to circulate American silver in some of our Western cities, and on the assumption that this is indicative of a deficiency of change, appeals have been made to the Government to procure an additional supply of Canadian subsidiary silver coin. It is not surprising, after the experience of the consequences of giving currency to American silver nearly twenty years ago, that there should be some anxiety on the subject, but there is really not the slightest ground for alarm. But for the suspension of specie payments in the United States, the consequence of which was the substitution of fractional notes for the subsidiary silver coin, there would have been no serious inconvenience felt in Canada. There is at present a decided tendency in the United States to coin silver to the utmost possible extent, owing to the depreciation of silver as compared with gold. It is therefore highly inexpedient to permit its introduction into Canada, even at the rates at which it is a legal tender for small amounts. It is more doubtful whether it is desirable to introduce an additional amount of Canadian silver coin. That must depend entirely on the supply and demand. It is of course well known that the nominal value of the fractional silver currency is greater than its real

value, and that value can only be maintained by a limitation of the supply. The Government doubtless has means of forming a tolerably correct opinion on the subject, and it is well known that there has been recently put in circulation new silver coin of a very recent date. It is much more probable that the Americans are making new efforts to introduce their silver than that there is any real scarcity of change. Those Canadians who travel in the United States must be aware that our silver coins are not current among our neighbors, although equally valuable.

We have great pleasure in directing attention to the report of the Maritime Bank, which is fully as satisfactory as could reasonably have been expected. The prospect of realizing the Albert road securities is most encouraging, and fair progress is being made in the realization of the old balances, which are still about two-thirds of the capital. The Directors advised that 3000 of the unallotted shares should be disposed of, and the shareholders have unanimously confirmed the recommendation. This will give an adequate working capital, and it may be hoped that before long the amounts now in liquidation will be realized.

THE NORTHERN ASSURANCE CO.

The annual report of the Northern Assurance Company, published elsewhere, will be of interest to Canadian policyholders, fire and life, in that old established company. In common, however, with nearly all companies, the fire experience of the Northern during the year 1881 was not satisfactory; the losses having amounted to a fraction over 63 per cent. o the premiums; nevertheless, after reserving the usual 33 per cent. to cover liabilities under current policies, a profit of nearly \$150,000 was earned, which was transferred to the Profit and Loss Account, In the Life branch, the new business amounted to nearly 22 million dollars, yielding nearly \$100,000 in premiums. The total income was close on 14 million dollars, and the claims to about half that sum. The Canadian business it is almost needless to say is under the efficient management of Mr. James Taylor, who, while indefatigable in behalf of his own companies, has always taken a prominent part in every endeavor to obtain for the insurance business in this country that fair treatment which it deserves as one of the greatest protectors of mercantile solvency. Although the Canadian business, which is almost exclusively confined to fire risks, cannot boast of any higher degree of success than the general experience of the company, so far as the ratio of immunity is concerned, it is nevertheless an indication of careful underwriting that, in what is usually styled a "wooden country," and in such a generally disastrous year, the proportion is not still higher in the neighboring State of New York the proportion for the six months ended June last was nearly 2 per cent. greater.

IS IT A SWINDLE?

Our Hamilton correspondent writes, warning wholesale men, bankers and the legal profession against being "taken in" by the agent or agents of the pretended firm of "A. E. Martin & Co., Mercantile Agency," 115 Broadway, N.Y. An exceedingly oily individual of fine address and fine clothes, styling himself "Wm. Koppell," the Superintendent Attorney of "Mur in & Co.," has recently been canvassing Western Untario for membership in the alleged agency. His plan is to obtain an agreement with a leading law firm in the city or town visited to act as legal agents of the concern in that vicinity, for which favor the law firm are assessed for the first year from \$30 to \$150, according to the size of the district in which they are to do collecting, etc., which assessment is required to be paid in cash. After the contract has been made with the law firm, the agent canvasses the wholesale dealers, bankers, manufacturers, etc., to become members and enjoy the advantages of "the most extensive and reliable mercantile and collecting agency in the Union" for the small fee of from \$50 to \$150 in cash per annum in advance. Our correspondent had occasion to visit New York a few days since, and at the request of some subscribers, who had paid their subscription to Koppell, visited 115 Brondway, and was surprised to find that no firm of A. E. Martin & Co. had offices there, and that in fact their names were not in the New York Directory, nor could any one be found who had even heard of

THE MARITIME BANK.

