TUESDAY, *June 18th*, 1872.

THE SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF TORONTO, in obedience to the summons of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, assembled for Divine Service in St. James's Cathedral, on Tuesday, June 18th, 1872, at 10 o'clock, A.M. Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. Rural Dean Givins and the Rev. Canon Beaven, D.D.; the Lessons were read by the Rev. C. J. S. Bethune, M.A. The Ante-Communion Service was said by the Ven. the Archdeacon of Niagara, the Epistle being read by the Rev. Dr. Twing, of New York. The Sermon was preached by the Rev. Canon Osler, M.A., from the text Judges xvi. 15. The Lord Bishop of Toronto celebrated the Holy Communion, being assisted in the administration of the elements by the Very Rev. the Dean of Toronto, the Ven. the Archdeacons of Toronto and Niagara, and the Rev. Canon Read, D.D.

REPORT ON CERTIFICATES OF LAY REPRESENTATIVES.

The Rev. A. J. Broughall presented the Report of the Committee on Certificates of Lay-Representatives; it was read by the Clerical Secretary, and referred to the Court on Contested Seats. (*See Appendix.*)

THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS.

The Lord Bishop then delivered his address as follows:—

Reverend Brethren, and Brethren of the Laity:

In deference to the wish expressed to me by several members of the Synod, and to meet what I believed to be a general convenience, I have been led to adopt a later day for our Annual Meeting than the one provided in our revised Constitution. But in doing so, you are aware, I am availing myself of a permission expressed in that clause of the Constitution, to change the day there named, if there should be satisfactory reasons for doing so.

Since our last meeting in Synod, two clergymen have left this Diocese, and another has made arrangements for visiting England, and taking temporary duty there. We have received during that interval, eight clergymen from other Dioceses; one from Quebec, one from Montreal, one from Huron, two from Ontario, and one each from England and the United States.

An Ordination was held in All Saints' Church, Whitby, on the 8th of October last, when two were ordained deacons, and four were admitted to the priesthood. These additions to our number enabled me to open two new missions; to supply a clergyman to the important mission of North Essa, which had been for many months vacant; and, on transferring the incumbent of Aurora to Wellington Square, afforded me the means of supplying that mission also. The failing health of the esteemed Rector of Wellington Square, rendered it necessary to make a competent provision for his duties; and the energy and liberality of the parishioners happily rendered this of easy attainment. An ordination had been held in the month of July previous, in the Church of the Ascension at Hamilton, when a gentleman was admitted to the Order of Deacons, who was desirous of uniting with the charge of a Grammar School in a growing town, such ministerial work as could with advantage be assigned to him.

I observed much interest to be awakened by the holding of ordinations in places where the opportunity of witnessing them had not before been enjoyed. They have invariably made a marked impression, by bringing into fuller view the solemn responsibilities of the ministerial office, and serving to beget a more becoming reverence and consideration for those who are entrusted with it. The practical teaching of the Ordination Services is felt to be of high value to the laity as well as to the clergy; and it is a pleasure to state that the proposal to hold them in our more prominent parishes, outside this city, is always cordially accepted.

We have to lament the death of four clergymen in our Diocese during the past twelve months. The Rev. RALPH LEEMING, who has recently been taken to his rest, discharged, during the early period of his residence among us, a large amount of missionary duty. He was the first resident minister of Ancaster, with charge of the surrounding country, including the now large city of Hamilton. It was then but a village, and the few Church people it contained availed themselves of Mr. Leeming's ministrations at the old church in Barton, about three miles distant. He was engaged subsequently in other spheres of duty; but his health became shattered, and, feeling himself unequal to continuous work, he made application to be allowed to retire. This was granted; but he was always willing to render his assistance where this was specially solicited. His unflinching interest in the welfare of the Church, and desire for its progress, has been practically manifested by a legacy of \$4,000 to the Mission Fund of the Diocese, and of \$2,000 towards the erection of a new parsonage at Ancaster.

The Rev. Dr. NEVILLE, in choosing Canada for his ministerial work, attached himself as assistant minister to Christ Church, Hamilton, where he remained for several years. On a vacancy occurring in the Church of St. Thomas, in that city, he was at his own request appointed its incumbent. His tenure of it proved to be short, but during the three years of his incumbency, he accomplished the erection

He had not long entered it, when there was an aggravation of the painful disease which caused his death; and, after months of severe suffering, he was taken to his rest in the month of July last. Dr. Neville possessed many abilities of no common order, and was very attractive as a preacher.

The Rev. JOHN HILTON commenced his ministerial career in a remote country mission covering a large extent of territory, in which he laboured with great assiduity and success. He was transferred to another, demanding less toil, where he prosecuted his work diligently and acceptably for several years. The severe trial of a country mission proved, however, too much for his strength, impaired as his constitution was by a painful, and what proved to be a fatal disease; and he was appointed to the charge of Brockton, within the bounds of this city, where he continued zealously employed for about nine years.

The Rev. CHARLES DADE came to this country about the close of the year 1829, having been appointed Mathematical Master in Upper Canada College. He retired from that post after several years of valuable service, and betook himself to agricultural pursuits. He never sought any settled or permanent duty in the church; but shewed a willingness to supply vacant missions for a time, and devoted himself earnestly to the work when it was undertaken. Without any special charge, he continued to the last to render ministerial assistance in his neighbourhood whenever required, and this he did cheerfully and heartily. He possessed high mathematical and classical attainments, with a large store of general information. He was of a guileless spirit and unblemished life, and died respected and beloved by all who knew him.

Soon after the rising of the Synod last year, I renewed my Confirmation tours; and have since that time visited fifty-eight parishes and missions for the administration of that rite, and admitted to it 429 males and 701 females; in all 1,130. During the last twelve months I have consecrated six churches, two burial grounds, and two cemeteries.

It had been suggested to me in some quarters that it would be advisable to suspend the regular course of confirmations, in the rural parts especially, for one year; the interval of two years between them, which I have hitherto allowed, being found, in many cases, too short to secure the collection of any considerable number of candidates. I have felt that it would be advisable, at certain intervals, to act upon that suggestion. The impressiveness of the ordinance is undoubtedly much increased by the presence of a large number of candidates; while it loses much in interest and effect when the number presented is very small. This has not, however, by any means, a general application; for in some parishes, especially in this city, they are prepared for, and they obtain, annual confirmations.

The few weeks of leisure which the acting upon this suggestion will allow, it is my intention to employ in a short visit to the mother country. While the benefits of a recreative trip of this character are on physical grounds not to be overlooked, we may all learn much from what we see, and from those we confer with, in our mother-land, which could be brought to bear with benefit upon the work of the Church amongst ourselves. I anticipate, with much hope, all these advantages from

my proposed visit to England; but, many as are its charms and attractions, it is my full intention to return by the middle of September. During my brief absence, the clergy, or others, are requested to communicate with their respective Archdeacons on those subjects connected with the local interests of the Church, upon which they have been in the habit of addressing myself. The Archdeacons, I am assured, will give their best attention to such communications.

Our increase of labourers during the past year has not, as I have stated to you, been large; but, through immigration and the results of the next ordinations, we hope to meet the more pressing requirements of the Diocese. I purpose holding an ordination on the twenty-ninth of the present month, and another early in October. It is very gratifying to perceive that the disposition is growing and spreading to give to our clergy a more adequate pecuniary support. The efforts to increase their stipends have been in many cases successful; and you will observe with satisfaction that the increased contributions to our Mission Fund enable the board to make large and liberal grants to those portions of the Diocese where the members of the Church are not in a condition to contribute much towards the support of their minister.

A meeting of the Provincial Synod has taken place since we last assembled here. It is to be lamented that from circumstances which were quite unforeseen and could not be controlled, its short session was so unusually meagre of results. There was a hope that something might be determined on, at least in the House of Bishops, which would meet a growing desire that more elasticity and vigour should be given to the conducting of public worship, by a shortening or division of the Services, and by a more strict and uniform adherence to rubrical directions. After much deliberation, it was thought best to leave counsels and suggestions on these points to the individual Bishops of the Province, these being confined to an interpretation of what is laid down and established, without the proposal of anything extraneous or new.

On the question of the shortening and division of the Services, we have happily a guidance in the recent Acts of Convocation in England, now confirmed by Act of Parliament. I am willing that these arrangements should be adopted amongst ourselves in cases where it would be found advantageous to introduce them; and I am ready to afford my best advice to those who may be desirous of carrying them into effect.

On the question of adherence to rubrical directions in the conducting of public worship, I shall briefly offer my own opinions and recommendations, which are in general accordance with the opinions expressed by the assembled Bishops; and I believe that my brethren of the clergy, at the least, will feel that such expression of them is not only desirable, but necessary.

The use of the Offertory has become so general that it is hardly necessary to say a word in favour of its adoption and continuance. All, I believe, have come to feel that praise is as much a duty in God's house as prayer; that thankfulness for mercies received should be as regularly expressed as petitions for temporal and spiritual blessings. And the great fact has come to be more appreciated, that our words of praise and gratitude should, ere the service is concluded, find substantial and practical utterance in the contribution of our alms for carrying out God's work

It is well, as all will admit, that these should be contributed in a solemn way, accompanied by words from the Holy Scriptures of admonition and encouragement. These are supplied in the well-chosen sentences of our prescribed Offertory; and at the presentation of the alms on the Lord's Table, the rising up of the whole congregation, as identifying themselves individually with that grateful offering, is an act reverential in itself, and much to be commended. It is true there is no special direction for such an act at the time, but there is nothing that forbids it. Being appropriate and devout, the adoption of it can hardly fail, I think, to meet with general approbation.

But I desire, also, to see a universal adoption of what the rubric prescribes, following the repetition of these sentences, and the collection of these thankful gifts. I desire to see an actual presentation of them to Almighty God in the words of the admirable prayer for the church militant. I trust that the complaint, if any were seriously entertained, will be abandoned, that the repetition of this prayer adds so considerably to the length of the service. This complaint might to some extent be mitigated by the omission of any collect before sermon, and a judicious abbreviation of the sermon itself. For the prayer before sermon there does not appear to be any authority; and if, in the rubric following the Nicene Creed, the words "then shall follow the sermon," would seem to indicate that the sermon is itself a part of the ante-communion office, the introduction of any prayer before it might fairly be regarded as contravening the letter of that rubric. The introduction of the sermon by a special prayer would appear to isolate it from that office, and make it a service by itself.

It might scarcely be necessary to notice the assertion, that the last paragraph but one in the rubrical directions, following the Offertory sentences, means that the use of the prayer for the Church militant is to be restricted to occasions on which the holy communion is administered. The incorrectness of such an opinion is at once shewn in the first rubric that occurs at the conclusion of our communion office. The words are these,—“Upon the Sundays and other holydays (if there be no communion) shall be said all that is appointed at the communion until the end of the general prayer, ‘For the whole state of Christ's Church militant here on Earth.’”

On occasions when the holy communion is administered, it has always been understood as the meaning of the Church that, after the prayer for the Church militant, there should be a pause to allow non-communicants to retire. It would be impossible to discover any authority whatever for adding on such occasions a collect with the minor blessing, “The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ,” &c. This would indicate a recognized conclusion of the service to such as might choose so to regard it; and it would indicate also a justification of non-communicants, in not allowing them to depart without a blessing.

It would tend much to the impressiveness of Divine service, especially at its morning celebrations, if there were no change of sacred vestments, and the surplice were used throughout. It is directed that, after the Nicene Creed and the announcements which may follow, the sermon should at once be proceeded with, and that

immediately after the sermon the minister should return to the Lord's table for other offices. It cannot be doubted that it is meant he should do so,—both ascend the pulpit and return from it to the Lord's table,—in the same vestment in which he had previously been officiating. There is, moreover, no recorded direction or rubric to shew that there is any but the one vestment, the surplice, to be used. This is declared, indeed, to be the fact in the Purchas Judgment, given several months ago by Her Majesty's Privy Council,—a tribunal which has shewn itself particularly adverse to anything like novelty or innovation in the Church.

I do not desire to enter with minuteness upon disputed points, and so shall content myself with adding that when, at the ante-communion service, prayers are directed to be said at the north side of the Lord's-table, we should accept that direction as it has been generally understood, namely, the actual north side when the church stands east and west, or the same relative position if the church be otherwise placed.

I have considered it but right and dutiful, my brethren, to refer to these points: because I know that in regard to them counsel and direction is in many quarters desired. And the counsel now affectionately offered springs not from any strong predilections of a personal character, but from a belief and conviction of what the mind of the Church is, and the persuasion, too, that its adoption would help to ensure the pleasing and edifying feature of uniformity, and remove many of the jealousies and suspicions which arise from the contemplation of diverse opinion and diverse action in what the sober and religious mind regards as sacred and essential.

I have had occasion, in the course of my Confirmation tours throughout the diocese, to observe a very general and marked improvement in the decorum and reverence of our congregations during Divine service. This, as a rule, has been particularly visible in the candidates for confirmation, shewing that they are duly impressed by the solemnity of the occasion, and dutifully affected by the gravity of the vows and the engagements they are assuming. This we must all rejoice to witness, because such reverence in God's house bespeaks a due consideration of His Divine Majesty,—it is an indication of a fear to offend God, and of a desire to obey and please Him. It has a direct influence, too, upon the moral life; it begets restraint and self-control when human passion would assert its power, and the world presents its temptations. On the other hand, when we observe listlessness and indifference in God's house,—the knee unbent, and no voice responding to the words of prayer or praise,—it is too sure an evidence that God is not in the thoughts of such persons, and that whatever interest they may feel in what man utters as from himself, they have little consideration of their own absolute need and dependence, and little desire to recognize their heavenly Watcher and Benefactor in their every day walk in life.

