

TEHERAN RESTORED TO A STATE OF CALMNESS

His Enemies Warned by Other Powers

ST. PETERSBURG, June 26.—A foreign office communication, based on the report received from M. Hartwig, Russian minister to Persia, confirms the news that quiet has been restored in Teheran. It states that the cabinet remains in power and that the Shah's position is believed to be greatly improved. The Russian and British representatives at Teheran have cognizance of the intrigues of Zill-Es-Sultan, the uncle of the Shah, who has been warned to desist. Although the official representations which have been made to the Shah deal exclusively with the matter of safety of Europeans in Persia, both Russia and Great Britain have strongly hinted to him that he must uphold the constitution in order to save the throne. The Shah has der to save the throne. The Shah has vowed his determination to preserve the national council. The communicathe national council. The communication admits that M. Hartwig played a leading part in the negotiations between the National Council and the Shah, acting as intermediary. The Russian Minister has certified that the council is cognizant of intrigues against the Shah.

THE RELATION OF THE CLOUDS TO NATURE

The study of natural laws not infrequently reveals a close relation between some of the most beautiful phenomena of the earth and sky and the most terrible exhibitions of the destructive powers of nature. A striking instance of this is the crown of light, feathery cirrus clouds which floating high in the clear sunshine, indicate to the practised eyo of the seaman the place where a West India hurricane is raging across the deep.

These clouds radiate from the centre of the hurricane where the fierce spiral currents of inblowing air, crowding together, rise to a great elevation, and then flow outward in every direction over the storm.

From the huse and textures of the distant clouds something may be learned of the character of the storm that when the cirrus cloud plumes seen radiating from the storm are faint and opalescent in tint, gradually fading behind a veil of haze, the approaching storm is an old one of large area; but if the clouds are "of snowy whiteness, projected against a clear blue sky, it is a young cyclone of small area but great intensity."