The President remarked that, comparing this statement with the one published two months ago, some gratifying facts were worthy of mention. The loans, on the other hand, had been curtailed, and the Bank was in a strong position, having nearly \$300,000 in each and other assets available at any moment, besides three-quarters of a million of dollars of loans A still furon call and in current discounts. ther realization of the as-ets is shortly expected, especially of the Albert Road securities. agency at Fredericton was spoken of as opened and likely to do a fair business, as a considerand likely to do a fair outsiness, as a substantial able amount of the stock of the Bank was now half by Fredericton people. The fact that several hundred shares, in addition to those taken in Fredericton, had recently been sold here to men of means and influence, who would at once bring strength and business to the Bank, was mentioned as another thing likely to increase the credit and standing of the Bank. The main reason why the meeting adjourned until to-day was to consider whether the shareholders approved of the recommendation of the Directors in their Report that the 3,000 shares now unallotted should be allotted. This would give more capital, improve its position, and prepare the way for having the Bank's stock brought from i's nominal to its real value; and the shareholders unanimously agreed to this being done. The position and prospects of the Bank appeared to give the shareholders much gratification.

NORTHERN ASSURANCE CO.

The forty-sixth annual general meeting of this Company was held within their house in Aberdeen, on Friday, the 9th June, 1882. Alexander Davidson, Esq., chairman of the Aberdeen Board, in the chair. The accounts and Balance Sheet of the Company for the year 1881, with the following Report, were laid on the table and (laving been already circulated among the Shareholders) taken as read:—

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS.

The premiums received last year in the fire department again showed an increase over those of the previous year, having been \$2,257,4435, as compared with \$2,222,993 in 1880. The losses, as in many other offices in 1881, were heavy, and amounted to \$1,437,631; or 63.68 ber cent. of the premiums. This ratio is higher than that of any year since 1873, and raises the general avorage of the Company's experience from the beginning to 58.08 percent. The expenses of management (including Commission to Agents and charges of every kind) came to \$661,020 or 29.29 per cent. of the premiums, a reduction of 41 per cent compared with the previous year. The result is that, after reserving the usual 33 per cent. of the year's premiums to cover liabilities under current policies, a profit was earned of \$147,300, which sum has been transferred to the credit of the General Account of profit and loss.

the General Account of profit and loss.
Assurance Branch.—The new Assurance during the year in the Life Department reached in the aggregate the sum of \$2,479,280, of which \$812,250 was for Endowment Assurances payable at death or on the attainment of a specified age. These new Assurances yielded Annual premiums amounting to \$90,165, and Single Premiums amounting to \$5,685. The

total income of the year (including interest) was \$1,210,625. The claims amounted to \$612,699, of which the sum of \$11,143 was for Endowments and Endowment Assurances payable during life. The expenses of management (including Commission) were limited to 10 per cent. of the prenium; received. Annuity Branch.—The sum of \$32,973 was received for Annuities granted during the year. The whole Funds of the Life Department now amount to \$7,902,283.

The balance at the credit of profit and loss (including the sum brought forward from the previous year, and the profit on the Fire Account of 1881) amounts, after charging the interim dividend of \$5 per share paid in December last, to \$546,004. Out of this sum the Directors recommend that a further dividend of \$5 and a bonus of \$21 per share be now declared, making a total distribution of profits for the year of \$375,000, and leaving \$321,004 to be carried forward. Mr. Davidson, Mr. Thompson, and Mr. Mathews, of the Aberdeen Board, retire on this occasion, and offer themselves for re-election. Colonel Baring, Sir Wm. Miller, and Mr. Walkinslaw, of the London Board, also retire, and offer themselves for re-election. Mr. Hector F. McLean has resigned his seat at the Edinburgh Board, and Mr. Matthew Montgomerie Bell, W. S., of the firm of Messrs. Dalgleish and Bell, has been elected a member of that Board. Mr. Robert Mackenzie, the younger, of Caldarvan, a partner in the firm of Messrs. Mackenzie, Gardner and Alexander, has been elected a member of the Glasgow Board. A local Committee has been established at Newcastle, similar to that founded at Bristol a few years ago, for the purpose of assisting in extending the business of the Company in the north of England. The General Court has been fortunate in securing the services of the following gentlemen, as members of this Committee:—Mr. David Dale, Darlington; Mr. George Anthony Fenwico, Newcastle; Mr. Thomas Gow, Cambo, Northunberland; Mr. Charles W. C. Henderson, The Riding, Hexham; Mr. John Rogerson, Croxdale Hull, Darlam; Mr. Thomas Taylor, Chipchase Castle, Northumberland.

