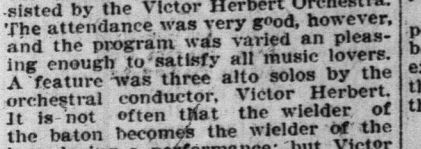

PROFESSION OF POLITICS HAS TEN THOUSAND FOLLOWERS

As Consequence Canada Suffers, Says Hon. Mr. Foster to McMaster Young Men.

Before the Political Science Club of McMaster University, Hon. George E. Foster Monday evening dealt with politics in a broad academic sense. Briefly, what he sought to effect was the clearing of the character of the professional politician and the pointing-out of the qualities that made for success in public life.

The professional politician he likened to the professional man of other lines. He had his undoubted place, like the lawyer and the doctor. He should not be spoken of in a disparaging way any more than the member of any other profession. Canada, in fact, suffered from a lack of men who were in politics as a life occupation. Good men were scarce, and a further point was owing to her long, splendid line of professional statesmen.

Canada wanted young men whose aim in life was to serve the country. There were three great requisites for the work they took upon themselves. First, they must be men of high character, and secondly, they must be men of high ability, and without it nothing could be done. Power of discernment, such as a statesman possesses, can come only from a thorough educational training. Canada was troubled with a host of mushroom politicians who had sprung up in a night, and who lacked grounding.

Power to Adapt.

The power to adapt was the second thing wanted. To focus knowledge to advantage was a gift many men failed to have. A man might be one name for this sort of gift.

Sterling integrity was the third quality that the applicant for political honors needed to carry with him. It didn't pay to be dishonest. "You are not to be taken out," said Mr. Foster, "in other words, the public get on to you."

The speaker wound up an interesting hour by making a further pointer. The blossoming politician must know how to accommodate himself to things as they were. There were two parties to choose from, or the alternative of plowing a lonely furrow. When he was asked what he was nestling himself to, he said that the party whose principles came nearest to agreeing with his own, when it came to smaller details he could go his own way.

The Impossible.

Wherefore did the system of party rule exist? Mr. Foster thought the querist might keep on at this point till he got grey-headed without getting satisfactory reply. He gave his own idea of what would come about if party divisions were cut away and a single free and independent member went to the house. In two weeks they would be a couple of great leaders. There would be party rule again.

He thought there was no greater curse in Canada's public life than the government patronage evil. It bred a class from the lowest strata up, who looked for money gain. In his own experience of public life he had found that the more patronage a government was guilty of, the nearer it was to dissolution.

Grand Trunk Exhibits.

The Grand Trunk has arranged to make two extensive exhibits, one at the Sportsmen's Show in New York City, and the other at the World's Fair in St. Louis. The exhibits will be somewhat similar in both instances. They consist of large photographs, identical with those shown at the World's Fair last year, representing scenes along the route of the railway, in the winter, the summer, the autumn, and where the hunters find their paradise. There will also be moving pictures of the Canadian life, also mounted fish and game. The Sportsmen's Show opens in Madison Square Gardens, New York, and will last for two weeks, and it is expected that 150,000 people will attend.

For the purpose of his exhibit, the G.T.R. has secured 500 square feet of floor space, and 1500 square feet of wall space, so that the pictures may be seen to the best advantage. The traveling picture exhibit will leave Detroit, early in March, and will arrive Milwaukee on the 20th of that month. Subsequently exhibits will be made in other cities of the west.

5000 FEET OF SOUND ICE ONCE LAY OVER ONTARIO

Prof. Coleman Discusses Present Day Conditions Indicating Glacial Wonders of Ages Ago.

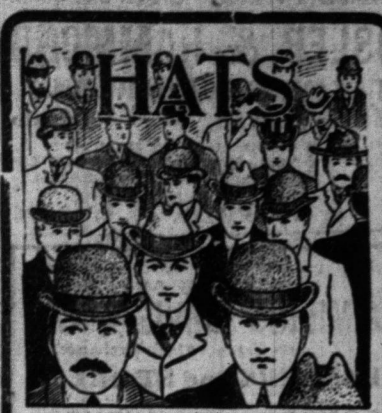

SENATOR CHOQUETTE SUED.

Faces a Suit for \$17,000 Penalties for Infractions Law.

Ottawa, Feb. 28.—(Special.)—Hon. Philippe Auguste Choquette, the gentleman assigned his judgeship in order to become a member of the senate, will probably have to face a suit for \$17,000 penalties. A writ for that amount was issued against him today for infringing the laws relating to the independence of parliament. In the deed the vendor is styled "a member of the senate of Canada."

GREAT OPPORTUNITIES.

Senator Loughheed Sees Trouble From the Autonomy Bill.

Winnipeg, Feb. 28.—(Special.)—Senator Loughheed passed through this city yesterday afternoon his way from Ottawa to Calgary, and took occasion to outline to the World correspondent his views on the constitutional aspects of the autonomy bill. In regard to financial provisions, the senator is of opinion that the total subsidies offered under the various heads are so more than sufficient for the immediate requirements of the two provinces, but that in the long run the provinces are taking into consideration, and that, therefore, to all intents and purposes, there is absolute no provision for compensation in lieu of crown lands.

In this connection he is of opinion that not only would the proposed legislation be a well-being to the new provinces, but it would also tend to ripple their natural development, for by taking out of their hands the control of their own immigration and placing it in those of legislatures at Ottawa, unacquainted with the peculiar needs of the west, it would lead to the continued introduction of a new mass of European settlers, slow and difficult to assimilate.

He also pointed out, in relation to the obvious claims of Calgary to become the administrative centre of Alberta.
