Ottawa, Sept. 13.—The creation of an editorial board of three members of the civil service thoroughly conversant with public affairs, is recommended by a joint committee of both houses which has been considering economies in public printing as the most effective way to bring about a reduction in the cost of parliamentary and departmental printing.

Winnipeg, Sept. 13.—The Northwest Grain Dealers' Association estimate the Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta crop for 1917, as follows: Wheat, 18,800,000 acres at 14.9 bushels per acre, 205,620,000 bushels. Oats, 7,470,000 acres at 29.1 bushels per acre, 217,470,000 bushels. Barley, 1,400,000 acres at 23.2 bushels per acre, 32,480,000 bushels. Flax, 690,000 acres at 8 bushels per acre, 5,520,000 bushels.

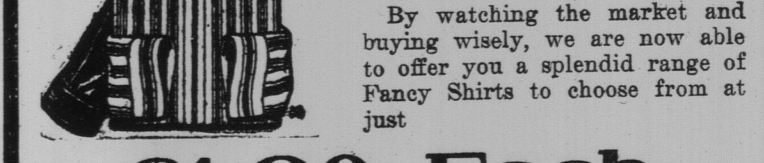

A STRIKING INDICTMENT

The Halifax Recorder in the following article exposes in a striking way the insincerity and the shameful record of the Borden government, with special reference to the talk about a national government.

An Ottawa lady sets the seal of condemnation on the Borden franchise bill, from a woman's standpoint, as follows: "What is fair for one is fair for all, and surely there are just as many men here now whose vote would be as objectionable as some of the women, on general principles. I think the act is wrong, because I never could see why an educated woman should not be entitled to vote as well as men, and surely there are just as many women here who are apt to be far more ignorant of the vote and its value than many of the educated women who have worked hard for it."

ANOTHER PROP GONE

The Ottawa correspondent of the Standard writes: "The most remarkable thing about the compulsory service situation is the way in which it is working out in the province of Quebec. Countless applications have been received from French-Canadians seeking to act as registrars under the legislation. Mr. L. J. Loranger, one of the advisory board appointed by the government to oversee the putting into effect of the measure, states that the thinking part of the population of the province realize the justice of the act and feel assured that it will be carried out with justice and equity."

In the west the women have the provincial franchise. Of the Borden franchise act the Edmonton Bulletin says: "The act appears to be a statutory declaration on behalf of the ministers that they have lost the confidence of the existing electorate, and also of the women. Wherefore they propose to disfranchise part of the present electorate and refuse to enfranchise the women."

SOLDIERS COMFORT ASSOCIATION PLANS WORK FOR WINTER

A special appeal is being made by the Soldiers' Comfort Association for socks and tobacco. The reports received at the meeting in Centenary church yesterday show that the work of the S. C. A. is steadily increasing. Excellent reports were received from both local and provincial branches. The president, Mrs. George McAvity, was in the chair. The treasurer's report showed that the total receipts for the month of August were \$149.57. The report of Mrs. J. Walter Holley, convener of the wool committee, showed that altogether 1,122 pairs of socks have been received by that committee during the past month. Four hundred and forty-one pounds of wool have been purchased at the rate of \$1.25 a pound. Money is needed urgently in this department to carry on the work. Special attention is called to Miss Flumber's appeal for socks to meet the needs of the soldiers on the firing line. War needs are also needed. Mrs. Harry McLeish, convener of the packing committee, reported that 105 cases have been shipped during the last three months, of which thirty-three were for general distribution, and the others for the New Brunswick battalions. The commanding officers have written, generally acknowledging the receipt of the cases. Individual parcels to soldiers at the front may be shipped as usual this year, but canned goods must be omitted. Fruits and jams are also prohibited. The parcels may not exceed five pounds in weight. Those intended for Christmas shipment must be in by the first week in October. Public attention was once more called to the honor card for all who have knitted 100 or more pairs of socks for soldiers. Excellent work is being accomplished by all circles connected with the S. C. A.

CLANCY'S OWN STORY OF U. S. FLAG AT VINNY

Man Who Put Stars and Stripes On The War Map

Tied it to His Bayonet and Held it to Lips of Wounded Newark Comrade Who Died in His Arms

How Gunner William Clancy of the Royal Field Artillery, the American who charged at Vinny Ridge with the Canadians, won the honor of being the first man to place the Stars and Stripes on the European battlefield, was told in the Houston Post recently by Gunner Clancy himself. He is a Boston man, but he has many friends in the Texas city, and that explains why he wrote the Post about his now famous act.

This is Clancy's letter of his account of his part in the battle—"109 Cecil street. "Bury, Lancashire, Aug. 7, 1917. "I am pleased to hear from a friend of mine who has written to me from Hearne, Texas. I am rather pleased to see a little clipping that appeared in your paper. I am sure proud of it, and I am glad that the United States knows that I, William H. Clancy, a homeless person, put the good 'Old Glory' on the battlefield at Vinny Ridge on April 9, 1917.

