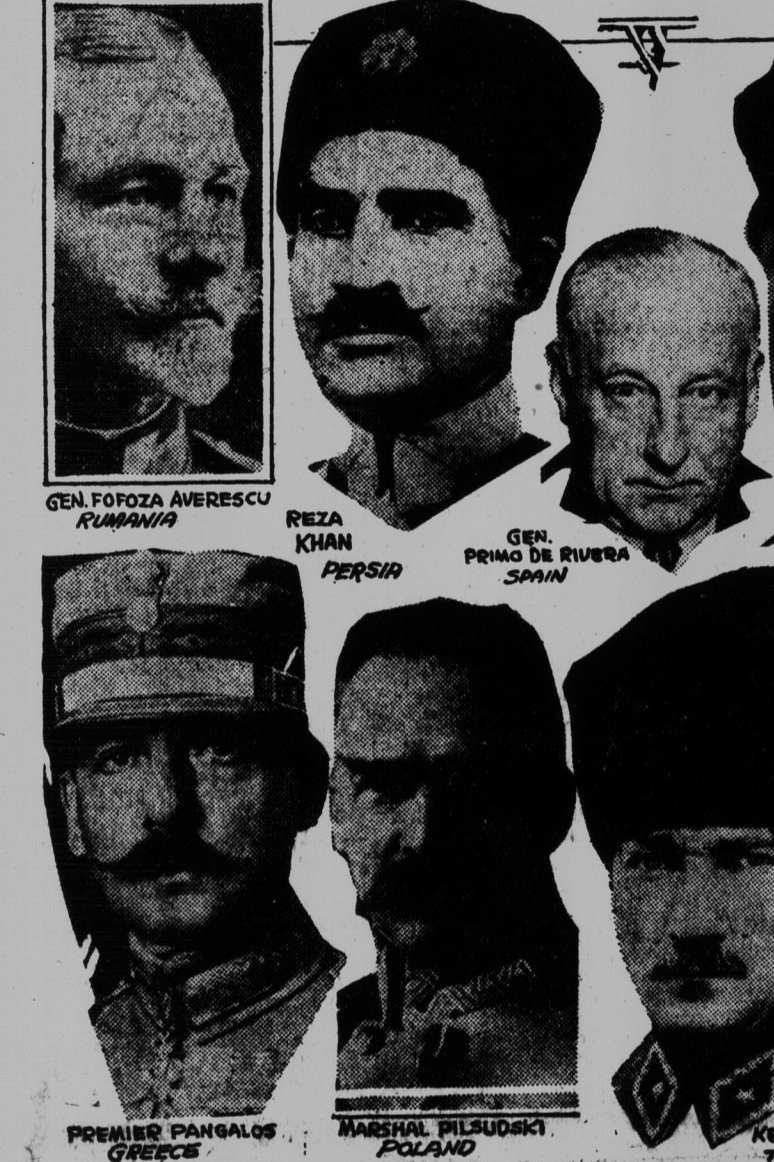
One Killed, 3 Hurt In Brooklyn Fight

TELEPHONE BOOK LEADS TO DIVORCES

Chicago Woman Finds Husband's Name in New York Directory and Investigates

NEW YORK, May 29.—Idle turning of the pages of the Brooklyn and Queens telephone book by a woman in a New York hotel resulted in two divorce actions. It was shown in testimony given by Stella Sturtevant in Chicago, before Justice Humphrey in the Supreme Court in Queens.

The plaintiff said she was married to Richard Jabel in Chicago in 1922 and last fall came to New York. In her room in a hotel she was looking aimlessly through the telephone book when she found the name Jabel. She went by text to the address given, which was in Glendale, Queens, and found Mrs. Elizabeth Jabel, who, she said, she had been married to Richard Jabel since 1900.

Stella Sturtevant obtained a divorce in Chicago and Mrs. Jabel obtained an interlocutory decree of divorce here from Justice Humphrey. Mrs. Jabel has two daughters, one of them married.


Motors 1,170 Miles Without A License

This man has a nice home, and his wife is a nice girl, but she is not pretty like I am. He gives her very little money and never takes her anywhere. I say things about her in a loving way that, when he thinks them over, she gets mad. I buy him nice shirts and handkerchiefs, so that she will see them, and it will hurt her. I have done everything, and I think of her to hurt her, and make her leave him.

People will criticize me if I go out with a married man living with his wife, and I don't want them to do that. So will you please tell me how I can separate them?

Doll your yourself up, so that you enhance all of your good looks with pretty clothes, while the poor wife has to skimp along on a shabby outfit. Pretending to be the wife's friend, while you insinuate things against her that poison her husband's mind. Making the husband spend all of his money on you so that he has none to spend at home. Flaunting the husband's infidelity in his wife's face, and parading the intimacy that permits you to give him presents of wearing apparel before her. Really, you don't seem to have missed a point.

And if all of that doesn't make the wife so green with jealousy and so disgusted with her poor, weak, makeshift of a husband, that she will leave him, I don't know what will. At any rate, you will have the consolation of having done your best to steal a woman's husband from her and break her heart and ruin her home.

Generally, when a girl starts out to get a married man, she begins by making him believe that his wife is too old for him. She tells him that, in some miraculous manner, he is still a boy, and that the years that have made his wife middle-aged have left him still a gay and carefree lad. DEAR MISS DIX—My son and his wife have lived with me ever since their marriage several years ago. He is my only child, all I have in the world, and I cannot bear the thought of his leaving me. He always comes to me with his difficulties in business matters and tells me I come first in his life. His wife is not as appreciative as she might be, and is not always in the best of humor.

