Heffernan, on Prince St., Halifax, for another twenty-five years. He then became associated with John Fraser in a commission business known as Heffernan, Fraser and Co. He afterwards went into the same line under the firm name of Delaney, Heffernan & Co. He went to Springhill, N. S., in 1885, and considering the unfortunate history of this town, he has done exceedingly well, having built up a first-class furniture business, and now has the entire trade of that district to himself. He has been in his present location for twenty-five years, and bids fair for a continuance of another such term.