"I received a letter from an individual by the name of Mr. Heasley, who is in the employ of the Planters and Merchants' State bank of Hearne, Texas. No doubt he knows me, as I have been there working on the railroad as a 'rounder.' "I have made my home anywhere. I lived with Father Deemy at Denison, Texas. But as the people of Texas treated me, I was glad to get away. I carried 'Old Glory' into action that I was a Texan, and all the fellows knew I came from there. "But speaking truthfully, I was born in Boston, Mass., and lived with my old grandmother in Ipswich, Mass. But I like the people of Texas, and I am pleased to be thought of by them. As this is the second letter I have sent to America, I never related my act. "But I shall tell you so you can let the United States people know what a former hero did. "On Sunday morning, April 8, 1917, that I heard through better orders that the United States had declared war on Germany. How glad I was! I went to my kit bag and took out 'Old Glory,' which I always carried with me. I thought the day would come when I would place it on the battlefield to show the enemy. "We were to advance at 5.30 o'clock Monday morning. I went into the trenches Sunday night. At 6 o'clock Monday morning word of command was given by all officers: 'Over the top and get the honor for the United States.' The Canadians charged and I with them. I tied 'Old Glory' to my bayonet and made the charge. It was the happiest day of my life. I assure you, I was struck dumb. They did not know what to say. I asked me to remember him to all his people in Newark, N. J. The last words he said were: 'Bill Clancy, I am glad I met you for the freedom of the world.' He died in my arms. "So I let him lie, but just before he died he kissed my flag, 'Old Glory,' he said. 'I told him—'Yes, Old Glory, and new glory, too.' Poor chap, I did not see him any more, for when I went forward I was under heavy fire I met my accident. "Old Fritz sent a shell over and it struck me, blowing up some of my ammunition. Of course, I can only remember now that I was being dug out from under the rubble. I was buried alive. Now I am in England and have almost recovered from the effects. I am waiting to be transferred to the American army. "I hope it is soon, although I belong to the best regiment, Royal Field Artillery, but I much prefer being with my fellow-countrymen. I hope I will see many fellows from Texas. Let them help keep the name that I have won. "If you wish and I wish to have this published throughout the United States, I anything you would like to know about the affair, please write me. I beg to remain a son of Texas. "GUNNER WILLIAM CLANCY, "The first American to put the Stars and Stripes on the battlefield." Clancy was in Paris when the war started in 1914. He immigrated to France with his regiment in March, 1915, and was soon in action for the first time. At Neuve Chapelle, he was wounded in the head by shrapnel splinters. He was in the hospital six weeks, but was back in action in time to have a part in the taking of the famous Hohenzollern redoubt. He also fought through the battle of the Somme, and at Gourmaucourt was again wounded, this time in the head, hands and shoulders. The September following he was again with his company, and while going to the relief of the hard-pressed Cornwallis for a third time fell a victim to German

ITALIAN GOVT. PLANNING TO CONSERVE FOODSTUFFS Paris, Sept. 12.—The Italian government is considering a series of measures which it is expected will limit the consumption of foodstuffs and raw material, according to a Havas agency dispatch from Rome. The measures, which it is proposed to put into effect in the near future, include the rationing of foods classed as necessities, the monopoly of the shoe production by the state, suppressing after September 15 of private automobiles, except those used by officials and diplomats and other measures of a like nature.

PERLEY SHOULD GO. (From Saturday Night.) It is reported in this writing that Sir George Perley, Canadian Overseas Minister of Militia, is on his way to Canada. It is to be hoped that once here he will remain. His conduct in the Col. (Dr.) Bruce affair should of itself be sufficient to have him removed from office. In the House the other day Sir Sam Hughes made the charge that such men as Lt. Col. Wilson, a well known medical man who worked with Col. Bruce on the report which so severely criticized the Canadian medical service in England, had been degraded because of this report, while it is well known how Col. Bruce fell under the displeasure of Pooh Bah Perley to the extent that he also lost his job, the office which he held in England being abolished. The only reward for courage under the Perley administration in London is dismissal. If you lick-spittle around sufficiently you get something you have not earned. If you cross the great man you are fired, no matter what the merits of your case may be. Col. Bruce is punished for the crime of attempting to improve the medical service, which he did most effectively, for, in spite of denials, counter reports, etc., his recommendations went into effect when his back was turned, and Lt.-Col. Wilson is punished for helping the good work along. In the meantime Sir Bruce's report is held up by the Ottawa government, apparently being afraid to bring the matter into the limelight.