In touching upon the duties and the edification of Divine service, I cannot refrain from expressing my hearty appreciation of the amended Table of Lessons that has been adopted, and its marked superiority to the one it has been made to supersede. In the words of an English prelate, recently uttered,—“The faults of the old Lectionary were glaring; it was difficult to believe that intelligent care had been bestowed on some of its arrangements. The new Table is not perfect; but

the leading features of it commend themselves to the judgment of every unprejudiced inquirer; and in some particulars its collocation of passages, and its adaptation of isolated paragraphs, are so felicitous as practically to cast a new light on the Scriptures, which it is instrumental in dispensing to those who regularly attend the services of the Church."

It will be our wisdom, brethren, to keep pace with the improvements introduced with thoughtful wariness by our Mother Church, and to avoid any changes in her time-honoured Ritual which her deliberate voice has not sanctioned. It is refreshing to perceive that her outspoken judgment upon a Creed which, in recent days, so many of the learned as well as ill-informed have ventured to assail, is in accordance with the persuasions of truth and duty. The traditions of more than a thousand years, giving all their weight to embodied verities which God's Word contains, are not to give way to the free and hasty speculations of this modern age. The Holy Hymn, as we may term the Athanasian Creed, which develops and expands a vital truth, is not to cease at the bidding of a bold and widening spirit of scepticism. We are not required to declare our repugnance to use words, in our affirmation of belief, and in expressing the penalty to which unbelief is liable, which our gentle and Divine Saviour used before us. We are not to be frightened from saying, as the writer of the Apocalypse, under Divine inspiration, said, that "unbelievers," not less than the ungodly and the profligate, are to have part in the lake of fire to which the unredeemed wicked are consigned. We rejoice at this, as giving testimony that the convictions of our "Masters in Israel" are sound and deep, and that, if a few are of errant and doubting spirit, the mind of the Church, in its entirety, is a stable mind.

It would, indeed, be perilous, were she wavering or capricious on momentous truths; the Church has a responsibility which it would grieve and alarm us to see her treat with lightness. Her work is, confessedly, to lead fallen man to the true source of pardon, and to teach him to aim at the recovery of the moral image in which he was at first created. If the passions, and prejudices, and divisions of professing Christians themselves, are a distressing hindrance to the attainment of this noble and dutiful aspiration, we have much in the condition of the world around us to warn and rouse us to a vigorous and united effort to arrest the increasing tide of sin and crime. The developments of a grossly evil spirit at the present day, fill us with horror and alarm; the profligacy and wanton cruelty of which we hear so many instances, make us tremble for our social peace and safety.

It is but right to inquire to what all this enormity of wickedness is traceable, that we may come, if possible, to the remedy. That is largely to be ascribed, as all must be persuaded, to the neglect of religious instruction in early life; to the contentment of peoples and Governments to afford a shallow secular education, without the leavening of religious truth, or the moral obligations that it teaches. The child taught and trained for this world's vocations only, without a deep inculcation of the love and fear of God, and the penalty hereafter of an irreligious and wicked life, will have but one leading idea—self-aggrandizement and self-indulgence, and will be checked by no restraint of conscience in the way and means of securing

them. Gigantic frauds will be perpetrated, if riches can thus be acquired; atrocious murders will be committed, if these will remove the barrier to unholy and polluting connections, or cast out of sight the objects of jealousy and hatred.

I have no disposition to reprobate this defect in the system of education prevailing with the authority and support of Government among ourselves. I know the difficulty, the almost impossibility, of securing the temporal boon, with the addition of the spiritual; how hard it must prove in a divided religious community, to introduce among the secular lessons which are meant for usefulness and advancement in the world, that lofty and holy teaching which trains the soul for heaven. The irreverent and fierce assaults recently made upon a praiseworthy effort of the Superintendent of Education in this Province to introduce a special work for moral and religious instruction amongst our common school pupils, testify too plainly the difficulty of applying that want.

I have confidence in the good intentions and righteous efforts of that venerable gentleman to do what he can for the amelioration of the evils which the absence of systematic religious teaching of the young must induce; so that we may have a hope that, from his tried zeal and unquestionable ability, a way may be devised by which such essential instruction shall be imparted, and the terrible evils we deplore to some extent corrected.

A praiseworthy interest has recently been revived for the improvement of the spiritual condition of those members of the Church in this Diocese, who, living at a vast distance and being much scattered, are without any adequate ministerial oversight. I refer to the large, and I may add, wild, tract of country lying to the north-west of us, and extending even beyond Prince Arthur's Landing and Fort William. On the route from hence to that remote region are, at different points, considerable bodies of Indians; but to these we have been unable thus far to supply more than two missionaries. Last year, through the generous aid of Mr. Dodge, we were enabled to place a missionary at Byng Inlet, on the north shore of Georgian Bay; and I am happy to have had it in my power to appoint a clergyman to Sault Ste. Marie, where a neat and substantial church has been built, and where a good congregation can be formed. Much disappointment has been experienced in the endeavour to furnish that promising field with a minister; but we cannot help the extreme paucity of clergymen, and so must not be blamed if we cannot, without a painful delay, meet the many applications that are made to us.

It has been strongly urged that the formation of that large tract of country into a separate diocese, with the appointment of a bishop to superintend it, would give life and energy to church work in that quarter. This we cannot but admit; and I am willing to give all the aid in my power towards the accomplishment of this good object. I am happy to communicate to the Synod that I have recently been informed, by a letter from the Secretary, that our great benefactor in former years, the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, has a sum of £950 sterling, arising from certain legacies, which they are willing to appropriate to the endowment of the proposed See in Algoma, on condition that in Canada a sum of at least £4,000 sterling is raised for the same purpose, and invested in approved securities, before the 31st December, 1875. him know, as soon as possible, whether the offer will be accepted, with a reasonable prospect of the fulfilment of it, I replied without delay that, on behalf of the Diocese of Toronto, I accepted the offer.

The invigorating influence of Episcopal oversight, and the ministrations that pertain to it, have not unnaturally led many earnest minds to the desire of subdividing existing Sees, in cases where the extent of territory and the difficulty of oversight is not so marked or apparent. We must respect such motives, and we must not discourage such efforts; but if there be an evil in very large Dioceses, where personal oversight cannot be so minutely exercised, there is, it must be admitted, an evil also in having them of very circumscribed dimensions. In such as these there is to be apprehended a serious lowering of the dignity of the Episcopal office, and a lessening of the appreciation of its distinctiveness and supremacy. And with the more minute supervision which narrow limits would allow, there is a danger of its trenching upon functions which pertain to subordinate orders in the Church. There is a risk that, in a Diocese of very contracted limits, the Episcopal may descend into ministrations that are parochial; and that, with an abated sense of its distinctiveness, the importance and need of the order may come to be disregarded.

We have also to take into account the large expense of providing endowments for the new Sees as they are formed. And it will be admitted that pressing necessities of the Diocese, as it is, ought first to be supplied.

I believe that the Diocese at large will feel it to be most desirable, if not an absolute obligation, to provide as soon as possible a Synod Hall, and a See House; to do something towards permanently sustaining the Institutions for the instruction of our rising youth, both male and female, in the principles of the Church; to improve the condition of our Widows and Orphans' fund; and to inaugurate a Sustentation fund, from which may be drawn a permanent relief to our weaker parishes. To this last every succeeding generation may be expected to contribute its quota, but the present generation can hardly regard themselves as relieved from the responsibility of starting it.

In addition to this, we have an appeal to our sympathy and aid from a distant portion of the Empire, the force of which it is impossible to disregard. I have recently received a communication from a clergyman in India, formerly of this Diocese, expressing the wish of the Bishop of Calcutta to obtain the help of every branch of the Anglican Church in the conversion of 200,000,000 of heathens in that country. "We have already," he says, "working in India, missionaries belonging to the Presbyterian, Episcopal, and German Lutheran Churches of America, whose wealth and resources are much less than those of the Canadian Church, and one or two of which have established missions to their own Red Indians as well; may we not depend upon your Lordship's charity to influence the Canadian Church to make a beginning like those Churches have done, and to send a missionary or two to the heathen of this land, and so show your sympathy with our Church here. A few men of zeal and piety, who would devote themselves to Christ's cause simply from love to Him and desire to preach His love, would have a noble field before them. There are thousands, and tens of thousands, of ignorant idolaters in every city;

and if God should give your missionaries the privilege of reaping as sowing, a blessed work would be accomplished for the Church." After speaking in high terms of the race of people whom it is desired to convert, and their readiness to receive sound instruction, he says: "The aim of the Universal Church should be to enlighten this admirable race, and to prevent them from drifting into the infidelity and conceit which western knowledge seems to bring with it, when unsanctified by religious teaching. The fanaticism and bigotry of the uneducated Sikhs and Mahomedans have also to be removed; and it is believed that Christianity is the only real influence which will convert these discontented and turbulent people to a loving reliance upon British rule." Although we have very much to do for ourselves—much to engage our charity and assistance at our own doors—we cannot deny the truth of what he thus proceeds to state: "The carrying on of Foreign Missions seems rather to add vigour to a Church's life, than to cripple its efforts. The Church of England has probably equal reason with the Church in Canada to spend all its powers in providing for home missions; yet its simple faith in our Lord's command, to preach the Gospel to every creature, has impelled it to send out missionaries to all parts of the world; so that Canada, as well as India, has reaped the blessing, without, I firmly believe, any hindrance having been caused to preaching to the neglected poor in England. The same eager desire to preach the Gospel in other parts, has been the mark of all Christian churches from the beginning; but how great would have been the loss to the world and to Christianity, if timid and selfish counsels had prevailed in former days, to confine all mission work to the local wants of the several churches then existing!"

It is suggested as a means for obtaining the necessary funds that there should be a special annual collection for this purpose. This, doubtless, would furnish a considerable amount; but for the success of the project we must look for other and liberal contributions. The passage and outfit of a missionary to India would be a large expense; and the annual stipend to a missionary in so expensive a country would be more than is requisite in our colonies. I lay the interesting subject before the Synod, believing that it will engage their earnest consideration, and I trust their hearty support.

We might have comparatively little difficulty in carrying out, at no distant period, all the Church objects that are brought before us, if all our members were influenced by a due sense of the responsibility that rests upon them to appropriate to God's cause a proper share of the wealth which, through His blessing, has accrued to them. We shall not be accounted rash in saying that, beyond all ordinary and established claims and appeals, thousands might be contributed for such noble purposes as have been detailed, by the rich and prosperous of our country. It is in the power of not a few to carry out some one of these objects individually; and we might see gigantic results on behalf of God's Church if, instead of bequeathing at death,—as doubtless it is the intention of many to do—liberal sums to many of our Church enterprises, they would during their life-time make such contributions, and have the satisfaction of witnessing themselves the blessed effects of the gifts they have laid at the feet of their Divine Master for the furtherance of His kingdom upon earth.

Before I conclude, I cannot refrain from noticing the growing desire that is manifested for free and unappropriated seats in our churches. I would sincerely encourage this movement, as being one which would contribute much to gather into the Church our poorer members, and promote amongst all classes a recognition of their Christian brotherhood. On the appropriating and renting system a church can never be thoroughly filled. Families, or individuals, rarely occupy the whole of the sittings appropriated to them. Oftentimes they are not half occupied; and not unfrequently they are entirely empty. And it is saddening to consider that there may, at the same time, be many who would gladly occupy the room which is thus vacant, but upon which they do not feel that they dare intrude.

I am sensible of the weight of the reasons which, in the weaker days of the Church in this Diocese, led to the adoption of the system of leasing pews; and how impossible it was in any other way to obtain the revenue required for the maintenance of the Church. But the introducing of the offertory, now become so general, has, to a large extent, supplied that need; and the envelope system has served so much to increase these contributions as, in many cases, to render pew-rents unnecessary.

But while I advocate the abolition of these, and a return to the primitive and purer system, I by no means advise a hasty or incautious abrogation of what has been long established; but to effect it with a becoming respect for the well-ascertained opinion of the congregation, and a careful regard for vested rights and privileges, which their possessor may not always be able to surrender without some equivalent compensation. Yet it would be well, as far as possible, to construct all new churches on the principle that the seats are to be unreservedly and forever free.

But I have detained you, my brethren, too long, and must come to a conclusion. You have much important business before you, on which I solicit your calm consideration and honest conclusion. Our time, too, is precious, and you will yourselves best discriminate between subjects that are pressing and practical, and such as are extraneous, or can well be postponed. You are aware that in a very few instances can the clergy be spared from their charges on the ensuing Sunday, and experience has taught us that to postpone any of our work to the following week is to hazard so diminished a house that it would not fairly be uttering the voice of the Diocese.

I pray that the Holy Spirit may guide you in your deliberations, and make you as much as possible to be of one mind and one purpose in the endeavour to glorify God and benefit His people.

ADMISSION TO SEAT ON THE FLOOR OF THE SYNOD.

CORRESPONDENCE.

Communications were read from the Secretary of the Dominion Telegraph Company, informing the Members of the Synod that a large supply of blank forms of telegrams, franked with the stamp of the Company, was placed at their disposal.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS OF LAST SYNOD.

Free Seats in Churches.

The Rev. Rural Dean Lett moved, seconded by Colonel O'Brien,

That in view of the missionary character of the Church, this Synod strongly recommends that in all cases where it is practicable the seats in Churches hereafter built in this Diocese should be free and unappropriated, the support of the ministrations of religion being derived from the Offertory system, as recommended by Holy Scripture; and further, that the General Purposes Committee be instructed, in granting aid to new Churches, to shew a preference to Churches in which the seats are to be free.

Moved in amendment by the Rev. S. J. Boddy, seconded by Mr. Wm. Gamble That a Committee be appointed to collect statistics on this subject before any action be taken by the Synod, to report to the next Session.

A discussion ensued on the subject which continued until Six o'clock, P.M., when the Synod adjourned.

DIOCESAN SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION.