Now don't you think I am doing right by keeping my son with me as long as I can?

ANSWER:
No, I think that you are doing a very great wrong, not only to your son's wife, but to your son himself.

You are ruining his life, because you are wrecking his marriage. You are separating him from his wife, because you are coming between them. And even if the marriage doesn't end in divorce—as it probably will—you will have made it one of those accursed husks of marriage that are nothing but just an endurance test.

Every marriage is a failure in which the wife does not come first with the husband. If he does not love her better than anybody else in the world, better even than his mother; if he does not go to her for sympathy, for advice, for understanding, it simply means that he is not getting the companionship out of marriage that he hoped for.

And if the husband turns to his mother, instead of to his wife; if he depends upon his mother instead of upon his wife; if his mother comes first, then marriage is an utter failure to the wife, and she is filled with a jealousy that eats out her very soul.

So, Mother Mary, if you have for your son that love that makes you put his happiness above your own, you will not want to be first with him. You will abdicate the throne in favor of his wife, and you will send them off to live by themselves so that they will have to depend on each other and have a chance to grow together.

Of course, this requires a tremendous sacrifice of you, but if you love your son one-tenth as much as you think you do, you will not balk at it. You will put his good above your own.

In addition to these, the chief duty of a doctor's wife is to put an extinguisher on her jealousy.

A great many doctors' wives are so green-eyed that they imagine that every woman who consults their husband is in love with him, and that every time their husband counts a woman's pulse he is squeezing her hand. These wives torture themselves, and ruin their husbands professionally, because women are always afraid to call in a doctor whose wife is given to suspicions. It is also the duty of a doctor's wife to suppress her curiosity and to keep her tongue between her teeth.

Without doubt, a doctor's wife can do much to enhance his fortunes by making friends for him. But perhaps she can do most of all by not expecting from him all of the attentions that a business man can give his wife, and by not badgering him because he cannot go around to parties, and must necessarily leave her much alone.

Saint John Women's Council Discusses Matters Relative To National Meeting In June

Question of Raising Money For Free Milk Funds, Maintained in City, Also Under Consideration—Routine Business is Dealt With

THE SAINT JOHN Women's Council at its meeting yesterday afternoon discussed various matters concerning the National Council annual meeting, endorsing the action of the local executive with reference to resolutions for the national and authorizing the Saint John Council's proxy at the annual meeting of the National Council in Vancouver in June, to vote according to her own judgment on constitutional amendments, which were read at yesterday's meeting.

**5 GIRLS DIE, 8 HURT
AS U.S. PLANT BURNS**

Head of Firm at Rockford, Ill., Severely Scorched in Attempting Rescues

ROCKFORD, Ill., May 28.—Five girls are dead and eight persons are known to be seriously injured as the result of a fire which swept a building occupied by the Sutton Top Shop, a concern dealing in automobile accessories.
The bodies were burned so badly they could not be recognized. One of the injured girls, Catherine Wood, was burned so severely about the face that it is feared she may go blind. Others suffered sprains and injuries in escaping from the second floor of the building.
John Sutton, head of the firm, was seriously burned when he insisted on attempts at rescue.
All but five of the 13 girls employed on the second floor succeeded in finding their way out of the smoke-filled room down the only stairway. The bodies of the five were found by firemen who fought their way into the building. The fire started when a strip of celluloid burst into flames.

