All For The State In England

Remarkable Condition of Unanimity Among The Politicians—Ablest Opponents Working In Double Harness

(Toronto Mail and Empire.) Not only the worst, but the best, of human nature is brought out by war, and this has been strikingly exemplified in the political scene in Great Britain. So honestly has this been observed that a great many people believe it will be permanent, and that soon after the war there is likely to be a new alignment altogether, and but two parties, the radicals and the moderates. The war has shown how hollow indeed are some of the pretensions of party government, and that at heart the strongest of political opponents have a deep respect for each other. Men who six months ago would not play golf together for fear, perhaps, that they might attempt to settle political differences with their clubs, are now handing each other handsome compliments across the floors of parliament. At the annual meetings of the great English banks, whose name is held in most respect? Why, Lloyd George's, the man who a few months ago was regarded as the most dangerous man in England as far as the old school of financiers could judge. Now one of them says that Lloyd George ought to be made a duke.

In Double Harness. A year ago he was the best hated man in England. Today he is one of the most popular. In his recent budget speech he raised everyone's taxes, and had some handsome things to say about the dukes, who a year ago would cheerfully have lynched him. He was followed by his ablest and sternest critic, Austen Chamberlain. The ex-chancellor of the exchequer had no fault to find. His words were compliments, indeed, he could not well criticize the budget, since he had had the honor of assisting Lloyd George to make it. His assistance was indeed, very generally acknowledged. Lloyd George. He also paid a tribute to the help he had received from Lord Rothchild, who a year or so ago had referred to Lloyd George as a species of highway robber. As it is with Chamberlain and Lloyd George, so it is in all branches of government. In the last parliament Carson and Redmond sat amicably side by side discussing how the recruiting in Ireland might be stimulated.

Distinguished Assistance. At the Foreign Office Lord Lansdowne, from the beginning of the war until his recent illness, spent as much time as Sir Edward Grey. At the War Office Kitchener has on his one hand Lord Haldane, the former Liberal Secretary of War, and on the other Arthur Balfour, formerly premier, and connected to be probably the greatest military

SEAL HUNT THIS YEAR MAY BE ABANDONED

St. John's, Nfld., Feb. 8.—Unless some plan can be devised within a month whereby the skins and oil of the seal can be utilized by the British government for war supplies there is a strong possibility that the seal hunt, which has been an important factor in the commerce of Newfoundland for many years, will be abandoned for the coming season. Because of industrial production and the war more of last year's catch of 288,000 has been disposed of and about half of the great catch of 270,000 made in 1913 remains in the hands of brokers in London and New York. The war has prevented the transportation of seal oil to Germany, formerly one of the principal markets for the commodity. Some time ago there were begun negotiations which it was hoped would result in an arrangement for the British government to take over the entire catch for the coming spring for use in making winter garments for soldiers. Word has been received here, however, that the manufacturers of clothing for the army find the material unsuitable, and that no practicable method of using seal oil in connection with military operations has been found. In addition, owners of the ten steel steamers ordinarily sent to the sealing grounds in March say that there is a brisk demand for the chartering of their vessels for trans-Atlantic service. It is argued by many persons who believe that restrictive measures are necessary to protect the seals that present conditions present a favorable opportunity for omitting the hunt this year, and thus permitting the animals to increase probably about half a million. A compromise proposal has been made that the steel ships be withdrawn and only the eight wooden sealers sent to the grounds. Should the entire hunt be abandoned it would mean the loss of six or eight weeks' employment ordinarily given to about 4,000 men. The average yield's catch has brought about half a million dollars to the colony.

Scheller, formerly of the staff of the Union Bank in Winnipeg. The word had been passed by the representatives of the Dominion and the C. P. R. police, also, and all were on the watch for the man. The information received in St. John is that the man wanted had left the bank without permission and was in the station when the train arrived and promptly spotted the man as he left the platform. In reply to a question by Mr. Skidmore, Scheller admitted his identity and immediately was turned over to Detective Killen of the city police force. He was taken to central station where he will be held pending further orders. Scheller had booked passage for Great Britain by the steamer Corsican and it is thought that he was making his way back to Germany.

RAISE LARGE SUM IN FRANCE FOR SOLDIERS

Celebrate the Success of the Famous Cannon of Joffre's Army

Paris, Feb. 8.—Yesterday was called "75 day" for, throughout all France, the people were celebrating the success of the famous French cannon. Little flags, medals and other insignia bearing reproductions of a cannon were sold everywhere. It is expected that from the sale of flags for the benefit of Belgian refugees, when the sum of \$700,000 was collected.