At Eight o'clock, P.M., the Diocesan Sunday School Association Meeting, in connection with the Synod, was held. In the absence of the Lord Bishop the Rev. Canon Read, V. P., was called to the Chair. After singing and prayer, the Chairman opened the proceedings with a brief address. The Rev. J. P. DuMoulin, M.A., of Hamilton, then delivered an address on the subject of the "Preparation of the Lesson by the Teacher," which was followed by an interesting discussion, in which Rev. Dr. O'Meara, Dr. Hodgins, Rev. Mr. Vicars, and Rev. Mr. Worrell, took part. The Rev. Dr. Twing, of New York, was next called on, and addressed the meeting. He was followed by the Rev. T. S. Cartwright, with an able Essay on "School Management and Classification." The proceedings then terminated with the singing of a hymn and the pronouncing of the benediction.

FREE SEATS IN CHURCHES.

The adjourned discussion on the Rev. Rural Dean Lett's motion was then continued, the mover being allowed to omit the following words from his resolution, "*the support of the ministrations of religion being derived from the Offertory system, as recommended by Holy Scripture,*" and also the word "*further,*" in the last clause, p. 89.

It was moved in amendment to the amendment, by the Rev. J. Hebden, seconded by the Rev. John Vicars,

That whereas, in the opinion of this Synod, the preaching of a free gospel would be more hopefully promoted under the open pew system, than under the rented pew arrangement, which at present so generally prevails:

And whereas, the purely voluntary principle does not appear to be laid down in the Scriptures, as that upon which the preachers of the

Gospel are to rely exclusively for their support, while it is recognized as having a most important place in the life of the Christian Church:

Be it therefore Resolved, That in every Parish and Mission in which the parishioners or people shall by endowment—the nature of which to be approved by the Board of Missions—secure for its clergyman, three-fourths of his stipend (the amount of which to be determined by the Bishop), the pews in the Church or Churches of said Parish or Mission, shall be thereupon free and unappropriated for ever.

At one o'clock the Synod adjourned for an hour.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Lord Bishop announced that he had nominated the following to serve on the Executive Committee,—The Dean of Toronto, Archdeacon of Toronto, Archdeacon of Niagara, Rural Dean Osler, Rev. S. J. Boddy: The Hon. J. H. Cameron, and Messrs. S. H. Blake, S. B. Harman, A. H. Campbell, and G. Percival Ridout.

It was then moved by Rev. J. Hebden, seconded by Rev. J. Fletcher, and carried,

That the Rev. Canon Read, Mr. F. A. Ball, and Mr. R. Snelling, be Scrutineers of the vote for the remaining members of the Executive Committee.

The election was then proceeded with.

BISHOP OF ONTARIO.

The Bishop here announced the presence of his Lordship the Bishop of Ontario, who was received with applause on the part of the Synod—the members rising—and took a seat on the platform.

FREE SEATS IN CHURCHES.

The adjourned discussion on the "Free Seat" subject was then resumed, and continued at some length, when both the amendments to the Resolution were withdrawn, and also the last clause of the original motion. The original motion, as amended, was then put, and carried unanimously as follows:—

That, in view of the Missionary character of this Church, this Synod strongly recommends, that in all cases where it is practicable, the seats in Churches hereafter built in this Diocese should be free and unappropriated.

MISSIONARY BISHOPRIC OF ALGOMA.

The Rev. Rural Dean Givins then requested the suspension of the Order of Proceedings so far as to allow him to introduce his motion, of which notice had been given, respecting the establishment of a Missionary Bishopric. Permission being granted, Rural Dean Givins moved, seconded by the Rev. T. S. Cartwright,

That, in the opinion of this Synod, the establishment of a Missionary Bishopric in the Algoma District is a matter of immediate and imperative necessity; and that with a view of carrying out the arrangement for the appointment of a Missionary Bishop, in accordance with the terms of the Canon proposed by the House of Bishops in the year 1868, a Committee be appointed to confer on the subject with any similar Committees that may be appointed by the Synods of other Dioceses in the Province.—*Carried.*

Moved by Chief Justice Draper, seconded by Ven. Archdeacon Palmer,

That this Synod acknowledges, with feelings of profound interest and satisfaction, the generous offer which has been made by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, of a grant of £950, in aid of a fund for the establishment and support of a Missionary Bishopric in the Algoma District, on condition that a sum of £4000 be raised locally for the same object by the year 1875; and the Synod hereby endorses the acceptance of the offer already made by his Lordship the Bishop, and pledges itself to raise its quota of the required sum.

MISSIONARY BISHOPRIC COMMITTEE

His Lordship nominated the following Committee on the Missionary Bishopric:—Ven. Archdeacon Palmer, Ven. Archdeacon Fuller, Canon Baldwin, Rev. Rural Dean Givins, Rev. Mr. Cartwright, Messrs. C. J. Campbell, S. H. Blake, Adam Brown, J. Ham Perry.

His Lordship, the Metropolitan, having sent a communication by telegraph to the effect that he would be happy to receive a deputation to-morrow on the above subject; the Lord Bishop appointed as a deputation Rev. Rural Dean Givins and the Rev. T. S. Cartwright.

CONFIRMATION OF LAST SESSION BY-LAWS.

Moved by the Rev. Mr. Smithett, seconded by the Rev. Rural Dean Allen,

That the By-law on the Mission Board be confirmed.—*Carried.*

Also,

That the By-law relating to the Widows and Orphans' Fund be confirmed.—*Carried.*

On the Rev. Mr. Smithett moving the confirmation of the By-law on the Patronage of the Rectories, exception was taken to the motion on the ground that the By-law does not need confirmation, as not being a proposition for an alteration either of the Constitution, or rules of Order or Canons; and, further, that it was by mistake placed in the list of unfinished business. The objections were sustained, and the motion, after considerable discussion, was ruled out of order.

Moved by the Rev. H. C. Cooper, seconded by the Rev. the Provost of Trinity College,

That the amendment to the By-law on the Divinity Students' Fund, adopted at the last session of the Synod, be now confirmed.—*Carried.*

SUB-DIVISION OF THE DIOCESE.

Iuce, John Duggan, Q.C.

The hour of Six o'clock having arrived, the Synod adjourned.

DIOCESAN MISSIONARY MEETING.

At Eight o'clock, P.M., the Diocesan Missionary Meeting was held; the Lord Bishop in the Chair.

After singing and prayer, the Chairman said they were taking advantage of the gathering together of the Synod to excite interest in their mission work.

Ven. Archdeacon Fuller expressed his regret at the absence of Bishop Coxe, of Western New York, through domestic affliction. It had been his privilege, when visiting England five years ago, to be able to state that this Diocese was able to support thirty-two missionaries. That number had now increased to fifty-seven, and yet they had now eighty-four townships in the Diocese, independent of the territory of Muskoka, and 31,000 members of the Church without settled ministers. The Mission Fund receipts for the past year had been \$14,000,—an increase of \$431 over those of the previous year.

The Rev. Dr. Newton said he had been labouring for two years at Rosseau, a mission in the far backwoods of Muskoka, at the head of Lake Rosseau. His district was of great extent, and the country was well adapted for settlement. A great many people were coming into this territory, and he believed that in a few years that district would be of much more importance than was generally supposed. In two years almost, the Colonization Road would be finished to the south-eastern point of Lake Nipissing, connecting Lake Muskoka and Lake Rosseau with all the country stretching out to the Ottawa river, thus opening up a vast country for settlement, and affording a great field for Christian enterprise. He described his work, and the character of the settlements in which he had to labour. The people in these backwoods were very thankful for the interest shewn in their spiritual welfare.

Hon. G. W. Allan wished to draw the attention of his brother laymen to the question whether the Church's mission work was a subject which engaged a large share of their attention and prayers. He feared that there was a great amount of

indifference and ignorance on the subject among the laity. There were some who took great interest in it, and contributed largely; but, generally, the question did not receive that attention which it ought. He urged the necessity of systematic giving; and alluded to the motion before the Synod to send a Missionary Bishop to Algoma. Large numbers of people were being attracted to that district, and the population would be much increased as soon as the Pacific Railway was commenced. If they neglected the territory, the most lamentable consequences must ensue. What they wanted was better organization. He hoped to see annual missionary meetings held in every parish, and more systematic contributions to the Mission Fund.

A hymn was then sung.

Mr. Dodge was very gratified at having the opportunity of addressing them for the first time since becoming a Canadian citizen—a British subject. He referred to the wonderful change which had recently taken place in the condition of Japan, and to the spread of Christianity in Syria and India, and expressed his opinion that they were on the verge of great events in the Church. He concluded by a reference to his own district in Muskoka, and an appeal for the Algoma Bishopric.

Rev. Dr. Twing, Secretary and General Agent of the Domestic Missions of the United States, said, he had been accustomed to regard Canadian Churchmen as the half-spoilt children of an over-kind and indulgent mother—his mother as well as theirs—for the Episcopal Church of the United States looked to the Church of England as her mother. His attendance at the Synod had convinced him that they were quickly learning the lesson of self-reliance. In the mission work of the United States they found hindrances in selfishness, stinginess, and worldliness; in the parochial or local congregational idea, and in regard to dioceses, clergymen restricting themselves to their parishes, and bishops to their dioceses; but there was a great increase in the interest felt in the missionary work, and the contributions to its aid. Christian women were taking great interest in the work of domestic missions in the United States, of which he gave instances. Could they not copy these examples of women-helpers in Toronto?

An anthem was sung while the Offertory was taken up.

The Benediction was then pronounced by the Bishop.

THIRD DAY.

THURSDAY, 20th June, 1872.

MORNING SESSION.

After Morning Prayer in the Cathedral, which was said by the Rev. Rural Dean Geddes, the Synod assembled at Ten o'clock, A.M., in the School-house, for the transaction of business.

THANKSGIVING DAY.

A communication was read from the Rev. Dr. Burns, of the Canada Presbyterian Church, respecting a day of General Thanksgiving. The letter was referred to the Rev. J. B. Worrell, who has a notice on the subject on the motion paper.

Three notices of motion were then handed in.

CONGRATULATORY ADDRESS TO HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN.

It was then moved by Mr. Snelling, and seconded by Rev. Canon Baldwin,

1. That an humble congratulatory address be presented by this Synod to Her Majesty the Queen, for the recovery of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales from his recent most severe illness.

2. That a Committee be appointed to prepare such address, and report the same to this Synod.—*See Appendix.*

3. That his Lordship the Bishop be requested to present or otherwise arrange for the presentation of the same at the foot of the throne.

4. That the said Committee be composed of the following members of Synod,—The Rev. Provost Whitaker, M.A.; The Hon. Chief Justice Draper, C.B., S. H. Blake, Q.C., and the mover and seconder.

NOMINATIONS TO STANDING COMMITTEES.

Moved by Dr. Hodgins, seconded by Rural Dean Allen,

As it appears, from the last Synod Report that, of the 42 Lay Representatives out of 340 entitled to seats in the Synod, and 35 Clergymen out of 140, appointed to fill the 126 places on the Standing Committees, almost every one of them was an old member of these committees, it is desirable that a larger infusion of new members be added to these Committees this year, with a view to familiarize them with the practical work of the Synod, and to keep up their interest in it,—be it therefore resolved,—

That the latter part of the 20th Section of the Constitution, containing these words, "and said Committee shall prepare lists of all Standing Committees for the approval of the Synod," be amended, so as to read as follows:—

1. The Chairman of all the Committees of Synod shall themselves be a Committee to prepare and submit to the Executive Committee, three weeks before the meeting of Synod, lists of each of their several Committees, to be reported to the Synod on its first day of meeting, and to be printed for its information and approval.

2. From two-thirds to three-fourths of the members of each Committee, who have attended its meetings most regularly, shall be

eligible for re-nomination on such Committee. The remaining one-third (or one-fourth, as the case may be), shall be selected from members of Synod on the Secretaries' list, who were not on any of the Committees of the preceding year.

3. These resolutions shall form Section 33½ of the Constitution.

It was moved in amendment to Dr. Hodgins' motion, by the Rev. J. Carry, seconded by Rev. W. T. Smithett,

That in future, in each year, one-third of the members of Committees shall be selected from members of Synod who did not serve on any Committee during the preceding year.

Moved in amendment to the amendment by the Rev. Canon Read, seconded by the Rev. Canon Beaven,

That the Chairmen of the Standing Committees be, *ex officio*, members of the Executive Committee.

After a short discussion it was agreed, in the absence of all the members of the Executive Committee, who were in Session, that the matter should stand over till the afternoon, to be then the first order of proceedings.

AMENDMENT TO BY-LAW.

Rev. Canon Baldwin withdrew his proposed amendment to the By-laws relative to the Patronage of the Rectories, and on the formation of new parishes.

BY-LAW ON COMMUTATION TRUST FUND.

senior on the list of Non-commuted clergymen who will be benefitted by the fund, when the surplus permits.—*Carried.*

The Rev. Rural Dean Lett then introduced the following By-law, and moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. S. H. Blake,

Whereas, a By-law, embodied in the Constitution, passed in 1870, enacted that the clerical members of the Commutation Trust Committee should be selected from the number of those clergymen who created said fund; and *whereas*, it is desirable to extend the number of clergymen from whom such selection may be made: be it enacted that said selection may be made from those who shall from time to time be placed on said fund, and also from the twenty clergymen whose names appear as the Senior on the list of Non-commuted clergymen who will be benefitted by the fund, when the surplus permits.—*Carried.*

It was then moved by the Rev. Rural Dean Lett, seconded by Mr. S. H. Blake, and carried,

That the above By-law be brought up for confirmation at the next Synod, previous to the selection of the Commutation Trust Fund Committee.

Ven. Archdeacon Fuller then moved, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Geddes,

CHANGE OF CLOSE OF FINANCIAL YEAR.

The Ven. Archdeacon Fuller's motion, "That, in consequence of the many great changes effected in the country during the last thirty years, whereby the time when farmers dispose of the greater part of the produce of their farms has greatly changed, it is expedient to change the period at which the financial year shall close; and that that part of the Constitution of the Synod which fixes the close of the financial year on the 30th April, be amended by substituting the 31st December for the 30th April," was, by consent, allowed to stand over as unfinished business.

TIME OF SYNOD MEETING.