BRITISH MARKET OFFERS UNUSUAL OPPORTUNITY FOR DEVELOPMENT OF CANADIAN LUMBER BUSINESS

Canada Lethargic in Regard to Development of This Line of Trade With Great Britain and the Continent, According To Report Issued By Commission

There is considerable room for improvement in the export lumber trade of Canada with Great Britain and a little more energy on the part of the lumber interests in the Dominion would result in a much larger and varied production at home, and a greater export trade in years to come, is the conclusion reached by the Special Trade Commission sent by the Canadian government to investigate conditions bearing on this important industry.

The report states, among other things that it would appear that the bulk of the sawn lumber suitable for the English market is under the control of very few dealers. It would seem that the business has been largely left with them without serious efforts on the part of a large number of Canadian lumber manufacturers to compete.

Another very serious obstacle is the cost of present ocean transportation, although it must be admitted that prior to the war when occasional rates were reasonable, we rarely tried, and more rarely still were prepared to take advantage of such opportunities in Great Britain.

At regular meetings of the Great War Veterans' Association held last evening in their rooms in Union street, a statement of the proceeds of the recent fair held in St. Andrew's rink was submitted. It was estimated that \$2,000 will be cleared as a result of the fair.

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BANGOR BOY WRITES FROM BATTLE FRONT

Loren Conlogue Sees German Balloon Brought Down in Flames

Many Prisoners Taken - Under Fire From Big Guns for Hours at Night. Shells Seem Unable to "Find Us," He Says in Letter

How a German observation balloon was destroyed by the fire of allied anti-aircraft guns on the western battle front, is told by Loren Conlogue, a Bangor soldier serving with the Canadian overseas forces, in a letter written to his mother, Mrs. George M. Conlogue. The letter, which is dated August 9, and written from "Somewhere in France," says:

Dear Mother - As I have the chance, I will write you a few lines. It has been raining here for about a week and there is lots of mud. This place is all cut up so you know how much mud there is. We have had pretty good weather all summer. I was back to a village the other day and they were cutting rye and the wheat is almost ready to cut. They are digging potatoes. There is a very good crop of everything so we will have lots to eat, I guess.

There are lots of small men among them that look as if they had been in the line of it. They are sure getting sick of this war and the sicker they get the better. They brought one of the German balloons down today. It came down all in a flame of fire. There are two or three men in them, watching where the shells burst.

Shelled for Hours. We are staying in a valley or hole. At night the shells go over for hours but they cannot seem to find us. The other day they were watching us from their balloons and sent shells over from big guns. They tried to get the range and we got out of there. We made them waste a few shells all right. We have large balloons up all day fastened by a cable, and watching the German lines. We can look each way in their country and signal to the big guns by telephone where to shoot.

**St. John Woman And Children Suffocated In South Framingham Home**

**Mr. and Mrs. John Murphy of George Street Receive Terrible News Closely Following on Word of Another Fatality a Few Days Ago**

To a home already saddened by the uncertainty regarding the fate of a gallant soldier and more recently by the news of the drowning of a young relative, comes news today of a more awful tragedy by which almost an entire branch of their family is wiped out.

Mr. and Mrs. John Murphy of 39 George street, have received the news that their daughter, Laura, and two of her children were found dead from suffocation by gas and, while the letter is not clear on the subject, it is feared that two other children met a similar fate at the same time.

The daughter was Mrs. Laura Blizard, aged twenty-four years, of South Framingham, Mass., and the children who are mentioned as having met death with her are Teresa, aged eight years, and Bobbie, aged three. It is feared that her twin boys, Eddie and William, six years old, may have met the same fate as the only survivors definitely mentioned are a week-old infant, who still is in a precarious condition, and the father, On Friday evening last, when Mr. Blizard returned to his home, he found his wife, apparently lifeless, on the floor and the children in similar condition in bed. He carried them out and had them taken to the hospital, but efforts to revive them proved fruitless, the only one mentioned as responding to the treatment being the infant of a week.

The little one had been found with its face deep in the bed clothes.

The details contained in the letter are missing, and it is not made clear how the tragedy occurred. Mrs. Murphy has written to the chief of police at South Framingham asking him for fuller particulars and is awaiting with special anxiety some further word regarding the fate of the twin grand children, which still is uncertain.

In addition to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Murphy, Mrs. Blizard is survived by four sisters, Mrs. Josephine Novack of Cambridge, Mass., from whom the news was received; Mrs. Rosalie Nairn and Miss May, both at home, and Mrs. Nellie Irvine of Cambridge.

Only a few days ago, the Times announced the death of Mrs. Irvine's daughter, Teresa, who was drowned in the Charles river, which runs near their home, and Mrs. Irvine, already suffering from the shock of her daughter's death, has been prostrated by the additional tragedy.

The husband of Mrs. Nairn, another sister, was a member of the Canadian Expeditionary force, but he has been missing for some time and it is feared that he has been killed in action.

Mr. Blizard, who lost his wife and children in this recent tragedy, had been listed for overseas service with the United States forces.