Mr. J. A. Sinclair and Mr. James Glegg, the Auditors, retire in conformity with the Company's Act of incorporation, but offer themselves for re-election. Mr. E. H. Mannering laving resigned the service of the Company to accept an appointment in another office, the Directors have appointed Mr. Valentine sole

The foregoing Report having been received and adopted, the following Resolutions were passed unanimously:—1. That a dividend of 20s and a bonus of 10s per share, free of income tax, be now declared, making with the amount already paid, a total distribution of 50s per share in respect of the year 1881. 2. That Mr. Davidson, Mr. Thompson, and Mr. Mathews be re-elected members of the Aberdeen Board. 3. That Colonel Baring, Sir. Wm. Miller, and Mr. Walkinshaw be re-elected members of the London Board. 4. That Mr. James Augustus Sinchair and Mr. James Glegg by re-elected Auditors. The meeting then adjourned.

CUSTOMS STATISTICS.

Customs returns for the month of August at Winnipeg were \$103,827.04.

The Inland revenue receipts at Toronto for August were \$82,841; for the corresponding month of 1881, \$40,111.

Inland revenue collections at Belleville for August were \$8,139.02; like period last year \$6,424.44; increase \$1,714.58.

Inland Revenue returns at Ottawa for August amount to \$10,562, an increase of \$8,687 over the like period last year.

The Oustoms duties collected at Guelph, Ont., for August amounted to \$6,733.70, against \$4,974.70 for the corresponding mouth last year, an increase of \$1,759.

Customs receipts at St. John, N.B., for August ult. were \$88,706, an increase of \$8,441 over August last year. The inland revenue receipts were \$29,748, an increase of \$3,717.

Customs returns at Toronto for the past month were \$556,233, the highest ever received at that port in one month. Like period last year, \$521,037.

The Customs collections at Victoria, B.C., in August were \$89,500, \$48,000 in excess of the corresponding month last year, and \$25,000 higher than ever before.

Receipts at Halifax Custom House for August amounted to \$127,082 - n decrease compared with the like period last year of \$3,235. Inland revenue for August \$18,379, an increase over August last year of \$4,020.

The daties collected at the Inland Revenue office, London, for the mouth ending 31st August, 1882: Tobacco, \$8,737.43; Spirits, \$10,617.26; Malt, \$2,005.56; other revenues, \$795.86; total, \$22,256.05; same month last year, \$24,614.03; decrease, \$2,357.98.

The following is a comparative return of the Customs duties at Ottawa for the past month and the like period of 1881: 1882—entered for consumption, \$104,677; duty collected, \$36,666; 1881—entered for consumption, \$120,910; duty collected, \$23,093, thus showing an increase in the amount of goods entered in the month of August, 1882, over that of August, 1881, of \$43,734, and in the amount of duty collected an acrease of \$7,972.13.

