tors believe, have been a source of much amusement ane instruction to the members generally, if not to the citizens at large, for they have excited an emulation among the numerous amateurs who have taken part in them and have besides been the means of directing the attention of several young persons to the study and practice of music and elocution. As before stated, sixteen Reunions in all have been held, and they were conducted so economically that the rates of admission were placed so low as to bring them within the reach of the whole community. It was at the outset determined by the Directors that the proceeds of the first series of entertainments, should, after deducting the necessary expenses, become the nucleus of a fund to be applied to the purchase of a Full Concert Grand Piano Forte for the Music Hall. In accordance with this decision the surplus funds accruing from this source are held in trust by the Institute for that purpose. By reference to the financial statement it will be seen that the Reunions have been a source of considerable profit to the Institute.

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The Directors feel under obligations to those ladies and gentlemen, the Amateurs, who during the past season so generously lent their invaluable assistance at these entertainments, for to their talents the success of the whole enterprise may in a great measure be attributed.
