For the promotion of the Trade and Fisheries.

The under mentioned merchants assembled the 30th Nov., 1837, at the Office of Mess. Newman, Hunts, & Christophers, No. 12, *New Broad Street, London*, to discuss such measures as it may be desirable to adopt with reference to the high duties charged upon the Newfoundland Fish in Spain, Portugal, and Italy; viz.,

John Gosse,

and the said discussion having been concluded, Mr. Job suggested, that it might prove very advantageous, if those persons who are engaged in the Newfoundland Fisheries would form themselves into a Society for their protection.

The Meeting concurring in the suggestion, Mr. Job moved, that Mr. M'Bride take the Chair.

Seconded by Mr. Brooking, and carried unanimously.

Moved by Mr. Job:

That it is expedient that the Newfoundland merchants and others interested in the Trade and Fisheries, should be invited to form themselves into a Society for the protection of the Fishing, Trading, and Commercial interests of that Colony.

Seconded by Mr. Gosse, and carried unanimously.

Moved by Mr. Brooking:

That as soon as twenty merchants, engaged in the Newfoundland Trade, shall have joined the Society, it shall be deemed to be formed, under the title of the "Newfoundland Association."

Seconded by Mr. Edward Hunt, and carried unanimously.

Proposed and carried, *nem. con.*:

That Mr. Brooking and Mr. Christophers be requested to prepare Rules and Regulations for the Society. And that this meeting do now adjourn until Saturday, the 2d proximo, at 12 o'clock, then to take the Rules and Regulations into consideration.

At a meeting of merchants interested in the Trade and Fisheries of Newfoundland, held at No. 12, *New Broad Street, London*, on Saturday, the 2nd Dec., 1837, (in conformity with the Resolutions of the preliminary meeting, held at the same place on the 30th ult. recommending that a society should be established for the protection of the Trade and Fisheries,) present

It was unanimously resolved to the following effect:

1st.—That the important interests of the Trade and Fisheries of Newfoundland have hitherto suffered materially from a want of co-operation by those engaged therein; and that the recent increase of the duty on Cod Fish in Portugal has demonstrated the paramount necessity of co-operation upon matters connected with their general welfare.

2d.—That a society, to be called the "NEWFOUNDLAND ASSOCIATION FOR THE TRADE AND FISHERIES," be established in London, and that the merchants and others resident in the United Kingdom, Newfoundland, and elsewhere, interested in the trade and fisheries, be invited to join the Association.

3d.—That the objects of the Association are to watch all proceedings in the British dominions and in Foreign countries which may either directly or indirectly affect the Newfoundland trade &

fisheries—to make representations to Government for the redress of any grievances—and to promote every object tending to the prosperity of all persons engaged in the trade and fisheries.

4th.—That the following Rules and Regulations be adopted for the government of the Association.

Individuals subscribing one pound or upwards annually, to be members, and to be entitled to attend General Meetings, and to give one vote.

Firms subscribing two pounds or upwards, to be members, and to be entitled to attend General Meeting, and to give two votes.

Firms subscribing three pounds or upwards annually, to be entitled to three votes.

No individual, whatever be the amount of his subscription, to be entitled to give more than one vote, and no firm to give more than three votes.

5th.—A Fund to be immediately raised for the permanent support of the Association by Donations and annual subscriptions, at the discretion of members and others.

6th.—All annual subscriptions to be for the year commencing 1st January and ending the 31st December, to be paid in London before the 1st of February of every year.

7th.—That the following gentlemen form a Provisional committee for the purpose of collecting subscriptions, of altering, or abolishing any of the Rules and Regulations, and of making the necessary arrangements for balloting for members to serve on the first General Committee: viz.,

And that Mr. Brooking and Mr. Christophers be requested to act as joint Honorary Secretaries, *pro tem.*

8th.—That the ballot for the appointment of the first General committee shall be taken in London, on the first Thursday in February 1838, at such time and place as may be appointed by the Provisional committee; and that the names of members proposed to form the General committee be forwarded to the Secretary on or before the second Thursday in January of every year.

9th.—No member except a merchant directly engaged in the trade and fisheries of British North America, is qualified to be a member of the General committee.

10.—The General committee so elected shall continue in office until the first Thursday in February of the ensuing year.