The great majority of our wholesale merchants have returned from their annual vacation, and the Fall trade activity is commencing to be felt in some departments, but is not expected to become general for another fortnight. A good many dry goods buyers have been in the market this week, and business in this branch continues active; groceries also bave been more active; leather firm with an upward tendency in values; boots and shoes steady and active; oils firm with a scarcity of cod in the market; dairy produce and provisions dull, and other branches quiet and unchanged. It is alleged that abnormal rates of interest on deposits are being offered by some of the smaller banks, 5 and even 6 per cent, being the figure in some cases. It would be interesting to know the nature of the investments for such funds. Another probable indication of a slight hardening in the market is the gradual disposal of some \$300,000 worth of a leading stock by one of the Canadian Pacific Syndicate. This may have no other indication than the usual requirements of persons engaged in gigantic enterprises. The market for Sterling Exchange quiet and steady at 1082 to 109 between banks, and 1093 over the counter. Advices from Ogdeusburg, N.Y., report sales of 1,000 boxes to a Montreal house at 11 3-16c, and ,000 boxes to another firm here at 11 to to 3-16, showing that there are parties here who have still considerable faith in the future of prices. At Ingersoll this week, twenty-one factories registered 9,245 boxes cheese, all August make, except 3 factories offering first half August. All the leading houses continue busy and report trade about equal to expectations, while country merchants are generally feeling jubilant over the good crops. In the home goods market knitted goods and blankets are rather scarce, and figured dress patterns are selling well, bronzed tinges being in special demand. Surged contings also continue in good request. Payments continue fair, but until the 4th of next month little of interest can be stated concerning remittances, as there are few notes maluring this month. Prospects for good fall payments were probably never better.

Daugs and Chemicals.—The month has opened well, with a good general demand, and the prospects for a lively full business are bright and cheering. In prices there is little change to note. Quining has slightly weakened in the New York market, and speculators have entirely withdrawn. Here the price is auchanged. Borax is a little lower, and Cod Liver Oil, new, has been sold in quantity at \$1.70 per imperial gallon, and now \$1.75 is asked. The Cod fishing has been a partial failure both in Norway and Newfoundland, hence the great advance in price. The English Chemical market is unchanged, prices being fully maintained, with Soda Ash slightly firmer.

FISH AND GAME.—There is not much offering yet, and the demand also is light, it being rather too early in the season. Dry Cod is selling at \$5.65 to \$5.70, and Cape Breton No. 1 Herrings at \$5.60 to \$5.75. North Shore Salmon is quoted at \$21, \$20 and \$19 respectly for Nos. 1, 2 and 3. No California Salmon in the market. The game season has opened, the supply as yet being small. Black ducks are selling at 75c per pair, grey ducks at 40c per pair, and teal at 30c per pair. A tew woodcock have been received, and were placed at once at \$1 per pair. Snipe is firm at 50c per pair, and plover at 60c per pair. Partridges are expected in the market shortly.

FRUIT .- Business continues good. The demand is chiefly for Peaches, of which receipts from Delaware and Jersey have been rather large, and are selling in baskets at \$2 to \$2.50, and in crates at \$3 to \$4 each. The crop in these States this year is heavy, while in many parts of Ontario it is reported a failure, on the whole little better than one-third of what it was last year. Chicago wheat market has continued irregular; to-day prices for wheat declined about 1e per bushel in Chicago, while corn advanced about \$\frac{1}{2}\$ for September delivery, and \$\frac{1}{2}\$ for options. The local grain market has ruled opict and nominally unchanged, all week. There were sales yesterday of 10,000 bushels Toledo Red winter wheat at \$1.12 for prompt shipment, and 20,000 bushels ditto on spot at \$1.10 canada Spring Wheat is quoted at \$1.20 to \$1.25. White Winter at \$1.16 to \$1.19, and Red Winter at \$1.30 to \$1.35. In course grains busidess very dull, and prices expected to rule nominal until the new crop arrives. The flour market has been dull and declining for the past week, caused chiefly by the weak and drooping English markets. Quotations for all grades show an average decline of about 15c on last week's prices. Oatmed is very scarce, owing to the curtailment of supplies from Ottawa, and price has advanced to \$6.