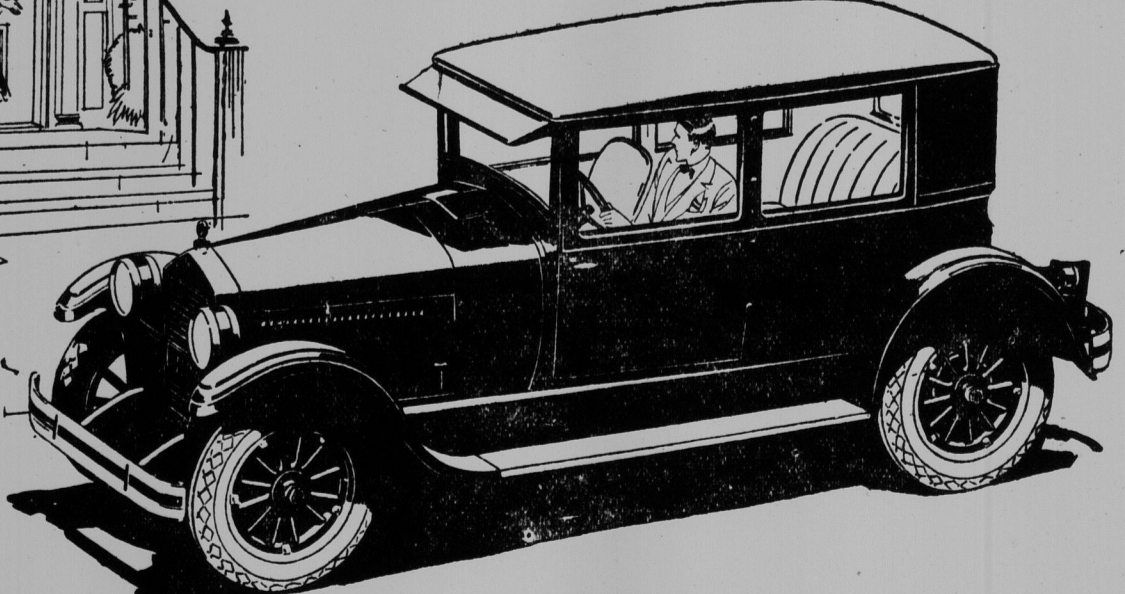

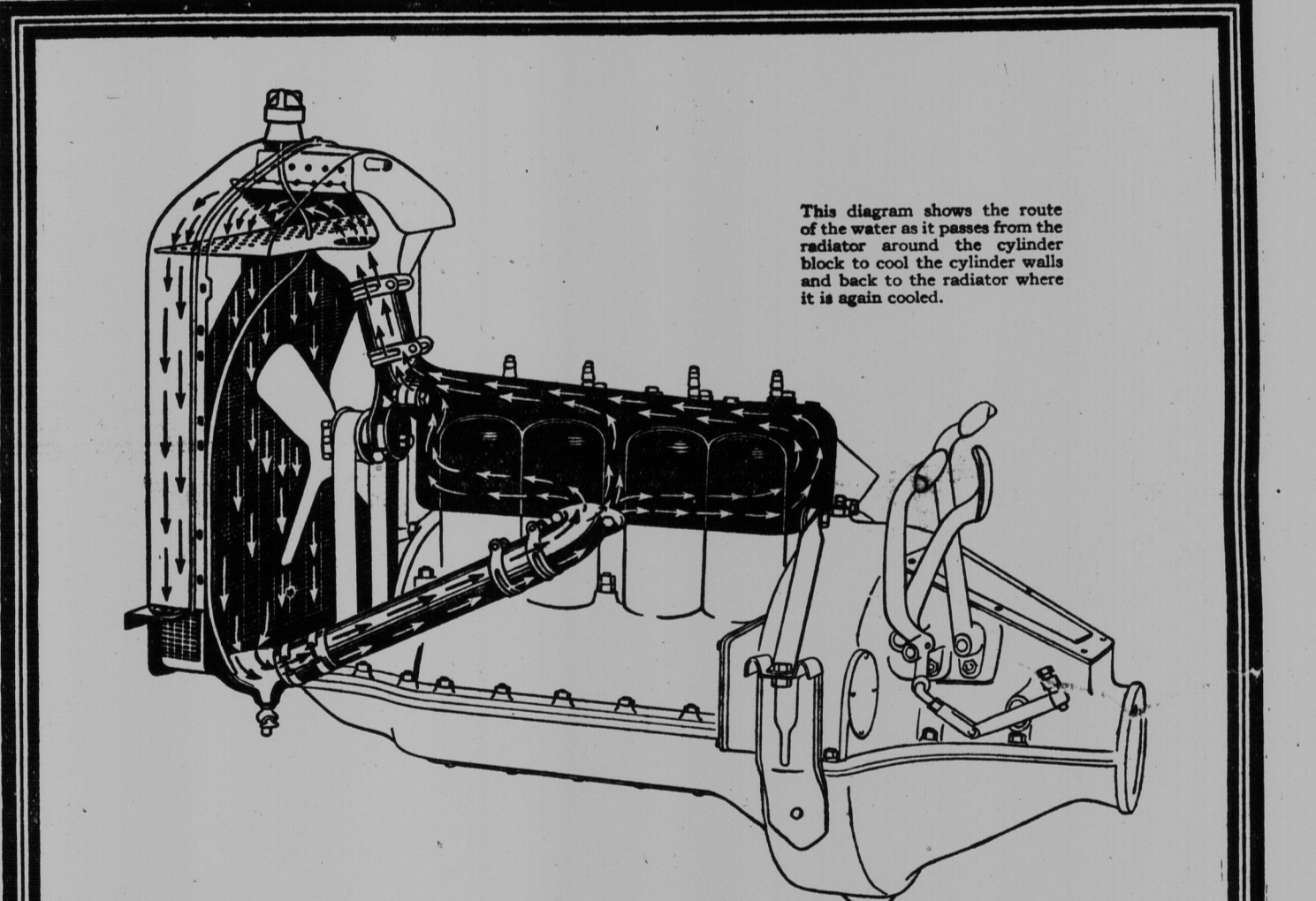

MUSSOLINI HINTS ITALY WILL DEMAND A GERMAN COLONY

Affirms Desire of Country For Place in Sun and His Resolve to Seek It

ROME, May 28.—Premier Mussolini reviewing his foreign policy to the Senate Friday again stressed Italy's desire for a place on the sun, declaring he is determined to make a stand for it. Though the duke failed to go into details it is generally believed among both opponents and supporters that at the fall meeting of the League of Nations' Council he will request that Italy be given a mandate over one of the former German colonies so as to give room for the population of the country.

Opinion is steadily growing here that it is exceedingly unfair for Great Britain and France who hold huge colonies to retain those of Germany while Italy's population is increasing at the rate of 300,000 persons a year. There is no outlet at home and the African

colonies though making good progress are unsuitable for growing cereal or vegetable crops. They also would require a large capital to develop their arborescent possibilities.

TO BE BACKED IN ITALY.