REPORTS TO THIS EFFECT GENERAL 'LONGSHOREMEN'S MEETING'

At a largely attended meeting of the Longshoremen's Association yesterday afternoon, several matters of importance were debated and resolutions expressing the sentiments of the members were adopted. The matter of rents was one which evoked a long discussion, and the stories told by the members, it was stated that there has been a general increase in rents, at least among the properties occupied by the longshoremen. Members told of increases of from \$1 up to \$8 a month, the average increase being about \$2 a month. There were almost 800 married men at the meeting and almost all of them had been asked for higher rents.

HEROIC CONDUCT OF BRITISH OFFICERS

Encourage Men by Bravery Under Fire—Some Instances of True Courage

Writing home from the front recently, a soldier stated—"Our officers are altogether too brave," thereby implying that the dauntless gifts of the lives of heroes is in vain. But is this so? Let us consider a space.

Perhaps the completest answer is to be found in Captain Norman Leslie's last message to a friend—

"I tried not to worry too much about the war," said Captain Leslie; "unless, individuals cannot count. Remember we are writing a new page of history. Future generations cannot be allowed to read the decline of the British Empire and attribute it to us. We live our lives and die—but count the loss naught. It is better far to go out with honor than survive with shame."

And so, with the hero light about his head and the glorious self-sacrificing love of Empire swelling his heart, a very gallant gentleman met his fate.

His is not a single, or even an exceptional case, for the same spirit animates every man in the British Army who holds his Majesty's commission, for the principle underlying the spirit is that where the officer leads there the men will follow.

Who is there does not know the hero tale of L. Battery, and how, in the words of Sergeant-Major Darrell, who has since been promoted to the commissioned ranks for his gallantry, "the officers were best and bravest of all; they never murmured, and without them we should never have done what we did."

Stunned at with shot and shell, the battery almost wiped out, Captain Bradbury and his subalterns, aided by some N. C. O.'s own men, succeeded in bringing one of their guns into action, and saving the rest from capture and the savagery from annihilation thereby.

It was difficult to see how our shells were falling, so Lieutenant Manday stepped out from the gunshield to act as observer, quietly directing the fire of his comrades until his leg was blown away by a bursting shrapnel; but even his bravery seems dim beside the heroism of Captain Bradbury, for he had a limp and one leg shot away, but continued to lay the gun until the other leg was shot away just above the knee.

Then again, there is the case of Lord Arthur Hay.

Lord Hay was directing a company of Coldstream Guards to take cover, when a bullet found him as he stood exposed to the full fire of the enemy. There he lay like a log until two privates crawled out to his help; but as soon

as they touched him he opened his eyes and just murmured— "Get back to cover, boys, the Germans are firing at you!"

But the "boys" worshipped their officer, and he died knowing that he had put the company into shelter before he himself went under.

A Useful Sacrifice. A magnificent example of life given up usefully is the case of Lieutenant Steele-Perkins, of the King's Own Royal Lancashire Regiment.

It happened near Cambria, during the retirement of the Allies, that the King's Own were entrenched bearing the brunt of an overwhelming German attack.

At first it was only infantry, but soon the guns got the range and the first man wounded by the bursting shrapnel was Steele-Perkins. Tenderly they lifted his unconscious body out of the trench and laid it on a stretcher, but as the R. A. M. C. bearers lifted their load he came to his senses, and insisted upon going back to his men. Hardly had he got back than a rifle bullet struck him, and he was taken a little way to the rear, but crawled back on his hands and knees to the firing line once more.

A third time he was hit, and the men with whom he was very popular, begged him to go to the rear while the stretcher-bearers could take him there with safety.

He could not speak, but just shook his head and pointed to the enemy in reply. Hardly had he done so than a shell burst overhead, wounding him for the fourth time. And now they tried to take him away by main force, but he shook them off angrily, and remained at his post only to die that evening from his injuries.

And yet he could have gone to the rear with his first wound in all honor.

Thoughtful When Dying. Yet another case, this time of inspiring kindness, was that of a young subaltern of a Highland regiment. He was the youngest officer in the regiment, hardly more than a boy in fact, and yet he had the strong soul of a man.

All day long the Highlanders had been under fire, and all day long the officers had been keeping their spirits up with many a cheery word, and not least among the officers to set a good example was the young subaltern. But at last he fell, mortally wounded. Even then he did not think of himself, but, turning on his side, gave the last two cigarettes in his case to a wounded lance-corporal lying beside him, groaning in agony. And that night he died.

"I wish I hadn't smoked those cigarettes, I wish I had kept them," says the lance-corporal. "Call the officers what you like—they are nuts! They do their bit of swank at home, but by Heaven you should see the stuff they are made up of at the front!"

All honor, then, to the officers of the British Army! Brave they are and ever have been; but not too brave, nor ever can be!

