### Unfair Charges Made.

"Perhaps you are asking why I make such a comparison. It is because state-ments have been made in many public places, in which there have been infer-ences that the labor movement is not loyal to the king and country. As to the issue of conscription itself, I will recall that the official attitude of the labor con-crease was absolute composition. They ongress was absolute opposition. They op-posed conscription in language just as strong as that with which they endorsed the cause of the allies. But, after every-thing has been said against it, after the question has been threshed out in almost question has been threshed out in almost every industrial centre and by our repre-sentatives in parliament, we find that the representatives of the people have declared by an almost overwhelming majority that conscription is to be law, and in so far as I represent the labor congress I want to say that the laboring people, as represented by that congress, will accept and obey that law. But let me add, we believe that when conscrip-tion becomes law it should be applied all around, that wealth should be conscript-ed as well as men." ed as well as men."

### Claim Right to Strike.

Touching upon the question of strikes, Mr. Draper declared that labor men in-sist upon maintaining that right to fight for the increased wages necessary to enable their families to meet the adthat certain employers had invoked the injunction method to prevent members of labor unions canvassing for members among non-union men, and he warned such employers that the labor organiza-tion intends to fight such injunctions.
