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DISEASED IMMIGRANTS.

42 of Them May Be Sent Back to Russia.

Quebec, June 1.-Forty-two foreign immigrants were landed at this port yesterday from the steamer Lakes Champlain, and were sent to the Jeffrey Hale and Hotel Des Hospitaliers.

Yesterday the medical examination of immigrants who arrived by the Lakes Champlain, showed that 42 steerage passengers, destined to settle in Canada and the United States, were infected with trachoma.

They were classed as diseased immigrants, for a minute examination, in order to determine whether they would be allowed to remain, or be deported.

This information was communicated to them, when they threatened to become turbulent. Dr. Doyle, chief immigration agent, requested the services of the Provincial Police, and under guard of a detachment from this force, the infected immigrants were taken to the city hospital, where they will remain until their cases are looked into, with the prospect of being returned to Russia at the expense of the steamship company who brought them to Quebec.

EXPECT TO MAKE ARREST SOON.

Authorities Making Progress in the Collingwood Murder Case.

Provincial Detective Greer returned to Collingwood yesterday to continue the investigation of the Whalen murder. The coroner's jury will hold another session to-morrow.

Attorney-General asserted yesterday that an arrest was expected in a day or two. The impression is gaining that some definite clue is in the possession of the authorities, and facts of a startling character will be brought out at the next session of the jury.

In the meantime active work is being done by the authorities of Ontario in watching for suspects from the neighborhood of Collingwood.

CHASING THE NEGRO.

One Found in Belleville is Locked up by Order.

Belleville, June 1.-Chief Newton of this city this morning received the following telegram from Collingwood: 'Arrest a negro with one sock on seen in York street yesterday.'

'James Wilda, Chief of Police.' The negro who was seen in the park yesterday was arrested, but he had two socks on. He gives his name as Charles Walter Scott, and says that he came from Ottawa. He is 31 years of age. His arrest is in connection with the murder of little girl.

Half Go Back to Work. Lowell, Mass., June 1.-After nine weeks idleness, the men of the Root, Merriman, Tremont and Suffolk reduced manufacturing corporations resumed work with fully 50 per cent. of the usual working forces.

Figures made public by the mill agents thru Agent W. S. Southworth, secretary of the Cotton Manufacturers' Association, tend to show that the efforts of the Textile Council to enforce the demand for a 10 per cent. increase in wages is being met. The Council, however, claims that the strike has just begun.

The officers of the union, in which are concentrated the skilled craft do not admit that the strike has been broken during the day or that the mills can continue to run.

All corporations ran during the day with every appearance of customary activity. No objection was offered to the return of the mill help to their work, and at no gate was anything but the best feeling manifested by those going in and those staying out.

Let the Work Live. New Haven, Conn., June 1.-W. H. P. New, president of the W. H. P. Association, delivered the anniversary address tonight to the graduating class of the Yale Divinity School. Dr. Faunce, in referring to the popular idea of the possession of 'the fittest,' said:

'The fittest, delicate infant may be more likely to die than the robust man, a sparkling intellect confined to a sick chamber may be more likely to die than the man of a sturdy build.'

'If the race were to crum the weak and sick, and let only the strong survive, it would destroy human love and those tender sensibilities which are the possession of all, and which sometimes makes life worth living.'

Dr. Faunce suggested that foreign immigrants might live more in consonance with the ideal of the Yale Divinity School, from divine inspiration, rather than from the government of which they are citizens.

GOVERNOR FIRED TO AMBUSH

Invited to See Frontier Town in Algiers, Finds Walls Loopholed and Manned.

THEN FIRED UPON FROM THE CITY

Escort Attacked by Large Band, But Sharpshooters Drive Them Off.

London, June 1.-Advice from Algeria report that M. Jonnart, Governor-General, was attacked by a band of 5000 men near Figiug while journeying from Djennan-Ed-Dar to Benouif on a large party. A brisk fusillade ensued, in which thirteen persons were seriously wounded. M. Jonnart was not hurt.

Later despatches from Benouif show that the attack on the Governor-General might have had the greatest consequences. M. Jonnart, who was recently appointed to the Governor-Generalship, was making a tour of inspection. Speaking at a banquet at Djennan-Ed-Dar Friday, he announced that a number of guns would be sent to the port to complete its armament, and added:

'Actions speak louder than words, and we do not need to dissimulate. Without encroaching on the domain of diplomacy, we mean to enforce all our rights, and we are not going to defend the honor of our country by force.'

M. Jonnart left Djennan-Ed-Dar at 10 o'clock Saturday morning. Arriving at Figiug, he was met by the Amier of Figiug, who invited him to enter the Zengua Valley, a series of gorges which are very beautiful. The party advanced to within 1000 yards of Figiug, and inspected the town, all the walls of which were loopholed and manned. The women in the town raised loud cries.

After observing the scene for some minutes, M. Jonnart, who was accompanied by a French sharpshooter, proceeded to the town, and was followed by a fusillade, which a company of French sharpshooters who were with the Governor-General's party returned as well as the difficult nature of the ground permitted.

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The Amier of Figiug expressed indignation at the attack and promised to punish the rebels. He was doubtful whether he has the means to enforce order. It is reported that the attacking party, which numbered 5000 men, returned to Figiug with heavy losses, several Moors having been killed by the French sharpshooters. The Amier of Figiug is endeavoring to capture the caravan raiders, and an ultimatum has been sent to the rebels to surrender.