Mr. William Magrath's motion, "That with respect to the time of the meeting of Synod, with a view of securing a better attendance of members at the meetings of Synod, section seven of the Constitution of the Synod be amended, by substituting the words, 'Second Tuesday in January,' in the place of the words, 'First Tuesday in June,'" was also, by consent, left over as unfinished business.

CHURCH, PARSONAGE, AND SCHOOL ARCHITECTURE.

It was moved by the Rev. J. D. Cayley, seconded by Rev. J. Langtry,

That a Select Committee be appointed whose duty it shall be to report to the next meeting of Synod some general scheme for obtaining

plans and sketches of Churches, School-houses, Parsonages, and Church Furniture, and for giving such facilities to Parishes desirous of building, as may assist in securing, throughout the Diocese, buildings of a suitable character; and that such Committee consist of Rev. J. D. Cayley, Rev. R. S. Forneri, Rev. A. G. L. Trew, and Messrs. A. McL. Howard, J. H. Perry, and Kivas Tully.—*Carried.*

CHANGE OF DAY FOR QUARTERLY MEETINGS.

Moved by Mr. C. Magrath, seconded by Ven. Archdeacon Fuller,

That the 23rd section of the Constitution of the Synod be so amended that the word "Tuesday" be struck out, and the words "Thursday or following day" be inserted.—*Carried.*

Mr. Magrath then introduced the following By-law :

Whereas it is desirable for the better transaction of the business brought before the Standing Committees of Synod at the regular Quarterly Meetings to alter the days for holding such meetings, and to give an additional day therefor :

Be it enacted, That section 23 of the Constitution of the Synod be amended by striking out therefrom the word "Tuesday" and substituting therefor the words, "Thursday or following day."

SUSTENTATION FUND.

Moved by Mr. Snelling, seconded by the Hon. H. B. Bull :

That the resolutions proposed by Mr. Snelling, as follows :—

1. That this Synod having already acknowledged the insufficiency of the salaries received by many of the Clergy, does now further resolve, in consideration of the special claims of lengthened service, that the salaries of all such priests as have labored continuously for fifteen years in this Diocese (no matter from what source or sources their incomes are derived), be in future supplemented, as soon as may be, until they reach the sum of \$1,000 per annum.

2. And in order to give effect to the foregoing resolution, *Resolved*, That a *Sustentation Fund* shall be established, from the interest of the invested capital of which shall be made annually the disbursements necessary to the supplementing aforesaid.

3. *Resolved*, That the steps necessary for setting on foot the *Sustentation Fund* be taken without delay, in such order as a Committee of Synod, to be appointed for that purpose, shall determine.—

That the Clergyman and Lay-delegates and Church-wardens of each Parish do constitute themselves a Committee to collect the sum of fifty cents for each member of our Church, according to the census of 1871, for the purpose of erecting the buildings proposed as a memorial to the late Bishop Strachan.—*Carried.*

WIDOWS AND ORPHANS' FUND.

Mr. Snelling's motions, as follows :

"1. That in order to carry out more effectually the purposes for which the Widows and Orphans' Fund was created, and in view of the difficulties of and the necessity which exists to augment that fund, increased liberality on the part of the members of the Church, and of this Synod in particular, as representing the Church in the Diocese of Toronto, is necessary.

"2. That a Special Collection in aid of the said fund be taken up during this and each succeeding meeting of Synod, on such day as His Lordship the Bishop shall appoint.

"3. That the said Collection be from time to time invested in Bank Stock to an account called 'The Synod (collection Widows and Orphans' Sustentation Fund.'

"4. That one-fourth of the principal and all interest be appropriated each year as a part of the annual grant to the Widows and Orphans,"—were withdrawn by consent.

CHURCH TEMPORALITIES ACT.

The following resolutions passed by the Ontario Synod having been communicated to this Synod by the Hon. Clerical-Secretary of that Synod :

"That a Committee be appointed to report on the advisability of conferring with each Diocese in this Province, having a view to petition the Legislature of Ontario to pass an Act to make the Church Temporalities Act, as recommended by the Provincial Synod, applicable to each Diocese in this Province."

It was moved by Dr. Hodgins, seconded by Mr. Grierson,

That the Committee, appointed in 1864, to confer with the Committees from the Dioceses of Huron and Ontario upon the Church Temporalities Act, be re-appointed for the same object of conference and report; and that the Resolution on this subject from the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario be referred to that Committee.—*Carried.*

The Members of this Committee are as follows: Rev. Canon Beaven, Rev. H. C. Cooper, Rev. Canon Read, and J. Geo. Hodgins, S. B. Harman, and R. A. Harrison.

STANDING COMMITTEE ON PRINTING.

Moved by Mr. Snelling, seconded by Mr. S. B. Harman, J. That inasmuch as the resolutions as to "the Standing Committee on Printing," adopted at the last meeting of the Synod, have not, on trial, been found to work satisfactorily, it is desirable that the same be amended. Be it resolved that in lieu of resolutions Nos. 2 and 4 the following be substituted:

(1.) That all Printing for the Synod, its Officers and Committees, shall be executed by a person to be appointed by the Printing Committee, subject to a scale of charges to be adopted by it, and that the person so to be appointed provide a surety or sureties for the due performance of his work, according to the prescribed regulations of such Committee.

(2.) That the Printing Committee for the present year be the Rev. Septimus Jones, M.A., the Rev. A. Williams, M.A., S. Thompson, and the Honorary Secretaries.—*Carried.*

DAY OF THANKSGIVING.

Moved by Rev. Mr. Worrell, seconded by Mr. W. Magrath,

That the Honorary Secretaries of the Synod, under direction of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, be instructed to correspond with the authorities of all Christian bodies in this Province, as last year, with a view to obtain united action in observing a national day of thanksgiving for the blessing of harvest.—*Carried.*

RECTORY LANDS ACT.

The Rev. Dr. Lett's motion—"That whereas the Legislature have, in an Act intituled the Rectory Patronage Act, established the principle that it is desirable that all semblance of connection between Church and State should be abolished; And, whereas the Legislature have, in an Act incorporating the Synod of this Diocese, given power to the Church to manage its own affairs through said Synod, and to hold property, real as well as personal, for the use and benefit of the Church; and it being desirable and expedient for the well being of the Church that all property of every kind whatever be vested in said Synod, a Petition be presented to the Legislature praying them to alter and amend so much of an Act 29-30 Vic. chap. 16, intituled The Sale of Rectory Lands Act, as directs the appropriation of

the funds and the proceeds of funds accruing from the sale of the said Rectory Lands, and that the appropriation thereof be vested in the Synod according to a by-law or by-laws to be enacted from time to time for that purpose, a restriction being placed on this Synod not to interfere with any Rector or Incumbent of any Rectory who may now be in the enjoyment and receipt of an income derived from said Rectory Lands or from the interest of the proceeds of land already sold, and also praying that the time for the sale of said Rectory Lands be extended to ten years from the passing of the Act so prayed for"—was, by consent, allowed to stand over as unfinished business.

FORMS OF PRAYER FOR SYNOD MEETING.

Moved by Mr. Blake, seconded by Col. O'Brien,

That in future, when the Secretaries are preparing the Programme of the Synod to be sent to the several members thereof, they do print in said Programme the Prayers to be used in the several Churches and Chapels of this Diocese, previous to the meeting of the Synod.

It was then moved by the Rev. A. J. Broughall, seconded by Dr. Hodgins,

That the resolution of last year respecting the use of the "Prayer for Unity," before and at the meetings of Synod, be now confirmed.—*Carried.*

FORM OF PRAYER FOR MISSIONARY MEETINGS.

Moved by the Rev. H. C. Cooper, seconded by Mr. Blake,

That his Lordship the Bishop be respectfully requested to prepare a Form of Prayer to be used at Missionary Meetings.—*Carried.*

CLERGY COMMUTATION TRUST.

The resolution of the Provost of Trinity College—That section (8) of the By-law respecting the appropriation of the surplus income derived from the Clergy Commutation Fund [see summary of Canons and Resolutions, of 1872, page 47], be amended, by substituting, in the first clause, after the words "holding the incumbency of a Church, yielding, from pew rents or otherwise," the words "\$1200 per annum," in the place of the words "\$300 per annum"—was referred to the Clergy Commutation Trust Committee.

RURI-DECANAL MISSIONARY COMMITTEES.

Ven. Archdeacon Fuller reported from the Executive Committee the following Committees on Missions in Rural Deaneries. The same as last year, with following changes: Rev. H. C. Cooper, *vice* Rev. J. Carry (West York); Rev. Mr. Murphy,

vice Rev. A. J. Fidler (West Simcoe); Rev. Mr. Smithett, *vice* Rev. Canon Brent (Durham); Rev. Mr. Stennett, *vice* Rev. Mr. Smithett (Northumberland).

SERVICE FOR SUNDAY SCHOOL FESTIVALS, ETC.

Moved by Mr. A. Marling, seconded by the Rev. T. T. Roberts,

That in the opinion of the Synod it is desirable to provide some authorized Form or Forms of Services, which may be used at School Festivals, and for Special Occasions on which large numbers of Children may be gathered together for common worship and instruction; and that the Lord Bishop be respectfully requested to cause such brief Forms to be prepared and issued by his authority, for use in the Diocese.—*Carried.*

The Bishop named the following Committee to prepare for his approval the Forms of Service indicated in the foregoing resolution, viz.: Rev. Canon Beaven, Rev. J. D. Cayley, Rev. Septimus Jones, and Rev. A. Williams.

Notice was given of an Evening Session, if found to be necessary.

Mr. I. M. Chafee moved, seconded by Mr. A. H. Campbell,

That the Lord Bishop be respectfully requested by the Synod to take into consideration the propriety of appointing a "Travelling Missionary," whose sole duty shall be to visit and minister to destitute places in this Diocese, collecting Statistics, &c., &c., under the directions of his Lordship, and reporting to his Lordship and this Synod.

Rev. J. Davidson's motion—"That the Students' Fund be supplemented by the sum of \$300, which sum shall be annually set apart for that purpose from the General Purposes Fund"—was withdrawn by consent.

Mr. W. J. McCleary's motion—"Whereas true Christian Unity is a vital principle of genuine Christianity:

"And whereas, such unity in the Church of God has now for a long period been very much impaired, if not for the time wholly lost:

"And whereas, in certain branches of the Church as well as among various bodies of professing Christians there are now hopeful signs of a very earnest and deep seated yearning after, at least, a better unity than that which has too long prevailed throughout Christendom:

"And whereas, Christian Truth, being the very basis of true Christian Unity, as error is that of division, it is therefore the very solemn and bounden duty of such branches of the Church, as well as of such bodies of professing Christians, to take such active and energetic measures among themselves as are best calculated to secure, advance, and maintain those principles by which, in the early days of the

Christian Church, truth had a fair and reasonable opportunity of not only successfully combatting error, but of striking most powerfully and effectually at the very root thereof:

"*And whereas*, the Anglican Branch of the Church, while having as such been ever from the earliest days mercifully preserved from the great sin of Schism, is nevertheless now, and has been for a long time past, afflicted with internal contentions and discords:

"*And whereas*, such contentions and discords greatly mar her beauty and usefulness, and not only hinder her progress, but render her almost utterly unfit to take—with great and good effect—any active or practical part in any movement which may sooner or later be made towards the accomplishment and full realization of that great and true Christian Unity once enjoyed by the Church of God, and which no small portion of the Christian world has now begun with yearning hearts earnestly to desire and long for:

"*Be it therefore Resolved*, That it is the very solemn and bounden duty of this Synod, as representing the Anglican Church in this Diocese, to take as soon as possible some such action as in its judgment is best calculated to aid in bringing about, among her own members, as soon as may be, a perfect agreement, or at least a much better agreement as to Christian manners of life and doctrine than at present prevails—was, by consent, allowed to stand as unfinished business.

ALLOWANCE FOR USE OF SYNOD HALL.

Dr. Hodgins moved, seconded by Ven. Archdeacon Fuller,

That the usual annual allowance of \$30 be made to the authorities of St. James's School House for its use, and the expense of gas—1871 and 1872.—*Carried.*

INCREASED MEANS FOR CHURCH PURPOSES.

Rev. Septimus Jones moved, seconded by Mr. Blake,

That the Bishop be requested to appoint a Committee to report to the next Session of this Synod upon the most scriptural and practicable methods of procuring increased means for Church purposes in this Diocese.—*Carried.*

His Lordship named the following Committee, to give effect to this resolution: Revs. S. J. Boddy, J. D. Cayley, E. J. Fessenden, Messrs. J. H. Perry, S. H. Blake, Wm. Ince, Dr. Hodgins, and the mover.

Moved by Col. O'Brien, seconded by Rev. C. Ruttan,

That the Executive Committee be requested to take such measures as may seem to them desirable, for the purpose of obtaining the

services of a competent Reporter, in order that a sufficient and truthful statement of proceedings and reasons for action may be given to the public.—*Carried.*

PROBATIONARY DUTY OF MINISTERIAL CANDIDATES.

Moved by Rev. W. T. Smithett, seconded by Ven. Archdeacon Fuller.

That in the opinion of this Synod, it would tend very materially to advance the interests and promote the extension of the Church in this Diocese, were a system introduced by which Candidates for the Ministry, while at the same time they are gaining an insight into parochial work, might assist the Incumbent in large and extended missions. And that this Synod humbly requests the Lord Bishop to take such steps as may bring about this end.—*Carried.*

Rev. Mr. Smithett moved, seconded by Col. O'Brien.

I have to congratulate you upon the accomplishment of the business of this Synod within so reasonable a period, and the pleasant and gratifying manner in which all its discussions have been pursued and have terminated. We all, I think, naturally look forward with some degree of anxiety to these sessions of our Church Parliament, as it may be termed, and I can assure you I have shared in that anxiety to no little extent myself. We see the proposition of a great many projects brought forward before us which may possibly draw forth angry and conflicting feeling. I am very happy to observe that in all the discussions that have taken place there has been a total absence of anything like acrimony of spirit; and, in many pro-

positions which have been brought under our notice which might have elicited strong conflicts of opinion, that they were, with wise Christian forbearance, withdrawn. I have to thank the Synod for their attention to their business, and to express my great satisfaction with their demeanour towards myself. And I trust that in the interval we shall all use our best exertions—the Committees especially—to carry out the objects and the several purposes with which we have been entrusted.