11th.—That the members resident at Greenock, Liverpool, Poole, Bristol, Dartmouth, Torquay, Teignmouth, Jersey, and Guernsey shall, at each place respectively, be at liberty to elect a "corresponding committee," the chairman of which shall be, *ex-officio*, a member of the General committee in London, and be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Association. At any General meeting of members, any other places shall be admitted as branches of the Parent Association, if recommended by 20 members.

12.—That a General meeting of the members of the Association shall be held annually in London, on the first Thursday in February, to receive from the committee a report of their proceedings during the preceding 12 months; and to elect by ballot 13 members to form a General committee, for the management of the affairs of the Association in London, during the ensuing 12 months.

13th.—Members of the general committee who, at any time, may be in London shall have the power of calling an Extraordinary General Meeting of the members, on any urgent occasion, after consulting the members of the committee

who may be resident at the Out-ports—14 days' notice at least, to be given of any such Extraordinary general meeting.

14th.—It shall be the duty of the chairman of the corresponding committee at each Out-port, to notify the members resident within his district, of all general meetings of the Association.

15th.—At all meetings of the general committee in London, three to form a quorum.

16th.—All subjects discussed in committee, or at general meetings, shall be decided by ballot, if demanded by one member and seconded by another.

17th.—No member shall be entitled to vote, until one month after he shall be elected.

19th.—Any individual member, or firm, whose annual subscription shall continue unpaid for 12 months, shall be deemed to have withdrawn from the Association, and not to be re-admitted except upon payment of a fine of £1 for every vote to which he, or the firm, may be entitled, in addition to the annual subscription.

20th.—Members resident beyond fifty miles of London, to be allowed to vote at all General Meetings, by proxy, if authorized by letter deposited with the Secretary. The proxy must be a Member of the Association.

21st.—The general committee shall meet in London on the first Thursday of each month, (or oftener by adjournment) and at the first meeting after their election, they shall appoint a chairman and Deputy Chairman, for the term of their remaining in Office.

22.—The Chairman, or, in his absence the Deputy Chairman with the consent of two other members of the committee, shall have the power to call a special meeting of the committee, whenever they may deem it absolutely necessary.

23.—The general committee will meet, during the first year at the Office of Messrs. Newman, Hunts, and Christophers, No. 12, *New Broad Street*; but thenceforward the committee shall provide such premises or Offices in London for the purpose of conducting the business of the association, as they may judge expedient.

24th.—It shall be in the discretion of the committee to provide maps & books for the use of the Association, but they shall not be removed from its office.

25th.—The committee shall likewise have power to annually appoint a Secretary, with such salary as they may consider equivalent to the services to be performed by him.

26th.—No Honorary Secretary shall receive, either directly or indirectly, any remuneration; but if any Honorary Secretary be appointed by a General Meeting of members, he shall be, *ex-officio*, a member of the general committee for the ensuing twelve months.

27th.—The funds of the association to be under the control and management of the committee, who are to lay before the general meeting of members, in February of each year, a detailed statement of the receipts and expenditure of the association.

28th.—All drafts and Checks for the payment of money to be signed by two members of the committee (one of whom must be the chairman or of deputy chairman), and counter-signed by the secretary.

29th.—The association to have a common seal, and Mr. Brooking, and Mr. Christophers, are requested to decide upon the device. &c.

30th.—The general committee to open a correspondence with the chambers of commerce at St. John's, Newfoundland and Harbor Grace, and such other bodies and places as may be deemed advisable, inviting their co-operation and assistance.

31st.—That the preceding Rules and Regulations may be altered, or abolished by the Provisional committee, before the election of the "general committee" in

February next, and thenceforward only by the Members assembled at the Annual general meeting of the Association; notice in writing to be given to the Secretary by two or more Members proposing any alteration, or abolition of the Rules and Regulations, at least three months before next ensuing Annual Meeting, when the matter shall be discussed and determined.

32d.—No alteration, or abolition of any of the fundamental Rules of the Association shall be valid without the concurrence, by ballot, of at least two-thirds of the votes, giving at a general meeting of members.

33d.—That the Rules and Regulations shall be printed and distributed under superintendance of Mr. Brooking and Mr. Christophers.

34th.—That the thanks of this meeting be given to Mr. Brooking and Mr. Christophers, for the assistance they have already rendered in forming the Association.

35th.—That the thanks of this Meeting be given to Mr. M'Bride, for his able and impartial conduct in the chair

TO THE RIGHT HONORABLE C. POULETT THOMSON,

PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD OF TRADE, &c. &c. &c.