The Italian peasant must see his livelihood further afield. For this reason every Italian, no matter what his other political opinion may be will support Premier Mussolini's policy at Geneva, if, as he foreshadowed Friday, he lives up to the motto expressed when he took power "nothing for nothing." While here he affirmed his intention of supporting the unanimous vote system in the League Council, Italians do not think their country's vote for Germany's admission to the League should be given away. For that reason it is expected here that Italy's consent to Germany's joining may be contingent upon the council's agreeing to give Rome the desired African mandate.

The Premier made two noteworthy points in his talk. One was that Italy would have made a colossal mistake if she had refused to sign the Locarno pact. The other was that nations like individuals must think imperially if they really wish to get on in the world.

TRURO THIEF GIVEN THREE YEARS' TERM

TRURO, N.S., May 28.—Roderick MacDonald, hailing from Sydney, C.B., pleaded guilty today to theft from two residences and a garage in Truro and was sentenced by Judge Martell to three years in Dorchester Penitentiary.

TOURIST BODY AIM TOLD AT WOODSTOCK

Success Depends on Work of Local Branches, Says Anderson

WOODSTOCK, May 28.—W. E. Anderson, secretary manager of the New Brunswick Tourist Association, returning from Grand Falls, where he had been in the interests of tourist business, stopped off and addressed a full and representative meeting of the Woodstock Board of Trade here this evening.

The speaker outlined at length the process of reorganization through which the provincial tourist association has recently passed and explained in detail the policy and program now being followed.

He stressed the truly provincial aspect which the organization assumes, naming as it does the chairman of each local committee a member of the provincial executive. "The success of the provincial organization, therefore," declared the speaker, "will depend very largely upon the hearty co-operation it receives from each community and the benefit which each section derives is dependent upon the initiative and activity of the local committee."

N. B.'s OPPORTUNITY

Mr. Anderson cited statistical records of the value of the tourist business in various states of the Union and contended that New Brunswick also might well expect to derive material annual income in selling the scenic beauty, historical traditions, and fishing and hunting opportunities to the tourists.

Progress of the work of the local committee was reported and completion of organization and formulation of the local tourist program is anticipated within a few days.

Mr. Anderson leaves here tomorrow morning en route for Saint John.