His Lordship then pronounced the Benediction, and declared the Synod prorogued.

APPENDIX A.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Executive Committee begs leave to report that on re-considering the recommendations offered in its report of last year, your Committee is of opinion that the carrying out of the third recommendation in that report would be attended with inconvenience.

Your Committee, therefore, recommends that the third clause of that Report be struck out, and the following substituted therefor, viz :

That the next order of proceeding after No. 5 in the present Order of Proceedings as printed in the Constitution, shall be "No. 6, Reading and consideration of Reports in the order of their presentation," and that the consecutive numbers be altered accordingly.

The Secretary-Treasurer having placed before your Committee an application from his assistant, Mr. Henry Cameron, for an increase of salary, the work in the Synod Office having much increased, your Committee appointed a sub-committee to examine the nature and amount of work required to be done.

That Sub-committee reported as follows :

"The Committee to whom was referred the application of Mr. Henry Cameron for an increase of salary, begs to report that having examined the books of the Synod, and made enquiries as to the general work of the office and the duties performed by Mr. Cameron, the Committee is of opinion that his application should be favourably entertained, and therefore begs to recommend that the sum of eight hundred dollars be placed at the disposal of the Secretary-Treasurer, to enable him to pay Mr. Cameron that sum as a remuneration for his services for one year, from the first day of May, 1871."

Your Committee thereupon resolved, "That in consequence of the great increase in the business of the Department of the Secretary-Treasurer, as reported by the Committee appointed on the 10th day of May, 1871, the sum placed to his credit to enable him to employ such assistance as is required, be increased to eight hundred dollars—said increase to date from the 1st May, 1871, and to continue to 1st May, 1872," and your Committee further resolved "That the Synod be requested to confirm the action of the Committee in this behalf."

Appended to this Report will be found a statement of parishes and missions in default at this date, on account of Parochial, Quarterly and Thanksgiving Collections for the year ending 30th April, 1872.

Your Committee recommends the adoption of some steps to enforce compliance with the regulation requiring the quarterly and other collections to be made in every parish and mission, and at each station therein where there is an established Sunday service.

It is believed that were there a more strict compliance with the rules of the Synod in this respect, the receipts on account of the various funds would be largely increased.

APPENDIX B.

REPORT OF THE CLERGY COMMUTATION TRUST COMMITTEE FOR YEAR ENDING 30th APRIL, 1872.

The Clergy Commutation Trust Committee begs leave to report as follows:—

Schedule "A" exhibits all the first class securities held by the Trust.

Schedule "B" gives an approximate estimate of the present condition of the fund.

Schedule "C" gives an approximate estimate of the charges on the fund.

The interest on the first class securities set forth in Schedule "A" amount annually to \$25,600.

The claim against Messrs. Farmer and de Blaquiere is still in suit, and the solicitors have not been able, owing to the complications in the matter, yet to close the account. We fear, however, that the amount to be ultimately realized from this security will fall far short of the claim as it stands in the books of the Trust.

The debt of the Honourable J. H. Cameron has not yet been finally adjusted, and we recommend that this account be at once settled between the Trust and Mr. Cameron, and if upon going into the accounts, it be found that any items cannot be arranged between the Trust and Mr. Cameron, the Committee be instructed to refer such disputed matters for settlement to some third person or persons, in order that a final balance be struck and the account closed.

The Committee of last year reported that the debt of Mr. Cameron after giving credit for \$80,000, amounted to about \$75,000; the interest upon this sum for the past year is \$5,250, making this debt \$80,250. From this must be deducted \$15,000, being the amount the Trust agreed to credit Mr. Cameron upon the sale of the Hamilton and Port Dover debt, making the balance still due upon this account \$65,250. Upon this sum no interest has been paid for the past year. We hope that when the balance between the Trust and Mr. Cameron has been finally struck, we shall receive at least annually a portion of the debt and the interest upon the whole of it.

The only assets of the Trust, beyond those set forth in Schedule "A," are:—

The debt of Mr. Cameron.

The debt of Messrs. Farmer and de Blaquiere, and certain other securities upon which we are attempting to realize, the nominal value of which is about \$13,000.

These two debts and these securities are the only sources from which the income of this fund can now be increased beyond the \$25,600 at present received.

We think it is not well to calculate upon the interest to be derived from these three funds, except as portions thereof are actually realized and safely invested.

Upon this course we have acted, and while in 1870 we could only show interest to the amount of \$21,600 as annually received from permanent and safe investments, we can now count upon interest to the extent of \$25,600 as annually received from first-class securities.

REPORT OF THE ENDOWMENT OF THE SEE, RECTORY LANDS, AND LAND AND INVESTMENT COMMITTEE.

For the Year ending 30th April, 1872.

The Endowment of the See, Rectory Lands, and Land and Investment Committee, begs leave to report as follows :

ENDOWMENT OF THE SEE.

During the past year there have not been any sales of land, on account of this Trust ; offers to purchase have been received, but your Committee decided not to sell at present.

The receipts on account of notes and subscriptions, though not so large as they were last year, are nevertheless not unsatisfactory. The Rev. W. Logan, who kindly undertook the collection of notes and subscriptions east of Toronto, has met with very fair success, and is still prosecuting his labours. Other collectors are still employed in other parts of the Diocese.

The Episcopal Income having been restricted during the past year to \$2,000, the expenditure has not exceeded the receipts on account of income. The amount overdrawn last year has been paid back to capital, and there is a balance of \$176.37 at the credit of Income account. It is hoped, that the receipts during the current year will enable the Committee to increase the Episcopal Income to \$2,400.

A detailed statement of Receipts and Expenditure during the past year is appended to this report.

RECTORY LANDS.

Particulars of last year's sales are set forth in the statement of land sales appended to this Report.

The attention of your Committee having been called to the mode adopted by the General Purposes Fund Committee for assessing the Rectory Lands Fund, for its share of the expenses of management of the various Trusts and Funds vested in the Synod, and that Committee having passed a resolution requesting your Committee to make an assessment of 5 per cent. on the income derived from the sales of the Rectory Lands for the year from 1st May, 1870, to 1st May, 1871, and a similar assessment for the year from 1st May, 1871, to 1st May, 1872, your Committee resolved that the sum of \$300 be paid annually

to the Synod, from the income accruing from the investments made on account of the Rectory Lands, as the amount due from said Trust, for expenses of management, such payment to commence with the year 1871-72," and this resolution was duly communicated to the General Purposes Fund Committee.

GENERAL LAND SALES.

A statement is hereto appended of the sales made during the past year of land held on account of various Trusts and Funds vested in the Synod.

Also of the investments made on the same account during the same period.

APPENDIX D.

REPORT OF THE MISSION BOARD

For the Year ending 30th April, 1872.

The Mission Board begs leave to report, that during the past year *fifty-seven* Missions have received aid from the Mission Fund, the sum of \$10,945.55, having been disbursed on this account.

Fifty-seven Missions are now on the Mission Board Pay-List, receiving aid to the amount of \$11,640.00, and in view of the claims of the districts hereinafter mentioned and relying upon increased contributions during the current year, your Committee, at its meeting on 14th May last, resolved to allocate \$500 to the region north of Bracebridge, \$500 to the Bruce Mines, and \$600 to Fort William; these grants to be for one year, and to commence as soon as the Bishop can supply these places respectively with Missionaries.

A statement of the Receipts and Expenditure for the past year is appended hereto; also, a comparative statement of the Parochial Collections for 1870, 1871 and 1872, shewing the increase for 1872; also a list of the Missions now receiving aid from the Mission Fund.

During the past year the By-law adopted by the Synod at its last Session, for the purpose of regulating the expenditure of the Mission Fund and carrying out more effectually the Mission work of the Diocese, has been applied to ten Missions, and with such success as to induce the belief that other Missions will soon avail themselves of the benefits to be derived from a fair and proper working of its provisions.

All which is respectfully submitted.

hitherto paid by the Committee, and the Bishop having recommended that the collection on the Day of Thanksgiving for the Prince of Wales's recovery, be devoted to the replenishing of the Fund, the immediate wants of the Committee have been relieved, but the receipts throughout the year (as in former years) have proved quite inadequate to the demands of the work entrusted to the Committee.

The following statement will show how small have been the contributions towards the Indian Missions from the Diocese, and that had we not been liberally aided by the Societies in England, but little could have been accomplished:

Average contributions from the Diocese during the last five years, \$700; while the annual amounts contributed by the New England Company, and Colonial and Continental Church and School Society have been \$1,280 per annum.

GARDEN RIVER MISSION.—The New England Co., who for many years had supported the Mission among the Ojibways at this station, having directed the retirement therefrom of the Rev. Mr. Chance, their Missionary, which of course involved the loss to the Mission of the services of Mrs. Chance, who had proved an invaluable assistant to her husband as school mistress, proposed to send one of their Missionaries on the Grand River as his successor, but your Committee not feeling justified in sanctioning this arrangement, the Company withdrew their support from the Mission.

Fortunately, the Rev. Edward Wilson, Agent for the Church Missionary Society in the Diocese of Huron, offered to assume charge of it, holding out the hope that his society would extend their operations among the heathen Indians along the North Shore of Lake Superior and in the interior. Mr. Wilson entered on his charge early last summer, and having spent the winter in ministering to the Indians at Garden River and the white settlers at Sault St. Marie, has proceeded to England to report the openings that present themselves and to arrange with the C. M. Society for taking advantage of them.

In alluding to this Mission, your Committee regret that they are not able to report that a decision has been arrived at by the Dominion Government on the land matters in dispute, between the Jesuits and the Committee, which were referred by the Indian Department to the Minister of Justice more than a year ago. Although repeated applications have been made for the same, *no reply has yet been obtained.*

MISSION ON THE MANITOULIN ISLAND.—From the quarterly reports received from the Rev. R. Hill, Missionary, and Mr. W. Stinson, School-master at the Mission Station at Sheguiandah on this Island, the Committee have the satisfaction of reporting that the services at the several stations have been regularly conducted and the school kept up.

Last autumn, the Missionary reported that the house erected for him at Little Current was not habitable during the severe weather in

winter, and he proposed, if the Committee could not erect a Mission House on the lot selected for the purpose at Sheguiandah, to make arrangements for putting one up himself. Under the circumstances, the Committee had no alternative but to accede to the proposition, and a comfortable structure was completed before the cold weather set in, in which Mr. Hill has passed the winter.

The cost of the land and house amounts to \$500, upon which your Committee have agreed to allow Mr. Hill interest at the rate of eight per cent. in lieu of residence till he is re-imbursed for his expenditure.

In presenting this last report of the Indian Mission Committee, its members cannot withhold the expression of their sincere regret that their endeavors to excite an interest in behalf of the poor aborigines in the Diocese have not been more successful. They will reiterate what they have so earnestly endeavored to impress upon the Synod and the Church at large, that the Mission work among the native Indians of our Diocese does not command that interest which they humbly conceive it has a claim to, if the Church is to prove equal to the great trust committed to it, in the apostolic commission of its Divine Head. To this want of zeal they are further compelled to ascribe another and no less discouraging feature, in the unwillingness manifested by the younger clergy to offer their services in this self-denying but noble Christian work.

They venture again humbly, but earnestly, to press this on the renewed consideration of our Church, as a subject that ought to be seriously laid to heart and which will hereafter be reverted to with unavailing self-reproach and shame, should other labourers enter successfully on those fields of operation which it has been vainly sought to occupy.

And in concluding their labours and resigning their trust, they will cherish the hope that as the District to which their efforts have been directed is now rapidly becoming the highway to the North-West, and is thereby receiving a vast influx of inhabitants, the time has arrived when the changed population and with them the hitherto neglected aborigines in that region, will receive the attention they so imperatively demand.

APPENDIX F.

THE WIDOWS AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The Committee are happy to be able to report, that though the demands upon this fund have largely increased during the past year, they have been met, to within a small amount, from the ordinary sources of income. The expenditure has been \$3,836.51; the receipts \$3,758.25, leaving a deficiency of \$78.26. This, however, will probably be balanced by some annual subscriptions of clergymen which are still due. A full statement of the receipts and expenditure is appended to this report, but it may briefly be stated here that the amounts paid have been as follows: Pensions to 17 widows, \$3,120; to 4 families of orphans, \$300; a last payment of arrears to one widow, \$200; assessment for Synod expenses, \$168; incidental expenses, \$48.51; making up the total \$3836.51, or \$520.88 more than the expenditure of the preceding year.

Since the 30th April, 1871, two widows, Mrs. B. C. Hill and Mrs. Hilton, have been placed upon the list of annuitants, with pensions of \$200 each, commencing, in the case of the former, on the 1st July last, and in that of the latter, on the 1st of April last. One widow, Mrs. Grun, whose pension, owing to peculiar circumstances, was only \$40 per annum, died in the month of December last.

The payments on account of orphans have been increased by the addition of two families, one being that of the late Mr. Hilton, who left four children, the eldest 14 years of age; and as it was ascertained by reference to the solicitor of the Synod, that the new By-law came into operation immediately on its being passed, the pension allowed by its provisions, namely, \$200 for the children, in addition to the same amount for the widow, was granted.

