United Press MOSCOW, May 29.—Four persons have been sentenced to death and many have been sentenced to death and many to varying terms of imprisonment at the trial of more than 100 persons in connection with gross corruption and extortion by the Kiew police force, dispatches from that city said. whatever comes without whining or boasting; to be a good housekeeper and make a comfortable home.


In addition to these, the chief duty of a doctor's wife is to put

We don't have to go very far afield for examples. We have one right in our midst in the person of Charlie Gorman, although in Gorman's case, they did not even give him a chance to show off after he had rightly won his world crown. There was another notable case concerning Paavo Nurmi and his expense account but that was hushed up and the silent Finn went back with only a slight reprimand. Hugo Quist was named as goat. Then, his countryman, Clas Thunberg, of Lily Lake fame, got into a similar kind of a mess with Mr. Quist but he got out of the country in time before the suspension parchment arrived but not after he and Charlie Jewtraw had broken a well-known amateur law that bars any matching of competitors. The list might run on indefinitely and might include a lot of the old timers but the latest addition is Charley Hoff, the brilliant Norwegian pole vaulter, who sweeps the cobwebs and dust off the roof of every building he performs in with the aid of a trusty stick and some natural talent. Mr. Hoff reaches such heights that the spectators in the top row get a cramp in their necks watching him go over the bar. In other words, what Mr. Hoff does in his own special way, he does exceedingly well—the best in the world, in fact. For some reason or other, he did not show up as billed at a special meet and thereby, doubtless, caused much concern to the amateur promoters. He says he was sick. The A. A. U. declines to take that for an answer and bars him. Now, Mr. Hoff wants to go to court. Personally, we believe he will find scant satisfaction in that quarter and the best thing he can do is to get out before it gets worse. The point is that Mr. Hoff is no exception to the general rule—that prominent European amateur athletes always get into some kind of trouble every time they come to the States. The only way we know of to avoid this is not to come.