LONDON, 30th Nov., 1837.

SIR,—With reference to the interview which we (Deputies from several Ports Connected with the Newfoundland Fisheries) had the honour of with you on the 25th inst., we are desirous before leaving London to lay before you a few observations, which we consider may be in some degree useful in the further consideration of the subject of the discriminating duty on Fish in Spain, &c.

The nature of the business carried on in Newfoundland consists in the British merchant importing into that country the provisions clothing, fishing tackle, and other necessities requisite for the prosecuting of the Fishery, without the "regular" supply of which necessities the Fishery could not exist, and issuing them on credit to the fisherman in the winter and spring months for their actual subsistence to be paid for in the fish they may catch during the ensuing summer, at such a price as may be fixed when the aggregate catch of the Island is ascertained:—the propable value of fish at such foreign markets as may be open to British ships, regulating the price to be paid to the fisherman.

The merchant who has been at the risk of a large outlay of capital for supplies to the fisherman and exposed to the risk of its total loss, from the precariousness of the Fishery, has at further risk and outlay of additional capital, provided his own ships to load the fish, calculating on the advantages which he, as a ship-owner would derive, by carrying that fish to the Southern Ports of Europe, Brazil &c., on an equality at least with other nations.—Hence the merchants connected with the Fisheries are all very considerable ship-owners, who employ their vessels almost exclusively in that trade.

The Seal Fishery at Newfoundland is the main stay of the greater part of the

copy. It employs about 370 vessels and 9,000 men for about two months; say from six to ten weeks in the months of March, April, and May. During the remainder part of the year many of the sailing vessels are employed in carrying Cod Fish to Spain, Portugal, &c. Let foreigners enjoy the carrying trade, these sailing vessels must lie up rotting in harbour; and thus, that hitherto invaluable branch of Newfoundland resource, the Seal Fishery, must decline; because the greatest possible success at that Fishery for two months cannot compensate for their continuing idle for the remaining ten months of the year.

If, therefore, a discriminating duty on Fish in any country be tolerated by England, it must be prejudicial not only to British Shipping, but actually prejudicial to the Fisheries themselves: for if the Newfoundland merchant should be seriously injured in his ship-owning interest, it must of necessity so affect his interest generally, that he must (if he continue the trade) charge a high profit on his supplies to the fishermen, so as to place himself on an equal footing with the Spaniard, Portuguese, or Italian (who may be favoured by duty in his own country); which higher rate of profit would of course so seriously affect the Newfoundland fisherman, that many of that industrious class must either undergo great privations, or exile themselves from that country,—now in a large majority of cases, their native land.

Thus, if such a ruinous system be allowed to continue as that now existing by the Spanish discriminating duty, and its possible imitation by the Portuguese (the present discriminating duty on Fish in Portugal is yet only 11s. per ton) the Newfoundland ship-owner and merchant must of necessity reduce the number of his ships, and, consequently, of his Imports into the Colony; and as neither of the fish-consuming countries (Spain, Portugal, nor Italy) can furnish the supplies necessary for the Fishery, their prices will inevitably be very much enhanced, and every article even of the first necessity to every fisherman will be supplied very irregularly and sometimes not at all.

It is therefore evident, although that very important branch of national prosperity—British Shipping—is the one directly attacked by the discriminating duty, levied in Spain, and exposed to be further increased in Portugal, that equally important branch—the Newfoundland Fishing Trade—which has been truly and appropriately termed a nursery for seamen, cannot itself fail to be seriously injured, by any measures prejudicial to the Newfoundland merchant and ship-owner.

If treaties of reciprocity should be made with those foreign countries upon which Newfoundland is materially dependent for the consumption of her Fish (admitting it at a moderate duty) we would respectfully suggest their adoption: conceding terms favorable to their produce, and granting by treaty, for a limited period, the like privilege of fishing on the Great Bank of Newfoundland which England ceded to France by the treaty of Paris, 30th May, 1814. (Ann. 13.—The French right of Fishing upon the Great Bank of Newfoundland, upon the coasts of the island of that name and of the adjacent islands in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, shall be replaced upon the footing in which it stood in 1792.)