In November last, a memorial was received from the widow of the late Mr. Sims, setting forth that she was left with six children, four of whom are under 16 years of age, and with no means for their support beyond the pension of \$200 granted to herself, and praying for an addition to the said annuity on their account. As Mr. Sims had died before the passing of the new By-law, the Committee at first entertained some doubt whether its provisions could be applied retrospectively, but ultimately decided in favor of the memorialist, on the grounds, first, that it seemed only consistent with the objects of this Fund, that their decision should be based upon the broad principles of Christian charity rather than on the letter of the By-law, or upon the question of its being retrospective or not—a point upon which no legal opinion had yet been obtained; and, secondly, that it appeared unjust that the families of two clergymen, Mr. Sims and

Mr. Hilton, whose deaths were separated by an interval of little more than eighteen months, should, under very similar circumstances, be placed in such different relative positions as that one family should receive an annuity double that of the other. The children of the late Mr. Sims have, therefore, been placed upon the Fund, with a pension of \$200, commencing from the 1st January last; \$50 for the previous quarter having been furnished as a special donation to the family by a member of the Committee, Mr. S. H. Blake.

In November a sub-committee was appointed to devise some plan for improving the Fund, who issued the following appeal, which was sent to all the Clergy of the Diocese, accompanied by a letter requesting their assistance in obtaining for it a favorable response in their respective parishes.

"To the Members of the Church of England in the Diocese of Toronto:—

"In order to meet the requirements of the By-Law respecting the Widows and Orphans' Fund of this Diocese, passed at the last meeting of Synod, and to provide the amount needed to answer its increasing demands, it has been found necessary to appeal to you to assist in raising a sum which will enable the Committee to satisfy the calls thus made upon it."

"The sum to be paid under this By-Law must be admitted by all to be the minimum that could be offered. It gives to the widow \$200, and to her children, if as many as four under 16 years of age, another \$200, making \$400 as the total for the support of herself and her family."

"At the time when the widow and orphan stand especially in need of comfort and aid, it is hard that their trials should be increased by being told that there is a grave doubt whether even this small provision can be made good to them. But as the fund stands at present it will be out of our power to do otherwise than make this answer to those who need much this assistance, and whose husbands and fathers deserve to be had in remembrance by us."

"In order to prevent this result and to raise a permanent fund, the interest from which will so far supplement our present income as to enable us to answer all the calls upon it, we venture to make the present appeal to the members of our Church who consider this claim a debt that should be paid, and to those who by their contributions in this matter desire to shew honour to the God of the fatherless and the widow."

"We need for our purposes \$10,000. This amount we propose to raise and invest permanently. Of this sum a member of this Committee has promised \$1,000, conditioned upon the whole amount required being raised by the 1st of next May."

"We trust that you will kindly give the matter your earnest considera-

"I heartily approve of the foregoing appeal, and trust that it will meet with a general and liberal response."

Action in reference to this appeal seems to have been postponed in most instances on account of its appearing, at the time when it was issued, to interfere with the missionary collections generally made during the winter; but as the gentleman who promised the sum of \$1,000 has kindly extended the time first named as a condition of the gift, the Committee express their earnest hope that no further delay will take place, and that the whole amount will be realized in the course of the present year. The amount already received, exclusive of the \$1,000 promised as before stated, is \$1,493.

The addition of \$10,000 to the capital of the Fund, as contemplated in the appeal, would indeed yield \$600 of annual interest, available as income; but neither this, nor any other method that could be devised for improving the Fund, would relieve, or ought to relieve the members of the Church from the duty of giving continually, and from time to time, for the support of a Fund established for so sacred an object. God has undoubtedly placed the relief of the widows and orphans of His ministers in the hands of His Church, and no member of it can evade the responsibility thus laid upon him.

The invested capital of the Fund stands in the Auditors' Report at \$16,651.29; but as \$2,315 of this amount yields no interest, the really productive capital is \$14,336.29.

The general collection for this fund in October last was duly made in all the churches and Sunday stations in the Diocese, with very few exceptions, there having been only one instance in which no collections were made, and that was owing to the mission having been at that time vacant. In four other missions there were partial omissions, the collection having been taken up in ten stations, but omitted in five. In reference to this,

the 3rd section of the new By-law enacts that, "it shall be the duty of the Committee to state, in their annual report to the Synod, the names of all such clergymen as may have omitted to make the said collection."

The Synod Report, however, in which the new By-law first appears, has been issued only so recently, that the clergy cannot be supposed to have been all aware of this rule, and your Committee, in consideration of this circumstance, have not thought it advisable to report the clergymen of the aforesaid missions for non-compliance with the regulation; being further confirmed in the expediency of this course by the marked improvement shown in regard to the taking up of this collection; for while in October, 1870, it was totally omitted in seven parishes, and partially so in six; last October the total omission was but in one parish, and the partial omissions only in four.

The expenditure for the current year, supposing that no new claims arise, cannot be estimated at much less than \$4000, namely, for pensions to sixteen widows, \$3,200; to orphans, \$540; for Synod assessment, \$152; and for incidental expenses, the same as last year, \$48, making together \$3,970. To meet this, the receipts may be estimated as follows: interest on capital (\$14,336), \$860; rents, \$110; annual subscriptions of 146 clergymen, \$5 each, \$730; making in all \$1,700, leaving \$2,270 to be made up by the October collection and by other donations.

THEOLOGICAL STUDENTS' FUND.

The present condition of this Fund is so far satisfactory that the balance now in hand to meet the payments of the next twelve months is \$692 56, or \$120 75 more than the balance at the same date last year; yet it is insufficient for the demands made upon it, the Committee having been compelled at their last quarterly meeting, much to their regret, to refuse an exhibition to a very deserving student, the whole amount in hand, and even a little more, being already pledged to the support of the present exhibitions. These are six in number, which, at \$120 each, will require \$720 for the whole year, or \$28 more than the present balance, supposing the number to remain the same.

The April collection, as received before the books were closed, was \$545 90, or \$5 37 less than the returns to the same date last year; but as there is invariably a large amount of this collection not sent in till after the 30th of April, it is impossible yet to state its exact amount. There appears, however, no reason for apprehending any falling off.

The annexed financial statement shews that the whole receipts of the past year were \$730 56, making with the balance in hand on the 1st May, 1871, which was \$564, a total of \$1,294 56. The disbursements have been,—for Exhibitions, \$560; assessment for Synod expenses, \$42; leaving a balance, as before stated, of \$692 56.

There are now six Exhibitioners on this Fund, Mr. John Fletcher having been placed upon it at the meeting of the Committee on the 14th of May. Of the three students who were on the list at the close of the last academical year, one left, having failed to pass the annual examination. Of the present six, two, Dundas and Doherty, will leave at the end of this term, so that their exhibitions will be available for other students in October next; three, Woodburn, Fennell and Spencer, will have to remain another year; and the sixth, Fletcher, till the end of the October term in 1873.

The report furnished by the College, relating to the present Exhibitioners, and embracing the several heads of general conduct, attendance at the Holy Communion, at chapel, and at lectures, application to studies, and the result of examinations, is in every case of a most satisfactory character. It is expected that in October next there will be more applications for exhibitions than the fund will admit of being granted, whereas it is most desirable, as conducive to the full carrying out of the objects of the Fund, that it should, if possible, be made equal to the support of many more Exhibitions than it bears at present.

In reference to a resolution of the last session of the Synod (page 69 of Report), instructing all Standing Committees to append to their reports of this year a synopsis of the By-laws and regulations of the Church Society affecting such Committees, as the rules governing the administration of the Widows and Orphans', and Theological Students' Funds are embodied in the existing By-laws printed in the new Consolidation of the Canons, it has been deemed unnecessary to re-produce them as a part of this report.

APPENDIX G.

REPORT OF THE GENERAL PURPOSES, STATISTICS, AND
ASSESSMENT COMMITTEE.

For the Year ending 30th April, 1872.

The General Purposes, Statistics, and Assessment Committee begs leave to report as follows:—

GENERAL PURPOSES FUND.

Objection having been taken last year to the mode adopted by the Committee for assessing the Rectory Lands Fund for its share of the expenses of the management of the several Trusts and Funds vested in the Synod, and the Committee's Report having been referred back in order that Rectors having objections to make might communicate them to the Committee, a Conference was held with a deputation from the Incumbents of the Government Rectories in this Diocese.

By mutual consent a case was submitted to counsel for an opinion as to the legality of the action of this Committee, and the substance of this opinion was as follows:—"The Rectory Lands Committee may be required to pay for the management of their Funds, and may either provide an officer under the By-law for their management, or contribute a specific sum to the Synod for their management, and that sum must be assessed upon the income and not upon the principal of the Fund, and in the proportions specified in the fourth clause of the By-law of 1867, as stated in the case."

Your Committee therefore resolved: "that the Rectory Lands Committee be requested to assess upon the incomes of the various Rectors a sum of money equal to five per cent. upon the clear income derived by them through the medium of the Rectory Lands Committee, between the 1st day of May, 1870, and the first day of May, 1871; and a further sum of five per cent. on the income for the year, from 1st of May, 1871, to 1st of May, 1872, to meet the said share of expenses of management for said period, in terms of the By-law of the late Church Society, contained in the Report for 1867, and the Constitution of Synod and resolution thereof,—page 76 of Report for the year 1870."

This resolution having been communicated to the Rectory Lands Committee at its meeting on the 14th May last, that Committee adopted the following resolution, viz.: "That the sum of three hundred dollars be paid annually to the Synod, from the income accruing from the Investments made on account of the Rectory Lands, as the amount due from said Trust for expenses of management, such payments to commence with the year 1871-72."

The above proposition could not however be entertained, your Committee believing that, under the directions of the Synod, the Committee was required to assess each Fund equally.

The fourth clause of the By-law above referred to, reads as follows, viz: "That the Committee shall keep all necessary books of account and may appoint any officer for keeping the same, and remunerate him therefor, and all charges of management shall be apportioned among the several Rectories in proportion to the income of such Rectory Lands, or any part thereof, or the investments therefrom."

As this clause is repugnant to the existing provision of the Constitution, which enacts that it shall be the special office of the Secretary-Treasurer to attend to all the business of the Synod, when not in session, your Committee recommends that the said clause be repealed, and that in accordance with the opinion of Counsel, above cited, a specific sum be assessed upon the incomes of the Rectors, said sum to be five per cent. upon said incomes.

Your Committee further resolved: "that, it being found that four cents in the dollar, ordered to be levied on the several funds, by Resolution of 9th February, 1871, to meet expenses, is insufficient for that purpose, a rate of five per cent. be substituted therefor; and that the same be collected on all funds under the management of the Synod."

In regard to the payment of the travelling expenses of members of Standing Committees of Synod, your Committee recommends that the resolution adopted at the Session in June, 1870, (see Journal of 1870, page 60,) be rescinded, and that all such expenses, past and future, be charged against the General Purposes Fund.

During the past year your Committee has received numerous applications for grants in aid of Churches and Parsonages already built or in course of erection in various parts of the Diocese. These applications have been favorably considered, so far as the funds at the Committee's disposal would permit, and it is believed that the assistance thus afforded has been of material benefit to the parishes and missions receiving the same.

A list of the grants so made will be found in the detailed statement hereto appended.

PAROCHIAL STATISTICS.

Your Committee would call attention to the improved manner in which the Parochial Statistics are printed in the last Journal of Synod. The information there collected in tabular and narrative form is valuable, its chief imperfection being occasioned by the absence of returns from seventeen out of one hundred and seventeen Parishes and Missions—excepting one new Mission (Byng Inlet), from which a statistical return could not be expected.

APPENDIX II.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL AND BOOK AND TRACT COMMITTEE.

The Sunday School and Book and Tract Committee submits the following Report, viz:—

I. Report on Sunday School business, received from the Diocesan Sunday School Association, and adopted (as amended) by this Committee.

II. Report on Book and Tract business.

I.—SUNDAY SCHOOL BUSINESS.

The Committee of the Diocesan Sunday School Association beg to report:

That although, when the Association was formed it was intended that a Convention should be held every year, consisting of the Clergy and representatives of the teachers of the several schools, it has not been regarded as quite practicable to hold another Convention as yet, although the first was so successful.

The recommendations contained in the last report have had a considerable effect in improving the systems adopted in very many schools, and there are indications that a greatly increased interest has been excited in the subject. Our schools are becoming better equipped and more efficient in promoting the great purposes for which they are established.

Among the objects that the Committee have endeavored to promote during the past year were (1) Special Services for children, (2) Mission Schools, (3) Local meetings and Associations.

A special service was held at St. George's Church on Sunday the 12th November, and although it was a little too late in the year, the children of nearly all the Church Sunday Schools of Toronto attended, the chants and hymns were sung with much heartiness, and an impressive address was delivered by the Rev. Mr. Smithett. Mr. Carter kindly gave his valuable aid in the musical portion of the service. The Committee would reiterate their earnest recommendation that such services should be occasionally held wherever practicable.

A meeting of those interested in Sunday School work in Toronto was held on 13th November, in St. George's School House, at which the venerable the Archdeacon of Niagara presided, and which was very well attended.

After interesting discussions, resolutions were adopted in favor of the establishment of Local Sunday School Associations in each rural deanery, and of the establishment of Mission Sunday Schools, also of inviting the contributions of teachers and scholars to be devoted to that object. Some valuable suggestions were also made as to the best mode

of retaining the older boys in the Sunday Schools. The meeting was attended with good results, and is mentioned here as an example that may be followed, and has been followed in other places.

The Committee were glad to hear of a meeting at St. Catharines, and hope that during this year the experiment will be tried at such central points as Hamilton, Guelph, Cobourg, or Port Hope, and others.

The Lesson Scheme recommended in the last report, was adopted in many schools, having been approved by the Bishop and by the Synod. The scheme was defective, however, in so far as it did not provide helps to the teacher in giving the prescribed Scripture lesson. The Lessons issued by the Rev. Mr. Holland of St. Catharines, and which are intended to provide the help the teacher needs, have been widely used, and are also under the sanction of the Bishop.

The Committee would have preferred that one and the same scheme should have been used throughout the diocese; but there are, perhaps, some advantages from having a choice, and it is a great gain to have any good series of lessons adopted in a school.