M. Jonnart's party had returned by the way it entered, over the Zengua Pass, where he was surrounded by a band of 5000 men. He was wounded in the arm and leg, but he escaped.

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ONE CRITIC ON SIR WILLIAM

Time That Free Rural Mail Delivery Was Inaugurated in Dominion of Canada.

BUT P.M.G.'S REPORT SAYS NOTHING

Our Departmental Returns Compared With That of Lord Londonderry of Great Britain.

A correspondent who has been delving into the Postmaster-General's report writes to The World the following criticism:

Sir William Mulock has been so much to the fore of late, especially in connection with his melodramatic failure to settle the longshoremen's strike, that an examination of his report as Postmaster-General may prove of interest.

In the first place, it has been conclusively shown that his department does not show a surplus, as he announced, but that the loss was produced by the unaccountable expenditure of excluding the cost of the Yukon and Alaskan districts from his returns. This is an ancient history now, but it is far less generally known that this same course has been pursued since 1880—thereby decreasing the deficits.

In order to examine the report more closely, it will help us considerably to compare it with the report issued by the Postmaster-General in England.

Attention is at once drawn to the difference in the size of the two reports. The English report is a huge mass of 444,465,870 or 72,329,350, it would naturally be expected that the English report would be a far larger book than the Canadian, with a gross revenue of \$5,128,118, but the contrary is the case.

The first is a modest little volume of 88 pages, the second a huge book with 530. It must also be borne in mind that the former deals also with matters concerning the telegraph and telephone services, which the latter does not.

What part does Sir William really take in the management of his department? His only contribution to the report is a short letter, addressed to Lord Minto, submitting it, but every other statement is signed by Mr. Coulter. It may be that he is too busy "fighting like a lion" in the cabinet, to have any time to spare for the report he is paid to do. Lord Londonderry, on the other hand, signs the full report.

Free Rural Delivery. The most satisfactory feature of the Canadian report is the steady yearly increase shown in the revenue after the reductions in the domestic and foreign rates of postage. To our minds, this shows that the postal facilities offered, the greater the returns, and that it is time that free delivery in all cities, as well as in rural districts, was introduced.

This system is not in the experimental stage, and rural delivery in the States as well as in England, is a great success. It would mean not only increased revenue here, but the saving of an enormous amount of time to our hard-working, busy population, and the rendering of the postal service to the rural population by being placed in easy communication with the rest of the world. It is scarcely a feather in Sir William's cap for us to show, by the following extract from a letter written by Mr. Burns, that the public have already initiated the system in the County of Perth, Ont.:

"Our system of mail delivery is an attempt to enable us to receive and transmit mail with some sort of regularity, instead of the haphazard plan of going six miles to St. Mary's for it. As yet, as far as I know, the system only concerns a number of homesteads situated on one concession leading from the village of Kirkton, but there is no reason why it should not be extended to other concessions. The system has become a feature of our account of our living within the sphere of operations of the St. Mary's Creamery Co., which is a very busy separator station at Kirkton, to which the milk from most of the farms on our concession line is delivered every week in summer, and tri-weekly in winter. During the last summer the milk was delivered to the separator station week to all those families who wished it for the six months at a net cost of 50 cents per family."

"During the winter, the patrons of the creamery draw the milk, 'turn about' for three times a week, and, therefore, can deliver the milk Monday, Wednesday and Friday at the separator station without a cent of cash outlay. Of course, we might have a daily delivery in summer, but as no one takes a daily paper, it was thought to be unnecessary. With the system now in full operation, it is considered it an improvement even on having a postoffice within a mile."

Take a Daily Paper. Incidentally, we should like to say in connection with this letter, how much we regret to see that "no one takes a daily paper" in the same form as this country expect to be properly governed, and to put an end to the political corruption which is eating like a cancer into its very life, and sending up the taxes by leaps and bounds, that should pay the cost of the paper, in order to be able to form an independent opinion of their own political and other matters. Politicians simply live on their ignorance.

No less than 155 pages are devoted to "Mail Transportation" in the Canadian report. This means that the names, addresses, and names of contractors, and the number of trips, period and cost are given for the transportation of mail. For instance, one man carries the mail an eighth of a mile, twelve times a day for a year, and receives \$75.12 for doing so. What purpose is served in publishing all this, with the large clerical work it must entail? The English report does not give it, and, worst of all, it can also be seen in the Auditor-General's report, that the cost is charged against "Trades and Customs." Why is this? The English report gives full particulars, including, also, the date and length of contract, what services are required of the vessels, the deductions for overtime, the penalty for general non-performance, and various other details.

As the 201 pages are occupied by the list of accounting and non-accounting offices in the Dominion, and the compensation, salaries and allowances paid to each officer, together with their gross postal revenue, the number and amount of money orders issued, etc. This is given, as well, in a more condensed form in the Auditor-General's report. This is surely unnecessary repetition and expense. A footnote in this table informs us that, in many cases, the contractors are paid "commissions on box rents." The amount thus paid was \$10,880,832. Why is it so hard enough to have to pay for a box, to have to fetch your own mail, thereby saving the postoffice a great deal of labor, and practically paying it for the privilege of saving its own time, without having to pay commissions too. This matter requires looking into.