GROCERIES.—Sugars a shade casier for granulated, 9c to 94c. Yellow Refined steady, with moderate demand for lower qualities, while the higher grades are more active. In the West Indies grocery Sugars there is dullness. Mollasses.—Barbadoes scarce, also for sugars and prices are firm. Sale of 100 puns. Barbadoes reported at 53c, held at 55c to 57c for choice. Antigua 49c to 52c, Trinidad 47c to 50c. Syrup steady. Teas—Consumptive demand is rather on the increase. Country traders are getting down in stock, and are more disposed to replenish. The values of Japan teas are but little altered. Some invoices nave found sale lately at moderate figures. Young Hyson and other China Green teas as well as Blacks quiet. Rice is dull, \$3.50 to \$3.85 for good as to quantity. Coffees hold about values for some time current for all kinds. Consumption of the genuine is rather on the increase, and the low prices should stimulate its use. Spicos nominally with but little of alteration for week for all kinds. Trade moderate. Fruits.—New Valentias are here 94c to 104c. No new Malaga Raisins yet. Crop 1881 is held at about late figures. Currants not plenty, but first of new crop is not far off. Valentias open precty high on Smyrna, and Figs at full rates. The drought has affected quality and quantity.

HAROWARE AND IRON.—As announced in our last report, the travellers are starting out this week, and some have already made a good commencement. There is every prospect of a good steady demand being experienced for all kinds of shelf and heavy hardware, at firm prices, especially for metals. A good many buyers are expected in the market during the forthcoming Provincial Exhibition in this city. Payments continue good.

Hides and Skins.—Offerings of native Hides, though not large, are equal to the usual average at this time of year, and dealers are still paying butchers 84c, 74c and 64c respectively for Nos. 1, 2 and 3. Tanners are charged 4c to 1c advance on these figures. Western Hides are reported in good request, and No. 1 Buff is selling at 104c to 104c, and No. 2 do quoted at 84c to 94c. Sheepskins have advanced this month to 70c to 80c each, as to size. Calfskins merely nominal at 14c per 1b.

MILLINERY.—Tuesday and Wednesday of this week were opening days in all our large houses, and the attendance of buyers from all parts of the country was unusually large. The occasion is most appropriately termed by the trade "fair" day, for certainly it would be difficult

to collect so many of the fair, gentler sex, a la mode, by any other attraction than the well-assorted displays of new and costly varieties of millinery goods shown in Montreal this week. There have, been more Western buyers in the city than in previous seasons, being attracted to the larger market, and possibly influenced somewhat by the unsurpassed pleasure of a sail down the St. Lawrence. In hats the shapes are larger this season, with a great many novelties in fancy trimmings; feathers especially prevail. In colors the cade blue is the newest shade; crushed strawberry and acajon or mahogany are also leading colors, while brown, bronze, and myrtle are still popular. Buckles seem to be about the only ornaments worn to any extent Plush and ottoman are the fashionable fa key ribbons. while in plain descriptions sain and plush reversible will take the lead. The leading article in mantles is mantclasse, made up to be worn with the "dress-improver." Brocaded velvets, in large patterns, will be the correct thing for early fail wear. Want of time precludes a more extended review, but the above-mentioned include all the principal styles and fashions this season.

LEATHER. --Market continues firm, without material change or much increased movement since the date of our last report. A good steady demand is advised for all kinds, and the tendency in prices seems to be upward. The market is fairly supplied with everything except the best B. A. Sole and possibly Waxed upper, for which latter the demand is now light, manifecturers having been pretty well supplied. Several round lots of Sole leather, of from 1,000 to 3,000 sides early, have changed hands at 26c to 27c for No. 1 B. A., and 23c to 25c for No. 2, as to quality. Holders of Bull are asking 17c, an advance of 1c on last week's price, for the best heavy qualities. Upper also firm with holders asking Ic advance, and bayers offering 4c better; several lots of two to three tons each of Quebec Splits have been sold at about 22c to 224c. Quebec tanners continue making shipments to Rugland, and a round lot of Splits was forwarded from this market this week.

LUMBER.—The demand is quiet, and prices remain fixed and firm; as the surplus stock will not be heavy very few concessions need be looked for this season. Local trade is dull, especially in building material, as very few buildings are being erected this season.

Oils.—Nothing doing in Linseed and prices unchanged, quoted from 72c to 75c boiled, and 70c to 73c for raw. Turpentine 72c to 75c; quiet. It appears that stocks of cod oil are scarcer in Newfoundland and Halifax than here, and fresh supplies caunot, it is said, be laid down in this market from either of these places at under 65c, hence holders are very firm; sales are reported of 3,000 gals at 63c. Imp. measure. Steam refined Seal continues scarce and firm also, with reported transactions in round lots at 72½c.

