One of the most puzzling questions in botany is, "Why or how does water rise to the top of a tree?" Various explanations of the phenomenon have been proposed, but none is regarded as altogether satisfactory. Dr. E. B. Copeland recently attacked the problem by means of interesting and novel experiments. For instance, he constructed an "artificial tree" of plaster of Paris, and found that water moved upward in it more than 40 feet. Yet he was unable to base any definite conclusion upon the results that he obtained. The water travels a large part of the way in a film, between bubbles on one side and the wall of the conducting vessel on the other. But the physical properties of the film are yet unknown.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon

and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely own-

or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead.

Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.


