# Statistics of Methodism in Canada, U. S. and throughout the world.



## ECUMENICAL METHODISM.

Except Lutheranism, Methodism is now the largest form of Protestantism in the world. It has 38,000 ministers and at least twenty-eight millions of members and adherents, equal to the total population of England at Wesley's death. Apart from many scattered missions, it has Conferences organized in England, Ireland, France, Switzerland, Germany, Italy, Bulgaria, Scandinavia, South Africa, India, Australia, China, Japan, New Zealand, Canada, the United States, the West Indies, Mexico and South America. It annually gives three millions of dollars for Missions.



## Constitutional History of Canadian Methodism.

- 1765—Methodism introduced into Newfoundland.
- 1766—Methodism introduced into New York.
- 1784—Organization of the M. E. Church in the United States.
- 1786—Organization of the Eastern British American Conference.
- 1791**—(Year of Wesley's death).—Methodism introduced into Upper Canada by the M. E. Church.
- 1815—Wesleyan Methodism introduced into Lower Canada.
- 1824—First Session of the Upper Canada Conference of the M. E. Church.
- 1827—Secession of the Ryanites.
- 1828—Amicable separation of the Upper Canada Conference of the M. E. Church from the parent body of the United States.

- 1830—Commencement of the work of the P. M. Church in Canada.
- 1831—Commencement of the work of the B. C. Church in Prince Edward Island and in Ontario.
- 1833—Union between the W. M. Church in England and the larger part of the M. E. Conference of Upper Canada. The discussion of the historical question as to which portion of this Conference perpetuated its former legal identity, those who went into this union or those who kept out, has excited much interest and some warmth. Happily this was all superseded fifty years after, in the broader union of 1883.
- 1837—N. C. M. Church introduced into Canada.
- 1841—Union of the W. M. Conference in Canada with the parent body in England severed.
- 1848—The said Union was reformed and continued until 1874.
- 1853—Primitive Methodist Conference organized in Canada.
- 1854—The Lower Canada Wesleyan Missionary District which was not affected by the union of either 1833 or 1848, united with the W. M. Church of Canada.
- 1874—Union of the W. M. Church of Canada, the W. M. Church of Eastern British America, and the N. C. Methodist Church of Canada, forming “the Methodist Church of Canada.”
- 1883—Union of the Methodist Church of Canada, the M. E. Church, the P. M. Church and the B. C. Church in Canada, forming “the Methodist Church.”
