The City is Growing. Assessment Commissioner Hall handed out to day the returns of the assessment for 1808. The figures show an increase of \$1,237,530 over those of 1897. The total assessment is \$31,050,630, of which \$26,-971,410 is Hable to taxation. The real es-tate assessment of \$22,243,618, shows an increase of \$315,268; the income assessment shows an increase of \$894,862, standing now at \$1,684,512. To reach this, however, Commissioner Hall's men have placed con-siderable burdens on some of the big city firms. The Canada Life had their assess-ment raised from \$34,000 to \$82,000, and the Hamilton Provident and Loan from \$50,000 to \$85,000.