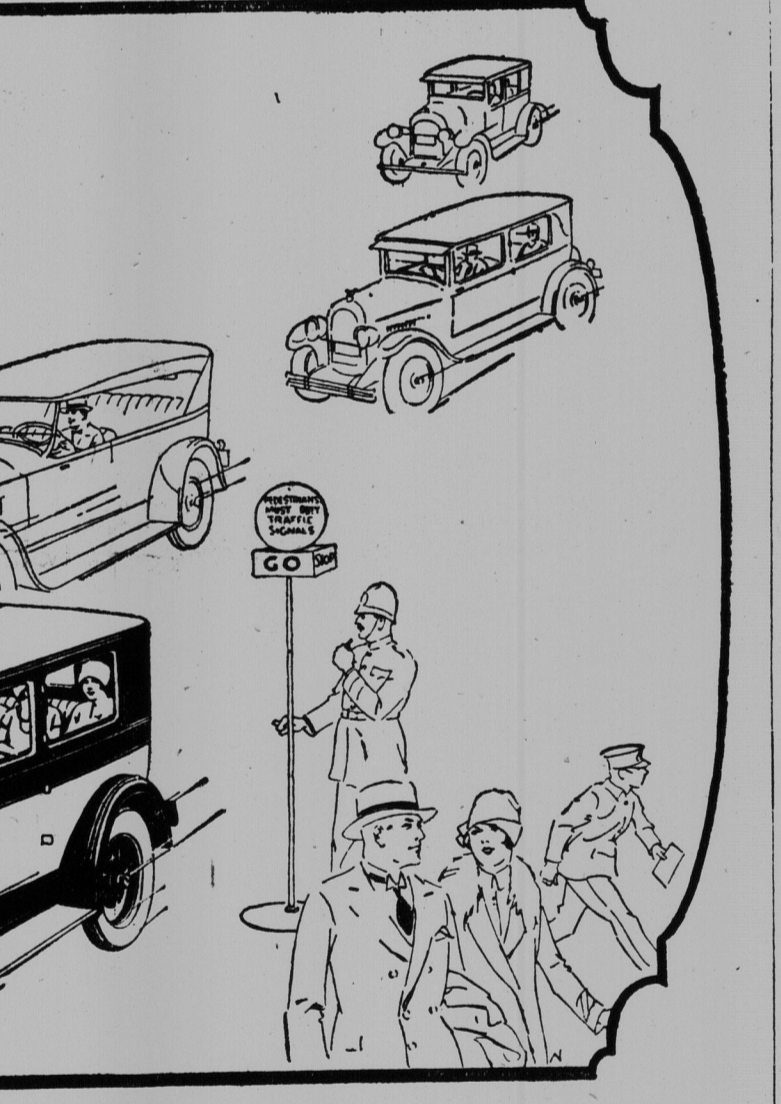

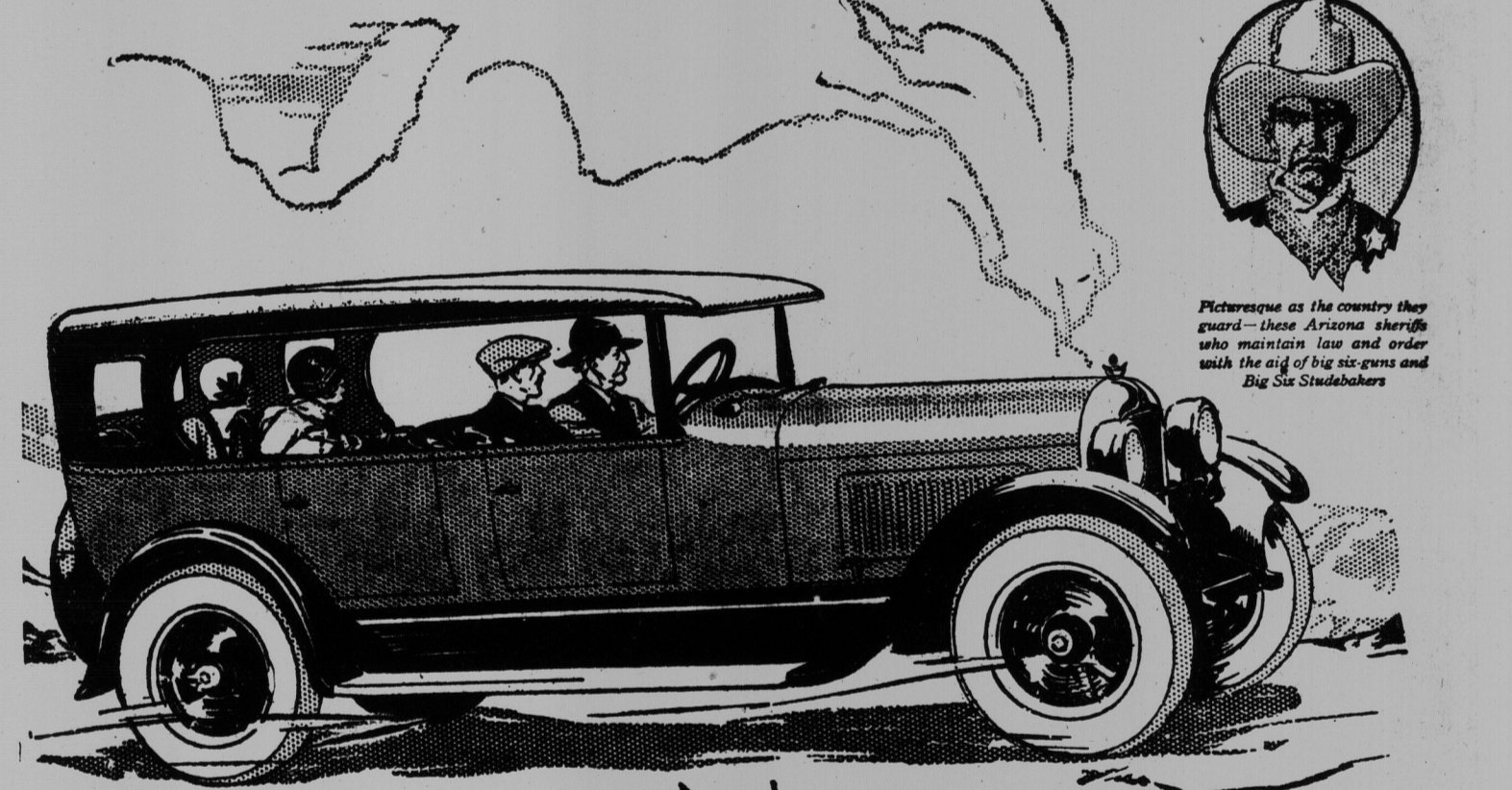

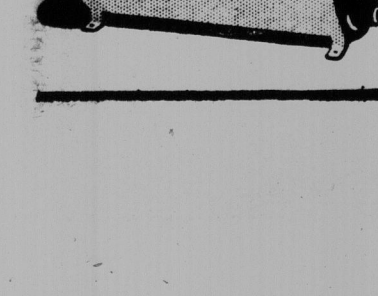

\$29,000 IS SPENT ON GIRL IN YEAR

Guardian of Dorothy Gordon, Massachusetts Heiress, Files Second Accounting

BOSTON, Mass., May 29.—A sum in excess of \$29,000 has been expended in one year on Miss Dorothy D. Gordon, 23-year-old heiress, over whose guardianship a long legal battle was waged in Massachusetts courts two years ago, according to the second accounting of Attorney John M. O'Donoghue of Lowell, guardian, filed in Middlesex Probate Court. Whether the \$29,000 was spent in one grand round of flowers, fun and romance cannot be gleaned from the accounting which is extremely brief and in no way comparable to the detailed accounting rendered last year. Whereas last year the report showed expenditures of between \$10 and \$20 a month to cater to Dorothy's "sweet tooth," and monthly payments to Galvin the Florist of \$30 to cheer her with flowers, no individual items are set forth in the report just filed. Last year it was shown that Boston and out-of-town specialists made a huge dent in the expense account, whereas this time an amount of \$5,083.23 is set forth for medical attention and nursing services. A meagre sum of \$317.28 is set forth for clothing. Household expenses are listed at \$10,183.84, and legal services at \$1,538.85.