Petroleum.—We quote an advance since 1st September of \$\frac{1}{2}c\$ per gal. in Petrolea, to \$15\frac{1}{2}c\$, equal to \$19c\$ here, in car lots, although several merchants, having contracted at lower figures, are not insisting upon the advanced pricest Locally speaking prices are, 18\frac{1}{2}c\$ cars, 19c part cars, and single bris \$19\frac{1}{2}c\$ by grocers where other goods are purchased, 20c by regular oil dealers.

Provisions.—In Liverpool yesterday lard and bacon each advanced is. The Chicago hog market was quiet;—estimated receipts were 14,000 hogs, against Tuesday's official account of 12,046. Pork received another severe reverse, selling down 42½c per bbl. to \$21.32½c October, \$20.02½ November. Lard was unusually weak, and 25c per 100 lbs. lower, the closing rates being 26c. Little or no change has occurred in the local

market since our last reference. The demand has continued light, and business of a jobbing character, confined to filling small city and country orders. Prices for nearly everything remain stendy at the figures last quotes. A fair enquiry has been experienced for Lard, and several hundred pails in lots of 100 each have changed hands at 14½c for Ganada and 15½c for Fairbanks'. Little or no demand for Bacon or Hams, and Mess Pork quiet and unchanged. Receipts of Eggs are reported liberal, and the demand being light with a good sapply, prices are easier, quoted at 18c to 20c; some holders would readily accept 19c. New York market reported firm at 24c to 24½c.

Wines and Liquous.—There has been a slight advance in Gins, other liquors remain unchanged. Travellers have returned from Fall trip, orders for which have been extensive, and the houses are now busily engaged in filling same. Fayments remorted good.

Wook.—In this market during the week about 1,000 bales of Cape have been sold on the spot and for early delivery at 17½ to 19c. In Australian no movement reported. The American markets have been a little more active during the week, and London is reported firm, with sales at full prices of the last series.

- TORONTO WHOLESALE MARKETS.

(By Special Telegraph.)

Tononto, Sept. 7, 1882.

The state of trade is entirely satisfactory, as regards its extent and the prospects of payment.

Recently seasonable dry goods find a good market, which indicates a line of wants among consumers that can only be indulged by comparatively well-of people. Hardware is perhaps the best of all the classes of business. Demand is steady, and prices firm and advancing. Groceries are not active in any one house, but there is a large and good trade being done. Indeed it is certain that the aggregate business of the year will be larger and quite as safe and profitable as good judgment would predict. The Exhibition was opened yesterday, and while the retail trade look for an increase of business in some directions, the wholesale men do not expect to be much the gainers. A regular course of trade is in every respect, and both to buyers and sellers, preferable to the excitement of Exhibition time. The harvest in the country west of Toronto is finished, but threshing must be done, and seeding also, before there is a general movement. It is now said that bank accommodation will not cost any higher rate of interest than what is asked at present in ordinary transactions. There is going to be plenty of money. Discounts are charged for at the rates of 6 and 7 per cent. Loans effected at 6 and 61 per cent. New York Exchange cheap at 1 and 1 per cent. Stocks have been irregular. In banks, Montreal has sold down to 2103; Toronto has been variable, the closing bids being highest. Commerce has been steady; Dominion sold up to a greater tigure than had been expected; Standard, steady; Imperial slightly improved; Federal steady. The Loan Companies have been steady in the majority of cases; but the extent of business done has been very limited. In banks Imperial, Dominion, Commerce, Federal, Standard and Ontario have been most active.

Fuel.—A singular freak of commercial spunk has developed the circumstance that coal is now being sold at \$5.50 per ton, a certain loss of 50 cents on every ton of full weight. Wood, best, \$5 per cord; mixed \$4.

COAL OIL.—There is no change in prices, the American oils, of which only a small proportion are sold, are 23c for prime, and 25c for water white. Canadian refined unchanged at 18c. Crude at wells \$1.40. Business is increasing.

