





## RAIN CAME JUST IN TIME TO SAVE GRAIN CROPS

Many Fields of Barley and Oats as Well as Pasture Lands Were Burning Up.

"This rain has made thousands of dollars for the Ontario farmer," said a York County farmer yesterday. Thruout the whole district surround ing Toronto, grain crops were suffering and this steady rain has come in the nick of time to save the situa-

The hay crop has about been gathered in, and its yield was considerably curtailed by reason of the dry weather. It is now felt that hay is not going to be as plentiful as it was expected early in the season.

The oat crop has done well, being better than for the past three years, but the hot weather was hastening it too fast, so that above all others this one stands to gain. The parched fields one stands to gain. The parched fields will be given moisture to fill and late sown crops will be materially helped by the shower.

sown, and this has been ripening so fast that its harvest would have commenced in a few days. Fields that were perfectly green a week ago have assumed the yellow tinge of harvest time. Already wheat and rye fields are in shock in several places.

The pastures have been poor this week, say some dairymen. The cows have eaten clean the abundant growth of the early summer and unless corn of the early summer and unless corn has been planted as a green crop, there will be a big shortage in milk yields soon, as well as a falling off in

beef making.
One farmer of South Ontario who by the way, is not the proverbial grumbler, told The World that farmers are not going to have extra good returns this fall. In this man's case the apple crop is a failure, and the late dry weather had hastened the late grain too much. However, the day's moisture will mean much improvement to Ontario's farm outlook.

Prayers Offered for Rain. ST. JOHN, N.B., July 17.—Owing to the excessive drought prevailing during the past three weeks, the straw-berry crop in New Brunswick has be-come almost a total failure, and unless rain comes soon other fruit crops will In some districts prayers are being offered for rain.



SLAVES EIGHTEEN YEARS

Nineteen Survivors of Band of South Sea Islanders Who Were Kidnapped - Tourists Now.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 17 .- Nineteen survivors of several hundred South Sea Islanders, kidnapped 18 years ago from their native strand and sold into slavery among the coffee plantations of Guatemala, arrived here on the steamer City of Para.

They are free and homeward bound, and in addition to this they are traand in addition to this they are traveling as tourists with their government paying expenses. The natives were kidnapped by Captain Blackburn, now dead, who visited the islands in his steamer, the Monserrat, and enticing them aboard, sailed away. They were supposed to be contract laborers bound to their Guatemalan employers for three years.

Ignorant of the language, and in a Ignorant of the language, and in a land where the law is sometimes the dictators' will, it was easy to keep them on the plantation, where they slaved until their plight was made known to the British Government, which, however, was not until 18 years had passed.



# Side Rake and Loader

Ontario Hay Crop is Being Finished in Good Style, -Implements Save Labor-Stackers Being Used -Alfalfa Tried and Found Good.

One piece in South Ontario, near Claremont was sown on the high clay hills and developed a big growth early. This was cut about the above date, and now the second growth is approaching the blossoming stage.

Cutting is done just as soon as the little shoots or buds are seen to be forming at the root stock. It is then, also, that the plant is blossoming. If properly saved this feed is worth its weight in bran, and will feed all farm animals as well as poultry. The avidity with which the animals eat it, makes it necessary to control its feeding.

The hay crop of Ontario is in its final stages of harvesting. Generally speaking we have had more than an average crop and the fine weather has made it possible to see nearly all, even the purely clover fields in first class conditions.

purely clover fields in first class condition.

While a few parts report that the yield is not as great as the spring gave promise of, yet the returns are good enough for anyone, and the manner of the making has been ideal.

Much of this hay has been put into the barns and much has been stacked. The use of the hay fork, the sidedelivery sake and the hay loader, are becoming general. No large farm is now complete without all three, altho there are places where the side delivery rake is dispensed with. These labor-saving haying tools do away with the exceptionally slavish work that was necessary in the old hay fields of Ontario, where men pitched the long timothy and awkward bundles of clover into coils, then on to the wagon, and then to the mows or stacks as the case might be. The hay had to be handled many times and it was no easy work on the hot June and July days. But the presence of a side delivery rake, which is followed up by a hay loader, conveying the hay to the wagon where it is easily taken care of by the man in charge. The wagon then is driven to the barms or stacks where the ingeniously devised hay forks descend into the load and carry off the entire contents in a few minutes. By a defit use of the ropes, this hay is delivered to every part of the mow, so that very little handling is necessary. The hard work of haying has thus been largely eliminated.

Less Men are Required.

Then less men have been required to handle 200 tons of hay as is common on many farms. In the effort to reduce expenses to a minimum, the machines are operated by boys and the home help, so that the extra day men are not so much in demand as formerly. Thus it is that those who have the charge of the haying, have all the work they want to do in handling the crop. At best it is no light work and the helpfulness of invention that has assisted in reducing the laborious manual labor.



Montreal.—There is little change in general trade conditions as reported a week ago. Wholesale drygoods men report no appreciable improvement as yet in the volume of orders nor in general collections. For general groceries there is a fair seasonable movement. Sugar refiners do not find orders quite so good as a week ago, and have not established any advance, as was thought probable, the outside markets for both raw and refined are relatively strong. In the hardware line a better enquiry is reported from the far west, but business with Ontario continues of a slow character. No activity is as yet apparent among the boot and shoe factories, but none of them have any stock of consequence on hand, and leather men predict they cannot defer buying much longer. Tanners are very firm in their ideas with regard to an advance in the near future, and some in the export trade have withdrawn all quotations to England. Further reports regarding the cut of hay, which is a staple crop in this district, are of the unfavorable character last noted. Some northern districts report fair returns, but the yield south of the St. Lawrence is generally poor. District failures for the week are rather heavier than the late average, it insolvencies being reported, with liabilities of \$169,000.