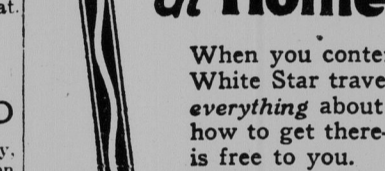

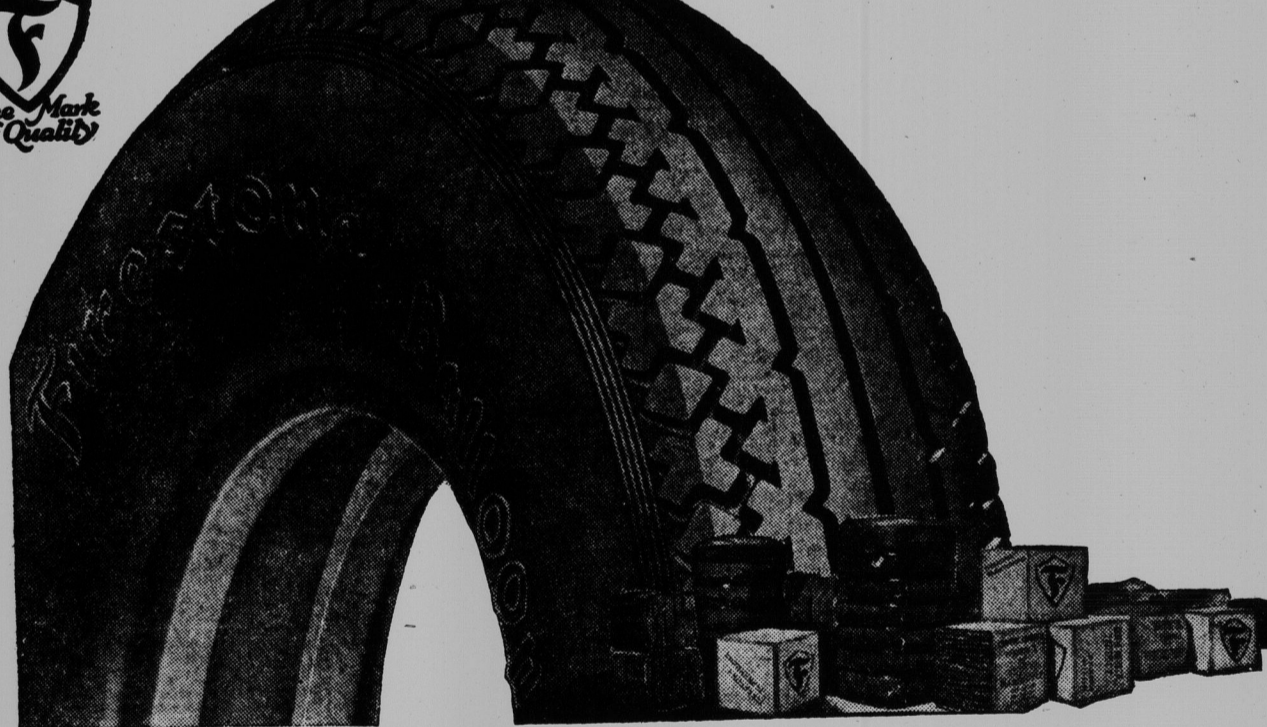

\$20 CATTLE RATE LOWEST FEASIBLE ON DOMINION SHIPS

Merchant Marine Can't Go in Trade For Less Teakle Tells Committee

OTTAWA, May 28.—The Canadian Government Merchant Marine cannot profitably go into the cattle carrying business at less than the \$20 rate. This statement was made positively by R. B. Teakle, head of the line, at today's meeting of the Commons committee on National Railways.

Mr. Teakle explained that because of the lack of return cargo for cattle carrying vessels, the cost of equipment and the lower profit on cattle space as compared with general cargo space, it would never be possible to cut the cattle rate by putting the Merchant Marine into the trade, unless a loss was to be regularly absorbed.

FAILS TO SEE PROFIT.

Several members of the committee were anxious to know what could be done if parliament ordered the equipment of some of the nationally owned ships at federal cost. Mr. Teakle did not think, even with the initial cost of equipment left out of the balance sheet, that the cattle cargoes would return a profit for the line.