FREIGHTS.—The Grand Trunk Freight department has issued the new tariff. The rates between Sarnia and Montreal appear to be on the old basis of 25c perbarrel on flour from Toronto to Montreal. But the rates on flour to the Lower Provinces and seaboard are higher than previously. Taking Sarnia as the point of departure, the rate is to L'Islet 67c; to Rivière du Loup 73c; and to Moncton 80c; to Richmond 88c; to Windsor Junction 75c; to St.

John 75c. The high rates will lessen the price of flour here, and increase the price at the other end.

FLOUR AND MEAL .- There has been very little done here in sales since last reporting. Superior Extra, Old Standard, has been sold at \$5.35 and \$5.40, and new Standard Superior Extra at \$5.50 for a small lot. Stocks are light, about 750 barrels. *Outmeal* is held at \$6 and \$6.25. Cornmeal is still sold in small lots at \$4.25. Bran is quoted at \$12.50, but held at

WHEAT. - There are no receipts by car, and those from farmers' waggons are insignificant. The price is unsettled. It is quoted at about \$1.08 or \$1.09 for new. No. 2 fall old wheat is 7c or 8c dearer. There are various opinions about what the price will be, but a leading produce man said to-day that he would not like to give more than \$1 for No. 2 fall for September delivery. The stock here is 51,766 bushels against 71,000 corresponding week of last year.

COARSE GRAINS .- Barley has not made its appearance yet on 'Change. There is known to be a large crop, and that it is generally brown colored. Prices seem likely to rule between 60c and 70c. Oats are coming in now and coming down in price. They are selling now about 40c to 42c, just 20 cents low r than two weeks ago. Peas are nominally 75c. Rye was sold on the street at 65c.

LIVE STOCK TRADE.—The market here is not really very large. Most of the cattle for export are shipped through from outside stations to Montreal direct. The principal receipts here are for local consumption. Good export entile are still bought at 5½c and 6c for best. Good butchers' cattle are bought at 4¢ to 4½c. There butchers cattle are bought at 45 to 446. There have been about 400 head within the week. Sheep have been in moderate and sufficient supply at 44c to 5c. Lambs are plentiful at good prices; best \$4, second \$3.50, interior \$3 to \$3.25. Hogs sell at 7c to 72c per 1b. live

GROCERIES.—The trade is fair, but not brisk. Profits are moderate. There is no change of any importance in quotations. Fruit is still good stock, and prices firm. There is no extra good stock, and prices brill. There is no extra movement in sugars, and prices are unchanged; Scotch refined, 7½c to 8c; Paris lump, 103c to 10½c; standard granulated, 9½c to 9½c; Canadian refined, 7½c to 8½c; Porto Ricos, 7½c to 7½c for dark to fair, and 8c to 8½c for bright to choice. Tobaccos, dark; 38c to 4/c; Western Leat 28c to 42c Richets 48c to 57c and choice. leaf, 38c to 42c; Brights, 48c to 57c, and choice 70c to 80c. Fish is scarce and no in demand; dry cod \$6 to \$6.50. There is no trout in the market.

DRUGS AND CHEMICALS .- It is said that a fair business is being done at present. There are few changes in prices. American apples are sold at \$2.75 to \$3. Hogs continue to be bought at 85.50 to \$10.0 n the street. Potatoes are 80c to 85c a bag. Poultry firm at 60c to 65c per pair for fowls; 60c to 70c per pair for ducks; and \$1 to \$1.50 for turkeys. Hops are out of the market, no price is named. The crop is light but the quality will be good this year.

HARDWARE.-There is a good and profitable trade being done. The market has been firm and advancing. All stock is good, and the de_ mand strong and healthy. There has been an advance of 10c on cut nails, and the prices are now, per keg of 100 lbs, 10d to 60d \$2.95 to \$3.10; 8d to 9d \$3.10 to \$3.20; 6d to 7d \$3.20 to \$3.30; 4d and 5d \$3.30 to \$3.40; 3d \$3.50.

Hides and Skins .- The market has been steady, the demand good, and stocks light, for all hides; cured are worth 9c, selected.
