If, therefore, a discriminating duty on Fish in any country be tolerated by England, it must be prejudicial not only to British Shipping, but actually prejudical to the Fisheries themselves: for if the Newfoundland merchant should be seriously injured in his ship-owning interest, it must of necessity so affect his interest generally, that he must (if he continue the trade) charge a high profit on his supplys to the fishermeneso as to place himself on an equal footing with the Spaniard, Portuguese, or Italian (who may be favoured by duty in his own prices. country); which higher rate of profit would of course so seriously affect the material for the information of the mer-Newfoundland fisherman, that many of that indistrous class must either undergo great privations, or exile themselves from that country, -- now in a large n.ajority of cases, their native land.