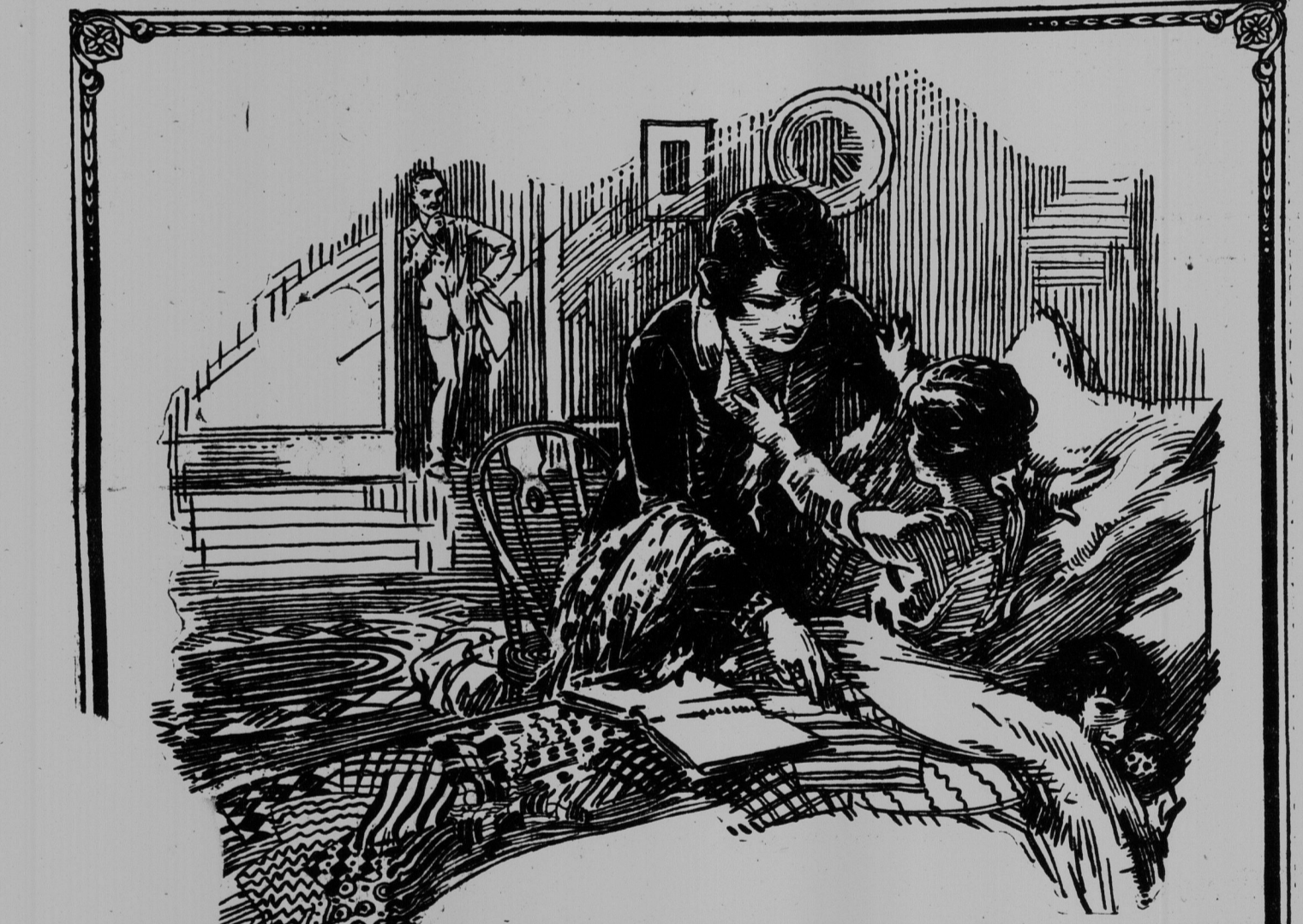
The candidates who failed claimed that the examinations had been unfair in that they had not been warned of the subjects upon which they would be called upon to write.

ROBBER NEAR DEATH AFTER KILLING BOY AND NETTING \$2,000

Those Injured Are Rooming House Proprietor and Detective Chief

ANOTHER ARRESTED FOR INVESTIGATION

Thug Opens Fire From Window as Police Arrive; Fight Lasts 10 Minutes

WINNIPEG, May 28—After the most desperate gun battle in the annals of the Winnipeg police department, William Davis, an Italian, who a few hours previously had held up the Logan Avenue branch of the Royal Bank of Canada, killing Maurice Garvie, a 19-year-old clerk, and escaping with \$2,000 in currency, was captured this afternoon at a rooming house a short distance from the scene of the murder.

CHIEF OUT OF HOSPITAL Chief of Detectives George Smith, who was wounded while leading his men in the attack on the house where Davis had taken refuge, was released from hospital this afternoon. First reports said he had been dangerously wounded, but the bandit's bullet hit

him on the right shoulder and glanced off, inflicting only a minor cut. He returned to duty. Robert Segal, proprietor of the rooming house, who was wounded when the police returned the gunman's fire, is in hospital, shot in the chest. His condition is serious. The bandit had been rooming at Segal's house for the past few weeks.

BANK OF MONTREAL DEPOSITS INCREASE

Savings Accounts Reach \$632,412,154 Against \$604,881,114 Year Ago

That the general business of the country is on the up-grade is reflected by the semi-annual statement of the Bank of Montreal.

The report, which is for the six months to April 30, is now going forward to shareholders. At the last annual meeting Mr. Vincent Meredith, president, stated that there were then indications of better business conditions. This has proved to be the case and as a result, the customers of the bank have been able to profitably use increased accommodation.

The general statement of assets and liabilities shows total assets of \$749,127,257, up from \$718,142,297 at the corresponding period a year ago. 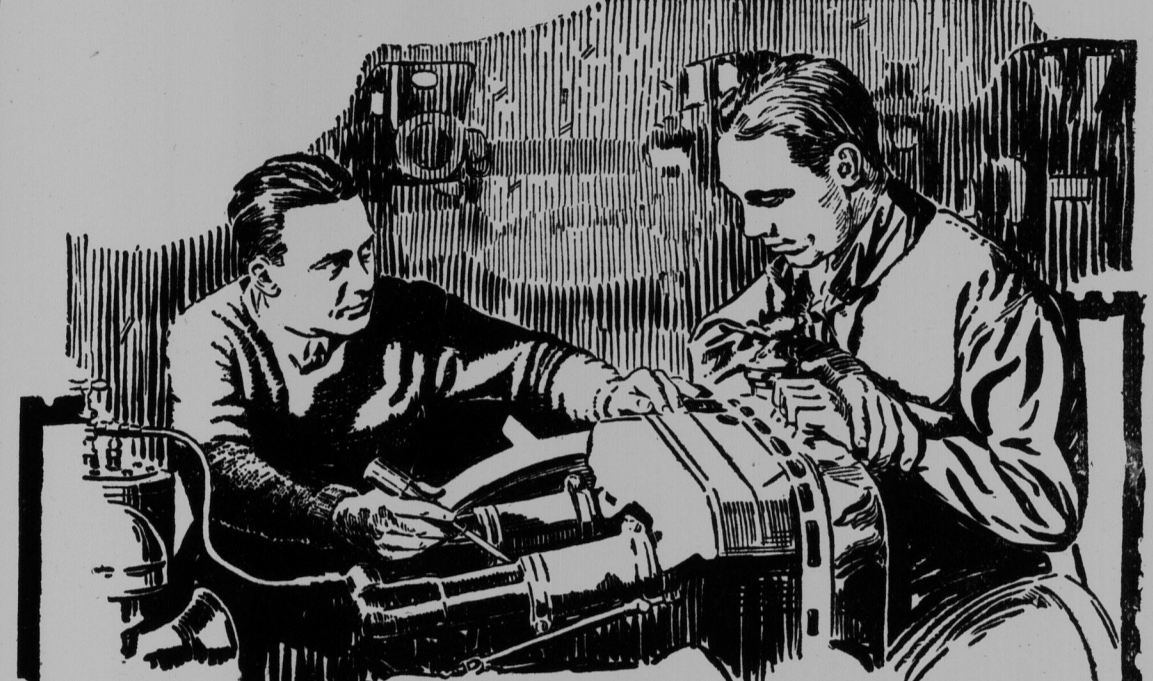