The Committee have carefully considered the subject of lessons for the coming year, and have examined several systems with the view of adopting one which they could recommend as meeting our requirements. The Committee have not yet been able to fix on any one scheme of lessons as entirely suitable for general adoption in the Sunday Schools of this Diocese. They hope, however, to report definitely on this important subject at the next meeting of the Synod.

The Committee do not suggest that a convention should be held this year, but would propose that one of the evenings during the session of the Synod should be specially devoted to the subject of Sunday Schools.

They would request that the clause in the Constitution of the Association which requires the holding of an annual convention, should be modified so as to leave it discretionary.

The Committee understand that in Toronto it is intended to have one or more combined special services for children this year, and it is hoped that the same thing will be done in many other places.

The Committee have been very much pleased to learn that several Sunday Schools in the Diocese have contributed very gratifying amounts in aid of the Mission Fund. The Committee cannot too highly commend this spirit of liberality on the part of the children of these schools. They regard the introduction of this most admirable practice as calculated, with God's blessing, greatly to promote the spirit of giving, and to foster in the young that germ of benevolent Christian liberality which in its development in after years leads to the making of those noble gifts for God's service which are so great an honour to His cause.

It is not necessary to repeat here the many references to important improvements in Sunday School management which are still required among us, but the Committee trust that the suggestions made in their last Report will be remembered.

II.—BOOK AND TRACT BUSINESS.

The Book and Tract business is contained under the following heads, *a, b, c, d.*

(a) Regulations respecting Grants.

The regulations respecting grants were found by experience to require some modification, and a fresh supply being required, they have been reprinted in the following forms:

1.—Grants to Sunday Schools.

i. Under this general regulation, a *first free grant* of Bibles, Testaments, prayer books, catechisms, and library books, from the Christian Knowledge Society's catalogues and other books circulated by the Committee since it was constituted, to the value of from \$2 to \$6 (at the discretion of the Committee), will be made to every newly-established Sunday School in any parish or mission in the Diocese.

ii. A *second free grant* from the same lists, but not exceeding \$4 in value, will be made to Sunday Schools in new or poor neighbourhoods, at the discretion of the Committee.

iii. Other subsequent grants will be made, not oftener than once a year, from the same lists, to any such Sunday School, to the value of double the amount, in books, of any sum not exceeding ten dollars, which may be sent on behalf of such school for Bibles, Testaments, prayer books, and library books.

iv. In all cases it will be necessary, before aid can be granted to any Sunday School under these regulations, for the party applying on behalf of such school to fill up and transmit to the Synod Office a blank form, to be furnished by it, containing, among other things, the following information:—

(1.) The name of the school, parish, or mission; the name of the superintendent of the school, and the number of teachers, male and female, engaged therein.

(2.) The number of pupils enrolled in the school, of boys and girls, and the average attendance of both kinds of pupils each Sunday.

(3.) The amount which the school or congregation has contributed during the preceding twelve months towards the expenses of the school, and in what way such sum has been raised.

(4.) The number and kind of bibles, testaments, prayer books, catechisms, or library books, which may be required in the school.

(5.) The time when the school was established, and whether it was before aided by the Committee.

v. No grant shall be made to any Sunday School which is not in actual operation at the time of making the application on its behalf.

vi. These regulations, being general in their character, may in special cases be varied at the discretion of the Committee.

2.—Grants to Parishes and Missions.

i. A *first grant* of service books, Bibles, prayer books, and tracts will be made to any new mission or congregation in the Diocese, to the value of from \$2 to \$6, at the discretion of the Committee.

ii. A *second grant* will be made to any parish, mission or congregation, to the value of double the amount, in books, of any sum not exceeding ten dollars, which may be received from such parish, mission or congregation.

iii. In all cases before aid can be granted under these regulations it will be necessary for the parties applying for such aid to furnish the Committee with the following, among other items of information, on a form to be provided, viz.:-

(1.) The name of the parish, mission, &c., and of the officiating clergyman.

(2.) The estimated number of persons composing the congregation on behalf of which the application is made, and the average number of such persons attending each service.

(3.) The amount contributed by such congregation for all Church purposes during the preceding twelve months.

(4.) The number and kind of Bibles, prayer books and tracts required.

(5.) The year in which the congregation was established, and whether the parish or mission was before aided by the Committee.

iv. No grant shall be made to any parish, mission, or congregation, which is not in actual existence at the time of making the application on its behalf.

v. These regulations, being general in their character, may be varied in special cases, at the discretion of the Committee.

(b) *Grants during the year.*

The number of parishes and Sunday Schools aided during the year was 40.

(c) *Transfer of stock.*

The transfer of saleable stock to Mr. Rowsell took place not long after the last meeting of Synod, and recently a portion of the shelves having been removed to the Synod Office, the larger portion of the old stock has been removed to them and is being arranged according to the MS. catalogue, in classes according to subjects, thus affording to the Committee greater facilities for systematic distribution, and to members better opportunities of selection.

A considerable number of the books and tracts have been distributed during the year, but, in consequence of the delay in this removal, not

so large a number, as was expected. In the future, as the shelves become cleared, the rest will be brought over and so distributed.

The rest of the shelves, the property of the Synod, still remaining at Mr. Rowsell's, will be paid for by him.

(d) *Publication of Canadian Works by S. P. C. K.*

By reference to last year's report (p. 67) it will be seen that a certain correspondence between the Rev. Dr. Beaven and the Secretary of the Christian Knowledge Society, on the subject of books and tracts for the Colonies, was referred to the Sunday School and Book and Tract Committee.

That correspondence related to the wise and liberal desire of the Society to provide works specially adapted to the state of society and habits of life and diversities of external objects and modes of thought arising from the circumstances in which the inhabitants of colonies are placed, which the Society proposed to do by publishing works composed by persons living in the Colonies or well acquainted with them.

The result of this reference has been, that two works have been received by this Committee, one by Mrs. Trail, the authoress of several well-known works in connection with Canada, the other by an author as yet unknown to the Committee, but transmitted by the Rev. Dr. Scadding, being a tale entitled "Moon Eye," or "The Trapper's Gift."

Both these works were submitted to a sub-committee, and having been examined and approved have been returned to the writers, with recommendations to the proper Committee of the Christian Knowledge Society to print and publish them. There has not yet been time to learn the results.

The Audit Committee begs to submit the usual Annual Balance Sheets of the Synod Accounts. The Subsidiary Statements, shewing the receipts and expenditures, and present position of each separate fund under the management of the Synod, are appended to the Reports of the Committees. These accounts have been regularly examined by the Auditors, and are certified as correct.

There is a deficit in the Expense Account of the General Purposes Fund, arising from its share of the expense of management for 1870 and 1871 not having yet been charged to the Rectory Lands Fund, owing to a question having arisen as to the proper legal mode of charging the same. The Committee understands that this has now been settled by counsel having given the opinion that it should be charged to the income arising from the investments forming the fund, and it is presumed that there can now be no further objection to the Secretary-Treasurer charging the amount.

Mr. Osler, one of the Auditors of last year, finding that his other engagements would not permit of his devoting sufficient time efficiently to perform the duties of the office, declined a re-nomination, and the Committee appointed Mr. James-Sydney Crocker in his stead.

APPENDIX L.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON MARRIAGE LICENSES

The Committee to whom has been referred:

1. The consideration of the disabilities under which the Church of England in this Diocese labours, in not being able to issue Marriage Licenses to her members, and
2. The question of marriage of divorced persons, beg leave to report as follows:

I.—MARRIAGE LICENSES.

Of the two subjects assigned to your Committee, on which to make inquiries, the first related to "the disabilities under which the Church in this Diocese labours, in not being able to issue Marriage Licenses to her members—a privilege enjoyed by a leading denomination of Christians in this Province." The "leading denomination of Christians," to which reference is here made, it is to be presumed is the Roman Catholic Church, as no other communion in this Province has either claimed or exercised the right to issue Marriage Licenses independently of Her Majesty's Representative in the Dominion. As the claim of the Roman Catholic Church to issue Marriage Licenses, has been also the subject of recent inquiry in the sister Dioceses of Ontario and Quebec, the result of which was communicated in memorials to the late Provincial Synod, the Committee avail themselves of the information contained in those documents, in order to report upon the disabilities complained of.

One of the memorials presented to the Provincial Synod was from the Synod of the Diocese of Quebec, the other was from the "Ottawa Clerical Union," in the Diocese of Ontario.

The Ottawa Clerical Union, in their memorial state, that they "have consulted the highest legal authorities, under the Dominion Government in reference to the matter," and that, "in the Province of Quebec, the Episcopate of the Roman Catholic Church, has an undoubted right under Treaty, to exercise" the privilege of issuing Marriage Licenses. "In this Province," they state, "Marriage Licenses are issued to all Protestants under the Episcopal seal of the Prerogative Court of Canterbury, * * * and the Governor General acts as Deputy for the Archbishop of Canterbury, whose jurisdiction extended at one time over the whole Colony of Canada."

The memorial from the Synod of Quebec, states, that "in this Colony the Governor General has ever since the cession of the country assumed (by his Patent) the power of an Ordinary, and has exercised it as incidental to his office of Governor, so far as it respects Protestants generally. It was never claimed or exercised (by him) in relation to Roman Catholics, to whom the free exercise of the religion

of the Church of Rome was secured, as well by the Treaty of Paris of 1763, as by an Act of the Imperial Parliament passed in 1774, commonly called "the Quebec Act." "The right of granting a dispensation of Marriage Licenses has been exercised by the Ecclesiastical authorities of the Roman Catholic Church in Canada, independent of the Governor, or his ecclesiastical power as ordinary." The memorial also states "that marriage, except in cases of license, is performed by proclamation of banns. * * * In England the power of dispensing with banns is granted to the Bishop by the 25, Henry VIII., chap. 21. * * * The license in England issues from the Ordinary, or person exercising ecclesiastical jurisdiction, or, in other words, from the Ecclesiastical Court. In Quebec the Civil Code contains a provision respecting the publication of banns, at the same time declaring, by the 59th article, that the marriage ceremony may be performed without a certificate establishing that the publication has been made, if the parties have produced a dispensation or license from a competent authority for the omission of the publication of banns."

"As regards the Province of Ontario, [the Ottawa Clerical Union] find that there exists a grave doubt as to the legality of all the marriages * * * contracted under marriage licenses issued by the Roman Catholic Episcopate in the Province, inasmuch as it is questioned whether the Marriage Act of the Parliament of Canada, (passed after the union of the Upper and Lower Provinces), did not abrogate the authority or power conceded to the (Roman Catholic) Episcopate under the Treaty of Quebec, as far as Upper Canada, (now Ontario), was concerned."

In regard to the application of the Marriage License Fund, the Quebec Synod state that, down to 1841, this fund was a perquisite of the Governor's Secretary; from that year, until 1846, it became in both Provinces part of the Public Revenue, and was applied as directed by Parliament. In 1846, the Lower Canada portion of the Marriage License Fund, was appropriated "to the payment of the principal and interest of the Lower Canada Rebellion Losses Debentures," while in Upper Canada it was in the same year, 1846, "specially appropriated to Public Charitable Institutions." "Subsequently this portion was, by 13 and 14 Vic., chap. 70, declared to be at the disposal of the Legislature for public purposes of interest in Upper Canada."

Such is a brief *resume* of the historical aspect of this question; but there is a more practical one to which your Committee would respectfully call the attention of the Synod. In doing so they submit that the really important element in the question alike of license and banns in reference to marriage, is, that there shall be no facilities for improper marriages, either within prohibited degrees, or in any other way, and that, alike by the mode of giving Marriage Licenses, and of publication of banns, every impediment shall be thrown in the way of marriage being contracted in such a manner as shall either facilitate improper marriages, or shall tend in any degree to leave in doubt the legality of marriage, or the legitimacy of the offspring. It is exceed-

ingly undesirable that the Church of England, by any claim to special or exclusive privileges, should adopt a course calculated to perpetuate a mode of procedure in reference to parties proposing to enter into the bonds of Holy Matrimony which may countenance other claimants to special privileges which have undoubtedly tended to facilitate hastily contracted or improper marriages. There is no question on which Parents, Guardians, and all directly interested can have stronger motives for taking a strictly legal and indisputable course, while there is little risk that the members of the Church of England will resort elsewhere than to their own Clergy, and to their Parish Church, for the actual celebration of the sacred rite.

After having given this matter our best consideration, we beg thus to report upon it :

1. We do not find it determined, that any denomination of Christians in this Province has the power to issue to her members Marriage Licenses.
2. The Roman Catholic Church in this Province acts upon the view, that it possesses the power to marry upon a dispensation or license issued by itself.
3. It has been urged that the Church of England, in this Province, has this right.
4. In view of the extreme doubt cast upon such a claim, and of the disastrous consequences that would arise from acting thereon if it turned out to be unfounded, Your Committee recommend, that a representation be made to the Legislature as to our position in this matter, as compared with the Church of Rome, in this country, and asking it to pass such a law as, while effectually protecting marriage from any undue or dangerous facilities in the contracting thereof, shall place all denominations, whether Roman Catholic or Protestant, on an equal footing.

2.—MARRIAGE OF DIVORCED PARTIES.

The other matter referred to your Committee is contained in the resolution proposing that "No clergyman shall solemnize matrimony in any case where there is a divorced wife or husband of either party still living; but this canon shall not be held to apply to the innocent party in a divorce for cause of adultery." On this your Committee think it is highly inexpedient, if not illegal, for the Synod to forbid any clergyman performing marriage between parties legally entitled to enter into Holy Matrimony. The enacting of the proposed canon (forbidding a clergyman to perform such marriages) would, in the opinion of your Committee, be a violation of the civil law relating to marriage in this country.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE
LAWS OF MORTMAIN

The Committee to whom the consideration of the Laws of Mortmain has been referred, begs leave to report as follows:—

1. From the decisions upon the question, your Committee is of opinion that the Act 9, Geo. II., cap. 36, known as the Mortmain Act, is in force in this Province.