We avoid suggesting any mode of retaliation that could, in any way, be deemed prejudicial to the fisherman and inhabitants of Newfoundland; because we are quite convinced that their welfare is so intimately interwoven with that of the Newfoundland merchant, that their interests are common; and we rely on Her Majesty's Government adopting such measures as will insure the admission of Newfoundland Fish to British ships, into Spain Portugal, and Italy, at a moderate rate of duty and on a perfect system of reciprocity, so as to avert the impending ruin of the Shipping and Fishing Interests of Newfoundland, the distress of her inhabitants, and the apprehended gradual depopulation of the oldest Colony of Britain.

To show how much former Boards of Trade encouraged Newfoundland merchants to supply foreign countries with Fish, we take leave to subjoin copy of a letter, written by the Board of Trade to the Mayor of Dartmouth 51 years ago; since when, the population of Newfoundland has increased fourfold, and, therefore, the being deprived of any of their accustomed Fish Markets will be the more ruinously felt.

Sir,

These extracts their Lordships judge material for the information of the merchants concerned in the Fisheries; as the one may prove the means of opening a new Market and extending the Fishery carried on by them, and the other points out in what manner the Fish fitted for the Italian Market should be cured.

ARMY—THE TROOPS FOR CANADA

The following may be taken as a pretty correct enumeration of the force intended to be embarked for this particular service, and we are led to believe that all are to proceed to Halifax as soon as the means of transport in ships of war can be provided:

One regiment of cavalry, augmented to	450
93d Highlanders, augmented strength	600
Brigade of guards, say	2000
65th regt. from W. I., augmented strength	600
23d fusiliers & 71st lt. infantry, augmented do.	1200
Augmentation of 100 rk. & f. to all regts. in Canada, Novascotia, & New Brunswick—namely, 1st royals, 15th, 24th 32d, 34th, 43d, 66th, 83d, & 85th	900

The 11th & 73d regts., ordered home from the Mediterranean, are to land at Gibraltar, there to await instructions in case their services should also be required in Canada.

The Inconstant has proceeded to Cork, and on her arrival there will take on board 250 r. & f. of the 93d Highlanders; the remainder of the regt. will follow as other vessels arrive.

Two companies of artillery are also, it is said, under orders for the same destination.

800 of the grenadier guards, & the same number of the Coldstreams, received orders yesterday to hold themselves in readiness to embark for Canada, it is supposed in the course of the week.

(From the Dublin Post.)

We understand that several regts including 3 or 4 now stationed in Ireland, have received orders of readiness to proceed to Halifax. We have not yet ascertained the numbers of all the regts.; but it is certain the 93d highlanders, are included. The 93d which goes out early next month, is to replace one of the regts. which left Nova Scotia for Lower Canada on the breaking out of the insurrection. We further learn, that Major-

General Sir Wm. M'Bean, while on his way to Limerick, to take the com. of that district, as successor to Major-Gen. L'Estrange, received an order from the Horse Guards to proceed forthwith to Cork, to hold himself in readiness by the 3d Jan. to sail for Halifax. Sir Wm., we have learned, is to be 2d in command to Sir J. Colborne in L. Canada.

It is said that Sir F. Stoven, who is now attached to the royal household, is to go out as ad-gen. The hon. col. Grey, equerry to the Queen, goes out early in the spring with his regt., the 71st lt. infantry.

An order has issued from the Horse Guards, cancelling the leave of all officers whose regts. are serving in Canada. They are to proceed without delay, via N. York, to join their respective corps.

We learn from Portsmouth that a ship of war, the Inconstant, was about to proceed to the north of Spain, with 1000 stand of arms & accoutrements; and it was rumoured that the marine bat. at Passage, which has been under the orders of Lord J. Hay, was to proceed in that vessels for Halifax.

Active preparations are, we are assured, making in every quarter to strengthen our military force in U. and L. Canada. Drafts from the depot companies of the regts. at present in the Canadas, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick, have orders to join immediately their respective regts.; so that the service companies of each corps will now be 6 in number, consisting of 100 r. & f. each. Two companies of the royal artillery, which were to have embarked yesterday for Jamaica and Barbados, have been countermanded, and are destined, it is rumoured, for Canada, via Halifax.

