OCCASIONAL LETTER

The appeal on behalf of our colored fellow-citizens. — The arrival of H. M. S. *Ceylon* with 250 of that race. — Who formerly owned Belmont.

Successful career of a former Halifax merchant.

The appeal to public generosity that is now being made on behalf of our colored fellow-citizens, to enable them to establish a meeting house for divine worship—a tabernacle that, for all church purposes, will be in keeping with the surroundings of Halifax in all that makes for the moral and religious welfare of the whole community, should meet with a hearty response from all classes. More than one sound reason could be advanced for the giving of prompt aid at this time. To the leaders of public thought, there is a plain path in which their steps must be directed, or otherwise there will be vain regrets.

A native of Halifax wrote, some years ago, a peculiarly interesting communication on certain features of Halifax in the history of the last century. Among other matters he referred to the colored people who were brought to Halifax in ship loads from the Chesapeake during the summer of 1845—men, women and children, the arrival of H. M. S. *Ceylon*, on May 10, 1815, with 250 blacks.

"If ever," wrote this old-timer who wielded a somewhat frisky pen, "there was a good man and a humble clergyman, the Rev. John Burton, was one. So everybody said, and so everybody believed it. His church was situated at the corner of Harrington and Bunkin street, a handsome, two-story wooden affair, perhaps somewhat better than the Dutch one on Brunswick street, but devoid of a steeple."

By-the-way, in those days, steeples, bells, organs, etc., were either not permitted or not indulged in by non-conformist persuasion. I never think of not permitting for the church, as it was called, was absolute in political matters, and the rights of conscience with all those who differed from it were not at that time of day taken into the smallest consideration—not from a feeling of enmity on the part of the ruling power, but because everything was admitted, taken for granted, on all sides, that what was, was right—until remedied.

How changed everything now—whether politically, ecclesiastically, socially or by any other way! The ruling passion of the present day is to see who can run up the highest steeple, blow the biggest organ, pull the noisiest bell. While in addition to this, "old St. Paul's" has long since been thrown into the shade by architecturally speaking, by the one unimpaired English cathedral in the city, the one which in his own quiet way.

Mr. Burton) there—the last place in the world, one would think, for such an impious creature.

And I am not quite sure, Mr. Editor, but that one of your readers had something to do with this destruction.