2. Your Committee is further of opinion that the Synod of Toronto is, under the Act constituting it, excepted from the effect of this Statute, and that it has the power to take, hold, enjoy, lease, and alienate all lands, tenements, and immovable property, which may be given, granted, purchased, appropriated, devised, or bequeathed, in any manner or way whatsoever, to, for, and in favor of the said Synod, as fully as if the said Mortmain Act were not in force in this Province.

APPENDIX N.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON PRINTING.

The Printing Committee of the Synod of the Diocese of Toronto beg to present the following Report:—

Your Committee, appointed at the Synod which closed on the 24th of June, 1871, lost no time in organizing and proceeding to business, having, in the ensuing month of July, had three meetings, at which the form and type to be adopted in printing the Report and other Synod papers were determined upon; tenders were invited and considered; and that of Mr. J. B. Cook, of the *Express*, was accepted.

Nor was time lost in preparing the draft minutes for the printer. The Committees on Statistics and Canons were communicated with; condensed forms for the publication of the former were prepared by the Chairman and adopted; and your Committee regarded with satisfaction the prompt preliminary arrangements they were able to make, and which they had every reason to expect would have resulted in an early and approved publication of the Report.

The subsequent failure of their expectations, while it has been a source of unceasing regret, annoyance, and disappointment, has been the result of circumstances entirely beyond their control. Financial embarrassments in the office whose tender was adopted, causing first a suspension and finally an abandonment of the work, under ordinary circumstances would have been easily met by its transfer to other offices; but the extraordinary circumstance of a printers' strike occurring, simultaneously, left your Committee for a time almost without resource; and at length, when arrangements were perfected by which the printing could be resumed and completed—as to the Report, with Messrs. Rowsell & Hutchison, and as to the Canons and other printing with the *Leader*—your Committee had to employ a party formerly engaged at the *Express* to collect, with no small difficulty, the unfinished portions of the Report and manuscript at that office, and superintend their removal to Messrs. Rowsell & Hutchison; and as time had become so urgent for the delivery of the Report, your Committee resolved on its issue with the sole omission of the list of donors and subscribers, a form of printing in its nature tedious and expensive, and the main object of which as a guide and incentive to those of the present year, they could not conceal from themselves, had been lost by the delay. It is proposed to issue these with the appendix to the Report of the approaching Synod. In the meantime, the Committee had a sufficient number of copies of the Report of the Mission Board struck off to supply a copy to each member

of the Missionary Deputations throughout the Diocese. These were duly despatched by the Secretary-Treasurer, and the Committee trust their use by the Deputations may have in some degree overcome the difficulties caused by the non-receipt of the Report.

It may be considered by some that your Committee have entered unnecessarily on these details, as they might have relied on the Synod being the last body to charge a Committee with intentional neglect; but the feeling that the delay in the delivery of the Report has been a source not only of general disappointment, but of perplexity and even injury to the clergy in advocating the cause of the Church in their missions, has pressed so heavily upon your Committee that they would rather anticipate even a generous criticism of their proceedings by stating that no regret, annoyance, or disappointment) to reiterate the words used above) can be more full or oppressive than their own.

While the Committee for the publication of the new Edition of the Canons and Resolutions of Synod will fully report on all matters connected with the same, it may not be out of place to name that this Committee concurred in the importance of the issue of so important a compilation of reference being extended to 3,000 copies, half of which, it is considered, may be readily disposed of at a moderate price ~~as parties~~ requiring extra copies, and from which a sum may be realized to cover a considerable portion of the cost of publication.

The only other matter it may be necessary to allude to is the proposition at the last Synod for the issue of Slips by the Printing Committee of "official notices and other information," and that consequent on arrangements being matured in that behalf, the "arrangements existing between the *Church Herald* and Executive Committee be cancelled." Your Committee on this head have to state that, after enquiries by the Chairman, it being found that it would be both difficult and expensive to make arrangements for such publications in the secular papers,—the arrangement with the *Church Herald* has not been disturbed, and it will rest with the Synod to rescind or maintain the same at the present Session.

APPENDIX O.

**REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON MEMORIAL
TO THE LATE BISHOP STRACHAN.**

The Committee appointed at the last Session of the Synod of this Diocese, to consider the subject of a Memorial to the late Bishop of Toronto, beg to report as follows:—

That it appears to them that the most appropriate mode of carrying into effect an object in which all the members of the Church in this Diocese, both lay and clerical, may justly claim a common and equal interest, is the purchase of a site, within the City of Toronto, containing from one to two acres, situated in a position regarded as being, in view of the probable future extension of the City, central and desirable, for the purpose of erecting thereon the following buildings, in the order in which they are enumerated:

1st. A church or chapel, to be under the immediate direction of the Bishop of the Diocese, for the celebration of daily Cathedral service, and for such other special purposes as may appear to the Bishop from time to time expedient: the dimensions of such church or chapel to be determined with a view to its being available at all seasons of the year, for the daily service of the church.

2nd. A Synod Hall and Offices, whereby the Church will be relieved from the burden imposed upon it by the necessity of renting a Synod Office.

3rd. An episcopal residence or See House, an object in itself most desirable.

The Committee, with a view to any objection which may possibly be raised as to the practicability of the plan which they now suggest, beg to call attention to the fact, that, according to the census of 1861, the members of the Church in this Diocese, amounted to about 138,000; and that, assuming their numbers to be no larger than this at the present time, a contribution averaging fifty cents each for every member of the church, to be raised by two equal annual instalments, would, in their opinion, go very far towards the accomplishment of the object proposed.

The Committee would ask leave to report again at the next meeting of the Synod, that they may thus be enabled to give the matter, in the meantime, a more mature consideration.

In the meantime, the Committee are, upon inquiry, able to state that changes and additions have been lately made in and to the governing body of that Corporation, which cannot fail of being attended with the best results.

In conclusion, your Committee would beg to recommend that the Secretary of this Synod be instructed to enclose a copy of the resolution passed during its last session, with reference to Trinity College, to the Secretaries of the Diocesan Synods of Huron and Ontario, respectfully requesting their co-operation in the matter by the passing of a similar resolution in their respective Synods; upon which your Committee have reason to believe that action will be taken by the Council of Trinity College to meet the suggestion contained in the resolutions.

APPENDIX R. (1)

MEMORIAL OF THE REV. J. W. R. BECK.

To the Lord Bishop of the Diocese of Toronto and the Synod of the Diocese.

The Memorial of the Rev. J. W. R. Beck, M.A., Rector of Peterborough, in the said Diocese,

HUMBLY SHEWETH :

I. That Trinity College, which was founded A. D. 1851, does not command the confidence and the support of the members of the Church in the Province of Ontario, and has therefore failed to accomplish the object for which it was established.

2. That the returns made by the said college of the number of graduates shew that, for the period of twenty years, there have been only about 120 who have regularly passed through said college and taken their degrees, making an average of six students per year.

3. That the collections, as shewn by a report made to this Synod, are omitted in 80 stations out of 217, and that the average amount of said collections is very small, being only \$3.26 per station.

4. That these omissions were made when it was supposed that a severe penalty attached to such omission, viz., that a clergyman guilty of such omission would forfeit all claim to the benefits of the Widows and Orphans' Fund.

5. That no information is given by said College to the Church throughout the Diocese, which is the occasion of much distrust.

6. That the College Council is composed virtually of the professors of said college, as it is well known that the present Council do not attend the meetings.

7. That said Council is composed of men who, with one or two exceptions, have had no University education, and consequently are not qualified to discharge the duties assigned to them, and, probably feeling this, they never act.

8. That the Professors are the paid servants of the University, and are as such improperly left to control it.

9. That all the Council, with two or three exceptions, are chosen from the City of Toronto, while the rest of the Diocese is left unrepresented.

10. That the Council is composed of men who have not graduated at said college, with the exception of S. J. VanKoughnet, Esq., who has been very lately appointed.

11. That the men who have taken their degrees at said college in due course, are overlooked, while three who have graduated at the University of Toronto have been placed upon the Governing Body.

12. That the Church people in this Diocese have contributed largely to the establishment of said College; that a yearly collection is taken up in the Diocese in aid of said College; that £16,500 of the Church's money, in the shape of Commutation money, was handed over to said College; and that said College has now, or ought to have, £1,200 per annum as interest of said £16,500, which is the property of the Church people of the Province of Ontario.

13. That, for and on behalf of the members of the Church, a deputation was sent to England, and £5,000 sterling were collected, and £2,500 were collected in the United States.

That an excellent site has been presented by the Reverend Mark Burnham, and a sufficient sum subscribed to authorize operations being at once commenced; but the payment of nearly all the subscriptions is conditioned upon the right of nominating the Clergymen to be from time to time appointed by the Bishop, being placed in the

hands of the Vestry ; and doubts are entertained by his Lordship of his power, under the acts of the Synod, to comply with this condition in such manner as to be binding.

Your memorialists therefore pray—

That such action may be taken by the Synod as will set at rest the doubts expressed, and authorize the Bishop to vest the nomination of any clergyman to be appointed to said proposed church in the Vestry thereof, as the same may be from time to time constituted in accordance with the Church Temporalities Act.

To this certificate there is a memorandum attached, and signed by the Incumbent, as follows: "I have been under the necessity of drawing the pen across some words of this certificate. The cause of this is, that I have been so ill since the first of July last that the Lord's Supper has not been administered three times in the Church at Wyebriidge."

For the reasons above stated by the Incumbents, your Committee respectfully recommend that the said Lay Delegates be permitted to take their seats in this Synod.

EXTRACTS FROM THE REPORTS OF INCUMBENTS.

1872.

1. ALBION AND MONO.—The Parish must be divided.
8. BEVERLEY.—A Stone Church will soon be completed at Copetown. At least twelve additional miles will then be added to the present twenty-eight when roads are good, and forty when they are bad. I do not see how one Missionary can attend to the four stations.
9. BOBCAYGEON AND DUNSFORD.—Division of the Mission very much required. A young man, a candidate for Holy Orders, could very advantageously devote the last year of his preparation in assisting the Missionary, and a small sum could be raised towards his support, and his expenses would be small. I beg to suggest such a plan to the consideration of the Bishop and Synod.
10. BRAMPTON.—A travelling Missionary in the west side of this County would, I am certain, be of great use. There is no Church service from Edmonton to Orangeville, a distance of eighteen miles, with a distance east and west of five miles each way. I believe that in a very short time the district would contribute a fair stipend for an active man, placed at Campbell's Cross, about ten miles from here.
12. BROCK AND BEAVERTON.—If a Missionary could possibly be sent to the south part of Brock, there is no doubt that support would be forthcoming.
19. COBourg.—I have for the last two years reported that a travelling Missionary in Hamilton Township is very desirable.
27. EMILY.—Division of Mission required. Perhaps \$300 could be raised towards stipend.
37. GRAND RIVER.—A Missionary is much needed at Cayuga, which is quite able to support him. I think they are willing *now* to contribute about \$400.
45. HAMILTON, ST. THOMAS'S.—Owing to the growth of the East end of the City, the congregation is constantly increasing, so that it is now a matter of regret that the Church was not built larger. A sum of \$1200 has lately been subscribed to finish the Church and to add about one hundred and fifty sittings. In addition, a handsome Pulpit, Reading and Prayer Desk, Altar Rail, Communion Service, Chancel Stalls, Carpet, and Stained Window have been placed in the Church at a cost of about \$500. A School House is about to be undertaken.
49. LINDSAY.—A Missionary in the Township of Mariposa, now a *quasi* extra-parochial charge, could find half to two-thirds of his support. Attention is called to Oakwood, four or five growing villages without Church Service in the neighbourhood.
52. LOWVILLE.—A new Mission could be established by taking in Carlisle, Strabane, and Freulton or Morryston, which I believe would be very acceptable to the people of those places.

53. MANITOULIN.—If another Missionary or two could be sent, he or they could find useful employment. Indeed, I may say more are needed.
60. MINDEN.—During the past year a site for a small Church has been given in the township of Galway. At Minden we are adding to the new building by degrees. For the first time St. Paul's congregation made up an even \$100 as their yearly help towards my support. At Kinmount I have received a request to re-open an afternoon service. At Stanhope we are building on ten acres of land deeded to the Synod.
64. MULMUR WEST.—It is in contemplation to collect funds this year for the erection of a brick Church at Whitfield.
65. MUSKOKA.—I have derived great assistance from Lay readers.
69. NORTH ESSA.—Next autumn, I think steps might be taken towards bonds being entered into for the payment of the stipend. We hope to commence building a Church at Ballynaskreen early in 1873.
70. NORVAL AND STEWART-TOWN.—We have made sundry improvements and many more are contemplated. The instrument and choir have been brought down stairs, and the huge "three decker" pulpit has been removed. Sunday evening service, for every Sunday in the year, has been established at St. Paul's, seats free; the first step, I hope, towards the total abolishment of pew rents.
72. OAKVILLE AND PALERMO.—The Church at Palermo might be united with Omagh, and form another Mission.
75. OSHAWA AND COLUMBUS.—A new Mission, with Brooklin as headquarters, is urgently needed.
86. ROCKWOOD AND ERIN.—It is very desirable that the Missionary Meetings should not be held at the most stormy period during the whole year. Two would be a sufficiently large deputation in a scattered place like this.
89. SALTELETT AND BINBROOK. The prospects of this Mission, in its present anomalous position, are not encouraging to a Minister, for the reasons which were assigned by the wardens when lately applying to the Rural Dean for a Deputation to visit us, in order to ascertain correctly the number of Church of England families, and the amount of stipend which could be raised.
90. SCARBOROUGH.—See Synod Report for 1870, page 268.
93. STAMFORD.—Several special gifts have been made in both Churches. St. John's has been much improved during the past year, thanks to one of the Churchwardens and a young lady. All Saints' has had two handsome gates given to it, and also a very beautiful large stone Font of the early English style, by two ladies.
116. WELLAND AND FONTHILL.—Our glebe question still remains undecided. As it is, we know not how soon the Government may take the glebe from the Parish.