A brigade of the guards under the command of Lord Saltoun, and the 23d and 71st regts., will, it is said, leave England for Canada in the spring. The first battalion of the rifle brigade, stationed at Woolwich, is ordered to be held in readiness for immediate service. Its destination is, doubtless, to Canada. We stated in our last week's paper that the Inconstant was about to sail for Canada with Sir G. Arthur. Our Portsmouth correspondent writes that she left Spithead on Thursday with that officer, and is to proceed to Cork, for the purpose of taking up the service companies of the 93d regt.; but we have since heard that Sir G. Arthur will be conveyed to the N. York packet which left the Thames yesterday. The Hastings is also destined for Canada, with troops. Lieut.-col. Fitzgerald, late brigadier-gen. in Spain, is appointed inspecting field officer of militia in Canada. Captains De Rottenburg and Head, with a number of other half-pay officers of various ranks, have received orders to embark immediately for Canada, for the purpose of assisting in the organization of the militia.

It is supposed that the 85th, 93d, & 99th, with other regts., will leave Ireland for Canada forthwith. The 22d are certainly ordered to Cork, perhaps for embarkation. The service companies of the 93d will proceed to Halifax. The transports to convey them are expected every hour at Cove.

The following note from the commander-in-chief, with its answer, have been published:—

"Horse Guards, Dec. 29, 1837.

"Lord Hill, being about to submit to the Queen that two battalions of the guards should be

held in readiness to proceed to Canada, as soon as the season will permit their transport to Quebec, requests that you will inform him which two battalions are first on the list for foreign service.

Woolwich, Monday.—A detachment of the royal artillery, under the command of Lieut. Young, embarked on board the Royal Sovereign, Lieut. Brady, agent, yesterday, for St. Sebastian; 500 lbs. gunpowder, and other ammunitions of war were also put on board for the protection of that fortress. Orders have also been received here for 4 companies of artillery to hold themselves in readiness to embark for Canada. Two troops of horse artillery are ordered to Ireland, one of which will relieve the rocket troop stationed there, which will proceed to Canada. In addition to the above troops, two regts. of cavalry, six regts. of the line, and two battalions of the rifle brigade, are under orders for the same destination. These troops are to be augmented by two regts. of the line from the Mediterranean. Great activity among the military is observable in this garrison.

SMOKEY CHIMNEYS.—It has been clearly demonstrated by science and practical experiment, that this great drawback upon domestic comfort is remedied by an unerring and simple process, viz: a slight but continued enlargement, commencing at the bottom of the flue, and extending to the top. This is sure to produce a draft, and it is presumed that in most instances of defective chimneys an inattention to this simple rule in the original construction would be found the cause of the evil.—Niaq. Dem.

On Saturday last an operation was successfully performed in Exeter of the utmost importance to the medical profession and of still greater interest to persons labouring under pulmonary complaints. A young man of the name of Tucker had been afflicted for nearly two years with an abscess in the lungs, which had increased to such a height that his case was deemed utterly hopeless, and he came to Exeter for change of air. Mr. Tucker, surgeon, of his city, having about seventeen years ago performed a successful operation on the mother of this young man and as she is now alive and well he naturally made application to him, and consented to submit to have an incision made on his side. Mr. Tucker having by means of the stethoscope, ascertained the seat of the disease, most skillfully performed it in less than three minutes, when a quantity of matter, amounting to upwards of a quart, or thirty-three ounces imperial measure, issued from the orifice. His cough had been most harassing and incessant, not being able to place himself in a reclining position for fear of suffocation, being in constant pain, and he had no rest for more than nine months. He bore the operation with great fortitude, and is in a fair way of doing well.—[Western Luminary.]

Letters are said to have reached Paris announcing the death of Jerome Bonaparte, ex-King of Westphalia.

The latest accounts from Curraghmore Castle states that the Marquis of Waterford was still suffering from indisposition, arising from a complaint in his eyes, and yet some of the Scotch papers stated his Lordship to have been amusing himself by pelting rotten eggs at the heads of some of his lieges.

Mr. Coke, of Holkham, having been created Viscount Coke and Earl of Leicester, was, in the usual manner, and with the accustomed forms, on Monday introduced into the House of Lords, and took the oaths and his seat.

The Paris press is much occupied with the squabbles which have taken place between the leaders of the opposition, M. M'auquin and Odillon Barrot. These differences will increase the strength of the Ministry, already improved by the decline of the Doctrinaire party, and the almost total extinction of the Legitimate.

Affairs in both Spain and Portugal wear a very sombre aspect. The government of both countries seem almost to admit their inability to restore tranquility to either.

Letters from Rome, announce the decease of Cardinal Geo. Doria Pamfili, of an attack of apoplexy, being the sixth member of the Sacred College dead in the short space of six months. Two more (Cardinals Membrini and Benvenuti) were at the point of death.