OTTAWA, May 28.—"Regarding the claim of extraterritoriality as applied to parliament buildings, it is a very big question which requires careful study and consideration," stated Mr. Speaker Lemieux in a report read in the house of commons tonight, respecting the recent removal of liquor from the rooms of certain members.

The Speaker denies that the order under which this action was taken was not for the purpose of conducting a liquor raid. "I may, however," continued the Speaker, "state in a general way that the immunities, rights and privileges of parliament are of immemorial standing; and, according to Anson, Page 153, it has always been admitted by the courts that the house has exclusive right, to regulate its own internal concerns."

The statement of the Speaker was as follows: "With regard to the complaints arising out of the action of the sergeant-at-arms in taking means to prevent theft in members' rooms, the matter was brought before the Board of Internal Economy this morning.

ACTION IN GOOD FAITH

"After hearing Colonel Bowie's explanation and considering his memorandum, the board was of the opinion that he acted in good faith, his sole object being to protect the property of members. Since the opening of the session, different objects, and sometimes money, have disappeared from desks in the members' rooms. It is a well known fact that there are several keys for each room, some of which are for change service secretaries, messengers and pages. A patrol has always been carried out for fire protection and other services, such as heating, light, etc."

ORDER NOT FOR LIQUOR RAID

"The emergency order given by the sergeant-at-arms on May 1 was not, as has been stated, for the purpose of raiding liquor in the rooms. The law allows any one to have liquor in one's possession, provided it is obtained legally or purchased from an authorized vendor.

"It was because of several complaints that the above order was given. Un-

fortunately, it was not written and the officer to whom it was entrusted, instead of carrying it out himself, with perhaps caution, passed it on to a subordinate who, in turn, gave it to another constable. The men who made the search found, in unlocked desks, several objects besides liquor, which they labelled and took over to the constables' quarters.

"In view of the wrong impression caused by this urgent measure of protection, I have given instruction, after consulting my colleagues of the board of economy, that in future none but the usual patrol will take place and members will have to accept the responsibility for the safeguarding of their personal effects in their desks and filing cabinets.

LIBELLOUS LIST CURRENT.

"A fictitious and libellous list has been current purporting to give the names of the members in whose rooms the effects were found. The Royal Mounted Police has been requested to investigate as to how it originated.

"Action will be taken as soon as the report is received.

"Undue importance was given to this incident, which, after all, was nothing but a measure of protection unfortunately magnified and aggravated by the circumstances that it seemed connected

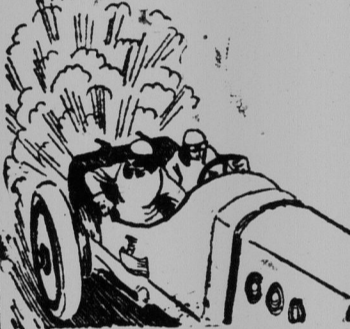

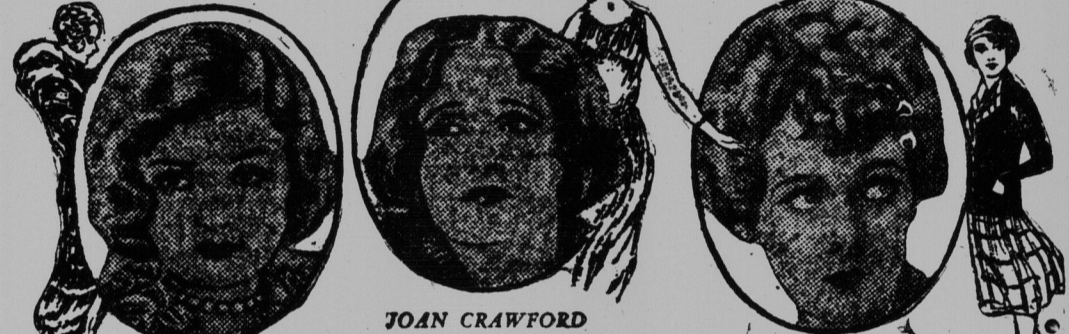