Their men know their high courage, and respect them. The British officer is a real leader, in a way that apparently the Germans do not understand.

The men will follow them into the jaws of death itself with a confidence that could only be inspired by a splendid example.

ST. JOHN RELATIVES OF YOUNG NEWFOUNDLANDER LOST WITH THE VIKTOR

Island Colony Giving Generously of Her Best For King and Empire

It was announced a few days ago that the British armored merchant steamer Viknor with her entire crew of 208 men had been sunk, and a day or two later it was stated that twenty-five of those who went down with her were sons of Newfoundland. There will therefore be a very deep interest in the following letter written by one of these young men from Newfoundland when he was on his way to join the Viknor. The local interest will be all the more deep because the young man has relatives in St. John. The letter appeared in a Newfoundland paper and had been sent to The Times by Isaac Mercer.

Whale Island, Devonport, England, Dec. 10, 1914. My Dear Mother—Just a few lines to let you know I am well at present, and I hope you are the same. I and Jack Parsons are leaving here tomorrow for Glasgow to join a ship. Her name is the Viknor. She is a ship captured from the Austrians and has six 6-inch guns, eight 4-inch, four 3-inch and three 8-pounders.

All the rest of the boys are gone except Jack and I. They are gone on merchantships. I have had a month's training. We had three weeks field training and one week drill. I passed seamen's gunnery all right. None of us have received a letter yet from home. The war is much the same as ever. Our fleet captured two German cruisers today and the allies are doing well on land as well, especially the Russians. Germany's fleet haven't come out yet, only a few cruisers and torpedo boats. We don't hear as much news here about the war as you do, but what we hear is correct. England and her allies are doing the best work.

Well, mother, you need not worry too much about me, for I am all right. I will be back again before long. They say around here that I will last about three more months. I am proud now that I am in the navy. It is a great honor to be in the navy. I will be home in the time that I would join, for England wants every young man she can get, and my young manhood will never be the same if I don't go. I am all right for anything else, but when it comes to this they are no where. If some of them were here for two or three weeks field training they would know what we go through. But work like this don't hurt anyone. It only makes a man of us.

There are no hands in pockets here. If you are stood to 'attention' you can't move hand or foot, and I tell you you have got to do some field exercises. This would be the proper place for our Shearstown boys. They would get some of the things they would know over the Belgians they would have to fight or lose their homes. If England loses it would be best for them to know the time for our Newfoundland boys to come forward and show the world what they mean. "England is our home, and we do our duty." Are we doing ours? Give my love to all friends. Wishing you good-bye. Your loving son, ELLI SPARKES.

In commenting upon the letter Mr. Mercer writes to The Times: "We hear a great deal of talk about what the other parts of the empire are doing for the Old Land, but I do not think there is any part that is making a better showing than Britain's oldest colony, Newfoundland. Her contribution of 650 and more than 1,000 naval reservists with more than 100 on the Nile and another thousand men ready to go."

Hints for the Cook

Cream Pie
One cup sugar, 2 eggs, 1-3 cup butter, 1/2 cup milk, 1 1/2 cups pastry flour and 1 1/2 teaspoonfuls baking soda. Use 1/2 pint jar cream, whipped.

A Delicious Dessert
One cup of coarsely chopped hickory nuts or English walnuts, added to a pint of whipped cream, sweetened, and poured over a dozen lady fingers.

Spanish Cream
Soak 1/2 package box gelatine in 1 cup milk one hour. Heat 3 cups milk to near boiling, add beaten yolks 4 eggs, 1 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon vanilla, and beaten whites 4 eggs. Mold.

Molasses Cookies
One and a half cups sugar, 1 large cup melted lard, 1 teaspoon each of clove, nutmeg and allspice, 2 teaspoons of cinnamon. Cream all together well, add 2 well-beaten eggs, 1 cup molasses, 1/2 cup milk in which 1 small teaspoon soda has been dissolved, about 4 cups of flour (bread), and 8 teaspoon of baking powder sifted together.

Lemon Meringue Pie
Pour the juice and grated rind of one lemon over one cup of sugar, add the yolks of two eggs and two tablespoon of cornstarch dissolved in a little cold water. Add one cup of boiling water and cook in a double-boiler until thick. Pour into a baked pie-crust and cover with whites of eggs which have been beaten stiff with two tablespoon of powdered sugar. Brown slightly.

Walnut Cake
Cream one half cup of butter with one cup powdered sugar. Add grated rind of half lemon and half teaspoon vanilla. Then add yolks of two eggs and one whole one. Beat and add one and a half cups flour with one teaspoon baking powder in it and three-quarters cup milk. Mix well and add three-quarters cup chopped walnut meats dusted with a tablespoon of flour. Bake in medium oven three-quarters hour.