SUICIDE OF A METHODIST MINISTER.—On Thursday week, the Rev John Gill Methodist minister at Ulverstone, put a period to his existence by cutting his throat with a penknife whilst in a state of temporary delirium.—*Liverpool Mercury.*

Horrible Death.—On Thursday evening last, between eight and nine o'clock Mr. John Campbell, a respectable tallow chandler, in John street, met a sudden & most execrable death. His soap-boiling works are immediately in the rear of the shop and dwelling-house; and one of his children having been in the yard, and noticing a pan of soap in the act of boiling over, ran into the house, to give notice of the circumstances to her father; to the surprise of the family he was not to be found and no one knew any cause for his absence from the premises, where he had not been seen for at least twenty minutes. Search was immediately made, and—dreadful end!—the first person who looked into the large vessel of boiling liquid discovered his body, almost boiled to a jelly! Such was the heat of the liquor in the pan that the person who assisted in getting out the ill-fated individual had his hands and arms severely scalded by mere contact with the dead body. Mr Campbell bore a most unblemished character, and has left a widow and several children to mourn his premature and horrible death.

Mrs. Fraser, whose sufferings among the savages at Torres Straits were so well dramatized at the Mansion House, has been residing in Greenock. She and her husband (Captain Green) have left that place for the purpose of visiting her children in Orkney. It seems that the gulls of London contributed £1500, which, it is said, and we hope truly, has been judiciously deposited under proper security for behoof of Captain Fraser's children.

A letter from the Cape of Good Hope, mentions the death of the Governor, Sir J. D'Urban. He was ridden over by a horse, and had his skull fractured, causing his death in a few hours.

CARRICKFERGUS.—This is the only town of Ireland that does not contribute to the O'Connell Compensation Fund.

The O'Connell annuity sent from Charleville three months since, has been set down amongst "lost or mislaid" if not worse!

The Grand Jury having fully investigated the several claims of the Messrs Guinness to compensation for the malicious destruction of their property since the last Dublin election have passed and allowed the several presentments awarding the full amounts respectively claimed by the Messrs Guinness.

We call the attention of our readers to-day to the extracts we have made from London dates to the 4th Jan brought by the *Triamirate*, capt. GREEN, from Poole, which vessel has been forced by the ice into *St. Mary's*, whilst the letters and papers by her have been despatched to *Carbonear* overland.

It will be highly pleasing to every lover of constitutional order to find how promptly Her Majesty's government act on the news reaching the mother country of the late civil war in Canada; by despatching men-of-war (amongst which are the following, *Hastings*, 74, *Inconstant* and *Pique* large class frigates), and other shipping, with a military force consisting of several thousand troops, commanded by officers of high character and experience; some of whom served and distinguished themselves in that country in the late war with the United States of America; who, consequently, possess a thorough knowledge of the Province, and who are to be followed by several other regiments, early in the present spring.

Equally gratifying we know it will be to every loyal subject residing in this Island to be informed, that by the English files we have perused brought by this opportunity, but one feeling of sincere attachment pervades the people of England towards Her Majesty who have evinced an anxiety and determination to

support the Ministry in silencing by force of arms, the machinations and wicked designs of the rebels in Lower Canada, however parties at home are found to differ in matters of internal policy and government. But we are rejoiced to find that the Province itself, without aid from Britain was able to put down the rebellion there, and put to flight the principal agitators and abettors in that diabolical conspiracy.

The names of those villainous ruffians Pappineau, Brown, O'Callahan, M'Kenzie, and others, who led the poor deluded Canadians into all the horrors of a civil war, and then abandoned them in the hour of necessity by decamping, will long be painfully remembered by the unfortunate families who are now suffering all the pangs entailed upon them by that ill-concerted and traitorous measure.

May this prove a warning to the people of this once happy Island, and may they no longer be led away by the mob-operators of the day, who pretend to patriotism and reform, and by deception and false declaration would entail upon society the same sort of distress and misery to suit their own ambitious purposes: for strong and mighty as the "people" may fancy themselves, they may certainly rest assured, that there is that heart-stirring spirit of loyalty felt, and fostering care and interest evinced by England towards her colonies and possessions abroad, that a sufficient aid, when necessary, would be promptly sent to the most distant part of the globe by Her Majesty's government, to put down rebellion and civil war whenever they would appear.
