Winnipeg, Man., July 27.—Returns for Manitoba's two new sources of taxition, future grain trading and gasoline \$225,000 annually, show a subtantial sum collected for the first months' operation, the provincial treading vielded \$16,808.10 for the business transacted in May.

Future grain trading yielded \$8,429.52 and the gasoline tax \$8,438.50.

The tax on future grain trading is fix cents a 1,000 bushels on wheat, three cents on oats, barley and rye and 12 cents on flax. The tax on gasoline is one cent, a gallon.

160 firms on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange contributed to the trading tax, and 13 companies paid taxes on 143,858 gallons of gasoline sold throughout the province for the month of May.






